The staff has been working very hard for HCA. They have been working short-handed, so sometimes there might be a short delay. Thank your staff and volunteers for working so hard and for a job well done.



FROM THE ARCHIVES—T.C. HEISEY ON NUCLEAR SECRETS

DON VALDES

Once in a while I come across something that I have tucked away for future use, hoping that the occasion will arise when it might be more timely. In the midst of the present controversy in respect to Chinese spies, campaign financing, Los Alamos secrets and who should be blamed, the Republicans or the Democrats, I thought this bit of historical perspective might be in order. Frankly, I was surprised at Clarence Heisey's position.

Dear H. L.

Perhaps you have read the Sokolshy editorial that appeared in the Columbus Dispatch last Sunday. I think it is conclusive evidence why we don't get anywhere in our various programs essential to good, sound business and horse sense.

I don't know how you feel about it, but I think this thing of Ike putting the top physicist of the hydrogen bomb project behind the eight-ball, or in other words, keeping all the top, nuclear secrets away from him is the most assinine (sic) and childish procedure that I have ever heard of. What Mr. Oppenheimer doesn't know about matters of these kinds you could put on a pin point. In other words, the horse is out of the stable but somebody told Ike that McCarthy is grabbing the ball away from him and so he had better get busy. Consequently, he is cracking down on said physicists before McCarthy can give him a whirl. Sounds like "My pa can lick your pa". Of course, that is only a darn fool layman's opinion.

Dear Clarence:

...Mr. Eisenhower's action in forbidding Mr. Oppenheimer to carry on as his top consultant in our hydrogen bomb project is all over my head. I just don't know what to make of it. Undoubtedly he did fear McCarthy's attack. On the other hand, McCarthy certainly has got a lot of guts to attack some of the situations in

Washington that need to be cleaned. His way of doing it is not mine. It may be that it's the only way to get action. We'll know more about it in a couple of weeks after the Senate Investigation under Senator Muntz. Many now blind alleys will be lighted I think in that investigation. I'll watch it as I know you will with great interest. What is the prevailing opinion regarding McCarthy in the area of central Ohio? I have understood that he has considerable strength in the southwest and in generally through the Mississippi Valley. I'll be interested to know your thoughts.

In a long letter on April 28 T. Clarence includes the following to Dillingham:

People out here are of different opinions. Some of them are very strong for McCarthy and some think he is a publicity hound. He certainly has guts but we had the same political calisthenics with Roosevelt and Huey Long. I would hate to think he is as bad as either of them. ♦

A NEAR MISS

I had a phone call recently from a glass dealer friend who said he saw an interesting piece of Heisey at a house sale that I might want to look into. Since this was a Sunday evening it wasn't likely that the house sale would be something that I could look into even if I wanted to. "No problem," he said, "I told the lady running the sale that I knew someone who might be interested and she said she would have it at her shop later in the week."


My friend said that the Heisey he saw was the no. 1473 Buttress centerpiece set (always interesting because you seldom find all the pieces together). He told me the asking price and I immediately made plans not to go look at it. I remarked that even with five pieces the set was overpriced. That's when he dropped his bombshell—there were not five pieces, there were nine!

Helen wondered why my eyebrows disappeared into my hairline.

"Nine pieces?" I said trying to sound calm.

"Sure," he said, "the five Buttress bowls and four matching candlesticks."

Four matching candlesticks?! I couldn't sleep that night and I began the countdown to the "later in the week" that could never come soon enough. I wished I had asked how tall the candlesticks were.



Now comes the educational part of this piece. Buttress was made from 1935 to 1938. The pieces were designed to be used together or separately when dressing a table. Sort of mix and match. OK, that's all the education you're going to get today. For the life of me, though, the pieces really don't seem tall enough to hold the flowers they were meant to display. The Buttress name is rather a stretch, too. Heisey named it but I have no idea what they had in mind. I thought, perhaps, the pattern alluded to the bustle dresses women wore earlier in the century but I guess that's also a stretch.

I poured through my books and nowhere could I find a reference to Buttress candlesticks. "Aha," I thought, "A new discovery! Perhaps they'll name it after me." After mulling it over I decided I didn't like the name "Carl's Buttress." It sounds like an anatomical reference. I would decline the honor.

I reasoned that the four candlesticks would make the unreasonable asking price reasonable and began to think up arguments to convince Helen it would be very wise to spend that much money on a rarity.

When the day finally arrived I walked as nonchalantly as I could into this really lovely antiques shop. I scouted around quickly but, failing to see four candlesticks sticking up in one place, I admitted to the proprietor why I was there. She had been expecting me and pointed to an antique table in the center of the room that held the Buttress set. Instantly I knew why I didn't spot the candlesticks—each was just 2" high and they were set into the right angled sections of the Buttress corner pieces. The corners were, in turn, placed around a large, lovely soup tureen that served as the Buttress centerpiece (the square Buttress center bowl was placed forlornly to the side.)

My heart skipped a beat—the candlesticks did indeed match the Buttress pieces. I picked one up to examine it closely but, aw shucks, I couldn't spot a Diamond H. Upon further scrutiny it was obvious that the little candlesticks did not show the expected Heisey quality. It was just as well, if the glass matched Heisey's I'd wonder forever if they might not have been right. Worse, I probably would have spent a lot of money on the chance they just could be what I wanted them to be.



I thanked the shop owner and told her I couldn't be sure and I wanted to do more research. She asked how long she should hold them for me and I advised her that if I weren't back this same day she'd know I hadn't found the candleholders to be Heisey.

I returned home and poured over the same books I had poured over before but couldn't find what I was looking for this time either. That pretty much was the end of it until I had the idea that the folks who read the *Heisey News* might be interested in seeing these pretty Heisey wannabes. A few days later I went back to the shop with my camera and asked permission to take pictures of the Buttress pieces.

The photos included here will show the candlesticks as displayed with the Buttress. The gracious antiques shop lady (I'm embarrassed I didn't get her name to include here) moved the tureen out of the way and let me set up the Buttress pieces as Heisey people know they should be arranged. Here, too, is a picture of one of the candleholders. I also found the candle pieces to have one less ridge down its length than the Buttress pieces.

Pictures taken, I thanked my hostess and turned to leave. I hadn't even reached the door when the soup tureen was put in its rightful place in the center of the Buttress corner sections. No matter, it is a pretty set and will eventually make someone happy.

I hope they like soup. ♦


ID Session — Thursday, 8:00 am

and this year, for the first time it was held in Gaithersburg, Maryland, another suburb of Washington, DC but not nearly so nearby.





An all glass show is a wonder to behold but an all Heisey glass show really dazzles. I had hoped to dazzle readers of the *Heisey News* too, and I would have had I realized that all the wonderful pictures I took of colored glass would be printed in black and white. Use this guide: if it's dark, it's Cobalt; if it's medium it's Tangerine; if it sparkles, it's crystal, and if it's Limelight it's practically non-existent. I haven't put names to the people in the pictures because I didn't want to embarrass myself because I'm so lousy with names.



Of all the Heisey events one can attend, none will have the quantity of unusual and rare pieces that this show usually boasts. I was blown away by a Diamond Band covered butter in crystal that was sold out from under me before I could take its picture. Then there was the newly discovered Heisey pattern, Greek Key Twist (see photo—or as they say on eBay: PIC). This pattern debuted in a Greek Key straw jar on a Twist body. I hope my photo does it justice. And, if you believe it really is a Heisey pattern—you and I have to talk. We took a picture, too, of what is known as a blood pudding dish, a signed Heisey bakeware piece which came complete with a high price tag and ghastly instructions on the

bloody part of making blood pudding. There were two scarce 8" Athena covered candy jars on the floor and then a never before seen 10½" jar showed up. There were many other exceptional pieces but, since I don't know if space restrictions will limit the pictures the editor can use, I'll let their captions speak for them.


