

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

After the Benefit Auction, I received several phone calls from members who were very upset about the fact that there was not going to be a flea market on the square. The Sertoma Club which had sponsored it for several years, is moving its flea market from the square to Roper parking lot on Union Street. We felt that since there is so much desire to have one on the square that the Heisey Club should do something about it. HEISEY DECORATIONS

Several months ago I received : very interesting letter from a former Heisey sales representative regarding a column I had written on Pembroke cutting (July, 1982). I think many of you might be interested in his letter.

"Please permit me to introduce myself: I was a road salesman for Heisey from 1937 to 1953 and am still active in the field. I plan to retire about Jan. 1. 1983 as that marks the date of my fiftie year selling fine china and glass.
"I am an avid reader of HEISEY

NEWS and I do admire your articles and the

research that must go into them.

"I would like to criticize you in one small error you make when you write about hand-made, hand-blown crystal that i polished; as in the NEWS of July 32, , ge 9. You call it "891 Pembroke Cutting-Rock Crystal". In the text you wrote " cutting is rock crystal (although the vase I have seen..." etc.

"Actually in the trade, we do not use the term "Rock Crystal." I looked at three dictionaries to make sure but all call it "a transparent quartz". The U. S. Customs only allows we importers to use the words "full lead crystal" when the lead content is 24% or more. (Up to 30% actually.) Heisey ran about 8-10%, or so I was told back then.

"No doubt in your studies of trade papers of the 'thirties' you found the term "Rock Crystal" being used but the Better Business Bureau does not approve. The malefactor of course was Cataract-Sharpe of Buffalo who called their produce "Rock Sharpe Crystal." Sharpe was the largest in the business - by far - and their competition was tough. They did not make glass but bought most of their blanks from Bryce (now Lenox).

"Hope the above is of some use to

· Ju. "I have never read an article on the prisms on Heisey candelabra. I would Jues the average collector feels they are Heisey glass. During W. W. II we made som pressed prisms (awful); I bet you could male an interesting piece on prisms - where they came from - how they were made, etc....

As you can imagine, I was thrilled to hear from Mr. Bosworth. As a collector who became interested in Heisey glass long after the factory closed, I find it very

interesting to hear from anyone who had first hand knowedge of the company and

glass making in general.

As to the term "Rock Crystal" -Heisey used this term consistently in their catalogs and price lists to refer to cuttings which were polished to a bright appearance. This was most commonly done by an acid bath in the 1930's and later. Heisey's continued to use this term until the factory closed. This is why we still use this terminology when speaking about Heisey cuttings. Mr. Bosworth is entirely correct about the actual, correct use of the term "Rock Crystal". It actually only should refer to the natural mineral, quartz which is sometimes found in pure enough form to be called "rock crystal".

He is also right about the controversy about the use of the term in the glass industry and the resulting comments in trade journals. The following quotes are taken from articles in CHINA, GLASS &

LAMPS from the mid thirties:

"ROCK CRYSTAL GLASSWARE -- Natural rock crystal, or transparent quartz, is not used commercially in making rock crystal glassware. Rock crystal glassware is a highly polished, thin blown glassware with a high metallic resonance and unusual brilliancy. It is manufactured commercially from natural transparent quartz sand or powdered natural quartz to which is added potash and saltpeter as fluxes and certain metallic oxides to give added brilliancy. The mixture is melted at about 2450 degrees Fahrenheit. The term "rock crystal glassware" should be confined to describing glassware made in this manner. It should not be used to describe plain glass." This quotation is taken from an article entitled "DENOUNCING MISLEADING ADVERTISING" which deals mostly with etched glass versus mold etched glass.

Another article from 1935 entitled "HO GLASS IS DECORATED" has this to

say about Rock Crystal":

"For the purposes of simplification, nearly all cut designs produced for popular consumption fall into several general classifications. One of these is the "rock crystal" cutting, which is, of course, not rock crystal at all. The term today identifies that elaborate, highly-polished cutting of the type developed in England about 200 years ago in imitation of the ornaments cut from rock crystal. Such designs are often floral in motif, combined with medallions, scrollwork, or other intricate decorative ideas.

I'd like to publicly thank Mr. Bosworth for his enlightening letter about plass and Heisey in particular. I hope he will write more about his reminiscences of the Heisey company and his experiences as a sales representative for them. We'd like to publish these in the HEISEY NEWS.

As to his reference about Heisey prisms, Tom Felt has done an article on the Heisey-made prisms during World War II. This article appeared in May, 1979.

THERE'S MAGIC IN HEISEY

As you know, the theme of this year's Convention is "There's Magic In Heisey". How true this is! What else can you think of that can capture and entrance you the way collecting Heisey does? I was told when I started collecting that a dedicated collector would give up most anything to collect Heisey, including new clothes and maybe even food. It hasn't been quite that bad but it certainly does cast a spell and you can't resist either that bargain nor that highly coveted piece of glass. Perhaps that is good because it is the most fun way of saving that I know.

Those of you who have not collected or belonged to the HCA for any length of time have no idea what our convention is like. Many longtime members arrive here at least by Sunday or Monday of convention week for that is a time to visit friends here or to make new friends. It also gives time to visit the beautiful museum and browse as long as you

want before the real rush starts.

Last year the electricity went off most of the day before convention started but people crowded our gift shop and the second's shop in the lower level all day long. Candles were used for illumination. It was really a fun day, however. (A sad note was that during all this confusion someone (certainly not a Heisey club member) filched the Bobeches from our New Era Candlesticks in the office building. We would surely like to have them back.

For the new member it must be an incredible thrill to go through our museum and see all the lovely pieces you never even knew existed. The friendliness of our people and their helpfulness will surprise you too.

Beginning on Saturday and Sunday, June 11 and 12 there will be a flea market on Newark's public square. This year it is being sponsored by HCA and managed by Newark Area Study Clubs. This will be repeated on June 18 and 19 and especially at that time many of our members will set up for a day or so which means there will be plenty of Heisey there. This helps pay your convention expenses.

During this same week there will be a flea market in Granville and another in Newark. Area residents have yard sales and there will be an All-Heisey Auction on the 18th. (See ad this issue). The more things that go on

the more people come.

The display will not open on Thursday this year but all day there will be presentations of our sound movie "The Heisey Glass Story", Videotapes of TV shows about Heisey and various slide shows, all in the ballroom of the Sheraton Inn, the convention headquarters. The museum will be open from 9 to 5 p.m.

On Thursday evening, June 16 the convention starts with a Champagne Preview and this is titled "Top Hat and Tails" to indicate the magic in our world of Heisey. The cost is \$5.00 for registered members and \$7.00 for those who do not register and for the general public. This lasts from 6 - 10 and will give

you plenty of time to look over the show and to partake of hors d'oeuvres and champagne. There will be a different caterer this year and we hope to work out the problem of the food running out

Prior to the show opening on Friday, the ever popular show and tell and glass identification will be held at the Sheraton Inn, the convention headquarters. This is held on Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and a continental breakfast will be served. You must be registered to attend. This is usually one of the most popular events. "The Wizards of Odds" should be of great help to you, though some people prefer to call this "Stump the Dummy", and often they do. There will be a knowledgeable panel to help on this.

On Friday afternoon you will get your first look at the fabulous glass display to be held in Hopewell Hall and, again, if it is your first time to see this the magic will be at work because you will be spell bound. This is especially true of the gorgeous tables set as for a luncheon, in all the rainbow of colors made by Heisey. Study clubs and individuals will be having clever booths with more beautiful glass making this event the "Great Spectacular".

The show itself will feature 56 booths of the rare and the not so rare, whichever your heart desires. This is one time when rarity almost seems common, the magic effect of Heisey Land. Dealers bring their finest to this show from all over the United States.

On Friday afternoon "The Magic Makers", the former employees, will be guests at a reception and HCA members are invited to mingle with them. A program is being planned for this event.

On Friday evening the show closes at five to give everyone time to get into their "best bib and tucker" for the banquet which is called "Bewitching Time" this year to fit into the theme. We will have a good magician as well as other things for your entertainment and fun.

On Saturday the slide show "This Is Your Life" which was presented in 1981 to celebrate our 10th Anniversary, will be shown at both 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. at the Sheraton. This will give, especially the new collector, an insight into history of the club for the first ten years and show the progress made. Everyone enjoyed this when it was shown originally.

On Saturday afternoon there will be three seminars.

The first, at 2 p.m., will be on "Orchid Etching" by Bob Rarey. He will be showing choice pieces with Orchid etching and answering your questions.

At 3:15 p.m., Bob Ryan will do a seminar on "Stems". Bob is one of the co-authors of "Heisey Stemware", and will be using slides and examples of stems. He will be looking at stems from a collectors point of view and will also talk about rarity.

The third seminar, 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. is called "Casting A Spell" and is the story of Heisey's advertising from 1897 - 1952. Tom Felt and Bob O'Grady have done extensive research and they will have a fine slide pro-

gram for you which will be of great interest.

In the evening, from 8:30 to 11, the Ballroom at the Sheraton will be filled with eager members ready to trade the "unwanted" for the "wanted". Wild two and three way trades take place here. Once you get into the trading spirit and learn the ropes this can be a real fun thing. "Grand Illusions" is a fitting name for this. As we go to press we still need a club to manage this event, an easy job for two or three people.

If you are fortunate (or unfortunate) enough to be on the Board of Directors of HCA, a long session will begin at about 9 p.m. Some of these last until two or three in the morning.

Let's hope this is a short meeting.

On Sunday morning at 8 a.m. at the "Vanishing Hours", the final session, there will be a breakfast buffet. This will be followed by the annual meeting with election of Board members and reports from the study clubs.

For the voting member this is a must, unless you have already requested your absentee ballot. I will not be too late, even at the breakfast, to get a voting membership for a one-time fee of \$25. As always there is a good slate of candidates. There will be no nominations from the floor since this was done in March so that there would be time to get the

ballots out to meet the deadline.

Of course while all the rest of this is going on the show is open everyday at noon, the flea markets are going on and the museum is open at 9 a.m. daily. The lower level lounge will be open for refreshments (cookies brought by club members) coffee and iced tea. Also we'll have that delicious cheese again brought by the Dairyland HCC of Wisconsin. We still need two clubs to help man this event. The museum and lounge will close the same hours as the show except on Thursday when it will close at five to allow time for people to get to the show preview.

Many people who attend tell us that our convention is the best run of any that they have ever attended anywhere. We are proud of

that and hope it continues to be true.

Make yourself known to people here. We all want to be friends. If we are too busy for anything but a friendly "hello" we are

sorry because we do care about you.

Be sure to wear your badge all the time which will allow you into all free events. Also the badges impress the Newark people some of whom haven't realized yet what an impact this museum and convention has on this little city whose greatest claim to fame nationally is that Heisey glassware was made here. As you all know Heisey Glassware causes a stir anywhere in the collecting world.

Be sure to come this year. You will not regret it! Make it your vacation - after leaving here you can also attend the Fostoria and Cambridge conventions which follow ours.

Send your registrations in early. See forms for this on Pages 22 and 23.





NO. 133 SWANHANDLED CANDLESTICK

In 1926 Heisey introduced its first console set, the No. 116 Oakleaf. It was not until 1929, however, that they started going for console sets in a big way. In that year they introduced eight sets; the No. 132 Sunburst, the No. 133 Swanhandled, the No. 134 Trident, the No. 135 Empress, the No. 1205 Raindrop, the No. 1231 Ribbed Octagon, the No. 1252 Twist and the No. 1401 Empress. The December 1929 issue of the Pottery, Glass and Brass Salesman reported that "These are some new bowls with candlesticks to match. For the first time Heisey has brought out some handled bowls..... One striking handle treatment is a particularly good simulation of a swan. The candlestick is made with the upper portion showing two swans joined together... These bowl and candlestick sets are sufficiently ornamental in themselves to stand alone, but they are also susceptible to ornamentation in the hands of cutters and decorators." In the April 1930 issue of Crockery and Glass Journal the swan handled console set was pictured with the caption... "This sparkling flower bowl and . candlesticks come in all the new colors and are manufactured by the A. H. Heisey Glass Co." Then the May 1930 edition of House and Garden carried a very good picture of both the bowl and candlestick and indicated it was made in crystal, green (moongleam), pink (flamingo), amethyst (alexandrite) and amber (sahara). The description went on to say it was moderately priced and suitable for a country house on account of its pleasing colors.

The No. 133 candlestick was carried in most of Heisey's price lists and catalogs from the end of 1929 to 1936. Although it is not as scarce as once thought, there were certainly not as many of these made as some of the others of the period. There was most likely at least a full turn made in each of the colors, i.e.

crystal, sahara, moongleam, flamingo, and alexandrite. The December 1929 issue of Pottery, Glass, and Brass Salesman tells us it was even made in marigold. Since this color was being phased out about this time there may have been some feasibility items made in marigold and even displayed in the New York showroom. At most I would suspect there may have been a short turn made.

The only turn book reference to this candlestick is one turn made in sahara in 1930. The other available turn book listings for 1931 and 1932 make no reference to it. Nor does the information available from May 1935 through December 1936. So it seems that although the No. 133s were available for about six years their actual manufacture was rather sporadic. They were probably only a moderate seller. A sketch of this candlestick appeared in the January 11, 1937 issue of the Chicago American newspaper where the Marshall Field Department Store advertised their once a year factory clearance of Heisey glass. This ad was reproduced in the March 3, 1938 Heisey News.

The candlestick itself is 6-1/2" high. As seen in the accompanying photo the column is composed of two identical swans back to back with their necks curved down so that their beaks rest on their chests. The effect is the semblance of handles formed by the swans necks. As usual Heisey's moldwork defining the wings and feathers is excellent. The candleholder (cup) portion is usually plain for a Heisey candlestick of this period and there is a plain ball connecting the swans to the base. It seems never to be marked with the Diamond H and was

not reissued by Heisey.

While a pair in alexandrite would be an exciting find, the rarest and most desirable would be a pair in marigold.

Editor's Note: There was also a Swan Handled bowl in the Ridgeleigh pattern and an underplate to go with it. There were no special candlesticks to go with it, however.



DIAMONDS ARE FOREVER.....

On September 5, 1775, an armed schooner of uncertain origin sailed forth from North Shore waters under orders from General Washington to seize "such vessels as may be found on the High Seas or elsewhere, bound inward and outward to or from Boston in the service of the ministerial army".

The vessel was the "Hannah" owned by our own John Glover, who was serving at the time as Colonel in Washington's army, manned by seamen from that same town and under the command of Nicholson Broughton. Thus our Town's claim as "The Birthplace of the American Navy".

Again it was General John Glover and his Regiment from the Yachting Center who successfully rowed Washington and his troops across the Delaware to surprise the British at Trenton on December 26, 1776.

That was over a hundred years before A. H. Heisey Co. started producing glass, in April of 1896.

One of my new contributors that shall be called, "the Felicitous Flamingo Hunter", (you will understand the name as time goes on.), has a #150 Pointed oval in Diamond Point spooner in Emerald; this pattern was introduced in the year 1896. Her other finds are as follows: #3440 Portsmouth 7 oz sherbet in flamingo, #1252 Twist 8" Kraft cheese plate in flamingo and a #1252 12" oval floral bowl, flamingo. Her crystal finds were the #1536 military cap and 1/2 doz. #406 Coarse Rib 7" plates..... "Curley" called me a couple of weeks ago all excited, as well he should be. There was only one piece to report but, what a goodie!!! #1183 Revere Punch Bowl, signed and cut, 8-1/2" tall and 8-1/4" diameter at the top. A picture can be seen in the January 1982 Heisey News - page 8...... My "first Convention Heisey friend" reports a #461 Basket, cut, and a Recessed Panel Basket.... the hunter from "the Point" has been quite busy of late, with her spy glass, and came up with a couple "nice" pieces; #373 Colonial Goblets, twenty-four (24) of them, marked and in their original box. I could cry! Also #468 Octagon with Rim nappies, one large and six small. It sure does pay to get out that spy-glass..... my good "English Buddy" talks about a pair of #29 Candlesticks, #1255 Pineapple and Fan cream and sugar in Emerald, with good gold, #1170 Pleat and Panel 8" vase in Moongleam, #1404 Old Sandwich Individual ash-tray and last but by far not least the #4229 D/O Favor vase in cobalt...... It just wouldn't seem right if the "Tipper" didn't come up with a few special things, so here goes. #:250 Groove and Slash cruet: #393 Narrow Flute 4 oz 'ow footed sherbets, two of them; #433 Greek Key 2 oz wine, double marked (now that's a goodie); three #393 Narrow Flute 4-1/2 oz Hollow stem champagnes, straight; #1025 Hotel Creamer with wheel cut and #1021

Sugar and Cover with the same wheel cut. These were sold as a pair. Well Tipper, keep looking and maybe you will come across the other two paired up again..... This month I heard from "the Empire State of the South", and it seems he found a lovely little #343 Sunburst toothpick in crystal, but to his dismay it was chipped so he let it pass; but three (3) #3404 Spanish stems with cobalt bowls were not passed by, those, needless to say were a present to himself. I do think that was a nice present.... from the "Sunshine State" comes a pair of #140 Candlesticks in Sahara, hmmmmmmm very nice, and a #1205 Fancy Loop oval relish in Emerald. O.K. Sunshine State, how about another letter just like your last one, please!..... Now how can we leave out the "Buck-eye State" #485 Perfume and #1252 Vinegar and Oil bottle with moongleam stopper..... now back to the "Bay State" to see what all those good people can brag about.
"Twinkle Toes" wants to boast about a #1200 Cut
Block cruet and a #1201 Fandango cruet; besides that how about the #480 8" Fruit Basket, that is a real beautiful basket..... "that Terrific Lady" purchased a #473 Narrow Flute with Rim Powder jar..... and "Mr & Mrs Speedy" have a #1401 Empress 12" sandwich tray with cutting.... a lovely Knife rest marked twice, once on the side and again on one end, was picked up by another Bean Town collector..... Yours Truly could hardly contain herself when she found the elusive pair of #1519 Waverly 3-lite Candelabrum. 

This was one of the very early patterns, beginning in 1896.* Ruth Webb Lee included this pattern in her book on Victorian Glassware and called it "Cut Block".** Minnie Watson Kamm, in her Sixth Pitcher Book, refers to it simply as Heisey's No. 1200. She includes a factory advertisement from one of the trade catalogs showing several pieces of the line.

The pattern is very plain with just an ornate band around the body, which resembles a row of diamonds with fine cut. HCA owns original Heisey catalogs showing this pattern in a complete line, including table set, water set, nappies, salver, cruet, etc. It was made plain or engraved which was probably lightly cut and decorated. Some decoration was done with acid and also with ruby stain. The small individual cream and sugar are often seen as ruby stained souvenir items.


The pattern was produced primarily in crystal and so far no crystal piece has been found signed with the Diamond H trademark. One finds the individual cream and open sugar in custard usually decorated as a souvenir item. These items were probably reissued when the custard souvenirs were so popular. Some of these (custard) items have been found with the Diamond H molded in the inside bottom. No pieces have been found in any color than custard. This pattern has never been reproduced.


*One of the first two patterns, Fandango being the other. **Vogel named the pattern "Square in Diamond Point." HCA prefers to use the shorter name "Cut Block" which it had been named much earlier. Only the number is original as Heisey did not name many of the earlier patterns. Names were supplied by researchers.

Editor's Note: The complete line of #1200 was shown in Heisey News in three issues in 1975. These were No. 10, P. 13; No. 11, P. 12, No. 12, P. 17. Other pictures can be found in the June issue, 1982 with my article on "Heisey's Little Things".

In regard to the article and pictures for Locket on Chain in the April issue, Louise White writes that I forgot the cake basket. I am sorry about that but we apparently do not have a catalog picture of it. Louise has one and she had sent a color picture of it but it is not clear enough to print. Bob O'Grady also wrote that he and Tom had found the cake salver, another nice piece.

LETTERS FROM A. H. HEISEY & CO. TO

R. C. (ROD) IRWIN, Sales Manager

April 24, 1926

Dear Sir:

We have your route list of the 16th, and have delayed answering it owing to fact that I have been laid up with a cold for a few days. Hence, the delay. Although we do not know definitely whether Charley will again make a trip or not, it is quite doubtful. Still he wanted to make a trip this May, advising us just day before yesterday. In any event, should he make a couple more trips, we will have to again cover his trips in order to build up the trade in this territory which has gotton away.

So until further notice, you will make St. Louis. We will send you a list of the trade in St. Louis on Monday. You can see by their purchases that some hard work will have to be put in to bring St. Louis quota up to where it should be. You better spend a number of days there and work it over good and hard. We know that you wouldn't intentionally say anything derogatory with reference to Mr. Cassel, but please make it a special point to say only nice things about him. He not only deserves it, but has a good many friends in St. Louis. Frank y, he is a wonder at his age, almost eighty. If we are half as good as he is at that age, I say Amen! We all think an awful lot of him.

We notice that Waterloo, Dubuque, Ottumwa, Keokuk, Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Mt. Pleasant, Fort Adison, Sioux City and Fairfield are not on your list. Do we assume the fact that we notice in making up your list that you made these towns earlier in the year? We would like to see you go over Dakota. These towns are far apart, we know, but that makes business better, because people who have money in these towns buy at home. It is too hard to go abroad for them. In opening any new accounts, please send name of buyer also, so that we can keep our files complete, and thereby be assured that our advertising literature goes to right people in the stores. We note in most cases that you are sending orders in Flamingo with the word rose. We know this is much easier, but there are and will be quite a few roses on the market, so that if we call ours Flamingo th. public will think of our product as something distinctive from ordinary rose. And it is. as far as anything we have seen so far is concerned. (We wish, if you would, in order to facilitate matters here at the office, put all your orders for MoonGleam and all your orders for Flamingo on separate order sheets, just as you do on blown and pressed. We hope this will not be too much trouble for you.) Hoping that St. Louis will be both a lucrative and convenient place and also congenial place for you to make, we remain.

January 20, 1933

Dear Sir:

As a further curtailment of expense, we have been shooting our people who have been traveling by machine on the 5¢ a mile basis. In this, we have consulted with not only the companies here that are using machines on the road, but some of our friends in the trade, and in no place do we find them paying more than 5¢ a mile.

To figure this out from a proper analytical basis, we have taken a unit of 30,000 miles. You will probably use 2,000 gallon of gasoline, which at 20¢ per gallon (and we can buy all the gas in the world down here for 14¢) would amount to \$400.00. We also estimate that you will use 300 Qts. of Oil at 30¢ per Quart, or about \$90.00 worth of oil during that period. Washing Car \$50.00; Storage \$150.00; Tires, two sets, \$80.00; Repairs, \$200.00, making \$970.00 Total. 30,000 miles at 5¢ per mile is \$1500.00, which leaves you a balance to make a trade-in on your car, \$530.00, which seems to us more than ample when the 30,000 miles has been finished.

We don't want you to think that we have suddenly gone Scotch, or anything of that kind. Gasoline and everything in the connection with an automobile has come down since the time we originally started you on the 7¢ basis, and in view of this and extenuating circumstances under which we are all operating at this time, we think it is only right and fair that we should bring our price down to 5¢ a mile.

MAJOR PRESSED GLASS EXHIBITION TO OPEN AT CORNING MUSEUM

"Pressed Glass 1825-1925," a major exhibition of more than 200 objects illustrating the development of glass made by machine, will open April 30 at The Corning Museum of Glass, Corning, N.Y. The display will remain on view until Oct. 30.

Both American and European objects will trace the development of design and technology from the first patent application for a simple glass knob in the 1820s to stylish automobile hood ornaments a century later.

The exhibition will display pieces from the extensive collection of The Corning Museum of Glass as well as from museums and private collections in the U.S. and abroad.

This story of an American achievement and its revolutionary effect on glassmaking begins with the mechanical press. A piece of table glass that a team of three or four skilled workers would have needed several minutes to make could be shaped and decorated in only one step nd a few seconds by just two semiskilled men with the new press. Production time and labor costs were reduced; glass was available to everyone at affordable prices.

European glass manufacturers, quick to adopt the improved technology, were soon mass-producing tableware and novelty objects with the mechanical press. Rene Lalique, a French glassmaker and jeweler, used the process to turn out memorable sculptures, vases, auto-mobile hood ornaments and other innovative designs. His work set a new artistic standard in pressed glass.

Another milestone in the history of pressed glass was also an American innovation. The development, around 1900, of the automatic

pressing machine enabled glass companies to mass-produce tableware more cheaply than ever. Incredible as it seems today, it was possible to buy an entire set of matching glass tableware from the 5 and 10 cent store for less than a dollar during the Depression of the 1930s!

The pressed glass exhibition at Corning begins with a hand-pressed Roman bowl made during the first century A.D. and concludes with the exuberant ornaments and vases machine-pressed by Lalique in the early 1900s.

Some of the highlights in the exhibition include examples of pressed glass salt dishes, cup plates, complete sets of tableware, "Carnival" and "Depression" glass, and miniature dishes and toys made for children. Several pressed glass souvenir items illustrate the wide use of glass for commemorating historical and political milestones.

Pressed glass from European factories inludes ornate objects from the Baccarat factory in France; goblets with "sulphide" portraits from England and Portugal; elaborate trays and plates made in England, Germany and Russia, and examples of Bohemian pressed glass.

As background to the special exhibition at Corning, an informative illustrated publication will be available. It was organized by Jane Shadel Spillman, the museum curator of American glass and exhibition coordinator.

After closing in Corning, the exhibition will be shown at the St. Louis Art Museum, St. Louis, Missouri; the Portland Museum of Art, Portland, Maine; and the High Museum of Art, Atlanta, Georgia, as well as in several other museums in the U.S. and abroad.

"Pressed Glass 1825-1925" will be on view seven days a week from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. through Oct. 30 at The Corning Museum of Glass, located in the Corning Glass Center complex.

HEISEY'S LITTLE THINGS

1776 KALONYAL

One of my very favorite patterns is 1776 Kalonyal. No one knows why it was numbered out of sequence in the numbering order nor do we know why it was called Kalonyal, which seemed to be just a fancy way to spell Colonial.

It is, indeed, a colonial pattern but with an addition, which are these rectangular jewel-like raised panels which add so much to the beauty of every piece.







Oh, for a cordial in this lovely pattern! Do any of you have one? In my estimation this would be the outstanding item in Kalonyal, though the 2 oz wine would still be small and would run a close second.

The toothpick, as in most patterns, is a choice piece. We found ours several years ago in an antique shop in Dayton, Ohio. There it sat in all its splendor with a price tag so low we couldn't believe it. As I picked it up the shop owner said "I think that may be Heisey but it isn't marked". What I knew was not only that it was Heisey but that it was also marked, no matter how faintly, because I had seen the mark at once.

Many of you may have found plenty of toothpick holders for a song but I've only been able to "steal" four. The Kalonyal, emerald Pineapple and Fan, Opal Bead Swag and Beaded Panel and Sunburst are the only ones which have been in the "steal" category.

I've formerly turned down several others for being too high but now I'd call them cheap, but that is why I still need five patterns in toothpicks. How time does change your thinking!

The punch cups, mustard and cover, and two styles of salt and peppers will round out your collection of 1776, along with the aforementioned toothpick, cordial and wine. So far I have only the toothpick in the HLT.'s.

This pattern has something in practically any category you could collect in Heisey and all are outstanding as you can see by the pictures.

There is even a <u>candlestick</u> for Bob, Tom and Jack , if they can find it; a syrup for Jim Earnshaw and even a nice variety of stems for the Ryans, Bradleys, Sparacios, Ray Larson and all the rest of us who love stems, and there's even a beautiful mustard jar for LaVerne Lokay.

Have you somehow gotten the idea that I love Kalonyal? If you find any of these little



goodies let me know so I can envy you.

Most of us around here pronounce this word "Kay-lon-yal" to differentiate from Colonial. We used this pattern in 1976 at the display to honor the nation's 200th birthday. Very appropriate, we thought.

CHANGES TO CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CONSTITUTION

In the event the study group (charter club) is dropped from the rolls, they may be reinstated by fulfilling the requirements for membership as stated in the By-Laws to the satisfaction of the secretary of HCA.

The above was passed at the March Quarterly Meeting, March 12, 1983.

This means that Charter Clubs can vote gain this year. Send for your ballot if you can't come.


