

# IS IT 1200 CUT BLOCK OR 170 CUT BLOCK?

Confusion has arisen from the Heisey Co's decision to refer to the Cut Block pattern by both #1200 and #170. Just why they chose to do this we cannot at this time determine. We can make some deductions by studying very ear-


ly price lists and catalogs.

In a very early catalog (probably the oldest owned by HCA and possibly Heisey's first) a very complete line of Cut Block is shown including a page of items with engraving. In this catalog it is called "1200 Ware." In other early catalogs and price lists showing many items of the pattern, the number 1200 is always used. The conclusion from this would be that 1200 seems to be the original factory number.

In a later catalog which is undated but includes the Diamond H trademark, thus dating it circa late 1900 or 1901, the number 170 is used. However, by this time only 2 items are shown in the pattern - 2 nappies - a 4" and an

8".

Logically, it seems 1200 should be the number used for the major pattern. While the number 170 was used by Heisey, it appears to be a late application and for the sake of clarity it should probably not be used by collectors since it was apparently for only the 2 nappies. The use of the double number is interesting from a historical view but is only confusing for collectors and dealers today.

# HEISEY IN THE TRADE JOURNALS

### NO. 1289 WINGED SCROLL

Unlike some of the other early patterns, which Heisey promoted extensively in the trade journals, no. 1280 Winged Scroll was only featured in two advertisements, the first appearing in the July 1899 issue of The House Furnisher: China, Glass and Pottery Review. The cream and sugar only were pictured, rather than the entire table set. On another page in the same magazine, the covered butter was also illustrated, along with two others in patterns from Fostoria and the Beatty-Brady Company and a molasses pot from the Eagle Glass & Mfg. Co.

This indicates that Heisey did provide the trade journals with cuts showing various pieces from their new pattern. In fact, others had already appeared in the Crockery and Glass Journal in the May 18th. and June 1st. issues, which pictured two different "boudoir" sets (one is actually a smoking set). Some sources have dated Winged Scroll as early as 1898, but it is probably safe to assume that the pattern was brought out at the beginning of 1899, in January or February.

It may be noted that the first advertisement mentions "fine crystal and opal". Opal was introduced early in 1899 and it is possible that winged scroll was primarily designed to be made in this color. By mid to late 1899, two other colors were placed in production, emerald and ivorina verde (or custard). final color from the early period, canary or vaseline, is more difficult to date with precision, but probably also was made around this same time.) Winged Scroll is unique among early patterns in that it is most often found in color: ivorina verde is seen most often, followed by emerald and then by opal and vaseline. The last two colors are quite rare, but not as hard to find as crystal; however, crystal is generally not considered as desirable, which makes this a case where value

and rarity do not necessarily go hand in hand.

The second advertisement for Winged Scroll was in the October 1899 issue of The House Furnisher: China, Glass and Pottery Review and is notable for being Heisey's first ad to be printed in color. It is a fullpage ad showing the molasses can, toothpick, salt, tumbler, 4½" nappy, oil, and table set, all in custard, or ivorina verde, as Heisey named this color. It is probably on account of this advertisement that some early researchers incorrectly assumed that ivorina verde was the name of the no. 1280 pattern; in fact, as was the case with most of the early patterns, Heisey never re-ferred to the line by name. Winged Scroll is a descriptive name used by collectors. (According to John and Elizabeth Welker's book, Pressed Glass in America, some collectors also refer to this pattern as Staghorn.)

ing an early painted decoration. In the xerox of this ad, which I hope will reprint okay, the winged scrolls themselves did not reproduce, since they were printed in a slightly darker custard on a cream colored background, but the no. 54 painted decoration, with red roses and green leaves, can be seen quite clearly.

According to factory records, other decorations included two different gold decorations, no. 35 and 38. I suspect that both involved painting the winged scrolls and that the difference between them was that no. 35 also had gilded rims. Pieces are also sometimes seen with a pale green decoration. Virginia and Loren Yeakley's Heisey Glass in Color, book II, illustrates

decorated pieces in emerald, opal, and ivorina verde, and William Heacock's Custard Glass from A to Z also includes 3 pages of items in ivorina verde. It is also known that pieces in this pattern were provided to the Oriental Glass Company for decoration, possibly includ-

ing other floral designs.

There is a reference in an old issue of the Heisey News to the trinket box having been made with ruby stain, which one would almost expect, since so many other patterns from this period were decorated in red (frequently as souvenir items). However, this could have been the result of confusion with the trinket box made by the Jefferson Glass Company, which I will be mentioning in greater detail later in this article. The Jefferson piece was a copy of the Heisey box and is often seen with ruby stain. I've found no other verification of real Winged Scroll pieces having been made with this decoration. If anyone has one, please write and let me know

While on the subject of the trinket boxes, it should be mentioned that they are sometimes seen in clambroth (a kind of off-color opal) and in black, but that there is some controversy regarding them. Since I don't feel competent to take a stand on the matter, I will let Louise Ream speak to it, quoting from her ar-

ticle in the October 1982 Heisey News:

Even though there is considerable speculation on whether Heisey did make the trinket boxes in black or clambroth, so far no one has been able to prove that they  $\underline{\text{did not}}$ , nor who did make them if Heisey did  $\underline{\text{not}}$ . If you were aware of all the special items which Heisey made for other companies, and the cheap looking opal novelties which they made in the early years, it would seem obvious that they could have made anything. The basic difference in the cheaper looking trinket boxes is that the bottom is flat rather than having the ground bottom rim. A simple addition to the mold of another type bottom plate could account for that . . . (which would have been a cheaper way to make it.) Unless additional original information turns up, this is likely to remain a mystery that cannot be entirely resolved.

The pattern was a fairly large one, including nearly 60 different items. It is a particularly intriguing one for those collectors who are lucky enough to find one of the sets produced in the pattern. The accompanying illustrations from the <u>Crockery and Glass Journal</u> show two of them (both referred to as "boudoir sets" by the magazine). The first, which Heisey called a "toliet set," consisted of the 13" tray with a puff box, cologne bottle, trinket box, pin tray and ring holder. The second, actually the #2 smokers set, consisted of a 13" tray with a cigar holder, cigarette holder, match holder, tobacco jar and ash receiver. Other sets included the #1 smokers set (an 8" tray with a cigar holder, match holder and ash receiver), a trinket set (an 8" tray with a trinket box and ring tree), and three condiment sets: #1 (an 8" tray with an oil bottle, salt and pepper), #2 This second advertisement was also notable for show-(the 10" tray with 2 oil bottles, salt and pepper), and #3 (an 8" tray with an oil bottle, salt and toothpick). Note that the various trays do not contain the winged scrolls, but only have the foliate design around the rims. Since none of the pieces in Winged Scroll are marked with the Diamond H, the trays are sometimes not recognized.

For the same reason, collectors are sometimes confused by a later pattern made by the Jefferson Glass Company of Follansbee, West Virginia. This pattern, known variously as Jefferson's Fleur-De-Lis, Wreath, or Winged Scroll Variant, is generally considered to be a

copy of Heisey's pattern. However, Heisey's line seems to have been discontinued sometime after 1902 and before 1905, while the Jefferson version did not come out until around 1910-1915, so it was not actually sold in direct competition with Heisey's Winged Scroll. And it is important to note that only three pieces were made by Jefferson, mostly as souvenir items: a puff box, hair receiver, and the trinket box. It should also be kept in mind that Jefferson made very fine quality glass, so if a collector ends up with a piece in his or her collection, it should not be considered inferior to Heisey. Jefferson made crystal comparable to Heisey's and a rich colored custard which is often beautifully decorated.

The differences between the patterns can be seen in the accompanying drawings (which were originally done for the January 1974 Heisey News by Horace King). Figure One shows the Heisey Winged Scroll, which is open at the top, with three dots forming a band gathering the scrolls together near the bottom. Figure Two shows the Jefferson variant, which has a solid band and additional scrolls filling in the center area at the top. Heacock's Custard Glass from A to Z pictures a Jefferson hair receiver with gold trim and a painted floral decoration, and his Ruby-Stained Glass from A to Z shows both the hair receiver and puff box.

In 1975, the Guernsey Glass Company in Cambridge made a miniature butter dish in Winged Scroll in Crown Tuscan, an opaque pink color. It was made for Robert Wetzel of Zanesville, marked "R. W.," and was not actually a reproduction since, of course, Heisey never made a toy butter in this pattern. It may have also been made in other colors (possibly milk glass or emerald), but is not likely to be a cause of confusion for the collector.

All of the original molds for Winged Scroll, as is usually the case with these early patterns, were destroyed long ago, so this pattern has never been reissued.

## EDITORS NOTE:

We have learned nothing new about this trinket box since I wrote the article in 1982. I have never yet seen one of these small trinket boxes with the three extra scrolls and the band across the lower scrolls as shown in the drawing of the Jefferson Glass pattern. I have recently seen one of the questionable ones with "Souvenir of Newark, Ohio" but that doesn't prove anything either.

The pattern on some of the questionable ones is usually very good on the lid but sometimes is faint on the rest of the box. But sometimes they have excellent detail on both parts.

Besides the gound bottom rim, the better ones have a slight "dimple" at the top of the mold lines.

It would be obvious that if Heisey made some for cheap souvenirs that they would have revised the mold a little and changed the bottom plate to avoid having to grind the rim. Imperial did that with the baby cup when they made it.

We may never know the answer to this enigma but if someplace else did make these, I hope we can find real proof and settle the question for all times.


We have both the "Crown Tuscan" and the emerald miniature butter dishes in our "look-alike" cabinet in the lower level.





#9083 LEAF On 5040 LARIAT stemware.






3320 RITZ Goblet, moongleam foot #9082 BLACKBERRY \* Plate Etching

In my February and March articles I told you a bit about the Jeremiah Lee Mansion; it is now the home of the Marblehead Historical Society. This past winter there was a complete "Wall paper conservation and restoration project" carried out. The Institute of Museum services in Washington, DC awarded us a grant for this wallpaper conservation.

The original wallpaper, made for the mansion in 1768, has been on the walls for 220 years. It is English, hand-painted tempera wallpaper painted in the style of Pannino, with each panel

fitting the space it occupies.

This was, and is, very precious paper and the people of our town are most pleased that it has been preserved for all to enjoy for years to come. It was a monumental task done by very special and highly skilled craftsmen working many, many hours with great patience and love.

Yesterday, while at work, I received a phone call from a friend with whom I had a 1:30 appointment; she was canceling until 3:00 pm. That was fine. Usually I go directly from work to my appointment but because there was an hour and a half to spend, why not spend part of that time in a local Antique shop. The shop is run by a mother and daughter and lots of times I take a cup of coffee or a cold drink and just go in to pass the time. This was the plan - the mother waylayed me just inside the door and we talked for a bit. I inquired "what she might have that I just couldn't live without", and the answer was, "really nothing that I can remember". So that was fine, I only half looked in that side of the shop, but, on the other side setting right on the top shelf of an old antique kitchen cabinet was the lovely #343 Sunburst 4 oz oil, not the correct stopper but otherwise in perfect condition. Perhaps I have the correct stopper at home! I became the owner of this nice oil for less than a movie ticket!! "It's an ill wind that blows no good!" I also have the #1235 Beaded Panel and Sunburst 8 oz ketchup; think I'll bring them both into a club meeting for show and tell - interesting examples of the two patterns. Also seen in the same shop were six #1506 Whirlpool (Provincial) 4 3/8" nappies. To my collection of creams and sugars I added the #1180 hotel creamer, etched and with a silver rim.

The "Little Olde Lamplighter" told me that he found a Heisey Dolphin Candlestick UNDER a Cambridge cross-arm. Someone had decided to convert it into a "two-light" Dolphin Candlestick, quite different! However, a quick reconstruction by the "Lamplighter" and "Voila" the Dolphin is "one" again, a treasure and rapturous to behold!! He informed me that it was a rather nice find. Rather nice? How about ostentatious!

My "Rebel Cousins" found, at a country fair - no less, a few stems - the #5072 Rose Stem - twenty-two pieces to be exact - with the Rose Etch - goblets, ice teas, sherbets, plus eight (8) 7" #1519 Waverly plates - also with Rose Etch. In addition to that, he "crows" a bit regarding an #1184 Yeoman 11" handled, three compartment tray - very dark Flamingo, almost a red!

"The Cardinal" at a recent Auction purchased a few things for himself, the #1469 Ridgeleigh Club ash tray and the Ridgeleigh round cigarette holder. He also acquired a pretty little #5024 Oxford 3 oz wine and when the next little wine was put up for auction, the "Cardinal" said to me, "Mom, I'm going to get this piece for my collection no matter " He only had to bid a couple of times and just about "stole" the #3350 Wabash 3 oz cordial. It is quite clear that besides tumblers the "Cardinal" also collects the little stems, such as, wines and cordials. It does my heart good to see young people interested in Heisey.

It's been a long time since I've heard from "Mountain Grandma" so here are a couple things she told me about just to make us "moongleam" with envy: #393 Narrow Flute 4 oz oil with the #6 stopper and the Narrow Flute French dressing boat (she found two of these, only one was marked), also found were four 12" glass shades dated 10-29-12,

crimped edges, made by Holophane.\*

Speaking of "Mountain Grandma", it reminds me to tell all you nice friends that the "Felicitious Flamingo Hunter" has made "Yours Truly" a Grandmother again, a beautiful 7 lb baby girl, "Jillian Alyse". My daughter's first and my sixth

- "The Mr." would be so proud!!

"The Buckeye Belles" hit pay dirt while in Tucson after a great many hunting expeditions. It was a warm Friday afternoon and they were returning from an uneventful visit to two shops when, alas, three #3380 Old Dominion goblets in Sahara were found, plus one #135 Empress candlestick also in Sahara.

"The Farmer", (MA) after planting the South Field and mending the fence in the pasture just adjacent to the barn, took his truck and headed for parts "known." Heisey was on his mind and he managed to dig up three pieces: the #1428 Warwick 5" vase; #433 Greek Key nappies - one 8" and six 4"; plus a #1567 Plantation 13" gardenia bowl with the #567 Plantation Ivy etch.
"From the Point" (MA) on one of their reg-

ular trips a #1201 Laverne low footed bowl in Fla-

mingo was spotted and carried away!

"The Heisey-holic" (AZ) informed me that she received a super"fix" when she found the 4½" Horse Head cigarette box and a #2 Chanticleer, or

Fighting Rooster - 8" tall in crystal.

The Heavenly Honda is on the road again with "The Preacher" at the wheel. It was a church conference and two (2) 4%" Frances vases in Moongleam were found. One had the old paper label still attached (of course it was left intact). Some one in their study club mentioned that it looked like a favor vase with a thyroid condition! In the Color Book the number is #4217 and the favor vase is #4227. I just got out my color book to look at these pieces, interesting! Take a minute and look them up yourselves.
"The Woverines" boast about their prize

acquisition - the #134 Trident candlestick (a pair) in Sahara with the Empress etching #447, on the base. Neither the etching book or the candlestick book had noted that the Empress etching was

applied to the Trident stick.

That "High Steppin' Couple" (MA) report an 8 oz goblet with the Mayflower etch, #3350 Wabash

DIAMONDS ARE FOREVER, continued and a #1235 Beaded Panel and Sunburst one-handled jelly.

"The Hilltoppers" (MA) haven't been heard from in a while also, but when I do finally hear it's a real exceptional piece, namely the #1255

Pineapple and Fan 10" vase in Emerald.

"Mr. Crystolite" says he found the #1184 Yeoman jelly; the #1533 Wampum ash tray and a Warwick 9" vase, #1428. Another piece of Wampum was discovered and transported to a place of honor in the home of "The Orchard Lady". It was a pair of candlesticks.

"The Magnanimous Chieftan" added the Pinwheel and Fan punch cup in Moongleam, while the "Energetic Countess" found a ladle in Moongleam.

"The Amicable Stroller" received a framed

Heisey Ad as a gift.

My dear Bryce:

Our western agent informs me that you have been copying some of our No. 393 line. We can hardly give credit to a condition of this kind - - - that you would maliciously go in and copy and cut the price of our ware. We enclose you illustrations of the line we mean. Kindly inform me if this is true, for until you confirm it, I can hardly believe it.

We have covered this pattern with about ten design patents, and should the statement of our representative be true, it will then be necessary to take such action as will protect our interests, and we propose to do this regardless of the cost. But, as stated above, until we hear from you direct, we can hardly believe it.

My dear Mr. Heisey:

Replying to yours of the 22ndinst, in regard to your 393 line; I think you will find that we have not acted maliciously; it is not our habit, nor have we copied your ware.

We have a line which may resemble it about as closely as we have a line in tank glass that resembles this 15156 pattern, which is made in the finest pot glass, and to which you no doubt refer.

I attach a copy of a letter written to me by Mr. Haley in reference to the whole matter. Also attach illustrations which he refers to, and I notice by the design patent you refer to, that it is somewhat different from the illustration you sent

I must say that if you had strictly followed out the doctrines that you preach, there would have been a very great number of pieces which you now make which would never have been made.

You must admit, that since the formation of your Company, that you have drawn ideas from very many articles produced by this Company, not only staples, but others. The greatest of these, and showing your utter disregard of practicing what you preach, was, in the copying of our Candlestick with the hole in it. Pittsburgh, PA Possibly you do not know that we have a patent on this article. Such is the case however.

I sincerely regret that you seem to think that we take particular delight in copying your designs. assure you that such is not the case. We are attending strictly to our own business, but claim the right to use any ideas that suggest themselves to us through the many different varieties and schemes that have been made in the past twenty-three years by this Company. I don't think we have hurt you one particle in the past, and I don't think we will. We are working on entirely different lines, and I am sorry that you allow the imaginations of your agents to in any way interfere with the knowledge you must have,

that this Company would not knowingly injure such a good competitor as you have always been.

Dear Sir:

With reference to Mr. Heisey's letter of the 22nd. Our 15156 pattern at Factory "K" and "G" is, no doubt, the one Mr. Heisey refers to. This is a narrow Huber flute on the outside with a flat optic plunger giving a prismatic effect which is materially different from Heisey's design. We have applied for design patent on this, which will, no doubt, be granted.

In making this line, we have kept away from Heisey shapes as well as design. Of course, our tumbler is very similar in general outline. This design has been made by this Company, I believe, since the Company was organized.

We are herewith handing you illustration of 210 Sweet Meat. This was made at the Bellaire Goblet Works, and if my information is correct, an entire line of this pattern was formerely made by the O'Hara Glass Co..

We are also attaching illustrations of our 406 Stemware which has been made and sold by "K" continuously. We understand this was originally made at the Bellaire Goblet Works. The flutes on the Heisey design are materially different; while they do not show on his illustrations, the heads of the flutes are square, which is different from our lines and which is a feature we have not adopted.

We are attaching you also a copy of Heisey's design patent on Tumbler which shows this feature of the square heads, and which is materially different from our design. If we have inadvertently duplicated any of the Heisey designs and shapes, we, of course, will be glad to discontinue or change the moulds or designs, as it is not our intention to copy his design.

We do not recognize his right to the narrow flute which has been made by this Company since its organization.

Dear Sir:

Yours with illustrations attached, received. The sweetmeat to which you refer was originally copied from a French piece, and is not original with you or your predecessors. Besides, it has no bearing on our design patent.

The goblet which you submit, excepting the leg, is practically a copy of a goblet made by McKee & Bros., before you were in the glass business, and was known as the "Mieton", imported by a dealer in New Orleans.

Please tell me, did Gorby originate any designs? I am positive that the O'Hara Glass Company never made a full line of this pattern.

It seems rather singular that you have been making this goblet for over 20 years, and you have only lately discovered that it would make a good tableware line, but not until we had made a small flute pattern, placed it on the market, and created a demand for it; then you come in (as I understand it), to make a similar line and fall back on the goblet as an excuse.

In relation to the electro-portable. The original electro-portable made by us, is the same pattern as our No. 21 candlestick, on which we have a design patent. This candlestick was made before you had any conception of an electro-portable, so it was utterly impossible for us to copy yours. Besides, an improvement on anything

is not a copy.

Further, we are not compelled to put buttons on the bottom of our foot in order to permit the cable to pass through the hole in the center of the portable, nor are we compelled to use Plaster of Paris to hold the metal attachments on the candlestick, but we use an improved process of putting a hole through the foot, and connecting it with a hole through the center of the portable, for all of which we get considerable more money than you get for yours. Consequently, a higher priced article can never injure a lower priced article.

Your candlestick is not new. The same thing has been made, blown, by Val St. Lambert, for several years, and the Duncans make a candlestick copied from these

same people and made by the same process.

If it comes to a show-down, I am of the opinion that we can antedate your candlestick, anyhow. Our reason for not making it sooner was because we had to install a compressor to do this.

You seem to think that because the several Companies that compose your combination, who have copied from French, English and German manufacturers, the different articles which you now make, that you originated them. Go over your goblets, cocktails, tumblers, etc., etc., and see how many you originated. You will then comprehend that your Company as a whole, through its predecessors has done more copying than all the other glass manufacturers.

We have duplicated staples that are public property, because they are made by practically all glass manufac-

turers, but we have not duplicated prices.

I might call your attention to the fact that we have sodas which you sell for 60¢ and we get 90¢. You have a 14" candlestick which you sell for \$7.50 and we get \$11.00 for our 9" and \$21.00 for our 15". There are many articles that we make, that do bear a proportionate increase. We never cut a price. How is this with you? Please tell me.

Bear in mind that we do not claim the narrow flute, nor any other flute, nor can any one else claim it, but a combination of a flute that is distinctly individual, is patentable. In fact, any part of two patents, that are combined and produce a new effect, are patentable.

Your Mr. Haley, in my opinion, has the right idea. His whole idea seems to be to avoid conflict, because

this is ruinous.

In conclusion, let me say to you that we make no claim on the goblet, but we do on the tableware and specialties. We put these on the market. spent considerable money in advertising them, and creating a demand for them, and we beg to hereby notify you that if your designs conflict with ours, there can be but one result, and that is a suit. We want to avoid this if possible, because it is expensive, but we propose to enforce our rights, regardless of the cost.

Dear Sir:

Your very interesting letter of the 31st., carefully noted, and I was very much interested in reading the past history of the business as there is no one better able to tell it than you.

January 5, 1915

I don't know that I claimed that we had originated a lot of the things you mention, but I did claim that this Company had been making them for the past twenty

vears.

In making a fluted line, we were not trying to excuse ourselve.

We frequently revamp ideas and patterns and this year, have at least two such schemes and another partial one which is very similar to the fluted idea, which is not new, simply some old moulds revamped.

In regard to the Electro Portable, it is strange we had it on the market prior to anyone else. It is also strange that the Patent Office granted us a very

broad patent.

All of this can be settled later, as I don't think houses like yours and ours need to go into court to get justice. Reasonable people can usually agree, and

if not, can call in Arbitrators.

Some of the statements you make in your letter are worthy of consideration. The first is, that you have duplicated staples that are public property, because they are made by practically all glass manufacturers. That is a good broad principle, which I dare say would apply to practically anything that is made by all glass manufacturers.

In regard to your getting higher prices than we do; I dare say, that is correct in a great many cases, and I think we have found from past experience, that in many cases our prices have been higher than yours. There are always circumstances surrounding an article which may enable a person to get a high price, and on the other hand, may force a person to get a low price. You have to take conditions into consideration when you dwell too much on that subject.

Another statement you make as follows:

"In fact, any parts of two patents, that are combined and produce a new effect, are patentable".

 ${\rm I}$  do not understand whether you are quoting the Patent Office, or your own idea, but this statement is quite worthy of consideration.

I think you understand our position, which is, to avoid conflict, but at the same time, not to consider the abridgment of our rights. I don't want to tramp on the rights of others, neither do we expect to have our rights interfered with.

When you get right down to brass tacks, I think you will have to admit that this Company has never injured you in any way and it has never maliciously gone after you, as I believe some factories have done in the past.

We are glad to see you making a success and hope that you accord us the same wish.

My dear Bryce:

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of yours of the 5th. First, our electro-portable does not conflict with yours, because we have been granted a patent on it, and if it did conflict, the patent office would not have given us the patent. Besides, it does not conflict in price, being higher, and I assume that when the public want a cheap one, they will buy yours.

I am always reasonable and get-at-able, but do not think you are, in the position you have assumed.

When we find that you are infringing on our rights, and our attorney endorses it, we will fight, that is all. We are always willing to adjust differences that can be adjusted. There is only one way to avoid this, and that is to give your patterns such distinctive individuality, that they will not be mistaken for ours. That is the way to avoid trouble, and we will do the same thing, under like conditions, if it ever occurs, and I don't think it will, as it is our object to avoid this.

In regard to your claim of getting higher prices on some items than we do. We do not know of a single thing, and we must insist on your informing us, because we will immediately raise our price higher than you are getting.

If your statement that you are getting prices near our own is true, why is it that a concern whose sales are about one-fourth of yours, makes more money than you do. This is evidence that you cannot twist to suit the case.

In conclusion, if you make anything which our attorney thinks is in conflict with ours, we propose to bring suit, for we intend to establish our rights through the courts, if necessary, which we do not desire, because it is very expensive, but we consider it cheaper than to allow people to conflicet with what we believe to be our rights.

This whole matter is written without any feeling. Simply want to impress on your mind what we mean.

DESCRIPTION OF CANDLESTICK
FROM CANDLESTICK BOOK BY FELT AND O\*GRADY
PUBLISHED BY H.C.A.

No. 137, Concave Circle

Attribution of this candlestick is still somewhat uncertain. The no. 137 is not pictured in any of the catalogs and it appears only in price list 210, dated June 1933. However, the turn books indicate that this candlestick was first produced in January 1931, when a four-hour turn in crystal was made. In March, a 2½-hour turn was made in flamingo and a four-hour turn each in sahara and moongleam. It seems unlikely that any others were ever made. The June 1933 price list probably reflects stock left over from those initial turns and it is probable that the no. 137 candlestick was discontinued shortly thereafter.

The candlestick pictured is known to have come from the Heisey factory, although this in itself is not particularly supportive of an attribution to Heisey, since it was not unusual for the company to purchase glass from competitors to use as possible models for their own wares. However, rather more substantial evidence is provided by the May 1931 issue of the Crockery and Glass Journal, which describes a new candlestick being shown by Heisey's New York representative: "E. G. Nock . . . is displaying this month a new arrangement for glass candlesticks that has infinite possibilities. By the simple expedience of cutting curves on opposite sides of the circular bases of candlesticks the Heisey company makes possible the close grouping of any number. Thus by bringing close together the convex side of one of these candlesticks and the concave side of another two are brought into close association while combinations of three and more may be made to form an infinite variety of designs and letters." The candlestick described, by process of elimination, has to be the no. 137, since the only other new candlestick made in early 1931 was the no. 136. Also, the description does fit the candlestick pictured (though it should be noted that when the convex and concave sides are placed together, the fit is not a perfect one but only approximate). Further, the candlestick pictured is the right height since, according to the price list, the no. 137 was 5 inches tall. And, finally, examples seen have been in colors which appear to be sahara and flamingo, respectively.

Thus, although the attribution cannot be too emphatically made, the best evidence at this time seems to support the belief that this candlestick is Heisey's no. 137.






