

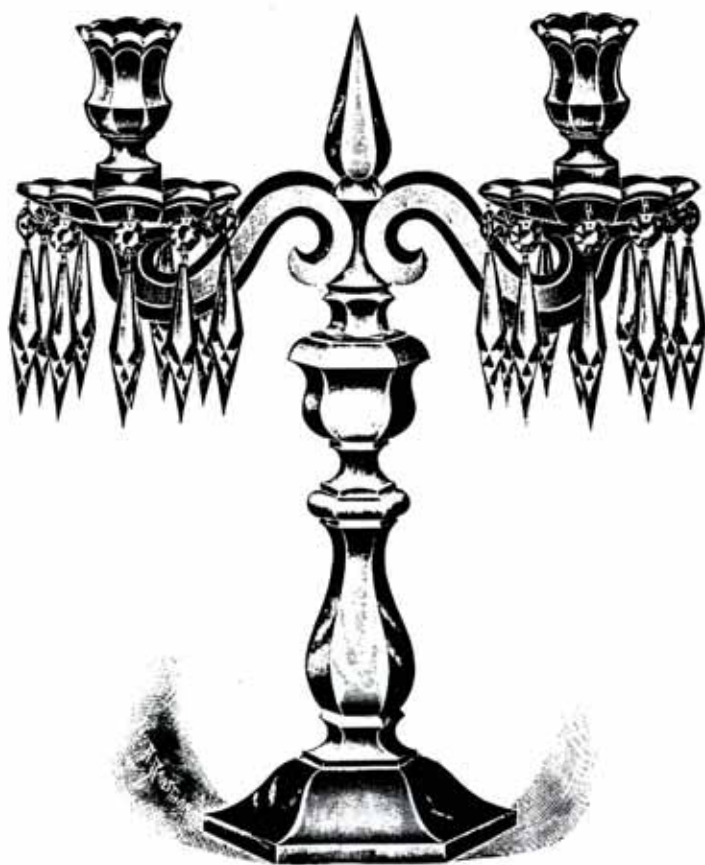

Focus on the Collection—#325 Pillows

Looking through past issues of *Heisey News*, I can tell that Heisey's #325, named Pillows by Minnie Watson Krumm, has always been a popular and much talked about pattern. Why it's even controversial!

Tom Felt's October 1989 "Heisey in the Trade Journals" article provides a good overview of the pattern. It was introduced by A.H. Heisey and Company in 1900 as "entirely different from anything on the market" (*The House Furnisher: China, Glass and Pottery Review*). As time would tell, this was not really the case. George Duncan & Sons actually produced a similar line of colognes in 1890, so similar that for many years the colognes were attributed to Heisey by collectors. Not so, pointed out George Fogg and Frank Maloney (see *Heisey News*, December 1986). In fact, Heisey made no cologne in this pattern. Other reported similarities are with glassware by the Flint Glass Company and a Westmoreland item made by Gillinder and Sons.

Pillows is characterized by an imitation cut glass design in the shape of smoothly beveled diamonds. The punch bowl, compotes, nappies and salver have an additional design element of diamond point at the base of the bowl. Heisey offered the pattern with their own #1 gold decoration and pieces are known with Ruby stain, probably added by another company.

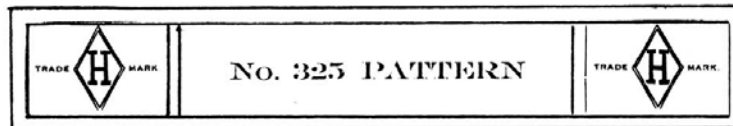

A few rare pieces are known in Flamingo—the 12-ounce molasses can, 1/2-gallon tankard, water bottle and pickle dish. In November 1989 Neila Bredehoft reported her discovery of 1901-1903 inventory ledgers in the archives that listed items tested in rose. Included was a list of #325 items: 7 creams, 12 4-inch nappies, 6 5-inch nappies, 4 7-inch nappies, 4 8-inch nappies, 4 9-inch nappies, 5 3-quart jugs, 3 egg cups, 3 water bottles and 4 tall celeries. Apparently these were early experiments with a pink that preceded the actual development of Flamingo.

The museum is fortunate to own a #325 Pillows water bottle in this early Flamingo. Other holdings in this pattern are a salt dip, punch bowl, footed jelly, footed rose bowl, pitcher, jelly compote, table set, toothpick and rose bowl. All of these items are on view in King House Room 5 with Heisey's Colonial items. The punch bowl is on view on a table in Room 4. If in doubt, come check us out! ♦

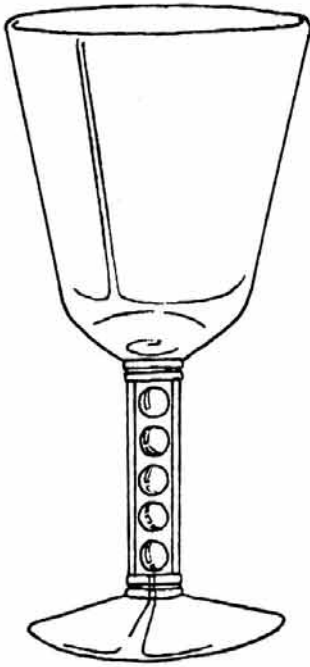

California and the Ides of March

I like to start a New Year off with something new and exciting both in my personal life as well as what I write for this space. Let's talk first about something "new" and exciting in Heisey. Very few collectors know about this piece. It's a goblet named "California," perhaps because it was found there. There you have it, every bit of information I have on this stem. You're fortunate to have this expert to guide you—how else would you learn. Louise Ream first pointed me in the direction of this stem. It is in our museum and she suggested I write about it. I asked her for everything available on it and she told me all I just shared with you (I'll bet you're surprised that we experts depend on experts, too).

The California goblet is marked with the Diamond H—that's what gave this expert the clue that it is indeed Heisey. The quality of the glass is spectacular. The convex circles down the stem appear to be bright little lenses. When you get to the museum be sure to look for it because our drawing does not do it justice (my brother Vince drew it from a sketch I made—he's the only one I know who can interpret my sketches). Keep a look out for a "California" goblet—where there's one there is bound to be another.

On the personal side, 1994's "new and exciting" is that we've decided to make another attempt to reach Newark, Ohio for the annual Cadillac Dinner and March Benefit Auction. If you don't think this is exciting you are unaware of the ill-fated effort we made last year. It precipitated the **Blizzard of 93** which, in turn, turned our planned round trip to Ohio into a two-day, one-way journey home where it began. My clothes weren't packed long enough to take on the normal Traveler's Suitcase Wrinkle.

I explained in the *Heisey News* then that whenever I pre-announced our plans, fate stepped in and changed them. Consequently, I took full responsibility for the blizzard and apologized to all it inconvenienced. So, for the record, we will *NOT* be in Newark, Ohio for the dinner or the auction this year either. If anyone asks, the Sparacios are spending March in the Bahamas (won't the natives be surprised when they're buried under three feet of snow). There's one tiny problem, I've yet to figure out how to make reservations in Newark without letting someone at the hotel know we'll be there. Maybe if I disguise my voice when I call

Because I won't be in Heiseyland next month for the festivities (wink, wink) the Auction Committee sent me a list of some of the things donated to the auction for the Endowment Fund. I'll note some of them here so you'll know what to bid on. Remember, if you don't bid on anything else, bid on the Endowment Fund donations if only to push up prices on these pieces. We must build a healthy Endowment Fund to protect our museum from a hostile takeover. It's no secret that the Licking County Historical Society has their eye on our space but only we insiders are aware that Donald Trump has been making inquiries, to say nothing of Viacom and TCI.

First of the listed items donated is first pattern, Fandango, represented by a 7-inch ball vase easily a \$1,000 piece (prices noted here are from my own personal price guide and do not reflect those found in Gene Florence's books or reality). Another exciting item is a Custard

Ring Band 1/2-gallon pitcher with six tumblers decorated with Heisey's Rose Bud decoration. This set was the first place winner at the 1973 Ohio State Fair Antiques Expo and comes complete with its ribbon—surely a one-of-a-kind set worth selling the kids for.

There's a Sahara Empress ashtray and a pair of #112 Mercury candlesticks in the same color—both tough finds. How about a piece of Locket on Chain in Vaseline? I don't know which piece, they forgot to tell me, but any Locket on Chain in Vaseline is to die for. Moongleam is well represented by a Petal cream & sugar, a 4-inch Beehive plate, a King Arthur goblet and a Trident 12-inch floral bowl.

A Plantation 1/2-gallon ice-lip pitcher should start some drooling as will the scarce Pan American cocktail glass. Cobalt is represented by a Carcassonne 3-ounce Oyster cocktail and I won't even mention the autographed Heisey stemware book, the Alexandrite Colonial 8-inch plate or the Stanhope cordial in Zircon because I mentioned them in an earlier article.

All told there are about forty pieces generous friends of the Heisey Museum Endowment Fund have donated to this auction. When a donated piece comes up, raise your hand high and bid till it hurts. If we pull together we can prevent Donald Trump from turning our beautiful museum into a gambling casino.

Looking forward to seeing you all at the auction even though I'm not going (wink, wink). ♦

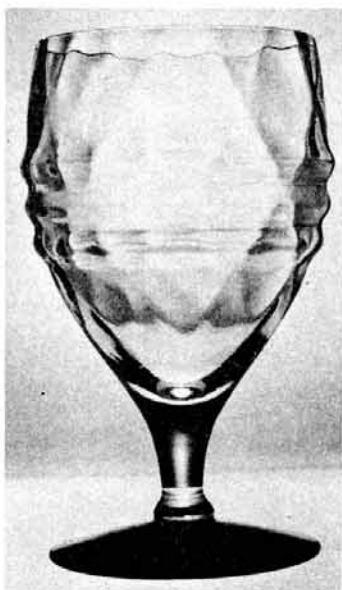
As of January 14, the Auction Committee has recorded 1003 lots for the Benefit Auction. As of that date, all the glass received has been examined and cataloged. The quality of the glass received this year is excellent. A good mix of patterns, colors and pieces await your inspection and bidding.

As reported last month, the various donations and consignments represent #3440 Portsmouth

all production colors and number of rare pattern pieces. A previously unseen Portsmouth goblet in Tangerine will tempt stemware collectors.

Notable among the donations benefiting the Endowment Fund is a Locket on Chain water pitcher in Vaseline, an Empress ashtray in Sahara, a Fandango ball vase, several pieces of Rose and Orchid etch, a Ring Band 1/2-gallon pitcher and 6 tumblers in Custard with Heisey Rose Bud decoration. This piece was the blue ribbon winner at the 1973 Ohio State Antique Expo, and a #4083 Stanhope cordial in Zircon, first one seen.

It is the intent of the Committee to have the auction list issue of the *Heisey News* in your possession a couple of weeks prior to the auction on March 11 and 12. Loren Yeakley has again volunteered to handle absentee bids. Full instructions for absentee bidding will be contained in the auction list mailing. We hope to see or hear from you in March. 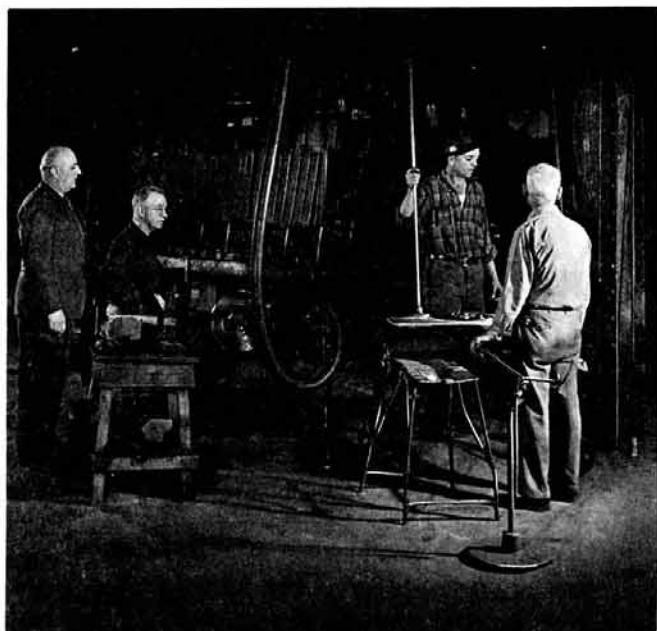

From the Archives

Knowing that Karen and Kelly (both Cincinnati and Columbus currently have the KKK, I just have the KK) will be breathing down my neck I try to stay on the alert for something (a) of interest to the membership and (b) different. This becomes a bit difficult in that I continue to go through T. Clarence Heisey's correspondence. I'm sure many of you wonder, along with me, if this chore will ever get completed (and will I ever write about anything else). In spite of my developing fascination with this material I do look forward to cataloging and sharing with you something else, such as the contents of the advertisement collection. But occasionally I get hit with something new. For example, yesterday, while chatting with Chauncy Delaney and Bob and Helen Rarey during the activities preparatory to the auction, my wife asked, "How many people were employed by Heisey?" Of course, both of them looked at me! Well, I found it, quite by accident, an hour later. A list of employees (numbered, fortunately) provided by the company for the purposes of War Bond solicitation in 1943.



Later in the day, bleary eyed and much in need of a cup of coffee, I encountered the auction prep gang still at it. Norm Thran and Karen Kneisley were coming out of the Lower Level men's room with a black light. Surely, I thought, they are not growing mushrooms in there. Noting my perplexed expression they were quick to explain the use of the light in checking the authenticity of Heisey ware. Now just how many times have you been sold the Brooklyn Bridge? "Really," said Norm, "come see." Before long the men's room became the locale of a seminar on the composition of glass with the accompanying question of why Heisey glass fluoresced and not other glassware. A bit later, again by chance, darned if I didn't come across an analysis, by Sharp-Schurtz Company of Lancaster, Ohio, of the composition of Heisey glass! For you inorganic chemistry folk:

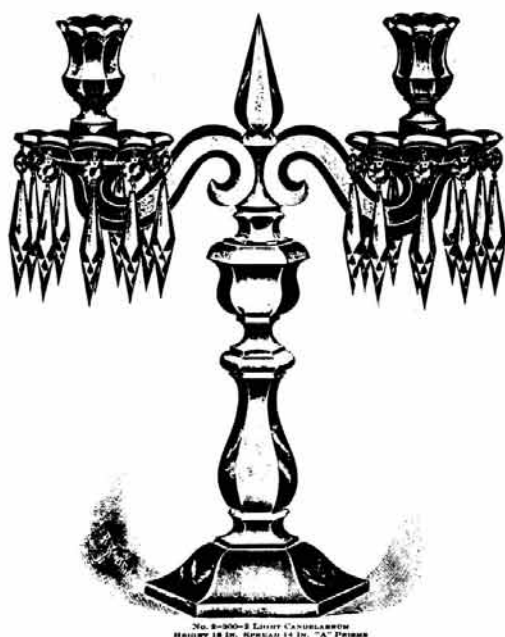

The Heisey-Westmoreland Connection

Over the years, as you know, my main interest has been collecting, researching, and writing about Heisey. It hasn't been possible, however, to do this without a growing appreciation for other American glass manufacturers. Thus when I had an opportunity to add some Westmoreland catalog reproductions to my library, I was happy to do so. I certainly did not expect to find the solution to a Heisey controversy in the process. Imagine my surprise, then, when I opened the 1924 Westmoreland Specialty Company catalog and found myself looking at Heisey's #300 two-light candelabra. Even the pattern number matched!

As you know, this candelabra was originally introduced back in 1901 as part of Heisey's very popular Peerless pattern. It had a base copied from the #2-300 candlestick, released earlier that same year. The candlestick was to become one of Heisey's most successful, remaining in production from 1901 to 1957, with continued manufacture by Imperial until 1982. The two-light candelabra remained in production for about half that period, from 1901 to 1944. Most of us know it today as part of the Old Williamsburg line.

It was surprise enough to find this candelabra in a Westmoreland catalog. What was even more exciting was to discover that the listing was not in Crystal but in Amber! Some years ago, a pair of these candelabra was exhibited at the June Convention, igniting somewhat of a controversy. In doing research for the candlestick book, we found no evidence that Heisey had ever made this candelabra in any colors other than Crystal and Sahara. Since Amber was only an occasional production color, with most pieces made for special customers particularly the Harvey House restaurants, some of us (including myself) were skeptical about the candelabra.

This skepticism was fed by the knowledge that some pieces from the #300 pattern are found with a very high quality amber stain. We have an Amber hurricane lamp, for instance, which shows evidence of being stained when illuminated from behind by a 500-watt light. It is only when lit by such an unusually bright light that we can see slight variations of color, proving that a stain has been applied to the surface of the glass, rather than the color being solid. Based on advertising in one of the trade journals, we believe this decoration to have been done by the Smith Ceramic Studios in Rochester, New York.

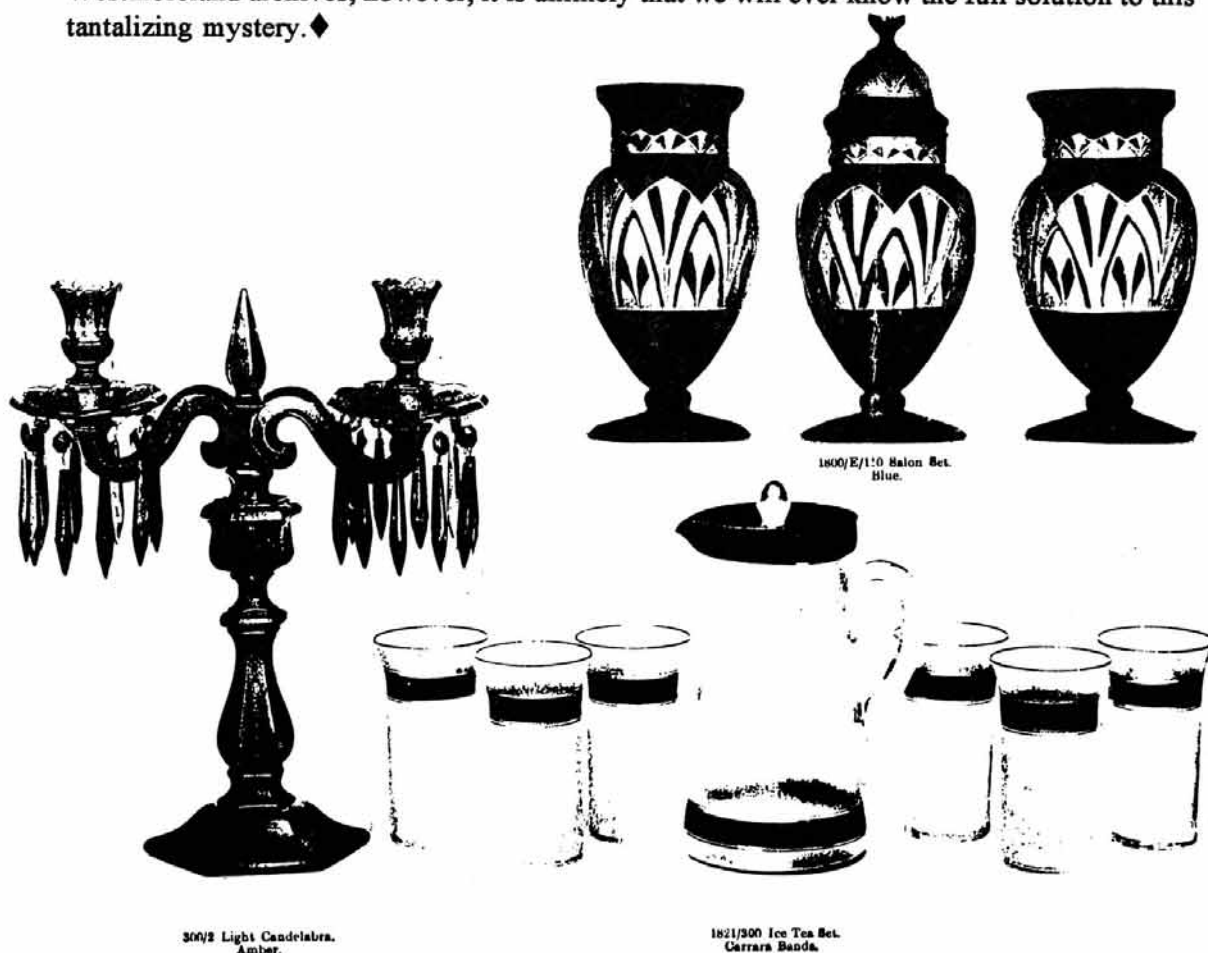
Over the years, I believe we've seen one other pair of the Amber two-light candelabra. On one occasion, there was a chip on one candleholder. The owner offered this as evidence that the color was, in fact, uniform. I regret to say that I remained unconvinced. Based on 1924 Westmoreland catalog, however, I now publicly retract this stand. Although the Westmoreland catalog also offered various "lustre colors" (or stains), they are quite specific whenever identifying an item in their catalog in one of these applied colors. So while it is not entirely impossible that the candelabra were Crystal, with a stain applied by Westmoreland, I now believe that the ones I've seen were most likely solid Amber. However, they were Westmoreland's Amber, not Heisey's.

How did Westmoreland come to be offering a Heisey piece in their catalog? I'm not sure we'll ever know. I contacted Ruth Grizel, editor of *The Original Westmoreland Glass Collector's Newsletter*. She in turn spoke with John Schnupp, Westmoreland's Production Manager from 1945 to 1984. The best supposition that any of us can come up with is that Westmoreland must have leased the Heisey mold in 1924. Since the company had never offered a large candelabra before, it's possible this was a way to experiment with the market before going to the expense of having a new mold produced. Ms. Grizel tells me that this is the only year she can find this candelabra listed by Westmoreland, explaining why they are so rare today.

The original catalog from which this reprint is taken was hand-tinted in color. According to it, the candelabra was sold with Amber prisms. (It was, of course, not cost effective for most American companies to make their own prisms. They were probably imported from Bohemia, just like the colored prisms that Heisey began to offer toward the end of 1926.) The base of this candelabra, as may be more apparent from the picture in the Heisey catalog, is hollow. Unlike many pieces made by Heisey, this one is not generally marked with the famous Diamond H.

As you can see, the other pieces on the Westmoreland catalog page accompanying the two-light candelabra, the #1800/E/110 salon set and the #1821/300 ice tea set, are definitely not Heisey. However, having found the candelabra, I began to wonder if any other items in the catalog might not also be from Heisey molds. I asked Ruth Grizel's help again, and she pointed out two sugar and cream sets that are similar. However, while I found comparable pieces in the Heisey catalogs, they weren't exact duplicates. It is well known that glass companies copied one another's successful lines and Heisey and Westmoreland were no exception. Who copied who is often problematic.

That there was some kind of Heisey-Westmoreland connection, at least for a brief period in 1924, seems unavoidable. Barring correspondence turning up in either the Heisey or Westmoreland archives, however, it is unlikely that we will ever know the full solution to this tantalizing mystery. ♦

When pressed as to why, there is generally a mumbling of "too far," "no time" and an underlying confusion and intimidation about going to a "Convention." The word convention conjures up visions of hundreds of people in funny hats sitting for hours listening to dry speeches and enduring meals of rubber chicken. Newark in June is the exact opposite. What follows are some impressions and sketches of what I consider to be the yearly "Heisey Happening" in Newark, Ohio. A Heisey Woodstock if you wish—to take the mystery out of it and raise the curtain on the enjoyment and fun that is HCA in June.

The area—Central Ohio in June has wonderful great weather. Newark and Granville are safe, quiet, restful, picturesque and easy to travel in between. All events and sights to see are within fifteen minutes of each other so there is never a rush from place to place. The area motels are all adequate and reasonably priced and listed in the *Heisey News*. Keep in mind you won't be spending much time at your hotel anyway.

Food is not a problem. All the national chains are in the area with fine restaurants in Granville and on the square in Newark. You'll soon find a favorite and seek it out on a yearly basis. All at reasonable prices! I always enjoy driving past and around the old Heisey Factory buildings and then back toward Granville past the Heisey mansion (both now privately owned).

There are plenty of antique shops in the area and they all have Heisey for "that week" in June. Don't be intimidated by all the Heisey experts in the area that week. Like any other show or flea market, it all depends on being in the right place at the right time. And bargains and finds seem to jump up at you from the vendors tables. Be observant and diligent and you will be rewarded!

The folks at HCA work all year to plan and produce a fine week of fun, education and serious work. They do a wonderful job. Their dedication and timeless efforts deserve participation you'll never regret it. The formal schedule of events will be in the *Heisey News*.

The National Heisey Glass Museum is best described as Heisey heaven. Marvelous displays, sparkling glass in well-lit cases. Knowledgeable and dedicated staff, amiable atmosphere, this is the place of wonder for the serious Heisey afficianado—the rarest of the rare, an accurate reflection of the genius that was Heisey. Not to be missed.

The HCA Glass Show at Adena Hall at Ohio State University (ten minutes from anywhere)—Fifty dealers form across the country with some of the nicest pieces you've ever seen. So much great Heisey all in one place and all for sale! This is where you can purchase the piece you just saw at the museum! Again you can find a bargain if you're diligent. Go through three times at least, in different directions. You'll see different items each time.



The Glass Display—Table settings of various patterns and colors of Heisey; each different; each unique; each set as though it awaits the celebration of a great occasion. A must see conveniently located adjacent to the Glass Show.

The Silent Auction & Swap—This event is always crowded, busy and loads of fun. Probably my favorite event. Items are placed on a counter with a long bid sheet and buyers are

assigned numbers. A time is set, sometimes three minutes sometimes fifteen minutes, you never know. If you want an item you write your bid on the bid sheet. When the alarm goes off, he who has the last written bid wins! Certain rules prevail, but what fun! Especially if you just have to have that "special piece."

The Apple Tree Auction—During convention week, Apple Tree Auction Center always has a Heisey Auction. Items are sold in sequence so that you can plan your attendance. Everything from the common to the very rare is possible. They even have TV monitors above the audience so that those in the rear can have a perfect view of the item up for bid. A real class act. Everything very well done. Computerized and easy to cash out and leave with your purchase.



Flea Market on the Square—The fun of this is rolling out of bed between 3 and 5 a.m., fumbling for your flashlight and wallet and heading for the main square in downtown Newark. All around the county court house are folks who have set up to sell Heisey. Some pros mostly not. Out of trucks, vans, trailer and boxes, spills glass of all kinds. And a constant flow of the faithful circulates the square, stopping at each vendor and passing a flashlight across the table to see if a "goodie" was put out since the last turn around. I've always thought that this would be a good place for the first-timer to sell some unwanted items to help finance the trip. Coffee, doughnuts and restrooms are available. Great fun! Don't miss it!

The Granville Antique Show—A seventy-five dealer, mostly-glass-mostly-Heisey show held at Granville High School, ten minutes away in sleepy Granville, home of Denison University. This event is sponsored by the the local Athletic Boosters and starts the day before the HCA show. Heisey in the hall ways, Heisey in the classrooms, the gym, the library, cafeteria, even outside in the parking lot. At dawn! Free entry! Great food in the cafeteria. Don't miss it. It's always fun to run between dealers, between shows to compare price and condition of that special piece.

And Now—a mention of the business end of things: the annual meeting, committe meetings, election of directors and the banquet. I know business is boring, but this is the engine that drives HCA. This is the group that works for our glass, our collections, our education and our future. Get involved, it can't hurt and you'll be contributing to the future of HCA, the museum and our passion for glass.

In closing let me say that some of the nicest folks I've ever met I see in Newark every June. Call it a convention, even a pilgrimage, but its one heck of a lot of fun. If you've never been to the convention I guarantee you'll learn a lot about Heisey, have the time of your life and come home with one or two bargains and the certain feeling you'll return next year.

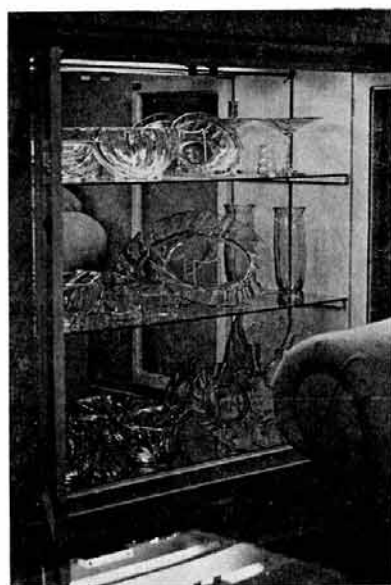

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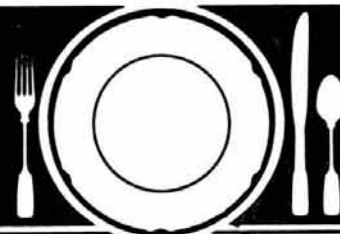
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
