



#### NO. 1483 STANHOPE CANDELABRA

The Stanhope pattern was first introduced at the New York China, Glass and Housewares Trade Show held the week of 19-25 July 1936. It was also introduced again for the mid-west at the trade show held in Chicago from 3 to 15 August 1936. The July, 1936, issue of the CROCKERY AND GLASS JOURNAL announced the introduction of this pattern at the New York Show and the August, 1936, issue pictured the candelabra, a cup and saucer, a serving plate and a bowl and called it "A Sensationally New Idea in Glassware..". The Fall 1936 edition of CREA-TIVE DESIGN, another trade journal, also pictured the candelabra as well as the goblet, relish dish and cream and sugar. By September of 1936, the pattern was on display at all of the Heisey showrooms around the country including New York, Chicago, Denver, Los Angeles, Baltimore, Philadelphia and Kansas City. A reporter for the POTTERY, GLASS AND BRASS SALE-SMAN noted in the September, 1936, issue of this trade journal that the "pattern created a veritable furor when it was first shown at the New York Show." There is no reason to believe that the Stanhope candelabra was not introduced along with the rest of the rottern at the July New York Trade Show. The .tems in the pattern which were displayed initially at the New York and Chicago shows were most likely "feasibility" items, that is, they had not yet gone into regular, full production. The Heisey factory turn books (productivity ledgers) indicate that the candelabra did not go into regular production until the week of August 22, 1936, at which time 74 were turned out of the mold. At any rate, they were available to the general public by September, 1936.

At the time, there was much publicity made of the fact that Stanhope was designed by

Walter Von Nessen. Mr. Von Nessen was a Dutch \*architect and designer who had established a firm in New York City. It is strange that Heisey, with all its "in-house" talent, would turn to an "outside" designer whose business was really architectural and industrial design. However, it seemed to be the trend of the day for glass manufacturers to go outside the field in searching for new designers. And Heisey was no exception. As the POTTERY, GLASS AND BRASS SALESMAN stated, "With all due respect to the many capable mold makers and designers that abound in this country, they are so steeped in glassware lore that their vision is apt to become circumscribed. On the other hand there are architects, illustrators, and designers who will bring to glassware designing an entirely new thought." Actually Heisey's first contact with Walter Von Nessen seems to have been in the summer or fall of 1934 when Rod Irwin, the Heisey Sales Manager , went to New York to meet Mr. Von Nessen to discuss the possibility of his designing some items for Heisey to display in a special exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum in November of 1934. \*\* Mr. Von Nessen's association with Heisey continued over the next few years during which time he was to design several successful patterns for them. And so it was that the Heisey Company commissioned Walter Von Nessen to design a new pattern for their Fall 1936 season. The result was "Stanhope", a pattern with a strong art deco flavor. It was named after Lady Stanhope, a wealthy English courtesan of the pre-Victorian era, who owned the famous Stanhope diamond.

On July 29, 1936, Mr. Von Nessen filed for two design patents, No. 101, 410 for a Stanhope plate and No. 101, 900 for the Stanhope sugar bowl. Although he did not file for a patent No. 1483 Stanhope Candelabra Cont'd.

for the candelabra as such, the basic design for all the Stanhope items was probably covered by

the plate and sugar bowl patents.

This candelabra was made only in crystal as a production item, however, there is one known in experimental blue (a light blue). Unlike most of the other candelabra made during Heisey's middle and late production years, which were available either as candelabra with bobeches and prisms or as candlesticks without bobeches and prisms, the Stanhope seems to have been offered only as a candelabra. It is pictured here both with and without bobeches and prisms to give the reader a better idea of its design. Incidently, the same bobeche was used on the Kohinoor candelabra which was designed by Mr. Von Nessen and named after another famous diamond.

Several Heisey etchings and cuttings were used on the Stanhope candelabra. The etchings include No. 490 Maytime, No. 491 Frosty Dawn, No. 494 Swingtime and No. 605 Frosted. The cuttings used were No. 867 Chateau, No. 880 Salem, No. 881 Kashmir, No. 882 Yorkshire, No. 883 Royal York and No. 888 Madeira.


This candelabra had a short production period and consequently is somewhat difficult to find today. The last available price list in which it appears is the 212-17 dated March 15, 1937. However, it was still being advertised in the CROCKERY AND GLASS JOURNAL in May, 1937, and it was most probably out of production by the fall of 1937 giving it a production life of about one year. It does not seem to be often marked with the Diamond H.

Although Imperial has not reissued this candelabra, they did reissue the Stanhope vase in stiegel green in the fall of 1980 which was commissioned by the Smithsonian Institution and sold only through their gift shop and catalog.

#### NOTE:

\* This may be a minor point but in the Stanhope article I just sent you I mentioned that VonNessen was Dutch because this is what an article in the Pottery, Glass and Brass Salesman said. However, I was looking over some Table Talks tonight and the May 1937 issue says VonNessen came to this country from his native Germany. I suppose both could be right if his parents or grandparents had moved to Germany from Holland before he was born. However I tend to give more credence to the Table Talk than the trade journal.





STEMS - NO. 3307 ALOOF

It is generally believed that if you want to know what Sparacio found this month - read his column next month. I'll have to plead guilty to that. It's so much easier to write confidently about something you can see and hold rather than rely strictly on research. I really don't confine myself to pieces I've acquired; some of the most interesting things have been those that you, the members, have been kind enough to share. Thank you for that.

Well, last month I found a little No. 3307 Aloof wine so this month we'll put together what we know about Aloof. I am personally aware of only three wines and one cordial in collectors hands in this pattern but I'm not privy to what many collectors have in their collections so let's just class them as tough to find.

Aloof was produced in 1916 and by 1924 it was already out of the line. It was strictly a stemware line and was offered in 3 different size goblets along with the cordial, wine, cocktail, burgundy, grape juice, claret, footed sundae, sherbet, champagne and 1 ounce pousse cafe. The best pictures you'll find of this pattern are in the ENCYCLOPEDIA OF HEISEY GLASSWARE, VOL. I. If you ever want to know what a "grape juice" looks like, that's the place to go.


Aloof was not made in color nor was it offered with a cutting. Right there are two strikes against it ever getting on the most wanted list; however, I have conducted a survey and have found that out of every 100 collectors there are 2-1/2 interested in etchings (other than Orchid and Rose). Let's see, 5000 divided by 100 times 2-1/2......you 125 members out there will be thrilled to know that Aloof came etched! I doubt that you'll ever find one but the goblet came with No. 455 Sportsman etching. The entire line, however, could be had with No. 384 Iroquois etching. Two of the four pieces I know of were needle etched but I did not check to see if they were Heisey etchings.

The blown bowls came with plain, medium or wide optic and the pressed stem is usually signed at the top just under the bowl. The wine I found has the Iroquois etching but there is no trace of the Diamond H on the stem. If it had not been for the etching I would have passed it by.









#### HEISEY CATALOG #50

I decided to write about Heisey Catalog #50 because there is a reproduction copy readily available for everyone to examine. Namely, Vogel's Book I is a copy of Catalog #50.

First, lets look at the original catalog #50 located in the HCA library. It has 127 pages. However, the page numbers only go up to 117. This is because there are number duplications through the use of alphabet characters, ie. Page 21 and Page 21A. One wonders why the use of duplicate page numbers, particularly like Pages 25 and 25A,B,C,D,E, & F. Perhaps late pages were added to the catalog just before printing with the original page numbers being maintained to minimize change and save time.

The catalog pages can be divided into two general classes: those which cover specificitem catagories like tumblers, sherbets, custards, mugs, etc., and those which show pattern lines like 300, 325, 339, 1776, etc. Lets compare Catalog #50 to Vogel's Book I. All the pages of the original catalog, except 7 and 8, are reproduced in Vogel's Book I as Page 1 thru 117. The original catalog Vogel used to produce his Book I may have been missing Pages 7 and 8. To maintain the page numbers, Vogel added two pages from some other source as Pages 7 and 8. The original pages showed ale and beer tumblers on Page 7, and lemonade or soda tumblers on Page 8. Vogel then added Pages 118, 119, 120, 131 and 132 to his Book I, again from some other source. Pages 121 to 130 are text material prepared by Vogel.

There is no actual date or reference to any kind of date printed in the original Catalog #50. However, the catalog can be logically dated as circa 1905 in the following manner. First, let us look at the three hundred numbered patterns in Catalog #50. You will see that the highest major pattern in the three hundred numbers is 357, later called the Prison Stripe pattern. Knowledge of future information beyond Catalog #50 tells us that the next major pattern in the three hundred's is 365, 01d Queen Ann. Since pattern 365 is not shown in Catalog #50, it reasonably indicates that the catalog was published before pattern 365 was introduced by Heisey.

Next, let us look at some of the old Heisey advertisements and patents that are in the HCA library. One old ad dated January, 1906, makes reference to Heisey's new #357 pattern. Another ad dated January, 1907, makes reference to Heisey's new #365 pattern. This tells us that the #50 catalog is earlier than 1907. There is a third ad dated January 18, 1906, that mentions two new Heisey patterns: #357 and #1776, the pattern named Kalonyal by Heisey. Catalog #50 has one page of items pictured for 357 Prison Stripe, and six pages of items pictured for #1776 Kalonyal. A bowl in the Kalonyal design was patented by Heisey on September 26, 1904. Because of the extensive number of items pictured in Catalog #50 for the Kalonyal pattern, I would estimate the catalog date after 1904. I also believe that

some pieces of a glassware pattern are produced prior to the offering of a new pattern line. Thus, Prison Stripe was mostlikely designed in late 1904 with production starting in 1905. Now, based on what is, and what is not shown in the catalog and on information from the Heisey ads and patents, the date for Catalog #50 is determined as 1905.

You will also notice in Catalog #50 the end of several early Heisey patterns as there are only a few items remaining in 1201 Fandango, 1205 Fancy Loop, 1220 Punty Band, 1225 Plain

Band and 1255 Pineapple and Fan.

One will also find the word "discontinued" stamped on various catalog pages. Of course, Catalog #50 would be used till the next Heisey catalog was issued. Thus, the stamping of discontinued on patterns no longer available over the life of the catalog. Next catalogs were #56 (circa 1908) and #58 (circa 1911).

As well as Catalog #50, there are many other Heisey catalogs and other types of original information available in the HCA library

for your examination and study.






Above, at right. An intriguing cocktail set that attracts immediate attention. After the cocktail is served, the ingeniously designed separate base can be inverted and used as a coaster.

#### BEE HIVE PLATES

The following is a quote from Ruth Webb Lee's SANDWICH GLASS, ENLARGED AND REVISED, Ninth Edition - Copyright 1947.

"The commonest cake plate produced at Sandwich was the octagonal Bee Hive, made only in a 9-1/4 inch size. Some of these plates are brilliant, while others are exceedingly dull. The border has shields, scrolls, grapes, acanthus leaves, etc. In the center of the base is a small hive with bees. Thistles and five-pointed stars alternate about the beehive. The usual edge is a clear scallop, though I know of one collector who owns an example having a stippled scallop. In addition, I have heard of an authentic specimen of this plate in blue and another in yellow.

For some reason, reproductions of the Beehive plate have been made. I cannot conceive that they have enjoyed a wide sale, for they would not deceive even the most inexperienced collector. The first copies came out several years ago, one in the usual size and the other much larger, measuring about 13 inches. During the last few years they have been on the market in several sizes, both clear and in colors. Since the originals were of heavy lead-flint glass and only in a 9-1/4 inch size, all the fakes in green, amber and crystal, from a bread-and-butter size up to a large tray, obbiously proclaim their lack of authenticity. There is no ring to the glass, they are not so heavy and they have a bright and shining surface. So far, this has been the only attempt to reproduce lacy Sandwich glass.


In the old memorandum book of William Stutson, dated 1859, I find 9 inch Beehive plates listed. It is not easy to believe that these plates continued to be made and sold by Sandwich so long after the great popularity of lacy ware was a thing of the past in a commercial sense. Of course, it is not beyond the range of possibilities that the demand for this particular plate may have persisted on a scale sufficient to make it profitable for manufacture, either on general or special order, at a time when what is now known as "pattern glass" had gone into mass production with consequent lower prices. The fact that Beehive plates are found today in much greater numbers than other handsomer styles strengthens the belief that Beehives might well have been produced for years after the demand for lacy glass had practically ceased".

#### Editor's Note:

It might surprise Ruth Webb Lee to know that the Beehive plates made by A. H. Heisey & Co., Ca. 1927 have become very collectible today. Those made by Heisey are soda lime glass - not lead. They came in 5, 8 and 14" sizes in several colors. The 15" size is known only in flamingo, moongleam and crystal. 8" size in flamingo, moongleam, sahara, hawthorne and zircon; 5" size in flamingo, moongleam, sahara and zircon.

The lavender stain seen on all these sizes was called "Lavender and Old Lace" by the company which applied it. The same company also used a pink stain. Duncan Miller made a beehive plate but they did not use the maple leaf in the border as both Heisey and Sandwich did. They also ground the bottom rim which Heisey did not. We have seen both plates and bowls made by Duncan Miller. The stippling on the Sandwich glass is much finer than that by Heisey, which is another way of telling the difference.

Does this whole story sound familiar?

#### E. WILSON HEISEY

(From American Flint, February, 1942)

E. Wilson Heisey, 66, president and general manager of the A. H. Heisey Glass Company, died Wednesday, January 21, 1942, at 2:40 A.M., in the Newark City Hospital.

Mr. Heisey had been in failing health several months and on January 6th was admitted to the hospital for treatment preparatory to an operation. His condition had been serious since the operation which he underwent January 17.

The son of the late Augustus H. Heisey, founder of the table glass industry here almost 50 years ago, Mr. Heisey became president of the company following the death of his father in 1922, and with his brother, T. Clarence Heisey, vice president and treasurer, successfully directed the business of the company, which is one of the outstanding glass manufacturing plants in the United States.

Mr. Heisey was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., October 9, 1875, the son of Major A. H. Heisey

and Mrs. Susan N. (Duncan) Heisey.

Mr. Heisey attended private schools in Pittsburgh and spent a year in the preparatory department of the Colorado Agricultural College. Following a year's training as a cadet at Kenyon Military Academy at Gambier, he entered Park Institute of Allegheny, Pa., for a two-year course. For three years Mr. Heisey was a student at Washington and Jefferson College in Washington, Pa., and while there was a recognized athlete. Leaving college he entered the glass company of which his father was head, mastered the details of the business and became factory manager. In time he was made vice president of the company and at the death of his father succeeded him to the office of president.

E. Wilson Heisey was keenly interested in sports and also kept a number of pure bred Setter dogs at the plant property. From boyhood Mr. Heisey was an enthusiastic devotee of baseball. He gained prominence as a player at Washington and Jefferson College and attracted the attention of major league scouts. He turned down numerous offers to enter professional baseball. Though passing up baseball as a profession, he found an outlet for his interest in the sport through the backing and managing of the Heisey baseball team.

For several years Mr. Heisey was a power in Republican politics but never held any public office himself. He served as a delegate to the national convention in 1936 and was a former member of the State Executive Committee and treasurer of the committee in 1930.

Mr. Heisey was at all times interested in the betterment of the community which the Heisey business helped to make a progressive industrial center, took an active part in civic affairs.

He served about 20 years as member of various committees in the National Glass Manufacturers' Association and was a member of the Society of Glass Technology.

Surviving him are: His widow, formerly Hazel Reese, whom he married in 1906; two sons, George Duncan Heisey and Augustus H. Heisey; four grandchildren; two sisters and two brothers, Mrs. O. H. Dockery, Mrs. Fred H. King, George D. Heisey and T. Clarence Heisey all of Newark, Ohio.

Funeral services were held in Trinity Episcopal Church, the Reverend James E. Wolf officiating; and burial was made in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

I have an item of interest concerning Imperial's Heisey "Zodiac", No. 1590, reproduction. On 3 December 1968, I purchased the candy jar of the above pattern in antique blue (and minus the cover) at a nearby "antique" auction. At the time I had no idea of the piece's identity and it wasn't until several years later that I found it to be a Heisey repro by Imperial. This jar has the pattern on the foot as stated in HEISEY BY IMPERIAL, P. 17, and is unmarked. It is of the antique blue as compared with the color chart supplied with the above reference.

Judging from the slight wear on the base, I would estimate that it was about 4 - 5 years old when I bought it. That would place the jar's manufacture about 1963-64. Since Imperial's production of this pattern in the candy (ant. blue) jar is given as 1972, I speculate that I have an experimental piece.

For your information I have enclosed a copy of an ad for the Zodiac pattern by Imperial which appeared in the September issue of House and Garden (1969). This copy, which you may retain, did not reproduce the colors in the ad clearly and it is noteworthy that no antique blue is shown.

## Q&A

Which type of glassware will break more easily when hot water is poured into it--thin glass or thick glass?

Many factors determine whether a piece of glass breaks due to heat exposure. The thermoshock resistance of a particular piece of glassware is not related to its thickness but rather to its composition -- the type of materials used and the way it is manufactured. With two drinking glasses of the same composition, there may be other stresses on the glass that can affect resistance to heat exposure. However, in general, thin glass has a greater resistance to thermo-shock because it distributes heat faster and more evenly. So, if all other factors are equal, thicker glass will be more likely to crack with the addition of hot water.




