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Dear HCA Members,

This is an update on happenings of the September Quarterly Meeting and Mini-Show. The foggy, overcast day did not deter the enthusiasm of the early arrivals at the Mini-Show. My brief tour of the dealers' tables revealed a number of unusual and rare pieces for the Heisey collectors.

The various committees met during the morning hours and it is their efforts that formulate the recommendations that reach the Board of Directors, who make the final decisions as to direction of the Club. It is gratifying to know there are those dedicated HCA members willing to serve in these capacities.

Now a report of the actions of the Board of Directors. The fire alarm system is installed and we all found that it works, as it was accidentally set off on Saturday morning. This false alarm had its good side as it alerted us to the fact that the Newark Fire Dept. called to find out the location of the Museum. This situation has been corrected.

A chain link fence has been erected on the west side of the back yard of the Administration Building. A problem with persons cutting through the property had developed over the years. We thank the Dayton Area Heisey Club whose donation paid for the fence.

Hopefully, the Heisey News mailing problem is also put to rest. The last two issues (August and September) were labeled, sorted and mailed from Newark. Four inquiries in regard to not receiving the Heisey News were received about the September issue -- three because memberships had expired and one because of failure to notify HCA of change of address. To all members, it is your responsibility to notify us of change of address.

We regret that Betty Barnard saw fit to resign as Treasurer of HCA. Betty has done a great service while serving as Treasurer and we thank her for her contribution. Her resignation was accepted by the Board of Directors and Mary McWilliams was elected Treasurer. We welcome Mary and look forward to her help on the Executive Committee. Mary is a former Secretary of HCA, so she understands her responsibilities as an officer of the Club.

The Museum painting project is now underway, a bit late in starting, and now has developed into the Museum Restoration Project. It was known at the start that the south side of the Museum had some bad siding. After all, a 150-year-old frame structure was expected to need some attention. It has now been determined that there is more bad siding than originally

THOMAS C. "TIM" HEISEY

"Thomas C. "Tim" Heisey, 69, of Granville Road, died Sunday afternoon (August 23) in Grant Hospital, Columbus, after a brief illness.

"Mr. Heisey was born June, 1918, in Newark, and was the son of the late T. Clarence Heisey and Anne (Davis) Heisey. He was the grandson of the late founder of the A. H. Heisey Company.

"Mr. Heisey graduated from Deerfield Academy in Massachusetts and was a 1940 graduate of Amherst College. While at Amherst he was affiliated with Psi Upsilon Fraternity. After graduation, he did post-graduate study at The Ohio State University.

"In his early years, Mr. Heisey raised and showed horses in national competition. He participated in horse shows in the World's Fairs in Chicago in 1933 and 1934 and in New York in 1939. His horse, "Goodness Gracious" won national championships in shows at Atlantic City and Madison Square Garden in New York. His horse also won a championship in Toronto.

"During World War II, he served in the Army Medical Corps in the Pacific theatre of operations and in Japan.

"For a number of years, Mr. Heisey worked at the A. H. Heisey Company and was president of the company for several years prior to its closing in 1957. He was a life member of the Heisey Collectors Association.

"On the local political scene, Mr. Heisey for 30 years has served as secretary of the Republican Executive Committee. In addition, he has been a precinct commissioner for about the same length of time.

"In 1963, he was appointed a jury commissioner by the late Common Pleas Judge Walter U. Bolton and was serving in that capacity at the time of his death.

"For many years, Mr. Heisey took an active part in the American Lung Association and was past president of the Ohio Lung Association. He was active, as well, in the National Heart Association and served a term as president of the Ohio Chapter.

"Mr. Heisey was a life-long member of Trinity Episcopal Church and served at various times as junior and senior warden.

"Mr. Heisey is survived by a sister, Mrs. Mary (Heisey) Merrill of Newark, a nephew, George D. Curtin III, of Clarksburg, West Virginia, and a niece, Mrs. Bruce (Anne) Harris of Newark. Also by a step-nephew, Charles D. Merrill of New York City, and two step-nieces, Deborah M. Merrill of The Hague and Kathrine A. Merrill of San Francisco.

"Funeral services for Mr. Heisey will be held Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 in Trinity Episcopal Church, the Rev. John W. Baker officiating. Burial will be in Cedar Hill Cemetery...."

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We are saddened to report Tim Heisey's death. He took an active interest in HCA over the years. He was an honorary and voting member and attended most functions of the club. He always attended the Conventions and often participated in events such as the former employees meeting.

thought, so it will require more siding than the contract provided. In addition, the blown-in insulation had become wet. This will be replaced with roll insulation prior to re-siding. At this late date, it is hoped to at least get the south and east (entrance) sides finished this year and complete the project as weather permits. It was felt that a complete job done right was preferable to a patch and hope job.

On the recommendation of the Executive Committee, the Board voted unanimously to purchase the computer equipment I mentioned last month in this column. This equipment is strictly for membership functions and is a part of the total computer package the Computer Committee recommended to the Board of Directors at the June Annual Meeting. It is expected to print the mailing labels for this issue of the Heisey News.

Last, but certainly not least, was the report of the Committee on Job Descriptions for Paid Employees presented by Stan Darling, a member of the Committee. He was speaking for Chairman Charlie Wade, Liz Stickle, and Neila Bredehoft, who had put together a very comprehensive and detailed booklet covering the period from hiring the first paid employee to the present time. Their study and report was nearly parallel to a similar committee's work on the subject conducted in 1978, but never implemented by the Board of Directors. Stan Darling and Charlie Wade were members. I offer my personal thanks to the members of this Committee for the diligent and comprehensive work they submitted to the Board. No action will be taken on the report until a later date to allow the Board members time for a complete study and evaluation of the report.

diamonds are forever

Not only are we the Yachting Center of America but also the "Birth-place of the American Navy." Fortunes and lives were freely given in the cause of independence. The Yachting Center sent an entire regiment, under General John Glover, which ended its heroic deeds by transporting Washington and his army in the famous crossing of the Delaware. In 1775 General Washington commissioned the "Hannah", a ship manned and owned by Marblehead men, as the first American Warship, supporting our town claim, "Birthplace of the American Navy."

Sometime between 1704 and 1714 the first Caswell came to the Yachting Center from the island of Guernsey. Eight generations of Caswells have been born here, the first of whom was William who became a private in Company eight of Glover's Marblehead Regiment. Needless to say, "Lloyd" is very proud of his heritage, and well he should be.

September is a delightful month, one that is still warm enough to enjoy the out-of-doors and full of color. New England foliage is beautiful. The harbor is still teeming with sailing-ships of all sizes and the races are still scheduled for every weekend. September also means the onset of the indoor shows and flea markets. One thing for the "Mr", as of this writing is a mystery to us, it is a #1503 Cyrstolite something, looks like a threaded cover or base 4½" round where the threads are and 5" across the top or bottom, and 1½" tall. Marked with a beautiful diamond "H". At our Heisey meeting tomorrow evening perhaps "Mr. Cyrstolite" can shed some light on the subject.

The "Midnight Riders" climbed upon their trusty steed and galloped away with several #1243 8" moongleam plates: the #413 cigarette holder and two (2) #3481 Glenford bar glasses in Hawthorne.

My "Sharp eyed friend" added the #5012 7" urn vase with a nice cutting to his collection while the "Busy Bee" has a comely #350 Pinwheel and Fan large nappy, 8".

The "Social Climber" has a #1469 Ridgeleigh Bon-bon dish and while at Brimfield she found a pretty Ring tree made from the base and stem of the #5013 Shasta goblet. A novel idea! Very discerning.

"One of the Lucky Seven" from the Lone Star State (TX) came up with some color: Seen but not purchased was a #1401 Empress d/f Center Bowl in moongleam; the #1405 Ipswich ½ lb. candy jar and cover in Imperial Heather; the bottom of the #1252 Twist mustard in moongleam, and a twist crystal individual nut. Purchased were the following items: the #1184 Yeoman crescent salad plate in moongleam; and a #17 10" floral Block in flamingo; #354 Wide Flat

Panel Hotel cream and sugar in moongleam; six #3357 King Arthur 6½ oz. sherbets-moongleam stem and foot/crystal bowl and a crystal #1495 Fern Whipped cream or mayonnaise, handled.

"Mountain Grandma" tells of two #4225 Cobel cocktail shakers with lipped ice strainers. One has orchid etch, #86 stopper and sterling around the stopper and base, the other has the #118 Rooster stopper and rattan rings around the shaker which forms handles from the rings.

The "Hilltoppers" have a charming little #4002 Aqua Caliente, crystal glass with Orchid etch.

From "the wolverines"(MI) came news that they have latched on to the #1184 Yeoman 13" relish and also the 13" divided relish both of these pieces Sahara and both are Empress etch.

"The Evergreens" (ME) had the good fortune to come across a #1295 Beaded Swag wine with ruby stain, always nice for one's collection!

"The Tipper" has an animal or two to crow about, in fact, a pair or two. He says if the animals went in the Ark two-by-two why shouldn't he buy them two by two. A pair of Standing Ponies, a pair of Ringneck Pheasants and one (isn't that a shame) 7" Swan. Also a #417 Double Rib and Panel Hawthorne 6" Basket, (the handle is cracked) also the #412 Rib and Panel one quart Tankard. Nice!

"The Felicitous Flamingo Hunter" is heading to Bermuda for a nice long week-end and a much needed one at that. You know the saying "All work and no play", I can tell the way she talked how the excitement is building. Just think of all the places I could go if only I dared get in a plane. Courage, that's all I need. O.K., before she hopped her plane a list with the following info was placed in my hot little hands: a pair of #33 3½" candlesticks; #305 Puntty and Diamond point paste bottle; #352 Ash tray; #7052 Diamond Grid Puff and ten (10) #1252 Twist moongleam 6" plates plus five (5) 6" two-handled mints in Flamingo.

The "Pilgrims" have a #1235 Beaded Panel and Sunburst individual salt and the "High Steppin Couple" cajoled a #310 Ring Band Sugar out of an unsuspecting dealer!

The "Mr" has a couple of nappies to report: the #361 Criss-cross 4" shallow, the #470 Intercepted Flute 4½" nappy and a #462 Nail 4½" square nappy Also six (6) #1404 Old Sandwich finger bowls, crystal with cranberry stain around the top; #433 Greek Key miniature oval creamer #473 Narrow Flute with Plain Rim square Honey dish and cover; #1540 Lariat 9" Celery Heart, Marked and the #1001 Caswell sugar sifter and cream, clear with moongleam foot and handle.

Oil in Moon-gleam with a Maltese Cross stopper; a #1220 Puntty Band Handled mug, red stain-souvenir "Elmer Anderson" Pan American Expo, Buffalo 1901: #1201 Fandango 5" handled jelly, 3 cornered and a *#1252 Twist cream (crystal) made from a cup. In #1404 Old Sandwich we also have the 18 oz. Beer Mug in Amber plus four (4) #1404 18 oz. Beer Mugs in Crystal.

EVA ZEISEL

BY TOM FELT

PART 3, GLASSWARE DESIGNS

As mentioned in the previous installments of this article, Eva Zeisel's association with glassware design actually goes back to the 1930's, during her stay in the Soviet Union, when she designed perfume bottles and was named art director of the China and Glass Industry of the Russian Republic. This experience was capitalized on in the late 1940's in this country, when she was once again called upon to design containers for perfume, but this time for such illustrious clients as Charles of the Ritz and Richard Hudnut.

It wasn't until 1952, however, that she created her first real line of glassware and, not surprisingly, this was an off-shoot of one of her best known ceramic commissions. An announcement appeared in the August, 1952, issue of THE JEWELERS' CIRCULAR-KEYSTONE stating that Sun-Glo Studios of New York had "entertained the press just prior to the New York China and Glass Show to introduce its new line of 'Silhouette' glassware designed by Eva Zeisel. The glassware, in both color and shape, was created to coordinate with the Hallcraft Dinnerware line which Mrs. Zeisel also designed and which was introduced at the Pittsburgh Show last January by the Midhurst China Co." This refers, of course, to the Tomorrow's Classic line, made by the Hall China Company of East Liverpool and distributed by Midhurst, which was probably her most popular set and which was being advertised as "America's fastest selling modern dinnerware."

There is no additional information available on Sun-Glo Studios but, in fact, the Silhouette line was actually made by Bryce Brothers in Mount Pleasant, PA. (one of the factories now owned and operated by Lenox). Colors available were amber, amethyst, smoke brown, chartreuse, green, blue, and clear, all "flowing from a luminous shadow at the top to a deep-gleaming base," according to the October, 1952 issue of INTERIORS. Like Tomorrow's Classic, Silhouette employed slightly bulbous shapes (curved to fit the hollow of the hand) with flared rims and a much more pronounced foot than used on the ceramic pieces. The pieces were meant "to combine the traditional grace of stemware with the functional simplicity of the tumbler."

Then, in December, 1953, an advertisement appeared on the back cover of the CROCKERY AND GLASS JOURNAL announcing that Mrs. Zeisel had been appointed as Art Director for A. H. Heisey. It must be remembered that, by 1953, Heisey was already suffering from the economic difficulties that would eventually lead to the factory's closing four years later and it is clear, from the advertising copy, that they were aware of the need to find new markets if they were to survive. "The entire Heisey organization is buzzing with fresh, sparkling ideas . . . designed to set a series of brand new trends in the handmade glass industry . . . Be sure to visit the Heisey exhibit at the January Pittsburgh show. There you will see unveiled for the very first time several new groups of glassware by Eva Zeisel. This revolutionary exhibit will indicate to you Heisey's competitive design plans for the future."

That this was meant to be a major change in direction for Heisey was underscored by a quotation from Eva Zeisel herself which was used in the ad: "Right now, exciting things are going on at Heisey. Whole new horizons are opening up . . . many original concepts in glass design and production are being inaugurated. Such a re-birth in a respected, well-established firm is bound to stimulate sales . . . bound to capture new markets."

The first of the new lines was No. 6009A Roundelay and it was definitely an innovation for the company. (The "A" designation at the end of the pattern number seems to have been used to differentiate Eva Zeisel's designs from the rest of Heisey's production.) The line is entirely blown, consisting of 16 pieces. All of the pieces are "useful" items, except for the bud vase (which was made from the oil bottle) and a console set - but, of course, even these latter pieces are intended for use on the table, thus fulfilling Mrs. Zeisel's oft stated goal of designing items which are both functional and decorative. Although some pieces have been seen in crystal, the sole price list for Roundelay offers them in Dawn only. In fact, this color was introduced at the same time as Roundelay and it is likely that both the color and the new line were simultaneously developed to complement one another (and to entice the market for "Scandinavian Modern" which was so popular in the 1950's). Roundelay, with its very plain, round shapes was given a certain allure by the color, which would naturally tend to be a lighter grey in the thinner portions (the rounded sides) and closer to charcoal at the rims or bases. Thus the color becomes integral to the decorator's intention.

(It should be mentioned that it was not unusual for Eva Zeisel to immerse herself in all aspects of production when designing a new line. As CHINA, GLASS AND DECORATIVE ACCESSORIES had written about her back in May, 1946, "At all times Mrs. Zeisel works closely with the factory in every aspect of producing the samples, for she believes that only by supervising every phase of production

and not allowing anyone at the factory to adapt and change the drawings or sketches, can one achieve results that satisfy the designer, as well as convey his idea exactly ... with the designer controlling the whole production process down to the last 1/16 of an inch.")

She was also responsible for the design of a series of very modern cuttings to be used on Roundelay. I say "modern" advisedly, however, because her Fish cutting could almost have been taken from a prehistoric cave painting, it is so simple and yet evocative. Although more austere than some of her previous "natural" designs in ceramic, it nevertheless suggests the same light touch and enjoyment of whimsy that inspired them.

That Roundelay was not the change in image that Heisey required is now well known to the collector today, for whom pieces are virtually impossible to find. It was introduced in January, 1954, but can't have been in production for more than a couple of months at most, never making it into a catalog. A second line of tumblers which also came out in January, No. 6007A, seems to have met with even less success. It was previously totally unknown; the molds are now in the HCA's possession (for a juice, a sherbet, a 12 oz tumbler and a 15 oz iced tea) but whether this will eventually enable us to identify any actual pieces from the line is problematic.

In fact, although there was still another pattern designed by Eva Zeisel introduced in 1954, it is pretty likely that her employment with the firm had already been terminated by sometime after March and did not actually last much longer than a few months altogether.

No. 1637A Town and Country, like Roundelay, was probably created primarily for production in Dawn. A pressed line, the pieces are much heavier and they are also relatively plain. However, a slight optic in the glass, similar to that used in the Saturn pattern, creates the same illusion of a variance in the color, with lighter "rings" just visible in the glass. Town and Country was more successful and, in fact, won a "Good Design" award in 1955. The pattern then remained in production until the factory closed. Originally consisting of twelve items (all drinking or serving pieces), half of the line was still being offered in 1956 and Imperial reissued the salad set, bowl and 16" plate up until the early 1960's.

Although Eva Zeisel had earlier made a pattern with the same name for Red Wing Pottery in Minnesota, it has no relationship to the later Town and Country, which is much more solid and does not demonstrate the tendency towards the grotesque displayed by the Red Wing set.

Although her association with Heisey must have ended early in 1954, this was not her last experience with the glass industry. Later that same year, she designed a line of tumblers for the Federal Glass Company in Columbus, one of the largest manufacturers of machine-made glass. Called Prestige, this line is once again characterized by its simplicity, with a false sham providing "the illusion of a very heavy bottom providing the glasses with extraordinary reflections," in Mrs. Zeisel's own words. A second line, called Stockholm, was also issued by Federal several years later.

And that completes the story of Eva Zeisel and

her influence on American glassware - a footnote in the story of her adventurous and highly acclaimed life.

"LICKING COUNTY ARTIFACTS TO BE IN OHIO TIME CAPSULE"

"A little piece of Licking County will be buried in a state time capsule in Marietta this fall as part of Ohio's commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution.

"The Licking County commissioners have turned over some local artifacts to Ohio Attorney General Anthony J. Celebrezze Jr., who is coordinating the statewide event.

Janet Miskimens, of Celebrezze's staff, took the artifacts from the commissioners Thursday, saying she will include them in the time capsule that will be buried Sept. 17 in front of the Campus Martius Museum in Marietta.

"Celebrezze selected Marietta as the site for the time capsule because Washington County is the first Ohio county and Marietta is considered one of the early gateways to development of the Northwest Territory. The territory eventually became the states of Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan and Illinois.

"The Licking County artifacts include pictures of local historical and government sites, a rollcall of elected officials and Heisey glass artifacts supplied by former Licking County Commissioner John Eshelman Jr. and his wife, Gerry.

"Artifacts from the other 87 Ohio counties also will be placed in the five-foot titanium container. It will be filled with Argon gas to preserve the items. The time capsule is slated to be dug up again on Sept. 17, 2087, the 300th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution.

"The commissioners turned over the artifacts during their Thursday meeting at the Hartford fairgrounds pavilion.

"County Commissioner Carl W. Wheeler is slated to represent Licking County at the Sept. 17 event in Marietta."
