INFORMATION FROM YOUR TREASURER

The Budget and Finance Committee has been very busy this year - six meetings have been held to accomplish its goals. These goals include: (1) cause an audit, (2) prepare the budget, (3) search for loan money at best rate, (5) make recommendations to board to correct cash flow problems. The members of this committee are Betty Barnard, Dick Marsh, Jay Barker, Miriam Balo, Wanda Lybarger and Louise Ream.

The year end financial report and the proposed budget are ready to submit for board approval at the March Quarterly Meeting. The audit is currently being conducted by Floyd Mason of Columbus, Ohio, (he is the same auditor we had last year). His report will also be ready to submit to the Board of Directors at the March Quarterly Meeting. When this report is approved we will publish the results in the next newsletter.

Let me share some financial facts with you as we look at the first six months since convention. The cash balance December 31, 1986 was \$4,747.01. However, the Board of Directors had just encumbered \$3,000 of that balance for a liability insurance bill - an increase in the insurance of \$2,500 over preceding years - a fact of life in the insurance world today. All of the club and museum insurance is steadly increasing along with other cost increases such as salaries, printing and publishing, shipping and receiving and on and on it goes. The cost of the Oscar is more this year. We expect to loose \$3,000 in advertising due to Apple Tree Auction's adaption of their own mailing lists for their Heisey Auctions. We now own a third building to pay utilities on and to maintain.

In October 1986 the warehouse and other loans were consolidated into one loan at BancOhio for total of \$75,000 at floating prime interest rate. The pay back schedule is \$1,000 plus interest a month and one payment extra of \$3,000 sometime during the course of the year. As a result of this payment schedule we reduced our debt by \$4,000 in 1986 and will in 1987 reduce it by 15,000. None of this debt includes the moulds - the moulds were paid for in June 1986. The warehouse portion of this debt is \$35,000.

In re-reading what I have just prepared for the newsletter, I am aware of "the good news, bad news" up and down I have felt so far all year. HCA is generating and spending over \$300,000 a year. This years proposed budget is \$20,000 more than last years actual. We have grown to this size because the founders had a vision and followed it - like the bumble bee who should not be able to fly, they never knew the impossible and just "did it". They also grew because of previous treasurers like Virginia and Loren Yeakley, Dick Marsh and Ray Ziegler. They also grew because of members like yourselves who have responded to every call for help along the way with your donations and your Oscar and other purchases. I would also at this time like to thank those members who have loaned or donated money in the past.

A. H. HEISEY & COMPANY - A CHRONOLOGY

Part 10, 1938 - 1942

1938 - February. A full line of the new no. 1503 pattern, called Rajah, was advertised. By March, the name of the pattern was changed to Crystolite.1

April 1. Price list 213-18 was issued.

August. No. 1509 Queen Ann was advertised as a "completely new flatware shape." A matching stemware shape (no. 5009) was also introduced at the same time, and both the pressed and blown pieces were shown with the no. 501 Belle-le-Rose plate etching. The no. 912 Sabrina and no. 913 Everglade cuttings were also advertised this month.

September. It was reported that no. 1506 Whirlpool³ had been introduced at the summer china and

glassware show.

The no. 7000 Sunflower pattern was also shown for the first time around October or November.4 December. The no. 917 Sarasota* cutting was advertised.

Other new stemware lines for 1938 included no. 5003 Crystolite.

Other new cuttings included: no. 904 Rialto, no. 904½ Trevi*, no. 905 Rosemont, no. 906 Windermere*, no. 907 Cheerio, no. 908 Rondo*, no. 908 Sonata*, no. 909 Champlain, no. 910 Copperfield, no. 911 Lyric, no. 914 Royal Sensation, no. 915 Amarillo*, no. 916 Arlington*, and no. 918 Winston*.

1939 - July. No. 1511 Tourjours and the no. 5010 Symphone stemware line were reported as new, both shown

with the no. 503 Minuet double plate etching.

August. The first of the animal-related pieces was out by this time, the no. 1, Horse Head bookends. September 15. Price list 214-19 was issued.

The no. 2355 Cloverleaf pattern was new in 1939.

Other new stemware patterns included no. 5011 Yorktown and no. 5013 Shasta.

Other new plate etchings included no. 502 Crinoline and no. 504 Tea Rose.

One new carving came out, no. 5020 Lily.

New cuttings included: no. 844½ Cromwell, no. 919 Laurel Wreath, no. 920 Grey Laurel Wreath, no. 921 Danish Princess, no. 922 Calgary*, no. 923 Cheyenne*, no. 924 Daisy, no. 925 Huguenot, no. 926 George IV, no. 927 Powhattan, no. 928 Legionnaire, no. 929 Ticonderoga, no. 930 Narragansett, no. 931 Plantagenet, no. 932 Coreopsis*, no. 933 Fan* and no. 934 Olive.

Zircon was discontinued, probably early in the year.

1940 - February. The first of the animal figurines, the no. 2 Chanticleer (or Fighting Rooster) was reported as new. The first mention in the trade journals called this figurine a "game cock." September. The 1519 Oceanic⁵ and no. 1521 Quilt were shown as new in the trade journals.

The no. 510 Tavern silhouette etching was pictured in the <u>Crockery and Glass Journal</u>. Also advertised for the first time this month was the no. 507 Orchid plate etching, which was to become the most popular etching the company ever produced.

New stemware lines for 1940 included no. 5022 Graceful and no. 5023 Continental.

New silhouette etchings included no. 505 Ice Skater.

New cuttings included: no. 935 Basque*, no. 936 Cathe*, no. 937 Donegal*, no. 938 Kilkenney*, no. 939 Festoon Wreath, no. 940 Westchester, no. 941 Barcelona, no. 942 Harvester, no. 943 Belfast, no. 944 Courtship, no. 945 Virginia, no. 946 Port Said, no. 947 Enchantress, no. 948 Boquet, no. 949 Evelyn, no. 950 Erin, no. 951 Holly Wreath, no. 952 Santo Domingo*, no. 953 Corsica*, no. 954 Bombay*, no. 955 Polished Punties* and no. 956 Everest*.

1941 - March. The no. 5025 Tyrolean stemware line was advertised.

April 1. Price list 215-20 was issued.

Pieces in the no. 1504 Regency pattern were pictured in the trade journals this month. July. No. 1533 Wampum was reported as new.

August. The no. 965 Narcissus cutting was advertised, initially in the trade journals and then extensively in several popular magazines.

The no. 1489 horsehead cigarette box was also advertised as new this month.

<u>September</u>. No 4004 Polka Dot was previewed. September 1. Price list 216-21 was issued.

October. Royal Hickman may have begun designing for Heisey by this time⁸ and was probably responsible for the new animals advertised this month: the no. 1522 standing pony⁹, the no. 1527 kicking pony 1541 Scotty 10 the no. 1529 balking pony, the no. 1538 rabbit paperweight, the no. 1540 Oscar and the no. 1541 Scotty Other new patterns for 1941 included no. 1535 Pointed Oval Point*.

The no. 1536 military cap ash tray was also made this year. New stemware patterns included no. 5024 Oxford.

One new plate etching was introduced, no. 508 Floral. Other new cuttings included: no. 957 Oriental, no. 958 Ping Pong, no. 959 Lotus, no. 960 Atlantic City*, no. 961 Versailles*, no. 962 Punties*, no. 963 Commodore, no. 964 Maryland, no. 966 Picket, no. 967 Vivian*, no. 968 Mary*, no. 969 Miriam*, no. 970 Limerick*, no. 971 Geneva*, no. 972 Berne* and no. 973 Cevlon*.

Cobalt was discontinued sometime in 1940 and Heisey returned to the production of crystal only.

1942 - January. No. 1540 Lariat (called Gordian Knot) was reported as new.11

January 6. E. Wilson Heisey was admitted to the Newark hospital for treatment prior to surgery.

January 17. E. Wilson Heisey was operated on.

January 21. Four days after his operation, E. Wilson Heisey died at 2:40 a.m.

T. Clarence Heisey assumed the presidency of the firm after his brother's death.

August. The no. 980 Moonglo cutting was advertised as new, with its "distinctive style which complements the lines of the looped border" of the no. 1540 Lariat pattern.

September. The no. 5042 Corinthian stemware pattern was shown. The no. 9012 Victory silhouette

etching was also advertised as new this month.

October. Another new silhouette etching was advertised: no. 9013 You, Me, Us.

New animals in 1942 included the no. 1 giraffe, head straight; the no. 2 giraffe, head turned; the no. 1 goose, wings down; the no. 2 goose, wings half; the no. 3 goose, wings up; the no. 1 ringneck pheasant; the no. 2 Clydesdale; the no. 1550 Dolphin pieces; the no. 1553 sparrows (#1, #2, and #3); and the no. 1554 fish bookends. The no. 1 Madonna also came out in 1942.

Other new stemware lines included no. 5038 Rooster and no. 5041 Athena. 12

One new plate etching was introduced, no. 511 Gardenia. Other new cuttings included: no. 974 Star Waterford, no. 975 Bow Knot, no.976 St. George Waterford, no. 978 Bedford*, no. 979 Tipperary*, no. 981 Moon Beam, no. 982 Moon Gleam, no. 983 Lady Astor, no. 984 Lancaster, no. 985 Sheffield, no. 986 Miami*, no. 987 Brittany*, no. 988 Serenade, no. 989 Laramie, no. 994 Athens* and no. 995 Castalia*.

Emil Krall, Sr. resigned at about this time and for awhile had his own studio on Cedar Street in Newark, where he continued to offer engravings done on Heisey blanks.

* Original pattern name unknown; named by researchers.

Note: I have attempted to gather information from as many sources as possible, to verify that information from multiple sources when available, and to include the most likely "guesses" based on our current knowledge, when the sources disagree or reliable information is not available. 1. The earliest patent for this pattern was not filed until February 8, 1939.

2. Many of the pieces in this pattern were actually slightly modified versions of articles originally offered as part of Heisey's no. 1401 Empress line.

3. Called Cameo in the early ads. Around 1950 the pattern name was changed once again, to Provin-

cial. The earliest patent for this pattern was not filed until February 6, 1939.

4. Referred to as Empress in China, Glass and Lamps.

5. This pattern was renamed Waverly in 1949. The earliest patent for this pattern was applied for on August 4, 1948.

6. Most of the pieces in this small line were adapted from earlier pieces in the no. 1521 Quilt

pattern of the previous year.

- 7. This pattern was in production only briefly, but was later reissued in 1952 as Impromptu. A patent was filed for this pattern on September 12, 1941 and approved November 18, 1941.
 - 8. There were no announcements of his association with Heisey in the trade journals until July 1942.
- 9. Some sources have dated the standing colt as early as 1940. The patent for it, however, was filed for on March 18, 1941 and approved May 27, 1941.

10. Called a Sealyham.

11. A patent for this pattern was filed September 12, 1941, and approved November 11, 1941.

12. Made exclusively for Montgomery Ward and company, initially under the pattern name, "Imperial."

diamonds are forever....

Before the establishment of the colonial banking system here in the Yachting Center, silverware was considered the safest, soundest kind of investment. The time was the early 18th century and Spanish and Dutch coins from the West Indies were flooding the seaports of New England and Marblehead was one of those seaports. The best way to protect this money was to take it to a local Silversmith to be transformed into tankards and teapots, candlesticks and casters, platters and porringers, salts and spoons.

Silversmiths had to be very versatile so they also functioned as clockmakers, bell founders, blacksmiths and decorators of painted tin. They were often referred to as whitesmiths because they worked with light metal whereas the blacksmiths used iron which was dark or black. Because the silversmith could wield an anvil and knew metals, he could be a blacksmith but the reverse was not true for the blacksmith was not skilled to handle delicate materi-

Several Marblehead silversmiths have pieces displayed in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. Two of these are John Jagger and Thomas Skin-

The greatest collection of silver in Marblehead

belongs to the First Church of Christ.

Heisey can be found with silver overlay done by many silver companies. We have several Lariat bonbons and a large 12" bowl heavy with silver, plus a beautiful #1170 Pleat and Panel crystal 3 pint jug - both etched and with silver around the top and handle, a wonderful way to enhance already beautiful glass. There is a lovely #1404 Old Sandwich 12" floral bowl that has all the plain panels frosted, the panels that have the punties are clear and around the scalloped top and bottom plus dividing each panel there is heavy silver. This is a truly regal bowl.

"Mountain Grandma" (CA) still has her "Heisey Honda" and packs it all in: #150 Banded Flute creamer; a set of the three mallards (these are the light blue by Imperial); a #1405 Ipswich footed candy jar, Heather (Heisey by Imperial); a lovely #1295 Beaded Swag 4" berry in opal with a daisy decoration; a pair of #1428 Warwick two light candlesticks; a #1186 Yeoman 6" two handled jelly/cutting, plus a pair of #1509 Queen Ann individual d/f candleholders.

From the "Big Apple" (NY) there is news of a #417 Double Rib and Panel mustard.

The "Two Guys" from Conn have two lovely crystal

pressed goblets in the #1401 Empress pattern.

One of the "Lucky Seven", from the Lone Star State(TX), picked up several nice pieces in Winged Scroll #1280 - Cream, sugar, spooner plus the covered butter, all in custard with perfect gold. As I understand, the set looked as if it was never used. Also picked up were four Daisy and Leaves nappys. Two were 4", the other two 412".

Now and again news comes my way from "the Tipper". It's been quite a while but a long list was mailed to me. I will pass on a few things now, more later: a #608 St. Louis Beer mug, a #459 Round Colonial 8" Basket (this was beautifully etched but he doesn't know what company did the etching); a #150 Banded Flute tray nestled into a silverplated tray; the #361 ash tray and cigarette container -

in cryltal and complete. (the last one I saw, out on the field, had no cover. It would be just luck to find a cover) He also came up with lots of Stanhope #1483, cream and sugar, five (5) cups and saucers and a 9" two handled vase. All the pieces have the black knobs except the vase, and those knobs are

"Cruet Man" (CA) has been looking for a #1404 Old Sandwich 8 oz Catsup in Flamingo for a long while. He need look no more, he is now the proud owner of same - and with stopper, also mint condition. Good for you, it's nice to be able to enhance

a collection every now and then.
"The Pilgrims" (NH) will hopefully be traveling more now that "spring" is just around the corner. Maybe! But they do have a #393 Narrow Flute oil and a #3380 Old Dominion short stem goblet in Flamingo

to report.

"The Double Steppin Couple" from the Bay State (MA) are bragging about a few stems they just happened to pick up one day, and they really weren't even looking: #3308 Bob White with the #366 Peacock plate etching - cordial, wine and a 3 oz bar glass (that one I couln't find in the etching book). I just sort of wonder what goodies they would come up with if they were trying?

"A friend in deed" also (MA) boasted a couple of insignificant things, namely the #367 1 quart decanter in moongleam with crystal stopper and a #2401 Oakwood Bar glass with American Crystal Label. Just thought these pieces were worth a mention in passing.

Agree!

The "Hanging Judge" is back on the bench after a few weeks hiatus. Captured and held were the following: ten (10) #603 12 oz sodas, optic; and the #1540 Lariat Hurricane Lamp with the #5040 7" shadethe candleholder has a handle.

This hurricane lamp would give good light to study your Heisey books while hanging around in your

cell. Is that right, Judge?
"The Hilltoppers" found a #1567 Plantation cruet and "Busy Bee" not only likes honey but candy as well - she came home with the \$465 one pound Recessed Panel Candy jar.

"The Farmer" has a #480 Daisy and Leaves, or Rotund, Basket, while "My Sharp eyed friends" took away with them the #3 Marlboro 9: Candlestick and the

#1024 Hotel cream and sugar.

"The Mr", during his many little stops, on his appointed rounds, came home with three (3) #500 frozem desserts - two moongleam and one crystal; he is trying to get one in each color to give to our newest daughter-in-law. Also a #1509 Queen Ann mustard/ cover and cut; The #353 Soap dish and cover; #429 Plain Panel 12" celery. This past week-end he insisted that we stop at a shop where we haven't found anything for about six months. "The time was right", he said. Right, it was. Right there sitting all by itself was a comely little moongleam #1252 Twist Oil, complete and unblemished, for less than a good bottle of wine!

He also picked up a Mickey Mouse collectors tin

for my oldest grandson - also a real bargain.


an appropriate motif.

HETCEY COLLECTORS OF THE DOCHESTED ADD

HEISEY COLLECTORS OF THE ROCHESTER AREA

The January meeting was held at the home of Sharon Orienter where her Heisey collection features a great group of covered candy dishes, lots of things from the middle years, and her favorite pattern, Waverly, first called Oceanic. Sharon treated us to creative hors d'ouvres and desserts with a low calorie theme which were enjoyed by all.

We welcomed guests, Sharon and Frank McClain, who have been active in the Depression Glass Club and hope they become interested in Heisey as well. Our officers for 1987 are George Reynolds, President; Betty Evans, Vice President; and Bruce Schwnedy, Secretary-Treasurer.

The theme for the meeting was patterns introduced during the years 1919-1940. These were the years when the new color patterns were introduced, fancy pressed stems appeared in place of the colonial stemware, and deep plate etchings were made. Everyone brought examples from this period to show. There were stems from 3357 King Arthur and 3355 Fairacre. These two patterns share the same stem design with different bowl shapes. There was also stemware from 1401 Empress, 3362 Charter Oak, 3333 Old Glory, and 3380 Old Dominion patterns. There was a 2 oz. wine from the low footed 3397 Gascony pattern and a short stem in the 3390 Carcassonne pattern with an Old Colony etch.

Also displayed were a 1469 Ridgeleigh cake salver, 4044 New Era 7" X 9" plate with Venus cutting, and a beautiful Sahara 133 Swan Handled candlestick. In the 1425 Victorian pattern there was a cream & sugar, an individual cigarette holder and ash tray and a two lite candle.

To continue our study of patterns in these years, Sharon Orienter organized a quiz which provided fun for all and earned a few dollars for our treasury. She had on display items from 25 patterns. As she held each one up, the pattern number was identified. We then tried to list both the pattern name and the date it was introduced (within 5 years). With 50 chances for a right answer, everyone paid a nickel for each wrong answer. Betty Evans won and paid twenty five cents. Many others

were around the fifty cent bracket.

For show and tell, Marvin and Lois Jacob produced a very nice 1590 Zodiac 2 lite candle. This pattern was introduced in 1946.

Next month the theme is patterns introduced before 1906, so we all went home to get out Clarence Vogel's Book I. Happy hunting everyone!

Last August, my family and I visited the Museum and were quite delighted with the well organized. and beautifully displayed glass. Although overwhelmed with the exhibit upstairs, the bonus for us was the basement display; fascinating!

At that time, I had several books about Heisey glass, however, I still had not been able to identify the pattern of our very first Heisey piece obtained 15 years ago. I described it to you as having an appearance of diamond optic but more pronounced. Well, I bought more books from your shop and that night I spotted a sketch on page 69 of Mary Louise Burn's "Heisey's Glassware of Distinction". Hurrah! It's a 15" #7000 Sunflower torte plate! I've included pictures of it with two different lighting conditions. (the H is in the center underneath.) At the moment, there are not many pieces of Heisey glass out in our Torontorian marketplace, and what there is, is often pricey, especially the Ridgeleigh pattern. If the dealer sees the H, they often double their selling price compared to other makes. As of yet, I have not found any Heisey in our suburbs. I have also not found any Orchid or Rose etched glass; I've heard that there is a family in the Toronto and Ottawa areas whose name is Heisey, who collect those patterns.


One find recently, was quite interesting: a Lariat-look-alike. It is a "1953 Coronation" coat-of-arms souvenir coaster, 4½" in diameter (including loops), cut and frosted bottom, "ridges" on outside of shallow "bowl" section. I don't believe it's a Heisey because the glass is poor with lots of bubbles, but the loops run in the same direction as Heisey's, so, beware!

Well, that's enough for now. Hopefully we shall pay the Museum another visit this year.

December Board Notes

A motion that the interest from the Endowment Fund continue to be reinvested in the fund for 1987 carried unanimously.

The total shares of stock in Bob Evans Farms owned by HCC was 4981.683.

The Project Committee suggested that we invite outside participation from the general public at the September Souvenir Dinner. After discussion it was decided against the idea for the present.

A motion to continue to have a pig roast this year was carried unanimously. John Eshelman will be chairman of the dinner which will be April 25.

The Dayton Area Club was voted permission to hold a silent auction in conjunction with the swap session at convention.

Jim Jones has signed a contract to do a book on Greek Key pattern for HCA.

The Long Range Committee suggested that the poems written by Liz King over the years should be put in a book or preserved by other means to safekeep them for future years. Another suggestion was that there be a way to let members know how they can leave any or all of their Heisey glass to the museum in their wills. Bob Ryan was asked to check with an attorney to see if they could write up some sort of form to be in Heisey News. (Editors Note: This was done in 1984 with the form reviewed by the attorney and placed in the December 1984 issue. This also included ways to give cash, etc.)

Charlie Wade explained the postage for the Newletter. Charlie said there had been a motion in the previous Board Meeting to go First Class Bulk Rate. In checking, the Executive Committee found that there was not a first class bulk rate. Therefore it was the decision of the Executive Committee to go with the next rate available then, which was third class bulk rate. After the first mailing at this rate the Executive Committee was not satisfied and asked Bob Coyne, our printer and Walt Stickle to attend the Executive Committee Meeting. They suggested that we go with Second Class Bulk Rate which is handled the same as first class mail. We also found out that second class was still cheaper than third class. In order to obtain our 2nd Class permit at a savings to us, we must continue to use our third class permit until our 2nd Class permit has been approved. By doing so the Postal Service will reimburse us the extra cost we have spent mailing third class. They will not do this if we go back to first class and apply for our 2nd class permit.

It was voted unanimously to continue to go third class until the second class permit is received. It was decided by the board that the second class mailing will be for one year after the permit is obtained.

It was voted unanimously to have a plaque in the museum for all of the presidents' names, rather than having pictures of them.

All of which goes to show that as Crystal Gazers, we are a complete flop, because we thought last Fall things would settle down and stabilize so that commodities, raw, unfinished materials and what-have-you would remain static, and likewise the price of our product.

We tried to be as conservative as we could last year in our prices. We are hewing as close to the line as we can this year and still keep our head above water, because we realize now, as we did then, that Her Majesty, the Homemaker, is in the last analysis, our boss, and both you and ourselves are dependent on her budget. Therefore, don't get the idea that we are trying to brush this serious situation off with a few facetious paragraphs.

Lead has gone sky high—several times its previous price. Potash, Soda Ash, Lime, Sand, Transportation, Fuel—in fact, everything that goes into the manufacture of glass has very materially increased. We need not point out what has happened in the steel, automotive, coal and other major industries as far as labor is concerned. Our industry, too, will be on the same bandwagon, because labor increases are contagious, and worst of all—whatever the labor advances may be, they will be retroactive as of August 17, 1948. Therefore, there is nothing else for us to do but refigure each and every item that we manufacture; price it at a point where we can keep in the "blue" and just have a little bit left after taxes are taken care of to maintain our plant in A-l condition.

We believe you will find in our new Price List No. 29 that we have been as considerate as possible in view of all the things we have had to absorb in the production and fabrication of our product.

We call your particular attention to the fact that this is a NET LIST and is not subject to discount. We believe this will simplify matters, and result in less confusion for you and for our factory. This list will be effective as of October 1, 1948, and applies to all orders on file shipped on and after October 1, 1948.

Please be assured of our deep appreciation for your loyalty through the years. We hope we may have the privilege of continuing your sustained and valued interest in Heisey's Diamond H Glassware.


