

MEMBERS PLEASE NOTE: PROPOSED BY-LAWS CHANGES

The Board of Directors recommends the following changes to the by-laws of HCA. These proposals will be voted on at the annual meeting, June 18, 1999.


Article I, Section 1: The regular meetings of the organization shall be held at least **three** (four) times per year at such time and places as the Board of Directors shall designate.

Article III, Section 2 (h): Each member of the Board shall attend 75% of all regular board meetings during any given operational year or the position may be determined vacated by the Board of Directors. For this purpose an operational year shall begin with the <u>first</u> (September) regular <u>board</u> meeting <u>after the annual meeting</u>.

Underlined words indicate they are new. Words in parenthesis are being deleted by the proposal. The purpose is to eliminate one regular meeting of the membership because of poor attendance at the meeting typically held in December. The proposed change deleting a September meeting requirement facilitates and allows for a board meeting and the regular membership meeting to be held other than in September. •

FROM THE ARCHIVES—# 3365 RAMS/HORN OPTIC...GOBLET?? DON VALDES

Once again I find myself engaged in research rather than "archiving." But in cataloging our collection of patents I came across, in various locations, correspondence from Edwin P. Corbett, Heisey's Columbus patent attorney. Unfortunately, we do not have all correspondents—a rather one-sided exchange. I hope you find the sequence of events as interesting as I have.



On the 18th of August 1927, A.H. Heisey & Company's patent lawyer, Edwin P. Corbett, sent a Design application to the Heisey Company "covering your No. 3365 Rams/Horn Optic Goblet" to be signed by Mr. Coble, notarized and returned. This was accomplished on August 25th. But as any avid Heisey collector would know, it is Mr. Cobel not Coble. On the 25th of August the application was returned to be filled out with the name spelled correctly. On September 8 the application is again returned—"Due to the mistake in the name of Mr. Cobel, it was necessary to have this case rewritten." Once again, sign, notarize and return in the heavy mailing tube so as to "guard against the drawing becoming creased or broken." The original assignment for design application #D-23517 from Ray Cobel to Heisey is sent to the A.H. Heisey company. Then the fun starts.

In a letter dated November 7, 1927, Corbett is notified that the application D 23517 has been rejected. In essence, the patent examiner finds lack of sufficient difference between Cobel's design and:

- a) the shape of one designed by J.S. Towndrow in 1868
- b) the stem is "anticipated in the Magee reference," (William H. Magee, July 13, 1926)
- c) the flaring collar of the design by Ferdinand Schmidt Dec. 28, 1926.

Although we only have the specifications for the Magee and the Schmidt patents, we do have both the specifications and drawings for the Towndrow. I'm sure you will be surprised to learn that, according to the examiner, "The goblet is a mere variation of the shape shown in the Towndrow reference.

There follows, on May 4, 1928, a letter to the patent office from Corbett. Included are the following remarks in reference to the Towndrow patent::

The examiner contends that the shape of applicant's goblet is a mere variation of the shape shown on the Towndrow reference. Counsel for applicant believes there is no basis for such a claim. The only similarity between the Towndrow reference and applicant's design is that they both come under the classification of goblets. There is doubt whether Towndrow can even be called a goblet. It is nothing more than a pocket drinking cup having a detachable stand, so that it can be taken apart and carried about in the pocket.


The examiner is also questioned regarding the stem of the Magee design:

The stem of the Magee reference consists of an angular or paneled column. The stem of applicant's design is wholly different, being circular, and starting from the foot as a very slender column, gradually increasing in diameter as it approaches the bowl... No two stems could be more strikingly different.

In respect to the Schmidt reference:

It is "...a goblet flaring toward the brim, with spiral lines upon the bowl. The flaring collar of applicant's design is but a minor detail, which merges completely into the general shape and appearance of the applicant's design. The novel and ornamental shape of applicant's bowl with its widely spaced apart longitudinal optics bending to the right near the brim gives applicant's goblet an entirely different appearance from anything shown in the Schmidt, or other references cited by the Examiner."

But the patent examiner is not about to give up. In a letter from the patent office dated May 19, 1928 it is stated that, "The former action for rejection is believed proper particularly in view of the ...added reference which shows the goblet portion of the same general type. Applicant has merely given his article a more pronounced bulge, but his is not thought a patentable change."



"The claim is again rejected. This may be considered final for the purpose of appeal if the applicant so elects." A copy of Ripley's design can be seen to the left. After viewing the Ripley design one cannot help but wonder if the examiner has something against Ray Cobel!

The response to the May 19 letter is not sent until November 16. Corbett presents the arguments for the approval of the application in terms that have a "T. Clarence" ring to them. "The Towndrow reference is merely a patent on a drinking cup with a detachable stand." Whereas "...the cup of the applicant's goblet has a novel shape unlike anything known to the prior art." And, again in reference to the Towndrow reference, "The stem above this necked-in portion is thick so as to form a grip for one holding the goblet..."

Finally, a letter written from E.P. Corbett on Feb. 19, 1929 states:

I am enclosing herewith Design patent No. 77,673, dated February 12, 1929, which issued as a result of the design application of Ray. C. Cobel, Serial No. D-23, 517 filed September 22, 1927, for a Glass Goblet.

The battle is over. One year, six months and a day after the original correspondence began, the Rams/Horn optic stemware, Heisey pattern #3365 is patented. I hope those of you holding this piece appreciate all it went through. ◆



HEISEY GLASS MYSTERIES

BILL HERON

One of the side effects that result from studying Heisey glass, at least for me, has been the realization that there are many questions concerning the Heisey company's products for which their seem to be no ready answers. Yes, there are guesses and conjectures, but hard facts



seem to have been lost in the fog of passing time. Hoping that the reader will find it fun to consider some of the Heisey glass mysteries that appeal to me, let's look first at some things that have to do with color.


A.H. Heisey & Company was capable of producing glassware in a variety of attractive colors; yet there seem to have been two lost opportunities that might possibly have contributed significantly to the sale of Heisey products. Duncan made glass in a beautiful shade of blue, Cape Cod blue. So did Cambridge with their Moonlight blue. We know from looking at Heisey items in the so-called "experimental blue" hue that achieving an appealing blue color was well within the Heisey company's expertise.

Yet while Moonlight blue probably was Cambridge's best selling color and Cape Cod blue did very well for Duncan, Heisey seems virtually to have ignored the potential for blue glassware. The mystery is why? The record says that, corporately, the Heisey company was a strong competitor. Obviously company executives didn't decide to be kind to Cambridge, Duncan, and others by remaining out of the market for blue glassware. In fact Heisey did make a move in that direction with Zircon/Limelight, but whether one likes Zircon/Limelight or not, it wasn't a real, true blue in the sense that experimental blue was. Nor did Zircon/Limelight generate much success in the market place. Thus, the question remains why was there no true blue color from Heisey?

The same sort of nagging question comes to mind when one considers the color red. Once again to name some competitors, both Cambridge and Duncan produced glass in striking red hues. Imperial also made an attractive red. But what did Heisey do – a few red handles on beer mugs and very little else. Judging by the beer mug handles and the few other examples of Heisey red that exist, the Heisey company was capable of producing as pleasing a red color as did its competitors. If you want to see how attractive a piece of red glass can be take a look at a sample of Cambridge's Everglades pattern in red or a sample of Duncan's Chanticler pattern likewise in red. Then think about 1401 Empress in red and see if you can keep yourself from drooling.

Meanwhile, when the factory could have been turning out lots of blue and red Heisey glass, what was the work force doing? Making or trying to make glass in the color Tangerine. It was more difficult and more costly to make compared with other colors and when the product did reach stores it sold poorly.

In fact slow sales of Tangerine when it was in the catalog has made it quite scarce today and consequently examples tend to be priced much higher than other, objectively more attractive colors including Cobalt. One can only ask what if the effort and investment a striking red?



Another color mystery is the ugly shade called Clambroth. It is seen on a trinket box in the Winged Scroll pattern and perhaps no where else. Why was it made at all? The trinket box seems mainly to have been a souvenir item, but who says that souvenir items have to be ugly. Certainly the Heisey Company made many souvenir pieces that cannot be faulted on the basis of attractiveness. Most of us probably have a souvenir piece of

that was put into Tangerine had instead been devoted to a nice blue shade or patterns in Heisey Custard and/or something with red flashing that combines eye appeal with practicality and perhaps historical significance. Therefore, I ask, to what does Clambroth owe its existence?

Speaking of Custard reminds me that Heisey not only made glass in Custard, but also made glass in a color the Heisey Company called Ivorina Verde. At a quick glance there doesn't seem to be any particular difference, but put a piece of each side by side in bright sunlight and the difference is striking. Personally, I prefer Ivorina Verde, which makes me wonder why the Heisey Company bothered with plain Custard. Perhaps it's analogous to an ice cream company making both Vanilla and French Vanilla ice cream, as well as chocolate, strawberry, etc.

The color Marigold also suggests a mystery. In order to produce Marigold one or more compounds of the element uranium were added to the mix. The result was a shade in the yellow family. It has been reported that glass in Marigold was difficult for the factory to work with. Also Marigold's rather garish appearance seems to have resulted in limited success in the market place.

The mystery concerning Marigold is not that the Heisey Company made it; obviously they were on the way toward making yellow glassware and Marigold was a step along the way. The mystery has to do with the extreme variability in the keeping qualities of Marigold glass. Some specimens have "sugared" terribly, a result, it has been said, of uranium's radioactive nature. But, there are numerous specimens of Marigold glass that have not "sugared" at all and look as clear and bright as the day they left the factory. "How come," I ask. Did the factory do something, either on purpose or by accident that has resulted in the "sugar" versus no "sugar" disparity? One thing that I do know is that Marigold even today emits radiation. Put a Marigold item on an unexposed piece of X-ray film and leave it over night. Then develop the film and you will find a sort of X-ray image of the Marigold item.

Something else that puzzles me is the way in which the Heisey Company used color in relation to animals. (Here I am speaking of the, shall we say, "regular" line of animals, excluding the Kingfisher and Duck floral pieces and various other "non-regular" animal items such as the frog handled plate). In the "regular" animal line, the only colors that seem to have been used are Cobalt and Amber, and these on a limited basis. Why just a few? Why only those two colors? Why bother with animals in color at all? Clarence Vogel once intimated to me that he knew of a Mother Pig in Flamingo. Maybe so. It isn't hard to imagine a glass worker pouring a bit of Flamingo or Moongleam or Sahara

into an animal mould if both happened to be in use at the same time. This could have been an amusing lunch time project intended to brighten up a dull day. But it seems not to have happened, or did it?

The lineup of animals also includes a number of curiosities. The fact that the Heisey family tended to lean toward the Republican party undoubtedly accounts for the presence of three handsome elephants in the line, but only one sort of caricature donkey. In a similar vein, the Heisey family liked horses, a fact reflected in the profusion of horses in the Heisey



menagerie. But why a gazelle or a giraffe? Why no free standing lion, only the lion on the lid of the Waverly trinket box or the head on the Empress lion headed bowl?

One might also question why a sheep didn't make it but the pig family did. And think about birds. Edible birds, chickens, ducks, and geese are well represented and there are two types of pheasants. Why was the turkey left out? Or what about our nations symbol, the eagle? On a personal note, I might mention the Cambridge, Duncan, and Imperial each made a heron, but not Heisey. Humph.

As you can see there are a lot of things to arouse curiosity when it comes to what the Heisey company did or did not do. No doubt there are lots of Heisey glass mysteries that I have not mentioned here. All I intended to do was to stimulate the reader's curiosity. If your favorite "mystery" has been left out, I apologize. Maybe you'll feel motivated to share it with the rest of us in a future issue of *Heisey News*. Whatever the mysteries, one thing that can be said for certain is that Heisey glass, in my opinion, stands out above its competitors for its design, style, quality, and beauty. •




