

On April 12, 1999, the National Heisey Glass Museum gained a new employee. My name is Gwynne Rukenbrod (yes that is German-it actually means rye bread or back bread in German), and I am serving you all as the new assistant curator. I am originally from Cleveland, Ohio. I attended Gettysburg College before transferring to Ohio State University in 1991. I graduated from Ohio State in 1994 with a degree in health education and community wellness. I have worked in the HIV/AIDS service field for the past five years, running a state education program for the American Red Cross and my own non-profit organization, Camp Sunrise (a camp for children impacted by HIV/AIDS). # HEISEY ROSE...POINT?

My wife says it's dumb things that tickle my fancy, and she 's right (though I didn't come back with the obvious comeback and tell her that **she** tickled my fancy—I may not be bright, but I'm not suicidal). We were doing a show awhile back when a young man we've known through Heisey collecting stopped by our booth to say hello. I appreciated that. Lots of Heisey folks just walk by our booth and make believe they don't see me. This fellow, Ed Sawicki, was with his dad, Ed, Sr., and mom, Mrs. Ed, Sr. They are Heisey people.

Junior (who's quite a big fellow—even for the adult that he is) said, "I brought something I want you to see, Mr. Sparacio." I turned to look behind me to see whom he might be addressing. A kick in the shin from Mrs. S. (my Mrs. S., not theirs) got me back on track. He unwrapped two pieces of Heisey—a colonial cream and sugar ("yawn," I

thought to myself).



"They're etched," he said.

"Be still my heart," my mind murmured in the ongoing silent conversation I was having with myself.

"It's Rose Point," he noted, "on signed Heisey glass."

OK, so now he had my attention. I looked expecting to see a poor replica of Cambridge's famous Rose Point etching scratched onto the Heisey cream and sugar. Well, as you know (because you've already peeked at the accompanying photo,) this was not the case. Not only was it Rose Point, but it was gold encrusted Rose Point—something often found in Rose Point. Gold encrusted is a condition that seems to excite Cambridge collectors.

I didn't measure the pieces because my mind was racing, trying to figure out how best to separate this guy from his treasure without being beat up by his father who is bigger than me, but my guess is that the cream and sugar are about 4" high. The first thing I looked at was the Diamond H. I thought it might be a little askew like those on the Heisey repros smuggled into the country now and then in bales of heroin. The Diamond Aitches (what's the plural of H?) were finely chiseled and straight—they could have come right out of the Heisey factory. And the Rose Point looked genuine, too. These were not something created by Ed in his garage.

"Where did you get these," I asked Ed accusingly.

"Off eBay, on the Internet," Ed said.

I wondered what kind of nut would offer something like this on the Internet, and Ed told me it was advertised as a "Gold Etched Heisey Cream and Sugar." Obviously the seller wasn't a Cambridge collector or much of any kind of glass collector for that matter. I'm going to say that a photo wasn't included just so I'll feel better about this—I never asked if there was a picture with the ad.

Anyway, Ed bought this unusual set and has allowed me to share it with you. The most fun we had with this was trying to figure out how it came about. We came up with some outlandish scenarios, but the only idea that has any basis in reality is that they were put together at Imperial Glass while they were still operating. They did have the Heisey molds (note that I spell molds without a "u") and they owned the Rose Point plates. No matter how you imagine it, someone at Imperial had to be pretty resourceful and have access to their facilities—you need more than a decal to put a detailed etching on a piece of glass.

Ed left the set with me as he wandered the show so that I could take its picture. There was a large Rose Point platter on our table that I thought of substituting for the cream and sugar, but I didn't because I feared that he would notice his bag had become unwieldy. Don't ask why I covet it. As I said early on—it's the dumb things I find fascinating. It's an unusual piece and should keep Ed happy for a while. When I see something like this, I always wonder if there are more. It seems like an awful lot of work to go through to make just one set. The person who sold it on eBay most likely bought it at a garage sale.

You know it might have been mine had I kept my eye on eBay instead of spending my time examining porno sites on the Internet for the FBI. I'm sorry I agreed to do that undercover work. Hey, it's a lousy job, but somebody has to do it.

In other almost Heisey news, the *New York Times* reported that 92 year old Eva Zeisel is enjoying a revival of her 74 year old career with nearly 60 of her designs in production. You may recall that Mrs. Zeisel did some designs for Heisey in the late years and was guest speaker at a recent Heisey convention.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art has reissued her Town & Country dinner set done in pottery for sale in its museum store. Also, on April 16<sup>th</sup> a place called the "O Group" opened a showroom of her work in Greenwich Village in Manhattan. My impression is that these works are for sale and they include, "vintage designs of dinnerware and glassware." There was no mention of Heisey designs in the short article, and it would be interesting to find out if any of those are available.

The last time I drove in Greenwich Village, I wound through the streets for hours with hundreds of other cars looking for a parking space. I've come to the conclusion that the cars that are parked in the village are permanent fixtures firmly cemented in place.

That's it for now—I'm off to search for a Heisey colonial goblet etched with gold encrusted Orchid on Crown Tuscan. ◆

# FROM THE ARCHIVES—PATENT ZINGERS!

### DON VALDES

I wish I had a copy of the letter which apparently went out of the Heisey Company office on January 31, 1913. It must have been a zinger!

I have just opened a folder labeled, "Colonials - Pat. Infring," containing letters from eighteen glass companies responding to a letter from A. H. Heisey & Co. written on January 31, 1913. Also in the folder is an envelope containing pictures cut from a catalog. The envelope is labeled, "Items claimed by Cassel to be copied by the Cambridge Glass Co." I am not sure of the contents of the letter nor the author, though the evidence



indicates it was E. Wilson. At least it seems to have been sent "on his watch." A. H. was in Atlantic City when, on February 6, Clarence wrote the following to him:



Dear Father:-

Mr. Norpell (note: Max Norpell was the Heisey Co. attorney) has just been here. Wilson, George, Mr. Sanford and myself all reviewed the situation. Mr. Norpell is to go over the matter carefully tonight, and give us his idea for procedure. We will get all the data necessary for the claim that he lays out, in fact we will get all the matter necessary at our fingers ends, and then call on the Columbus people.

Mr. Bokee's (note: Bokee was the sales rep from Baltimore) samples arrived this morning, consisting of 4 Oz. Footed Sherbet, 5 In. Nappy, 8 In. Nappy, Jug, Footed Jelly, 4 1/2 In. Plate, like our #1150, and a medium squat marmalade jar like our #341. This was not on Mr. Cassel's (a Pennsylvania Heisey sales rep) list, so I suppose there are quite a few items they are manufacturing similar to our #341 Line.

Things are moving along nicely as usual. Weather is very cold,



Yours, (signed) Clarence

The contents of the responses from these glass companies are startling, ranging from indignation to cooperation. Aptly, The Co-operative Glass provided the most conciliatory

response. But there is also something of a mystery involved, "We wrote you last December when the matter was first brought to our attention as to how we came into possession of molds for certain Glassware which you claimed were an infringement on your design. (Emphasis mine) Included was a letter from C. A. Snow, patent attorneys writing to Co-operative Glass Co on Jan. 29, 1913:

We have made a careful investigation of the subject of the alleged infringement of the design patent of A.J. Sanford, No. 40686, granted May 10, 1910, for Glass Vessel, and assigned to A.H. Heisey & Co., Inc., of Newark, Ohio, by the manufacture and sale by you of certain glass vessels of a type illustrated by the sugar bowl, of which we have received a specimen, and





which is also shown in the illustrative or advertising cuts submitted, and we find that there are prior patents and other publications showing all of the obvious salient of distinctive features of the patented design, and we have reached the conclusion that if the said patent is valid, it rests upon a very narrow foundation and is not infringed by your product.

Fostoria's reply was brief and threatening:


We have information to the effect that you are duplicating some of our moulds, and we will make no exception in your case, but shall do as we advertised we would do. This is fair warning.

David Fisher of New Martinsville Glass was irate:

...I am surprised that you would have the NERVE to write us after the contemptible way you treated us on the Molasses Jug deal one year ago.

Various forms of dirty linen accompanied some of the indignation and denial. Canton Glass's long letter included the statement:

We are told by some of our agents...that you have copied some of our ideas, which you no doubt have a right to do from a legal standpoint, but not from a moral one. It seems



that you gained entrance to our factory at one time, which we called your attention to by letter, and which you denied, and afterwards you wrote to a number of parties that were working for us offering inducements to work for you...


Halfway through the Fenton letter something of an explanation surfaces:

We certainly think you are right in your contention and we think it would be a fine thing if the manufacturers could come to some agreement whereby they would all make their own designs themselves and there would then be no more trouble of this kind.



And Mr. Blumenauer of the Jefferson Glass Company throws even more light:

We are somewhat puzzled over your letter of the 31st, and have finally concluded that it was a circular letter and probably being address to all glass manufacturers and it is in line with something that we had in mind.



That most of the replies to the Heisey letter were immediate, only one was longer than three days in reply, that was ten, is a good indicator of the touchiness of the situation. It certainly seemed to have turned over a hornet's nest. If further information comes to light I'll keep you posted. Meanwhile, look out for fakes, copies and other non-genuine Heisey. •

# MEMBERS PLEASE NOTE: PROPOSED BY-LAWS CHANGES


The Board of Directors recommends the following changes to the by-laws of HCA. These proposals will be voted on at the annual meeting, June 18, 1999.

Article I, Section 1: The regular meetings of the organization shall be held at least **three** (four) times per year at such time and places as the Board of Directors shall designate.

Article III, Section 2 (h): Each member of the Board shall attend 75% of all regular board meetings during any given operational year or the position may be determined vacated by the Board of Directors. For this purpose an operational year shall begin with the <u>first</u> (September) regular <u>board</u> meeting <u>after the annual meeting</u>.

Underlined words indicate they are new. Words in parenthesis are being deleted by the proposal. The purpose is to eliminate one regular meeting of the membership because of poor attendance at the meeting typically held in December. The proposed change deleting a September meeting requirement facilitates and allows for a board meeting and the regular membership meeting to be held other than in September. •



# FROM THE HOT SHOP....

# GWYNNE RUKENBROD



As I begin to learn all of the "ins and outs" of my new job, I realized that an announcement about the re-opening of the Institute of Industrial Technology (IIT) needed to be made. The second floor of the institute is now open with all new exhibits, and a beautiful new main entryway has been added. Maybe some of you can visit during your free time convention week (ha, ha – free time???). In addition to the new exhibits, new to the glass blowing shop is a piece of equipment called a 'garage'. A garage is a chamber used to reheat already cooled pieces of glass, thus allowing the creation of goblets

and footed pieces. Here is an example of how the garage would be used: A cup that was made before and has been cooled to room temperature can be set in one of the chambers of the garage. These chambers are heated in order to reheat the pieces of cool glass without changing their shape. After the cup is warm, it can be reattached to a punty (pipe) and additional decoration, a stem, or a foot can be added from new hot glass. The garage prevents the pieces from cracking or breaking. Thanks to a local artist, our glass artists can now create beautiful stemmed and footed pieces. •

complete—traditionally assumed to be Heisey, but documentation unclear; #352 Flat Panel sugar sifter; #473 Narrow Flute with Rim basket; #1306 Comet Leaf goblet; and #423 Diamond Band goblet (found all by itself in an upstate New York shop!)

In the first of our two programs, Brad Nutting discussed the #1483 Stanhope pattern. Noting that this was one of the very few true Art Deco patterns produced by Heisey, Brad presented stunning pieces from his and Phyllis' collection in the context of the Art Deco movement, both stylistically and commercially. An extremely interesting look at an exotic and uncommon pattern.

Next, two of our newest members, Richard Bojko and John Mullen, exhibited their extensive collection of Orchid, which they have amassed in a relatively short period of time. Punctuating an informative history and discussion of the Orchid etch was an array of pieces from the Waverly, Queen Ann, and subsidiary patterns, including (but not limited to) the Lily bowl, seahorse footed bowl, seahorse handled candy jar with cover, Yeoman epergne (down boys! This vase is unetched!), a Cascade candlestick, and both the Tyrolean and Graceful cordials. This represented but a sampling of a beautiful collection. •


