

Focus on the Collection—Colonial Pieces in Color

Browsing through shops, glass shows and flea markets you have no doubt seen many of Heisey's colonial-style pieces with applied colors. Many decorating companies purchased Heisey blanks and embellished them in a variety of ways. There are #465 Recessed Panel and #1183 Revere candy jars with outside surfaces that rival the candy in colorful


presentation. The flat panel lines—#352, #353, #354—were also favorites for stains, iridescence and enamels. To view some of these examples in the museum, look in Gallery 2 in the decorated Heisey



Heisey also made some colorful examples of colonial-style wares. There aren't many to behold because these patterns were popular in the early 1900s and 1910s and had been phased out by the time Heisey introduced Moongleam and Flamingo in 1925. Some individual pieces, however, survived the stylistic changes of the 1920s and 1930s.

The colonial display in Room 3 of the King House features several examples of early Moongleam and Flamingo. The #325 Pillows rose bowl in Rose is believed to be a sample

from Heisey's earliest attempt at creating what was later called Flamingo. There are also examples of several straightforward colonial patterns like #300-½ Peerless, #353 Medium Flat Panel and #150 Banded Flute. At the top of the display is an array of colored nappies—including Marigold and Vaseline—in the #350 Pinwheel and Fan pattern, one of Heisey's













imitation cut designs that is usually lumped in with the colonial era. In the same room, look at the Little Things cabinet for a selection of #393 Narrow Flute and #473 Narrow Flute with Rim items in Moongleam, Flamingo, Hawthorne and Sahara.

Colonial-style patterns also mingle with the color selections in Gallery 2. Here you will need to look harder because the simplistic panels and flutes are easily eclipsed by the more decorative patterns of the Depression Era #354 Wide Flat Panel hotel sugar and around the corner there's a #433 Greek Key punch cup, also in Flamingo. The Moongleam section hosts a #465 Recessed Panel half-pound candy jar. Other loners are: a #300 vase in Marigold; a #300 footed tumbler and #373 Old Williamsburg goblet in Alexandrite; a #354 Wide Flat Panel cream and sugar in Sahara; a Moongleam #352 Flat Panel lavender jar with silver overlay in the decorated section.

Fred Harvey apparently took a liking to the understated elegance of Heisey's colonial lines. In the Amber section in Gallery 2 you'll find a #352 Flat Panel jug, a #341 Puritan water bottle, a #354 Wide Flat Panel soda and a vase made from a #354 soda.

Some patterns were offered with a greater color selection than others. #393 Narrow Flute has a more even representation in Gallery 2. Look for items like the creams and sugars in

Flamingo, Marigold and Sahara. The #393 Domino sugar holder appears in the Flamingo and Sahara sections and there's a bitters bottle in Cobalt. The #299 toddy shows up with the Moogleam. Flamingo and Sahara. Cobalt and Tangerine each boast a #351


Priscilla pilsner. The #352 Flat Panel tobacco jar appears in Zircon and Moongleam.

Downstairs in Gallery 1 there are some colonial surprises in the experimental section. Standing as a testament to the endurance of

and #353 Medium Flat Panel molds were used to test the single pot of black glass made by Heisey in its later years. In the light blue experimental hue, #393

Narrow Flute makes an appearance.


A good source for additional color possibilities in the colonial lines is Neila Bredehoft's Collectors Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass, 1925-1938.◆





Left: #465 Recessed Panel candy jar and #299 toddy.


Right: #351 Priscilla pilsner.





The Trumpet Vase—Chapter Two

Never let it be said that I don't keep my word. It may not be kept when promised but, eventually, I act with honor.

In the November 1995 issue of the *Heisey News* I wrote about my trials with an 18-inch high, #353, Wide Panel trumpet vase and I said I'd have more on the subject next time around. Well, next time came and went without more on the subject as promised. It was more appropriate that I say "Happy Birthday!" to HCA on the occasion of its 25th birthday when the next time came. Well, though it seldom does, *next time* has come 'round again to pull my chestnuts out of the fire.

You may recall that I bought a magnificent Heisey trumpet vase unaware that a glass marble was wedged inside the vase just above the tapered end at the bottom. This threatened to be a permanent condition. I could not dislodge it. I did everything I could think of plus a few methods suggested by others that lead me to wonder why supposedly bright people ever thought of them.

There was the Heat the Vase trick, there was the Vacuum that Sucker Out solution, there was the Grease the Marble routine, there was the Hit the Damn Vase With a Hammer desperation ploy, plus a few other suggestions not fit to be aired in a family newsletter. I ended my tale of woe with a request to HCA members that they mail or fax to my attention any recommendations on dislodging the @#\$%&* marble. No one

should be surprised that I received suggestions from concerned HCA members—that's just the way most HCA people are. I also got a few weird recommendations because that's the way some other HCA folks are.

One of the "far out" suggestions was to cut the vase off just above the marble and pry the thing out then glue the vase back together. This was not as ridiculous as it sounds because it would surely work. The suggestion that was as ridiculous as it sounded was the one advising that the Heimlich maneuver be performed on the vase. I suppose I would have tried it had I any idea where the breast bone of a trumpet vase is located.

The first fax I received had unkind things to say about my efforts to heat the vase and shrink it to get the marble out. If the strength of his words is any indication, I'd say he felt very strongly about it. He suggested, instead, that I fill the vase with ice because *ice* will shrink the glass while, "HEAT EXPANDS IT, Dummy!" I liked the ice idea because it always seemed to me that a trumpet vase would make an ideal Martini pitcher. The ice would not then be wasted on just chilling an empty vase and I would be saved from being confined to an eternity in hell for committing a mortal sin.

The same gentleman suggested that, if all else fails, "leave the thing on the porch on Saint David's Day (an old Welsh custom known as: *The Flaunting of the Find*) which is March 4." The religious connotation of "Saint David's Day" makes me wonder if it would work for those of us not likely to enter Heaven's gates.

Two people recommended fingernail polish remover. Two gives this method a ring of feasibility. One person said simply to swish, let stand, then rinse. The other warned, that if fingernail polish remover is used near an open flame our house would end up in Dayton, me in Akron, the marble in Toledo, and the vase in all of the above. Lacking immediate travel plans, I intend to heed the warning.

Another suggestion was the use of Adolph's Meat Tenderizer, a precooking product used to, well, tenderize meat I suppose. The reasoning behind this is that what is holding the marble in place must be vegetable matter and would, consequently, be dissolved by the tenderizer. This may be wishful thinking if the weeds in my garden are any indication. No amount of pulling dislodges them and, though I wouldn't eat any, I consider them vegetable matter. Perhaps it might be worth sprinkling our weeds with a meat tenderizer. If it works, remember you read it here first.

Someone felt that a length of piano wire poked around the marble would loosen it. This seems a sensible idea. As I contemplated the economic reality of purchasing a piano to get the needed wire, I received a telephone call from the southern end of the country.

"Are you Scandinavian?" the caller wanted to know.

"How close is Scandinavia to Sicily," I asked, eager to comply.

"You don't qualify," he said and I felt the pangs of rejection.

The rest of our conversation had best be paraphrased. This gentleman said that only "liquid waste" (not his words) from a Scandinavian could loosen the marble. He swore this was not an old wives tale as he has been called upon many times to perform this service (details of the circumstances were conspicuously absent). He magnanimously offered to contribute in the event I could not find a suitable Scandinavian in New Jersey. The impression given was that he looked upon this as a high calling, just as one would when donating blood or bon marrow. I advised him that he might be a last resort and promised to let him know if I ever became that desperate (though not before checking postal regulations sending bodily substances through the mail).

Given my reputation for procrastination, I hesitate to admit that I have yet to try any of the more sensible recommendations submitted to date (for the first time ever, we are out of gin at our house or testing would already have been well underway). I promise once more I will report on the results "next time"—if only to advise which method, if any, has worked. If none works I'll wait until March 4th, Saint David's Day, so it may be awhile before this subject finds closure.

From The Archives—Records Update

After taking off for a week and a half the current archiving task was hard to get back to. I am still at the job of cataloging employees' pay records. For the most part there has been little of interest, or at least in the way of recording what is in a particular box of records. Oh yes, job titles are often intriguing and sometimes have left me guessing, PRESS SLOAR, for



example. But listing names, jobs, and dates of employment aren't the greatest way to spend a beautiful fall day. However, today I ran into something in which you might have some interest. In the 1956 pay records were several summary sheets—Weekly Report of Number of Males and Number of Females, Total Weekly Man (sic) Hours, Average Number of Workers for the Year, Summary of Payroll Control per Quarter, Gross Earning per Department by Quarters, etc.

At least for the present I'll have to leave such tasks as the comparison of the pay of women to the pay of men to others for whom research is their particular task. That and other questions about life in the Heisey plant will have to wait. There have been many times that I would have liked to have gone off on an unrestrained tangent but that isn't within my job description. But I digress.

Some time ago I had been asked about employment in the plant and I came across the approximate number of 400. It would be nice to uncover that kind of data - I would like to find the summaries for other periods in the life of the plant as a means of comparison, but for 1956, the average number of workers for the year was only 147! In 1957, the closing year, the average number of workers for the year was down to 122. Clearly, the decline had set in. There were, roughly, two male employees for every female. Personally I find this a startlingly high number of women factory workers for that day and considering the type of work involved.

With gross earnings (after deductions for union dues, taxes, Blue Cross, etc) of \$447,732.75, I calculate the average take home pay at \$3,045.80.

Also present in the payroll records were quarterly summaries of payroll for each of the departments; Press, Packing and Stockroom, Mixing room, Shipping, Furnace, Lehr Men, Blown Finish, Press Sloar (there's that word again), Press Grinding, Cutting and Engraving, Etching, Mould Shop, Mould Cleaning, Blown Department and Yard Labor. Some day perhaps someone will do an analysis of all of this material. For the present, it's there.◆

A.H. Heisey & Company—A Chronology, Part IX

Tom Felt

1950

- ◆January. The #5078 Park Avenue stemware line was advertised as new.
- ♦A new plate etching, #516 Plantation Ivy, was introduced at the same time, for use on pieces in the Plantation pattern.
- ◆February. A group of seventy-nine glass workers were honored at the annual dinner for members of the Quarter Century Club and the



Diamond H Club for service ranging from twenty-five to fifty years. T. Clarence Heisey was one of four who had from forty to forty-nine years' service, and there were seven employees who had been with the firm for more than fifty years.¹

Five new cuttings were introduced this month, matching prominent dinnerware patterns:

- ♦ April 21. The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York opened an exhibit of outstanding American and European glassware made since 1900. Four hundred pieces from the United States, France, Sweden, Holland, England, Austria, Belgium, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Finland and Germany were shown. Heisey's display of about a dozen pieces included the Lariat three-light candlesticks, the horse head bookends, the tropical fish (frosted), some examples of stemware and various contemporary serving pieces.
- ◆June. Heisey animals were prominently featured in the advertising for the movie of The



starring Jane Wyman, Gertrude Lawrence and Kirk Douglas.

♦June 26. The #518 Pan American Lei plate etching was introduced in conjunction with a new Vernon Kilns dinnerware pattern of the same name. The premiere showing was in Honolulu, with an "American premiere" on July 10th in New York. The promotion was sponsored by Pan American Air Lines, and in addition to the china and glassware, new patterns in Dirilyte flatware, linens and "kindred pieces" were also introduced, with Pan American Air Lines flying fresh leis to both "premieres" and, later, to other shows and store promotions around the country.



- ◆Catalog 31 was issued this month.
- ◆September. The #1033 Patio³ cutting was shown in *The Jewelers' Circular-Keystone* on the #5079 Pan American stemware line.
- ♦October. Three more cuttings were shown, #1030 Bandoleer, #1031 Greenbriar and #1032 Heirloom, all on the #6060 Country Club line.
- November. The American Flint, a union publication, mentioned a recent three-week strike over wages. The same report expressed admiration for T. Clarence Heisey, "who at all times is all business and trying to keep us well satisfied and surrounded by good working conditions."
- ♦New patterns for 1950 included #1624 Patio.
- ♦Other new stemware lines included: #5074 Sea Horse, #5077 Legionnaire, #5082 Mid-Century and #5083 El Rancho.
- ♦One other cutting was introduced: #1024 Hawthorne.

1951

◆January. #1951 Cabochon was advertised as new. 5 #6091 Cabochon stemware also came out at this time.





³When used on #5083 El Rancho stemware, this cutting was known as Corral, and was cut by machine rather than by hand.

⁴Designed by Horace King.

⁵A patent was filed for this pattern on May 9, 1951 and was approved February 10, 1953.

- ♦New cuttings announced this month included #1046 Pussy Willow, #1047 Autumn Rushes and #1048 Crocus.
- ♦February. #1425 Victorian, which had been discontinued during the War, was reissued.
- ◆September. The #1040 Iris, 7 #1050 Skyline and #1060 Starlight cuttings were introduced at the Merchandise Mart Gift Show.
- ◆Backed by the American Flint Glass Workers' Union, a merchandising campaign was inaugurated by Glass Crafts of America to foster sales of American glassware and resist

competition from inexpensive imports. This organization was made up of most of the surviving American firms. In addition to Heisey, other members of the GCA were Blenko, Cambridge, Dunbar, Duncan & Miller, Erickson, Fenton, Fostoria, Imperial, Indiana, Morgantown, Seneca, Viking and West Virginia Glass Specialty Company.

♦October. The American Flint reported that a strike had been just averted, following a long drawn out wage conference. Two days were lost due to the furnace having been let out in anticipation of a strike.



◆December. Nine new cuttings were advertised: #1061 Primrose, #1062 Bridal Lace, #1063 Wood Violet, #1064 Provincial Wreath, #1065 Baroness, #1066 Debutante, #1067 Yorktown, #1068 Victoria and #1069 Lily Vale. (All of these cuttings, except Debutante and Lilly Vale, were discontinued by July 1952.)

- ◆Additional stemware lines in 1951 included #5063 Bantam Rooster, #5065 Colt and .#5086 Plantation Ivy*.
- ♦The last of the animals, the #1 flying mare, was introduced in 1951, only remaining in production for about a year.
- ♦The #1038 Pine cutting was introduced to match the Lenox China pattern.


- ◆January. Sultana (amber) was displayed at the Pittsburgh show, initially on #6091 Cabochon tumblers and #5077 Legionnaire stemware. Although eventually other pieces were also offered, this color only remained in the catalog briefly.⁸
- ♦#1405 Ipswich was also reissued at this same show.
- ◆September. Five more cuttings were advertised as "rock crystal cuttings": #1071 Baroque9,

#1072 Southwind, #1073 Serenade, #1074 Inspiration and #1075 Radiant.

- ◆September 13. Heisey's last design patent was filed for a triangular footed bowl, pattern number unknown. It was approved April 14, 1953, but is not known to have gone into production.
- ♦October. Harold Dunham was named advertising and sales promotion manager of the newly created Market Research Department. Since joining the company in November 1945, he had been sales representative for the southeastern territory (comprising Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Tennessee).
- ♦October 15. American Home magazine sponsored a luncheon in New York featuring Reed & Barton's new "Silver Wheat" pattern in sterling. Four table settings were shown combining this silverware with Franciscan, Haviland and Lenox china. One of the

tables included Heisey stemware; the others had Tiffin, Imperial and Cambridge stemware.
November. It was announced that Rodney C. Irwin had resigned as sales manager, aftertwenty-eight years with the company, twenty years of which were spent filling the latter position.

◆December. A few weeks before Christmas, Heisey opened a retail store at the plant, at the north end of the factory on Oakwood Avenue. According to the American Flint, "It is not only a good spot for the public in selecting their Christmas presents but also gave the workers a chance to see a lot of their finished ware on display, and to see

the fine quality after it is finished and ready for the buyers."

- ◆December 16. A chartered bus took a group of twenty-six employees and their spouses to see Sally Flowers on her TV show in Columbus. Ethel Burrell of the mold cleaning department presented the hostess of the show with a glass hat with the Diamond H trademark cut on it. Anna Sprice, of the etching department, gave her a Heisey Rose etched torte plate, and Tom Abbot presented her with a cream pitcher and sugar bowl. ◆#4004 Impromptu was reissued in December. 10
- ♦A commemorative plate was made for the sesquicentennial of Newark this year.
- ♦The #1952 elephant handled mug (or Dumbo mug, as it is generally referred to today) was designed by Jane Wilson Scott. This was not a production item, having been created as a campaign souvenir for a Republican dinner in Newark.
- ♦New stemware patterns included #5089 Princess, #5092 Empress Lily* and #5098 Louisa*.
- ♦Other new cuttings this year included: #1059 Midwest and #1070 Bel Air.
- ♦ Around this time, arrangements were made and agreed upon by the stockholders to sell the Heisey company to a private syndicate. However, the deal fell through when T. Clarence Heisey could not agree to some of the conditions of the sale.



If You're Using the Diamond H Logo ...

This is a friendly reminder.

HCA owns the rights to the Diamond H trademark and it is duly registered. To keep this right when the trademark comes up for renewal, the organization needs to control its usage. It is okay (to a certain extent) if the mark appears on non-HCA business cards or letterhead, but such usage must be with written consent by HCA.

To help us keep the trademark, please send a letter requesting permission to use it before you have your items printed. State how you will use it. You will in turn receive a letter giving consent for the specific use you indicated. When the item is printed, it must feature the registered symbol (an "R" within a circle, ®) next to the trademark. After the item is printed, forward a copy to HCA so we can attach it to the letter on file. If you did this a long time ago it would be nice if you sent another letter and example. If you're printing a new or different item, you must write again and state your new purpose.

In case you've ever wondered, HCA owns the Diamond H on two media—paper stationery and glass. And no, we won't allow anyone to use the latter.◆



Happy New Year—Time to Plan Ahead

There's something incongruous about a joint discussion on planning ahead and dying but that's what this is. One seems to negate the other. Though I will admit I originally had trouble with the concept, it does make sense when you think about it. It came into focus for me when I put together what is popularly know as a "living will"—this to advise my doctor to rethink his Hippocratic oath should I lose my Heisey collection to a tornado or hurricane and react as any serious Heisey collector would (this will also explain why my wife forbids guns in our house).

No one plans to die, nor does anyone look forward to it (except, perhaps, those who have an unhealthy desire to peek beyond that light at the other end of the tunnel). It's not a cheerful thought, but death is a fact of life. If you wonder where I'm going with this I'll explain before it becomes depressing. Last month HCA President, Tom Bischoff, mentioned an additional bequest from the estate of the late Miriam Pringle—she named the HCA as beneficiary of her State Teachers' Retirement benefits. This was in addition to a collection of Heisey glass and other assets already willed by her to the museum.

Now, that certainly isn't depressing, is it? Especially since, Miriam let her intentions be known. She and her mother enjoyed collecting and participation in the HCA so much they wanted it to be a permanent part of their memory. Our endowment fund is just a little richer because Miriam did more than talk about it, she took positive action regarding her wishes.

What is depressing is that the Endowment Committee is aware of a few other situations where members who passed away had advised us of similar intentions but neglected to write it out formally. Informing family members is not enough (there's little need to spell out the reasons for that here). The point is, you can stay in control of your wishes even after you've gone beyond the pale.

It must be stressed that a humongous estate is not a prerequisite. Anything from one piece to a whole collection is a plus for our endowment fund. Nor does it have to be a glass donation—any property or asset will serve the same purpose. To date we have been fortunate with stock donations and securities willed to the endowment fund. And cash is always nice as it will grow forever in our well managed fund.

As you know, the purpose of the Endowment Fund is to leave our museum free from the uncertainties of fund raisers and make it self supporting. It will be nice knowing that long after we've all gone to that great flea market in the sky, our museum will exist in perpetuity because of our foresight and, as an added bonus, we will be remembered as well.

Know, too, that you don't have to have already met your maker to become a permanent part of our museum. You may give a donation while you're still around to enjoy its results. Either way, if you don't have a financial advisor or a lawyer to execute your wishes, drop a line to the Endowment Committee for answers to your questions and, if you wish, you'll be advised how to proceed.

I don't own one yet but I've earmarked my Fandango goblet for the museum. No matter that they may already own one by the time I find mine—I'm sure mine will go on display with my name prominently featured because I've taken out a form of insurance—it's a list of certain museums that will remind our curator that there are those already being haunted by unhappy patrons.


Heisey Heritage Society #8 Vincent Sparacio



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
