
Where in the World is Sparky



#439 Fatima Individual Ash Tray

I was rummaging through our Heisey collection the other day —What? You don't rummage in your Heisey? Then you're missing part of the fun of having it. Anyway, here I was rummaging around, looking for ideas for another smoking gear article. That's when I landed on Fatima. Fortunately, she didn't complain too much.

The #439 Fatima ash tray is first mentioned in a typewritten addition to Price List 206 (about 1923), and makes its first illustrated catalog appearance in Catalog 102 (about 1924). Production continued until about 1937. The last illustration of it appears in Cat. 211 (seen in Vogel, Volume 3, and also in the Bredehoft blue book covering color). By the time Cat. 212 was published, #439 had been dropped. Despite around 14 years of production, Fatima is not seen that frequently. Part of the reason may be that this ash tray is not marked and so this little slab of glass goes unrecognized as the noble product of Heisey that it is.

As with many of these ash trays during this period, the name was chosen by researchers later on, not by Heisey.

At first this choice puzzled me. When I see the name, I want to stress the first syllable (FAT-ima), as in the Portuguese apparition honored in many Catholic churches as Our Lady of Fátima. Why on earth, I wondered, did this suggest itself as the name for a piece of smoking gear? As I've mentioned before, I am not a smoker. Nevertheless, I grew up when tobacco advertising was all around. So you might think I'd have heard of the Fatima brand of cigarettes. But you'd think wrong. A bit of quick research revealed that the Fatima cigarette brand was an old one, a prominent radio sponsor in the 1940's, and sold by Liggett & Myers until about 1980. And that it is pronounced fa-TEE-ma. Presumably, she is the

veiled Turkish woman on the package, embodying the Turkish tobaccos that went into the original blend. Not quite believing the sources I'd found, I even dug up a few old Dragnet radio ads and listened to them. They proved the point and induced a mild state of nostalgia while I was at it. Not that I want to get emotional about it. Just the facts, ma'am.

Now we know how to say it. ("What's this 'we'?" I hear more knowledgable tobacciana collectors saying.) What about the ash tray itself? While called an individual ash tray, Fatima has two cigarette rests, side by side. Several other individual ash trays have multiple rests, but they are usually arranged around the sides. I always assumed that was so there would always be a rest pointed more or less in your direction whenever you chose to put your cigarette down. Perhaps Fatima was for side-by-side smokers, or to give a place to rest an expired butt while moving on to a fresh cigarette.

The ash receptacle is scooped out cylindrically, rather than spherically. (My geometry teacher would be so proud.) The shape is obvious in the Cat. 102 illustration, but not so clear in the Cat. 109 one. The bottom is ground and polished completely flat. The photo with this article gives the illusion of a concave bottom but that is just internal reflection of the ash receptacle. The sides are also ground and polished, a finer point not often seen in other little ash trays.

Grinding and polishing was expensive, especially when more than the bottom was involved. Fatima's price reflects that. In 1933, the much larger and heavier #366 Salem wholesaled at \$5.80 per dozen, either crystal or Moongleam. Its more intricate shape may have made it harder to get out of the mould, which also would have contributed to the cost. #365 Rhombic, again much bigger than Fatima, was \$5.00 per dozen. One ash tray nearly the same size as Fatima, the #358 Solitaire, was only \$2.00 per dozen. Fatima herself, dainty and small though she was, taking little glass and surely easy to unmould, commanded an eye-popping \$8.00 per dozen—it took a lot less to make eyes pop back then. Only the massive White Owl, the complicated Irwin, and one other ash tray combo got more. That may be another reason #439 isn't seen that often; sprucing up with extra polishing priced her out of the market. Fatima may have been small, but Heisey still took pride in making it the best it could be.

Bredehoft reports that Fatima "usually has a full ground and polished bottom" which implies there are unground specimens out there. If the bottom isn't ground, then the sides probably aren't either. Perhaps Heisey did offer it fire-polished only as a less expensive alternative. The price lists I have are silent about that, but the illustration for Cat. 211 does go out of its way to say the ash tray was "cut." Either way, #439 Fatima is not easy to find.

I did say Fatima was available in color. But not much, as it turns out. It is found only in crystal and Moongleam. Find either one and you're halfway there to a complete set. I will guess that Moongleam is harder to find than crystal, since most price lists don't show anything but crystal listings for Fatima. I am not aware of any other colors.


There is at least one look-alike, so nearly the same size that the difference is trivial. In one example, it was ever so slightly taller and broader than #439 Fatima; in another, just a tad smaller. The look-alike's finish is coarser, especially in the ash receptacle. The examples I have seen have the frosted silhouette of an elephant on the bottom.


Now it's time to plunder pillage thoughtfully contemplate the collection again for a new idea. Oh, who I am I kidding. I'm going to get right in there and ransack the shelves.

Vital Statistics

#439 Fatima individual ash tray: Length, 3"; width, $1\frac{1}{2}"$; height, 9/16". Ground bottom. Unmarked. Crystal or Moongleam.

We will provide online and in the auction catalog a list of vendors (shippers) who will to pick up your glass, pack it, and send it to you. We simply do not have the volunteers, materials on hand, and staffing capability to do this task.

This auction is your Association's largest fundraiser. Please plan on attending if you can. If you can't make it, consider bidding absentee for that piece you desire. 

Heisey's Perfect Parfaits

Today these stems with tall, slender bowls would be called "champagne flutes", but A. H. Heisey & Co. usually called them "parfaits."

Invented in France in the 1890s, the parfait (French for "perfect") was originally a frozen dessert made with sugar syrup, eggs and cream with fruit, nuts or liqueurs and served in a tall, short-stemmed glass. In the United States, the name is used for layered desserts made with ice cream, syrups, fruit or liqueurs, and whipped cream, often garnished with fruit, and served in tall, stemmed glasses. Today, a parfait might consist of layers of yogurt, granola, and fruit. Whatever its ingredients, a parfait would look and taste best in a Heisey parfait glass!

Heisey included parfait glasses in many of its stemware lines from its early years until the 1930s. They have capacities of 3½ to 7 ounces, with stems of varying heights.

Heisey's first parfaits were part of pressed stemware lines. Some of them are listed as "tall champagne or parfait" in the company's catalogs. Parfaits can be found the in no. 300 Peerless, no. 337 Touraine (plain and narrow optic; photo, p. 3), no. 341 Puritan (photo, p. 3), no. 393 Narrow Flute, no. 483 swirl optic, and no. 1183 Revere (plain and narrow optic) patterns. The no. 369 Hartman pressed stemware line included a 7 ounce tall champagne, which could also be used as a parfait.

Heisey's Perfect Parfaits Continued...

When the company began producing blown stemware in around 1915, it included parfaits in many of these lines. Among these patterns are no. 3304 Universal, no. 3311 Velvedere, no. 3312 Gayoso, and no. 3324 Delaware. These blown parfaits with pulled stems are not marked with the Diamond H and may be difficult to identify unless they are decorated with a Heisey etching.

Heisey's production of parfaits greatly expanded when the company introduced its innovation of blown bowls paired with pressed stems. Parfaits can be found in the following patterns of this type: no. 3333 Old Glory, no. 3350 Wabash (photo, p. 1), no. 3357 King Arthur (photo, p. 1), no. 3360 Penn Charter, no. 3362 Charter Oak (photos, p. 5), no. 3368 Albemarle, no. 3366 Trojan, no. 3380 Old Dominion (photo, p. 5), no. 3381 Creole, no. 3389 Duquesne, no. 3408 Jamestown, and no. 3409 Plymouth. They are found in all of the production colors of the 1920s and 1930s, sometimes in combination with Crystal, and with Heisey cuttings and etchings.

Pressed stemware lines made during the 1920s and 1930s also included parfaits. The Tudor pattern included parfaits in two shapes (no. 411 and 412). Parfaits can also be found in no. 1184 Yeoman (photo, p. 5), no. 1404 Old Sandwich (photo, p. 5), and no. 1485 Saturn. Several major pressed patterns of this period, no. 1252 Twist, no. 1401 Empress, no. 1425 Victorian, and no. 1469 Ridgeleigh, did not offer parfaits.

The company seems to have started to phase out parfait glasses in the mid to late 1930s, although production of parfait glasses in existing patterns may have continued. Stemware patterns introduced after this time often include glasses with tall bowls of about the same size as those of parfait glasses, but they are called footed sodas or footed juice glasses. Several examples are shown on page 3. They would still make lovely parfait glasses, even if Heisey no longer called them parfaits.

Heisey made parfaits in most of its production colors, excluding Dawn and the early colors (Emerald, Opal, and Ivorina Verde). The no. 3345 Mary 'n Virg stemware line included a parfait, which might be found in Canary. The no. 3389 Duquesne parfait was made with a Tangerine bowl. The no. 3381 Creole parfait and no. 3380 Old Dominion parfait were made in all Alexandrite and with an Alexandrite bowl. The no. 1485 Saturn parfait was made in Zircon. Any of these would be a great find!

DRYING AND STORING . . . Dry immediately with a soft, lint-free towel. Deep-cut glass can be dried and polished by dipping in sawdust, wiping off dry sawdust with soft paper towel. Store stemware by placing it upright on shelf rather than rim down. Wipe all glassware before it is used.

SAFETY AND CLEANING HINTS . . . Avoid exposing your crystal to temperature extremes . . . warm your glassware before filling it with hot food. A tiny nick can be removed by smoothing with emery paper and polishing with jeweler's rouge. Remove stains in vinegar cruets with diluted ammonia. Tea leaves and vinegar will clean lime deposits from a water bottle or pitcher. If tumblers stick together, separate them by placing cool water in inner glass and holding outer glass in warm water.


Frequently, as Curator I am asked how to care for Heisey and other elegant glassware. This original advertisement which gives tips on how to care for Heisey was found by Michael Maher in his personal archives. I hope you find this both interesting and useful. Jack



— Heisey Glass Bead Program




The Heisey Glass Beads are selling very well! Many have asked how we make them and why we sell them pre order, as well as how long it takes to get your orders. This is a handmade product from original Heisey Glass that was damaged beyond repair. The beads cannot be made without the damaged glass. It is a very lengthy process which is explained below. The damaged piece is taken to a glass studio, where the artist pre heats the glass in the "garage" to raise the temperature of the glass. Once the temperature desired is reached the piece is puntied (put on a pipe, to be inserted in the furnace).





The piece is doused into the flames and heat. The piece quickly becomes returns to molten state, and is removed from the furnace "glory hole" several times and rolled and flattened to a ball of colored glass on the rod. it is heated again and grabbed with plier like pullers to pull and stretch the glass into straw like canes of glass.

From here the pieces cool, and go to the next process, which requires a different artist. This artist takes the canes of glass and with a high heat torch fuses them on top of another rod wrapping it in the glass creating the bead. The beads are removed and annealed (slowly cooled to fully harden and strengthen the glass).

Once cooled, the beads are ground on the inside, much like Heisey's oil bottles were. This gives them a uniform hole for the bracelet. The Museum then receives the beads in this state. We then have them sterling silver cored for quality and to prevent the metal bracelet from scratching the inside of the glass. Once this is done the beads are assembled into their groups, put on the bracelet and gift boxed with a card of authenticity, and the name of the series. At that point the beads are ready to be shipped or picked up, but it is quite a process. We have two series available for pre order.

Depression years series: Flamingo, Moongleam, Sahara Modern Series: Zircon, Dawn, Crystal

The bracelet sets are \$75.00 with the bracelet, or \$25.00 per bead. Please call the Museum to pre-order either set.

Both sets will be available in the gift shop for sale during the benefit auction, April 4-5, 2014. (so long as we have glass to make into beads). Keep the donated broken colored Heisey coming and also the orders for the beads.


