



NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE BY-LAWS OF HEISEY COLLECTORS OF AMERICA, INC.

In accordance with Article IX, Section 1, of the Constitution of Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., this is notice to you as a voting member of said organization that at the regular quarterly meeting to he held at Newark, Ohio on June 21, 1987, the following addition to said By-laws recommended by the Board of Directors at a meeting held March 7, 1987, will be submitted to the voting membership for approval or disapproval.

BY-LAWS ARTICLE XII

COMPLAINTS FROM MEMBERS

Section 1. All complaints from voting and nonvoting members shall be in writing and be directed to the Executive Committee for appropriate review and action if needed.

Section 2. Such complaints shall be considered at the next regular or special meeting of the Executive Committee scheduled after receipt of such complaint.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Executive Committee may request a personal appearance of the complainant, but such complainant may not demand such personal appearance.

Section 4. If it appears desirable or necessary to do so, the Executive Committee may refer the complaint for the review and consideration of the Board of Directors at its next quarterly meeting.

Section 5. Complaints from the membership will all be directed and considered pursuant to these provisions only.

A. H. HEISEY & COMPANY - A CHRONOLOGY

Part 12, 1950-1952

1950 - January. The no. 5078, Park Avenue stemware line was advertised as new. A new plate etching, no. 516, Plantation Ivy, was introduced at the same time, for use on pieces in the Plantation pattern. February. A group of 79 glassworkers were honored at the annual dinner for members of the Quarter Century Club and the Diamond H Club for service ranging from 25 to 50 years. T. Clarence Heisey was

one of four who had from 40-49 years' service and there were seven employees who had been with the firm

for more than 50 years.

Five new cuttings were introduced this month, matching prominent dinnerware patterns:

Arcadia (no. 1025) Bellevue (no. 1026) Fremont (no. 1027) Hibiscus (no. 1028) Gladding-McBean Lenox China Gladding-McBean Vernon Kilns

Evening Star (no. 1029) many modern patterns

April 21. The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York opened an exhibit of outstanding American and European glassware made since 1900. 400 pieces from the United States, France, Sweden, Holland, England, Austria, Belgium, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Finland and Germany were shown. Heisey's display of about a dozen pieces included the Lariat 3-light candlestick, the horse head bookends, the tropical fish, (frosted), some examples of stemware and various contemporary style serving pieces. 1

June. Heisey's animals were prominently featured in the movie of The Glass Menagerie, starring

Jane Wyman and Gertrude Lawrence.

June 26. No. 518, Pan American Lei plate etching was introduced in conjunction with a new Vernon Kilns dinnerware pattern of the same name. The premiere showing was in Honolulu, with an "American premiere" on July 10th in New York. The promotion was sponsored by Pan American Air Lines, and in addition to the china and glassware, new patterns in Dirilyte flatware, linens, and "kindred pieces" were also introduced, with Pan American Air Lines flying fresh leis to both "premieres" and, later,

to other shows and store promotions around the country.

August. No. 517 Winchester '73 Silhouette etching was introduced to tie in with the new Universal-International movie starring Shelley Winters and James Stewart. The etching was designed by Horace King and coordinated to china manufactured by Vernon Kilns. The promotion was not successful, partially because the movie itself had been rushed into release in early June, before the glassware and china patterns were ready, in response to another film, Colt-45, which had beat them to an opening. Additionally, as Fred Bosworth, one of Heisey's salesmen, recalled: "Popcorn consuming youngsters were generally not high-priced glassware buyers. So, Winchester '73 was not a big mover." Catalog 31 was issued this month.

September. The no. 1033 Corral cutting was shown in The Jewelers' Circular-Keystone on the new

no. 5079 Pan American stemware line.

October. Three more cuttings were shown, no. 1030 Bandoleer, no. 1031 Greenbriar and no. 1032

Heirloom, all on no. 6060 Country Club.

November. The American Flint, a union publication, mentioned a recent three-week strike over wages. The same report expressed admiration for T. Clarence Heisey, "who at all times is all business and trying to keep us well satisfied and surrounded by good working conditions." New patterns for 1950 included no. 1624 Patio.

Other new stemware lines included: no. 5074 Sea Horse, no.5077 Legionnaire, no. 5082 Mid-Century

and no. 5083 El Rancho.

Additional cuttings included: no. 1024 Hawthorne and no. 1033 Patio.

1951 - January. No. 1951 Cabochon was advertised as new. 2 No. 6091 Cabochon stemware also came out at this time.

New cuttings announced this month included no. 1046 Pussy Willow no. 1047, Autumn Rushes and no. 1048 Crocus.

February. No. 1425 Victorian, which had been discontinued during the war, was reissued. September. The no. 1040 Iris, no. 1050 Skyline and no. 1060 Starlight cuttings were introduced at the Merchandise Mart Gift Show.

October. The American Flint reported that a strike had been just averted, following a long drawn out wage conference. Two days were lost due to the furnace having been let out in anticipation of a strike.

Additional stemware lines in 1951 included no. 5063 Bantam Rooster and no. 5065 Colt.

The no. 1038 Pine cutting was introduced to match the Lenox China pattern.

Other new cuttings included: no. 1034 Maytime, no. 1035 Cornflower, no. 1036 Beau Knot, no. 1037 June, no. 1039 Desert Flower, no. 1041 Lily, no. 1042 Wood Lily, no. 1043 Heritage*, no. 1044 Laurel, no. 1045 Sagamore Hill*, no. 1049 O'Fallon*, no 1051 Hollyhock, no. 1052 Silver Iris, no. 1053 Cat-Tail, no. 1054 Gothic, no. 1055 Westminster, no. 1056 Bermuda, no. 1057 Florida, no. 1058 Southland, and no 1059 Midwest.



1952 - February. No. 1405 Ipswich was reissued.

April. Nine new cuttings were advertised: no. 1061 Primrose, no. 1062 Bridal Lace, no. 1063 Wood Violet, no. 1064 Provincial Wreath, no 1065 Baroness, no. 1066 Debutante, no. 1067 Yorktown, no. 1068 Victoria, and no. 1069 Lily Vale.

September. Five more cuttings were advertised as new "rock crystal cuttings": no. 1071 Baroque.

no. 1072 Southwind, no. 1073 Serenade, no. 1074 Inspiration and no. 1075 Radiant.

<u>September 13</u>. Heisey's last design patent was filed for a triangular footed bowl, pattern number unknown. It was approved April 14. 1953, but is not known to have gone into production. (Ed. note: There is also a triangular oil bottle, we have the drawing, the model <u>and</u> the cruet L.R.)

October. Harold Dunham was named advertising and sales promotion manager of the newly created Market Research Department. He had previously been sales representative for the southeastern

territory (comprising Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Tennessee).

October 15. American Home magazine sponsored a luncheon in New York featuring Reed & Barton's new "Silver Wheat" pattern in sterling. Four table settings were shown combining this silverware with Franciscan, Haviland, and Lenox china. One of the tables included Heisey stemware; the others had Tiffin, Imperial, and Cambridge stemware.

November. It was announced that Rodney C. Irwin had resigned as sales manager, after 28 years with

the company, 20 years of which were spent filling the latter position.

December. A few weeks before Christmas, Heisey opened a retail store at the plant, at the north end of the factory on Oakwood Avenue. According to the American Flint, "It is not only a good spot for the public in selecting their Christmas presents but also gave the workers a chance to see a lot of their finished ware on display, and to see the fine quality after it is finished and ready for the buyers."

December 16. A chartered bus took a group of 26 employees and their spouses to see Sally Flowers

December 16. A chartered bus took a group of 26 employees and their spouses to see Sally Flowers on her TV show in Columbus. Ethel Burrell of the mould cleaning department presented the hostess of the show with a glass hat with the Diamond H trademark cut on it. Anna Sprice, of the etching department, gave her a Heisey Rose etched torte plate, and Tom Abbot presented her with a cream pitcher and sugar bowl.

No. 4004 Impromptu was reissued in December. 4

A commemorative plate was made for the sesquicentennial of Newark.

New stemware patterns included no. 5086 Plantation Ivy*, no. 5089 Princess, no. 5092 Empress Lily* and no. 5098, Louisa*.

One other cutting was introduced this year: no. 1070 Bel Air. Sultana (amber) was briefly offered as a production color. 5

Around this time, arrangements were made and agreed upon by the stockholders to sell the Heisey company to a private syndicate. However, the deal fell through when T. Clarence Heisey could not agree to some of the conditions for the sale.



One of the shops, operating here for over fifty years and consisting of two large buildings, one on either side of the street, has just been sold and will be replaced by condos. We don't like this but, "only diamonds are forever".

The Mr. and I have moments when we can't decide

just what we want to do. Go? Stay? Save? Spend? We think, discuss, ponder and hesitate, don't hesitate - go ahead and go into that same shop that you go into every other day! The inside bottom had a large diamond H, the dealer had this piece marked Crystolite. It wasn't Crystolite but I didn't know what pattern it was, but the price was certainly right. Paid my money and promptly left the shop. I'll describe the jelly to you by saying that it is exactly like the \$479 sugar, even the very same handle.* I love it, for sure. The Mr. can't believe

that he didn't see it sitting on the shelf.

A starry eyed gal from the "Sunflower State"
(KS) took herself to an auction and came home with the #305 Punty and Diamond Point Water Carafe. I

understand it was quite a sleeper!

The "California Kid" had one more item to tempt us all; #1401 Empress individual cream and sugar in Flamingo! Think I'll just stay in California for a while and catch up with "Mountain Grandma"; #331 Colonial Panel Straw Jar/glass cover, (marked); #134 Trident 2-lite Candlestick with the #515 Heisey Rose etch, two (2) #1469 Ridgeleigh round cigarette holders; a pair of #351 Priscilla oils, salt and pepper sitting in a fancy metal tray; #1401 Empress d/f Candlesticks in Sahara; #500 Octagon 5" Basket in Moongleam and the #465 Recessed Panel 9" Basket; lastly one dozen (12) count them - #5072 Rose Stem goblets with the #515 Heisey Rose etch, all are marked.

My "Evergreen Friends" (ME) tell about the #1183 Revere individual salt and a #417 Double Rib and Panel Mustard. These things were not found in

"ME" but in "TX". Good for you.....

A pair of 6 7/8" Horse-head Bookends were dis-

covered and corralled by "my good English buddy". Some time ago our "Rebel Cousins" (KY) had a house guest, a "Yankee from PA". While my Rebel Cousins were at church the "PA Yankees" were out there "flea-ing". Just a-poken here and a-poken there, having a great time. Well, later in the day the "Yankee from PA" decided to show my "Rebel Cousins" what he found. He opened a real little package all wrapped in newspaper - Lo and Behold - a 6" Round Opal #46 plate, signed. The best part, the dealer had no idea of the value. Ahhhhh! When the Rebel Cousin saw this he chased that "PA Yankee" clear across the river to his own territory. That's OK "Cousin" I hear you have a #1183 Revere one quart - Cobalt - cocktail shaker; a #1280 Winged Scroll 8" Comport in Custard and a pretty #3355 12" Flamingo vase. Never fear, you did good!!

"Sharp eyes" has the 3½" Duck Flower Frog in Hawthorne and the "Busy Bee" came up with a #341 high

footed jelly.

"The Orchid Lady" (MA) has a few nice things to her credit; #325 Pillows high footed compote; plus the #325 celery; and #1201 Fandango Individual cream and

The #4045 Ball Vase (Med) with the #469 Mermaid Plate Etch was discovered by "the Double Steppin Couple", along with a cute little #2052 Bar glass with

#467 Tally-Ho Silhouette etch.

"The Tipper" (now there's a name we haven't heard in a while); #1023 creamer, in marigold, there it was sitting all alone just waiting for someone to take it home. The time of day was late, so I'm sure many people just walked on by that little piece over and over, or else the dealer had just put it on his table, which sometimes does happen. A beauty, and perfect! Also #413 Rib and Panel Cigarette box; the #3308 Bob White 3 oz Burgundy and the 2 oz Wine, both with #366 Peacock Plate Etching; another wine, the 2 oz #3350 Wabash.

"A Friend in Deed" has in his collection a #1567 Plantation Coupe plate and (ready) the Sleeping Fox Ash Tray!! Yours truly had the pleasure of seeing both of these pieces plus I held them in my hand. When you can hold a piece of Heisey it is the best way to remember exactly what it looks like. As if I'd ever see a sleeping fox out on the field. But

then again who knows!

"The Wiz" (not of Oz - of MA) picked up the #1250 Groove and Slash sugar. While elsewhere in and around "the Bay State" came myriads of things; common, rare, crystal, color, plain and fancy; #1184 Yeoman lemon dish, crystal; the 6" 2 handled four compartment preserve/enamel rim, a crystal Floral Bowl and the Punch cup in flamingo. Enough about Yeoman, now a #21 9" Aristocrat candlestick; an Im-promptu (polkadot) #4004 Bar glass; the #1447 Rococo Bon-bon and a #315 Paneled Cane 13 oz Molasses Can. In color five (5) #3362 Egyptian (Charter Oak) 4½ oz Parfaits were found in flamingo; the #1280 Winged Scroll Creamer, Sugar and Covered Butter in Custard plus a #1433 Thumbprint and Panel flamingo 11" Center-

As for the "Mr" and Yours Truly we came across a #1540 Crystolite oil; the insert for the #1405 Ispwich candle vase; #1540 Lariat 7" Crimped Vase; #352 Flat Panel Horseradish Jar and the #150 Banded Flute 1½ oz bar sham. Also the #1626 Satellite 8" Vase/ Frosted base; and a #305 Punty and Diamond Point 8" Vase and last but not least the #3404 Spanish Stem 12 oz soda in Cobalt.

We have just returned from Ohio; we were there for the auction, and the weather was just like spring, up in the high 60s - low 70s. Today here in the Yachting Center it was 220, but the Crocus under our Bay-window are up, Spring is not far away.

Editor's Note: The handled jelly dish is exactly what you said - 479 Petal. There are exactly three items in this pattern. Handled jelly and Cream and sugar. We have had one in the museum for several years.

At the business meeting we discussed our treasury status against our goal for donating The Heisey Candlestick book to several local public libraries. We decided to buy asmany as we could at the convention in June for donation. We noted that Marge and Jerry Gillette are attending the 200 dinner in April.

To continue our study of Heisey, Marv prepared a display of 25 candles for a quiz on the pattern name and the number of colors each was made in. We had an opportunity to look at the display and try to memorize the names before the quiz, but the colors got the best of us.

For show and tell candles, Edith Bockes displayed a 31 Jackbe Nimble, the shortest of all the toys, a 99 Little Squatter, a 1503 Crystolite rosette candleblock and a 129 Tricorn in Moongleam. Mary gave an impressive demonstration of decorated candles. He displayed a 1401 Empress Sahara candle with a formal Chintz etch, made between 1931 and 1938, a 142 Cascade 3 light with Orchid etch, made between 1940 and 1957, and a 1495 Fern 2 light with the Floral deep plate etch. He also showed two 112 Mercury candles, one with the Heisey Rose etch (1949-1957), and one in Sahara with an unknown cutting. Marv showed the first decorated candle, the 47 Regal with a 336 Rosebud etch and the first with a satin finish, the 111 Cherub. He also explained that the 134 Trident two light is the candle made with the most number of different decorations - 80 cuttings and 18 etches, and displayed one with a cutting that had been apparently flame* polished to make it look as though the pattern was pressed. George Reynolds displayed a 100 Centennial candle with cutting.

George and Arlene Reynolds have been out having

fun hunting and for show and tell displayed a rare Empress dolphin footed covered mayonnaise with the Antartic etch, a pair of 343 Sunburst salt and pepper shakers and a lovely Gayoso Russian coffee cup in diamond optic and moongleam.

Our next meeting will be at Betty Evans' house and the theme will be colored plates. Happy spring to all and we're looking forward to the upcoming convention in June!

Does that mean this piece is an Imperial Reissue in the Heather color? I am enclosing an SASE in hopes you can give me an answer. Also, is there a way you can tell the difference between an original piece of Heisey or a reissue? Has there been a book published on Imperial and their Heisey mold reissues? I'd sure appreciate any Lona B. Siegfried, IL help you can give me.

A, Yes, the jar which you picture is a 1405 Ipswich candy jar in Heather made by Imperial. I am printing the information from our book "Heisey by Imperial". Color of yours is Heather.

The following list is everything that Imperial

made in the Ipswich pattern.

This book was written by the Newark Heisey Collectors Club and sells for \$6.95 which includes a price guide.





Some 750 Heisey Hunters attended this year's show. That is down a bit from la year's attendance, but the ratio of buyers to browsers seemed to be a bit higher th last year. There are always nervous moments as the opening bell approaches. Thirty minutes before show opening we often get the feeling that our dealers have prepared a great show and nobody's coming -- no sign of a buyer at the starting gate. It's fifteen minutes to opening and still nervous time -- maybe half a dozen folks are waiting to come in. Then the opening bell sounds and from somewhere eager Heisey hunters materialize and stream through the door for an hour or so. It happens every year, but we still get a mild case of the yips waiting to see if it will happen again.

Our dealers offered a wide variety of patterns, pieces and colors ranging in price from under \$10.00 to more than \$2,000.00 for elaborate candelabra in hard to find colors and almost \$3,000.00 for the Flying Mare in Amber. Patterns ranged from the

earliest --Fandango, Fancy Loop, Bead Swag, etc.
-- to one of the latest -- Lodestar. All of
the Heisey colors were represented as well as a
number of Heisey patterns in colors by Imperial
and Viking. Collectors of "Heisey's Little
Things" -- toothpick holders, cordials, bar
glasses, individual salts, etc. -- had an excellent selection from which to choose.


The Museum booth, offering a selection of books on Heisey and other glasswares as well as a number of items in glass for sale, was popular with the crowd again this year.

Bob O'Grady and Tom Felt with our flower lady, Martha Seaton, created a beautiful display to carry out the theme of Heisey and Art Deco. The display, composed of Heisey products introduced during the Art Deco Period, included pieces in Ridgeleigh, Stanhope, Saturn and No. 4222 "Horseshoe" patterns; the Sahara and Zircon colors; a Revere 4-light candlestick, a pair of Kohinoor candelabra and a plate with a Nimrod carving.

The door prize this year was an Eagle Plate, in keeping with the observance of the 200th Anniversary of the U.S. Constitution. The drawing for the prize was held during the closing minutes of the show, and Charlie Wade was announced the winner. Charlie is President of the Board of Directors for the Heisey Collectors of America.

One young woman, attending her first Heisey show, stood silent when she first saw the sparkling display of Heisey glassware. Then she began to move along the aisle, chirping and making other happy, but incoherent, sounds as she took in the show. We saw her later after she had her excitement under control -- she acknowledged that she was hooked and will be at the head of the line for the 16th All Heisey Show.

Then there was the young couple who left the show looking a bit down in the mouth. When asked if they had enjoyed the show, they said they had but had run out of money. They reappeared a few minutes later, all smiles, and volunteering that they had located an automatic teller machine nearby, pumped up the old pocket book and were back in the hunt!




