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NOTES FROM YOUR PRESIDENT.....

IMPERIAL UPDATE

At the convention in June, when I asked the membership for donations to purchase the Heisey moulds, I truly believed that within three weeks there would be a resolution to the situation. I had no idea of the possibilities of delay and continuations that were available to the management of Imperial Glass.

Imperial is now closed, the courts have appointed a Trustee and the bankruptcy is progres-

sing.

We have been approached by this trustee who wanted to know if we really would buy the Heisey animal moulds for \$500,000. He was told that they weren't worth that, and even if they were, we didn't have that kind of money. We have been approached by a representative of a large liquidating firm (they liquidated Jeannette Glass last year) who asked the same question, got the same answer and asked if they would be worth nearer \$100,000. We answered that that was a lot closer to their true value. Speculation here is that the liquidators will buy Imperial from the court if no one else does.

There is another group working toward the purchase of Imperial, the "Save Imperial Committee" in Bellaire together with Viking Glass has made an offer to Lenox, the creditor of record of Imperial. At this time this offer has neither been accepted or rejected. Should this offer be accepted, the intent is to restore Imperial to a working, hopefully, money making glass house.

Viking Glass, as you know, has been friendly to the HCA, making glass for us in moulds "rented" from Imperial, at considerably reduced rates, and also making glass for us in our own moulds, and would not use the Heisey moulds to our disadvantage.

I wish there was more I could tell you about the proceedings, I wish there was more I knew about them, but the HCA is an interested spectator, not a participant, at least not yet. There is some hope that we may be able to purchase some moulds, but right now, that's all it is, hope, and I won't lead you down the garden path again with no more than hope.

When we have something positively sure you will hear about it from us. 1-

HEISEY'S LITTLE THINGS

By Louise Ream

The #433 pattern is called both Greek Key and Grecian Border, the latter apparently having come from some Heisey material. It was first made in 1911 with a few pieces still being made in 1941. No piece has ever been reproduced. In fact, the moulds were inadvertently given to the Scrap Iron Drive during World War II. It is nearly always marked.

Possibly this pattern is the most popular one, among men, especially. The glass is heavy and of superior quality, very well finished. Since it is popular its price is usually high.

For our HLT Category we can find several pieces though, strangely there is no individual salt. By this time, however, salts were disappearing from table glass lines. The individual footed almond is a very cute piece and not too hard to find. The individual butter pat has slightly higher sides than those in most patterns. Of course there is the usual custard or punch cup but in #433 you can add two - one in crystal and the other in flamingo.

The 2-1/2 oz. bars are the same as the toothpick so that you should either collect two or call it the toothpick since it should bring a lot more money as a toothpick. The 2 oz. wine and the 2 oz. sherry are very attractive.

The individual creams and sugars are oval and are not as small as some of the others. The individual ice tub is almost my favorite piece of Greek Key. One wonders exactly what its use was since it could hold so little.

It is gratifying to get notes from some of you about the various things you have found. Just keep looking! Maybe you will find a marked #300 individual drink bottle in amber. It does exist.

OBSERVATIONS AND OPINIONS ON OPEN SALT COLLECTING

We're off on a new adventure. After accumulating a number of duplicates while getting new salts for our collection, we decided to buy some intentionally for resale.

One of our current projects is identifying and collecting Heisey salts. The Heisey Company started in business in 1896 and put out its last catalog in 1956. Much of their glass is usually high quality, being clearer, smoother and with more sparkle than its competition. They made both shakers and open salts in the early days, but later abandoned salt dishes almost entirely. They started marking their ware about 1901, although not every piece had their "diamond H" in the mold. Some were sold marked only with stickers. We have been working with Louise Ream, Executive Director of the Heisey Museum, who has a complete collection of the Heisey open salts. Thanks to her help we have a list of the known salts (21 individuals, 5 masters and one double) to work on. These are in crystal; a really complete collection would also include 5 more individuals in color, but no new shapes.

Looking for 27 specific salts less than 100 years old may not sound too difficult, but it has proven much harder than we expected. Some of the unmarked ones are very difficult to distinguish from similar dishes made by other companies. One has a shape that exactly matches a signed Higbee salt. Instead of the HIG bee on the inside bottom, it has a faint "diamond H" made by a mark etched with acid on the plunger of the mold. (If you have a Smith 1-3-2, H & *J) 2784, look closely on the bottom of the bowl.) Only a few of these are known today - we are still hunting for one. Some of the colored ones are rare also - the Revere tub (Smith 55-4-3, H&J 374) in cobalt blue and the Pineapple and Fan (Smith 165-4-3, H&J 3051) in green have each brought \$140-150 prices this year.

The #1121 salt (Smith 2-4-1, H&J 2709) has several look-alikes from other companies. We still cannot tell if one is Heisey without comparing it directly with a known copy. Louise Ream has one of these marked "diamond H," the only signed one we have seen. If you have a signed one, you are fortunate.

The double, or twin salt as Heisey called it, resembles one from Co-Operative Flint Glass Co. (H&J p.18, #239 Twin Salt). The two can be distinguished by examining the bottom pattern - the Heisey one has 14 rays while the other has 12.

The last open salt **that Heisey produced was in the late Puritan pattern, originating in 1937. It is unmarked and hard to find. Many similar designs are available (Smith 261-1-1 is the general shape, H&J 3250 may be one of them). Some were sold as pressed; others had one or more of the faces polished. The pressed ones are 1-7/8" square at the top, 1-1/4" square at the bottom, and 15/16" high. They have steeper sides than the one pictured in Smith, and come only in

crystal. This was a challenge to find - we looked at literally hundreds of larger and smaller dishes like it before discovering a pair at a mall in Georgia.

Our list of Heisey salts as it stands today is as follows:

There are several salt-size dishes that Heisey catalogs list only for other uses. These include:

SMITH HAD	A27 20 TGS - 6022 C SSS - 60 SSD - 60
11-1-2 466	Ash Tray - Old Sandwich pattern

There is also a pedestal nut dish in the Medium Flat Panel pattern which is marked "diamond H" and is in some collections. We rationalize that someone must have used these dishes for a salt sometime, since they are too cute to let go.

There seems to be at least one salt incorrectly attributed to Heisey. The Fine Prism dish (Smith 82-3-2, H&J 2614) is cited as Heisey in H&J, but the Museum disagrees. There is no record of it in the Heisey catalogs, and the Museum says the glass is not the Heisey quality on our dish like this.

We have a beautiful master salt in mint condition which we bought with a Heisey paper label on it. The Museum agreed that the quality of the glass is up to Heisey standards, but pointed out that anyone can buy or print labels. They know of no reference to it in the old Heisey lists or catalogs, and until one shows up, our "find" will have to remain a "maybe."

Besides the plain salts themselves, decorated versions are sometimes found. We have the Revere tub with engraved sides and the early Puritan with a silver overlay. This embellishment was not necessarily done by Heisey - they supplied salts to

various decorators over the years. If you want to collect the decorated versions, it could expand your search significantly. Although there are many old catalogs of Heisey items, we know of no way to trace the number and type of decorations that have been added by others.

A study of the tableware patterns shows the rise of Heisey shakers and the demise of open dishes. Our references show the picture as

follows:

All but three of the open salts that Heisey made were part of a set of tableware. All such sets also offered shakers, or salt bottles as

they were first called.

We are still hunting for six more Heisey shapes. Later we might even try for all the colors. We will be competing with Heisey collectors, many of whom specialize in "Heisey Little Things." In the meantime, we are putting together a paper giving descriptions, illustrations and information we have gathered about Heisey open salts. We currently plan to publish it in some form by next spring.

NEEDLE IN A HAYSTACK

(or Finding a Real No. 1121 Heisey Salt Dish)

At first the job sounded quite easy - find a Heisey #1121 salt dish for our collection. After all, we had a good picture from Louise Ream's HLT column (Nov. - Dec. 1982) and we had seen the shape quite often at antique shows and flea markets. But we were forgetting Murphy's First Law - Nothing is as simple as it seems.

Our first try looked good until we got it home. Then we found there was a slight curvature at the base which didn't seem to match the pic-

ture. Our next one was closer, but the ends did not seem quite straight enough. To make a long story short, we wound up with six unmarked salt dishes which we thought were possibilities. Then we visited the Museum and asked for help.

Fortunately, Louise has an #1121 which is marked diamond H. She compared our dishes to hers and found one which matched and one which is "maybe." Three have 24 rays in the bottom pattern rather than the 20 rays found in the Heisey version. One of the others is slightly longer -60 mm. instead of 59 mm. (a 1/25 inch difference). The real #1121 has the clearest glass of the lot.

So we really have one, and possibly two. Today we still have not figured out how to be sure that a salt dish is Heisey #1121 without having a genuine one for comparison. The glass is better quality than other look-alikes, but this is hard to check on a dusty dish in the back room of an antique shop. Someday we hope to pick one up and find a diamond H in the bowl; that will probably be many near misses from now. In the meantime we have learned that at least one close copy exists, and that we should be very careful before saying "This is really Heisey #1121."

In finding our needle in a haystack, we reaffirmed the time-honored admonition - "Your best protection is a knowledgeable dealer." Most of our "possibles" were ones we selected at flea markets or shops. The real McCoy came from George and Eileen Schamel at an antique show, who said they felt sure it was the right one. It cost more than the \$2.00 dishes we picked up elsewhere but we did get the real thing for our money.

Q. I wanted to let you know about some more punch cups that my husband found while on a trip in Virginia. These punch cups also have the eight panels and the pleats at the bottom, however they have a pressed/molded star design on the bottom instead of the cut star that my other cups have. These new punch cups are marked, and are of good quality crystal. Apparently there were two different punch cups made in the same pattern (two different bottoms?).

I look forward to anything you are able to find out. As a relatively new collector of Heisey glass, this has been somewhat exciting for me and is definitely a learning experience. Thank

you so much.

I am sure that your second group of cups are the same as the first ones except that these had been ground and polished on the bottom which enhanced the pressed star.

I saw some 400 cups with the eight panels plus the pleats at a flea market very recently. I guess I had never observed these closely before. Eight panels rather than six should, therefore, be the determining factor as to whether it is 300 or 400. Why did Heisey do this to us?

THOMAS MARTIN

Thomas Edwin Martin, a popular social studies teacher in Mamaroneck High School, died Monday, September 24 at St. Vincent's Hospital, Manhattan, from cancer. He was 50 and lived in New Rochelle.

Mr. Martin taught for 23 years in the Mamaroneck School District, the first six in the former Mamaroneck Junior High and the remainder in the high school. His illness kept him out of school for most of last year.

"He had a passionate interest in history; it really came across," said Thomas Tiktin, the high school principal. "He would challenge the kids intellectually and they responded to him. The kids tried hard to get into his class. They knew it was a strong course from someone who loved the subject and had a real commitment to it."

Mr. Martin was born May 11, 1934, in Florence, Ala., to Mr. & Mrs. Buford Martin. When he was in the 11th grade, his family moved to South Bend, Ind., where he finished high school. He graduated summa cum laude from Bob Jones University, in Greenville, S.C., then attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky.

He was ordained a minister, but never had

his own congregation.

In the late 1950s, Mr. Martin moved to New York and entered one of Bonwit Teller's junior executive training programs. He then entered Columbia University, received a master's degree in history, and took the teaching job in Mamaroneck.

For the last 10 years, Mr. Martin's passion was collecting Heisey glass -- molded bowls, plates, candlesticks and other objects made early in the century in Newark, Ohio. He became something of an expert, buying and selling pieces, joining an organization of dealers, and discovering rare pieces which he sometimes donated to Newark's Heisey Museum.

"It was more than an avocation for him," his brother said. "It was a second career."

Mr. Martin is survived by his mother and a brother, Scott.




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

This is the third and last in our Ridgeleigh series. There were two more candlesticks in this pattern, bringing the total to seven. The same month the vase candlestick was issued (February 1936), the two-light candlestick (Photo No. 1) was also produced. This was sold both as candlestick and a candelabra. It was unusual in its candelabra form (Photo No. 2) because it had only one bobeche which merely rested over the top of the center column. The bobeche was perfectly plain, round and held six prisms. Of all the Ridgeleigh candlesticks this reflects the strongest art deco flavor. It is six and a half inches high and the ridges appear on the center column and the candleholders. The arms are thick, wide and plain. The base is stepped and ground smooth on the bottom. The glass in this candlestick is usually brilliant and clear. It was offered



until sometime in 1944, though probably made for the last time in 1941. It was made in large quantities but is not very common today probably due to the fact that it is rarely marked. The candelabra was normally sold with "A" prisms but was was also offered with "H", "P", and "X" prisms. It was also offered with two production cuttings, no. 883 Royal York and no. 884 Vincent, though rarely seen with either. It was made in crystal only and was not reissued by Imperial.

The seventh and last Ridgeleigh candleholder (Photo No. 3), the one-light no. 1469-1/2 candelabra, was also first made in February of 1936. The "1/2" was added to the pattern number to differentiate it from the other one-light candelabra which had been introduced a year before. They both had the same bobeche and candleholder but different bases. The 1469-1/2 has a column with vertical ridges and a knob at the bottom. This knob is similar to the one on the large two-light candelabra and the candle vase but smaller. The base is almost flat and also has ridges. Ten "A" prisms were used on the bobeche. As far as is known, it was made in crystal only and is usually marked on the bottom of the base. It is not especially difficult for collectors to find today and was not reissued by Imperial.

You would have been so proud of our display at the Cameo Show, it was absolutely breathtaking. We had seven eight foot tables and they were loaded with everyone's choice Heisey, Alexandrite, Cobalt, Moongleam, Sahara, Flamingo, Tangerine, Vaseline, Zircon, Emerald, Marigold, Hawthorne, almost all the colors. I'm sure that almost all patterns were represented also. It was very beautiful.

Comments from people were quite interesting.



ILLUMINATING DEVICES

The following quote is from Crockery & Glass Journal, March 29, 1917. The candlestick is Heisey's #5. If you find any put together this way you will now know that it was not done at Heisey.

"To overcome a difficulty which has troubled the trade, Edward Miller & Co. have perfected an attachment for electrifying candlesticks. The Security Electric Candle Attachment, here illustrated, is a novel device that will fit any candlestick having a socket of ordinary size, regardless of the variation in the bases. It is provided with a rubber plug, adjustable to any socket, and when properly attached cannot wobble, work loose, or pull out. It is as rigid as the stick itself, always in perfect alignment with the candlestick and will hold on during a life time, or can be detached in a second. A patent has been applied for.

EDWARD G. NOCK KILLED

In a fall of 10 floors from a window in his apartment, Edward G. Nock, well known glassware sales representative, was killed on October 9. Mr. Nock had been ill for several days and had dismissed his night nurse shortly before his body was found on East 43rd Street, New York. For some years, Mr. Nock, who was 65 years old, had been manager of the New York office of A. H. Heisey & Co. Previously he had represented that company in the Southeast, making his headquarters at Elberton, GA. Two daughters survive.

Joseph J. Lower, who has been working out of the New York office of A. H. Heisey & Co., for the past two years, covering New York State and a part of Canada, has been made manager of the office, taking the place of Edward G. Nock, who died on October 9. Mr. Lower has been connected with the Heisey sales organization for eight years, traveling the Rocky Mountain states before coming to New York.

Recently I received a call from a lady in the Mid-West wanting to know if an item in my February ad was still available. I had to tell her that the item she wanted had been sold. She then told me that she had my January ad in front of her and wondered whether I still had the #417 Flamingo basket. I did have it and she bought it. Then she asked about an item in my November ad!

I've received several inquiries similar in nature to the above. Is Heisey glass getting more difficult to find? Are people going back over the old ads looking for things they might have missed? Are collectors getting desperate? I don't know.

What do you think?

BACK ISSUES OF THE HEISEY NEWS AVAILABLE: Each Volume Contains 12 issues - Each Volume - \$9. Volume V, VI, VIII, IX, X, XI & XII - Reprints of issues of Heisey News in their entirety - Much valuable information in each issue - A must for the beginner.

I'm hoping you can answer two questions regarding Heisey glass. I understand that by looking under a Black Light, true Heisey glass will turn yellow. Is this an absolute test of Heisey authenticity? Are there exceptions to this rule? The following pieces are puzzles to me:

(1) I have four 5-1/2" saucers/bowls in the old Colonial pattern, each clearly marked with the diamond "H" in the center of the burst on the plate. There was no doubt in my mind that they were Heisey, but under the black light they turned blue rather than yellow. In your opinion, are these plates fakes?

(2) I bought a glass elephant believing it was Heisey (it is not marked) since I saw it pictured in an old, old Heisey catalog. In the book on Animals by J. McDermott, it is not pictured. However, under the black light, it turned a definite yellow. My question on this piece is whether it is Heisey or another glass that turns yellow under the black light. Am I putting too much emphasis on the use of the black light?

Ruth Schmit, Ill.

A. Yes, you <u>are</u> putting too much emphasis on the black light. Almost all old glass turns yellow, not just Heisey. I assume you have read Vogel. Even he realizes this and he mainly means that you can separate Heisey from Imperial this way. For the most part that is true but there are exceptions.

When Imperial obtained the moulds they used the Diamond H at first, not knowing about Heisey Collectors and that this could get confusing to them. So they did make Colonial (Williamsburg) and other items, marked with the Diamond H, not the stemware, but some other pieces. It was very good glass, nicely finished and I think it has gone into the Heisey collections. That may be what you have. It is 28 years since Imperial got the moulds - 18 since they removed the mark entirely so the marked pieces are far from new, and certainly should be collectible.

Incidentally, all of the Heisey animals are shown in the McDermott book. Also, very little Heisey blown glass turns yellow and it is mostly pressed glass that does. Sorry I can't tell you who made your elephant.
