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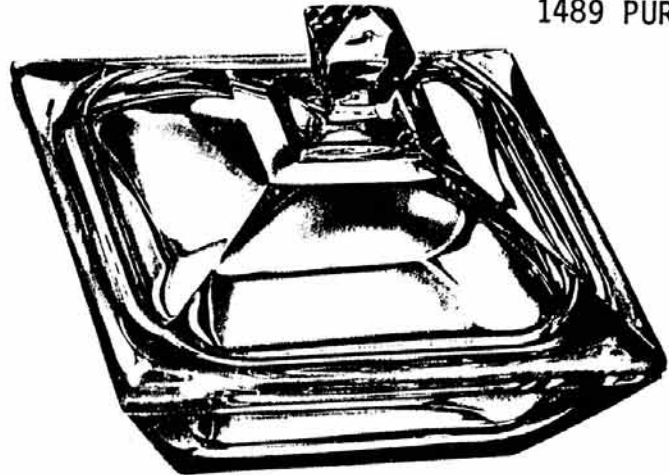

NOTES FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

A new year and a new decade. My report to you this month will cover actions taken by the Board of Directors at their meeting on December 8. The Treasurer's report and Curator's report will be covered elsewhere in this issue.

Neila Bredehoff's Archivist report stated that since her last report, much had been accomplished. She stated that 137 catalogues and price lists had been examined, processed and listed in the computer, wrapped in acid-free paper, placed in acid-free boxes, and stored. This work is not complete as there are several more catalogues to process. The Board voted to purchase a blanket insurance policy for \$50,000 coverage until an accurate inventory is available. The coverage is for the paper and other items acquired by the Archives and Research Committee.

Christos Maskaleris, Chairman of the Inventory Committee, reported that the committee would begin a non-glass inventory update after the start of the New Year.

The 1990 Souvenir "Oscar" will be made by Fenton in their Rosaline color. They will be available sometime in February.

A by-laws change, submitted by Dick Smith, to the Executive Committee, and recommended to the Board, briefly states that "Executive Committee members will also be members of the Board of Directors". Charlie Wade had suggested such a change after he retired from the Board. He felt an Executive Committee member could not adequately serve the Board and not be a member of the Board. Passed by the Board, this by-law change will be presented for a vote of the members at the Annual Meeting in June.

Bob Ryan, Co-Chairman of the Benefit Auction, reported that as of December 8, 620 lots were catalogued and that several boxes were on hand to be processed. Many outstanding pieces are included in the sale, rare beautiful cuttings and a good selection of colored items.

It was the decision of the Board that since the Museum Benefit Auction was a profit making event for the benefit of the museum, that the use of credit cards was taking from that profit and actually penalizing those buyers who were paying cash. It was decided to charge a 5% buyers premium for credit card use. This buyers premium applies only to purchases at the Benefit Auction. Credit card sales will continue in the gift shop as always with no buyers premium.

After considerable discussion, the Board voted to again hold the 200 dinner in April, the date yet to be decided. HCA needs more participation by Study Clubs and individuals in this event. This was started as an event to payoff the Warehouse purchase. This year (1990) will nearly complete the payoff of the bank loan which was \$75,000 in the beginning.

As stated earlier, Charlie Wade felt that members of the Executive Committee should be Board members. At the December 4 Executive Committee Meeting, he had submitted his resignation. Sam Schnaidt was elected to fill the vacancy, as provided in the Constitution of Heisey Collectors of America, Inc.

ed to fly to another state and, when he finally decided it was time to come back to his nest, he brought with him the following two treasures: two (2) Arch tumblers, both Crystal but one of these valuable pieces had feet. Very, very nice find. His set of Arch tumblers is almost complete.

The "Keystone Cops" (PA) have been out roaming the fleas with their "billy-clubs". I wonder if anyone fears them? No, not the Keystones, they're harmless. Nevertheless, home they came with four (4) #2323 Navy glasses, 7½ oz, Old Fashions. These were for Mr. Keystone as he is the one who collects Navy. The "Canadian Goose" came up with a #1205 Rain-drop floral bowl in Moongleam. What a catch!

HEISEY BY IMPERIAL - NO. 1591 STORYBOOK MUG

A few years ago during Convention, I was stumbling around the flea market on the square at an ungodly hour, wondering what I and everyone else was doing up so early. (Those of you who haven't been to Newark in June yet, don't know the peculiar ritual we engage in of greeting the dawn on Saturday morning when, after a busy week, we should all be snug in our beds instead.) As a collector of the storybook mugs, on one of my circuits I noted that a dealer had set out a set of four in colors which I already had, but that it was so early that they had misted over. I don't recall now how it is that I happened to pick one of them up but it was only then that I discovered that mist had nothing to do with the mugs' appearance and that, in fact, all four had frosted or satin finishes.

I was immediately excited because I knew from the Imperial book that some mugs in Crystal had been made with a satin finish in 1977 on an experimental basis, but I had never seen one for sale nor were any of the other three colors even listed. Needless to say, I snatched all four, once again aware that with so much glass having been sold out of the Hay Shed, there is never any point at which you can say that an Imperial collection is complete -- there's no telling how many variant or experimental pieces may turn up which aren't in the book.

The four mugs (two of which are pictured) were in Crystal, Ultra Blue, Fern Green, and Nut Brown and, quite frankly, are not among the most attractive storybook mugs ever manufactured, but were nevertheless a delightful addition to my collection. One of the first things I discovered, however, is that my Crystal mug was not necessarily one of the experimental few made in 1977, since the example on display in the Museum has a fine frosting reminiscent of Imperial's Cathay pieces, whereas all four of my mugs have a dull matte finish, similar to that used on the Slag mugs made from 1975-1977. Judging from the colors involved, around 1978, would be a good guess for the year of production, since the storybook mugs were issued in both Nut Brown and Ultra Blue that year; however Fern Green was never a production color for the mug, except as a special order in 1975, so they could date from anytime between 1975 and 1979.

The original storybook mug (called a "child's cup") was designed by Horace King and made in Crystal from 1947 - 1950. Imperial seems to have initially reissued the mug as a special order for E. Ward Russell in various carnival finishes and it was at his request that the plain panels were stippled. The first mugs made for him had ground bottoms, but all of the later ones have a collared base instead. By 1971, the mug had been added to Imperial's catalog and it remained popular for many years, later providing a steady source of income for the HCA gift shop -- indeed, it's still a popular sales item in versions made by both Fenton and Dalzell Viking, so that by now a "complete" collection includes more than 30 mugs (or more, if you also collect the various marks). What follows is a summary of the colors and finishes that I am aware of:

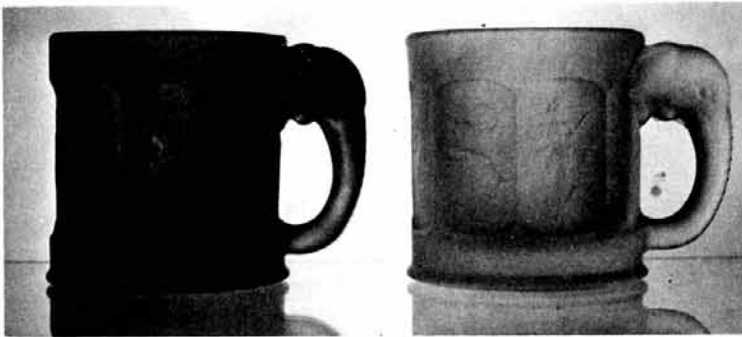

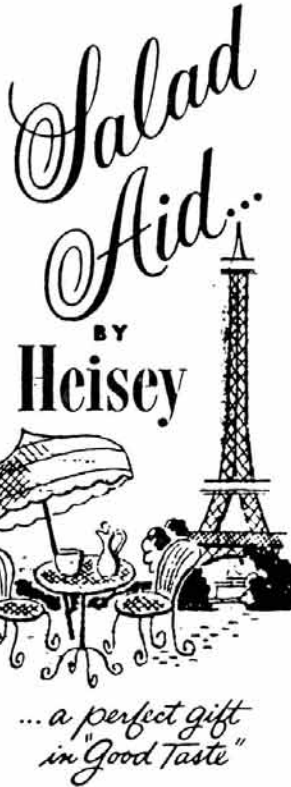

The article about the Archives Yields New Information makes reference to a Rose color (pink) by Heisey around 1901. In my opinion, it is entirely possible that Heisey experimented with a Rose Pink color in 1901.

The color Rose had been in the glass industry for several years prior to 1901. McKee & Bros. Glass Company of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, was producing a Rose-Pink color in 1899. A 1898 advertisement of McKee & Bros. makes reference to their "Rose-Pink" glassware. They say "We challenge any other glass manufacturer to produce this color (Rose-Pink). Have you seen it? The winning color of 1899". I have seen the four piece table set in McKee's Apollo pattern in their Rose-Pink color.

To the Trade:

You will possibly recall that several seasons ago we first produced a new and unique and different item in what we call our two-handled mint, jelly, bon bon and cheese, to which we later added our two-handled sandwich, two-handled hors d'oeuvre and two-handled salad bowl. These items were all universal favorites, and consequently, always copied by unscrupulous manufacturers.

The trade as a whole, in their effort to meet competition, are too busy to pause to consider the ethics of the matter, and in consequence have been purchasing these items from other factories at reduced prices, and, we believe, inferior quality. It is bad enough to copy a house's exclusive product, but to cut the price we think is about the same as grand larceny. Consequently, we have not only taken the means to protect ourselves on design, but the government has granted us a mechanical patent for the manufacture of these articles. In other words, they have granted us a patent on our method of manufacture of a purely handled item, and our process of manufacture is the only means by which such an item can be made. Our exclusive rights are, therefore, obvious.

You can appreciate that to infringe on a mechanical patent is a very serious offense. Any manufacturer who now produces a two-handled item not only on the order of the items on the enclosed illustration, but any item, no matter what the design, that has two or more handles placed on the side, whether the handle be divided in two parts, or is single, is liable under our patent. And you, as a dealer, though innocent in your intention, if you continue to purchase such items, are equally as liable.

Therefore, in fairness to you and to ourselves, we take this opportunity to advise you that you lay yourselves liable to litigation should you purchase such items from any other manufacturer.

In the meantime, we will give you six weeks to unload what you already have in stock, and would advise that if these items are of sufficient interest to you in the future, you make such purchases of said items from us. We believe that in giving you this opportunity to dispose of the stuff you may now have that we have been fair.

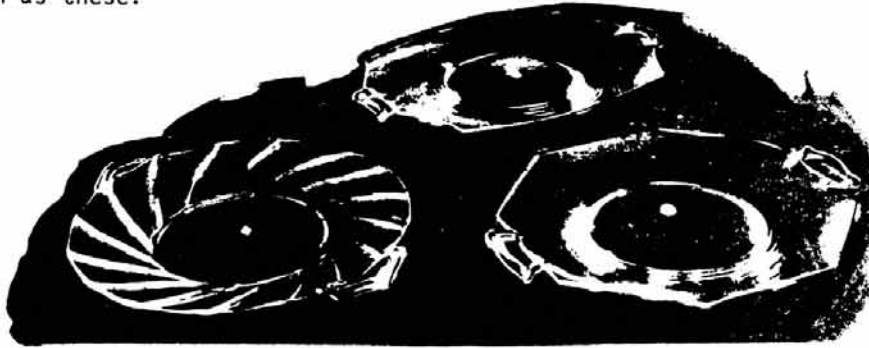

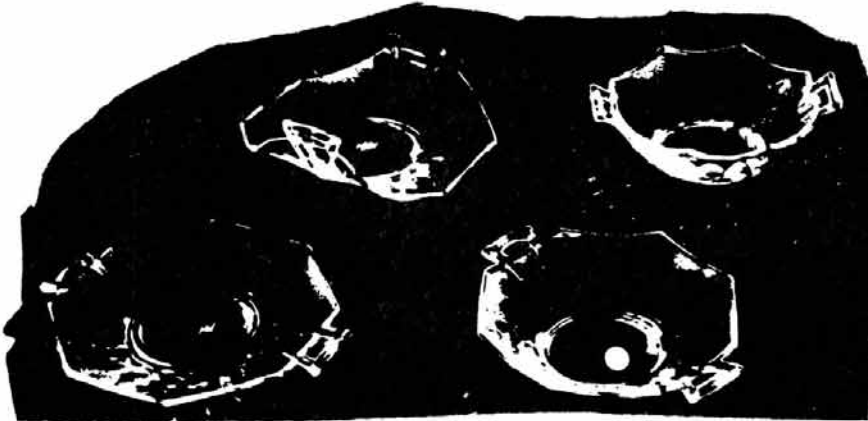

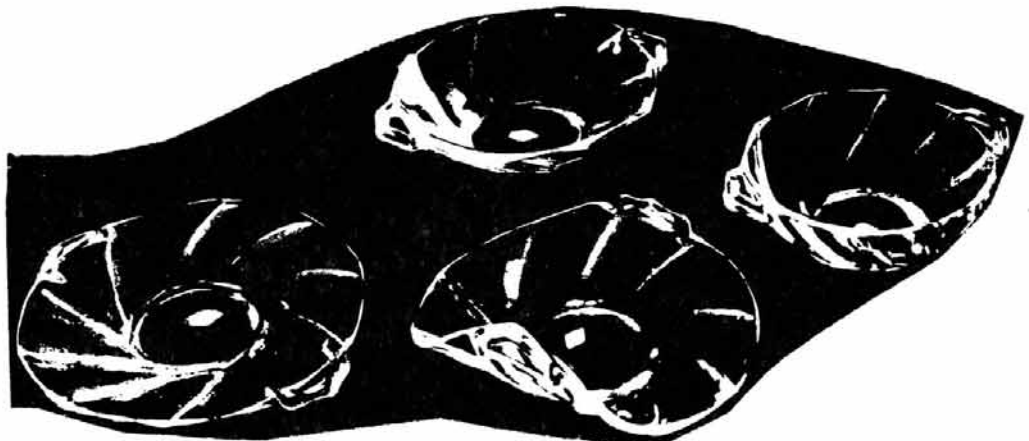

APPARATUS FOR MAKING ARTICLES OF GLASSWARE

Application filed April 17, 1928. Serial No. 270,754.

My invention relates to method and apparatus for making articles of glassware and, more particularly, to method and apparatus for making articles of glassware, such as dishes or the like, that are provided with suitable handles.

Heretofore, it has been customary to make handled glassware, such as dishes or the like, by forming the article by any of the well-known methods, for instance pressing, and then attaching and shaping the handle by hand.

The attachment of handles to glass articles by the hand method is a slow, laborious and, consequently, expensive operation, requiring workmen of a high degree of skill. In addition to this, such method has practically precluded the idea of making glassware having handles thereon of such shape and designs as to add materially to the ornamental effect of the ware.

Making handled glassware, such as dishes or the like, by forming the body portion and then attaching and shaping the handle has had the added disadvantage which results from attaching two pieces of glass together when such pieces of glass are at different temperatures. A perfect weld is seldom, if ever, formed between the pieces of glass under such conditions and, in glassware having handles thereon, this has increased the possibility of the handles breaking away from the body portion of the article.

One object of my invention is to provide a method and apparatus for making glassware, such as dishes or the like, having handles thereon whereby the handles are formed integrally and simultaneously with the body of the article.

Other objects of my invention may be seen in the following description, and the preferred embodiment of my invention may be seen in the accompanying drawings wherein similar characters of reference designate corresponding parts and wherein:

Figure 1 is a vertical sectional view of a mold and plunger constructed in accordance with my invention.

Figure 2 is a perspective view of a part of the main body portion of the mold and the mold ring which I employ, these parts being shown separated.

Figure 3 is a perspective view of a finished article that has been formed in my mold.

Figure 4 is a perspective view of a part of the article shown in Figure 3.

Figure 5 is a perspective view, partly in section, of a portion of the main body portion of my mold showing a mold ring assembled therewith.

Referring to the drawings, I have shown a press mold of the block type comprising a main body portion 1. This main body portion 1 is preferably provided with suitable handles 2 for convenience in moving the mold from place to place and for other reasons which will hereinafter appear.

Disposed in the lower part of the main body portion 1 is a valve 3, which valve preferably forms a substantial part of the bottom of the mold. Such valve has an annular flange 4 thereon fitting within a cutaway portion 5 in the base of the main body portion of the mold. The valve may be entirely removed from the main body portion 1 by removing the annular plate 6 which is secured to the main body portion by the screw bolts 7 or other suitable means and forms the lower wall of the annular groove 5. As will be seen by referring to Figure 1, the valve 3 is ordinarily in its lowermost position.

Referring to Figures 1, 2 and 3, it will be seen that the upper part of the main body portion 1 is provided with indentations 8 on its inner surface which are of the same general contour as the underside of the handle of the article which is to be formed in the mold. A mold ring 9 that is adapted to fit upon the top of the main body portion of the mold has indentations 10 in the surface thereof which are complementary to the indentations 8 in the main body portion when the two are in assembled relation. Lugs 11, depending from the mold ring 9, are designed to rest upon the inner surface of the main body portion adjacent the indentations 8. When in this position, they are complementary to the indentations 8 and 10.

In the operation of my device, a charge of molten glass is placed in the main body portion 1 of the mold and the mold ring 9 is positioned on the mold. When the mold ring 9 is in cooperative relation with the main body portion 1 of the mold, the indentations 8 and 10, together with the lugs 11, form a handle-shaping cavity into which glass is to be forced by the action of the plunger.

With the parts in this position, a plunger 12 is placed in the main body portion of the mold in the manner shown in Figure 1 and pressure exerted thereupon. Pressure on this plunger will cause the molten glass in the main body portion of the mold to flow upwardly around the plunger to form the body of the article and into the depressions 8 and 10 to form the handle. When the molten glass has become slightly cooled and has set sufficiently, the plunger may be removed, the main body portion inverted and the valve 3 operated to push the article out of the main body portion of the mold. The article may then be subjected to the usual finishing operations, such as bending the handles to any desired angle.

Referring to the preceding description and the drawings attached hereto, it will be apparent that I have provided a method and apparatus for making articles of glassware having handles thereon wherein the handles will be formed simultaneously with the forming of the main body portion of the article and integrally therewith. Such method will not only permit the making of handled glass-

ware wherein the handles may be of such shape and design as to add materially to the ornamental effect of the ware but will make possible the production of glassware wherein the handles have greater strength.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim is:

1. An apparatus for making an article of glassware with a handle thereon comprising a mold and a mold ring, said mold and mold ring having indentations therein designed to completely form a handle with an opening therein.

2. An apparatus for making an article of glassware with a handle thereon comprising a mold and a mold ring, said mold and mold ring having complementary indentations formed in the abutting surfaces thereof to form a handle, said abutting surfaces contacting with each other both outside of the handle and within the handle.

3. An apparatus for making articles of glassware with a handle thereon having an opening therethrough which comprises a mold and a mold ring having complementary indentations formed in the abutting surfaces thereof to form the handle with the opening therein, such abutting surfaces being free from interfitting projections.

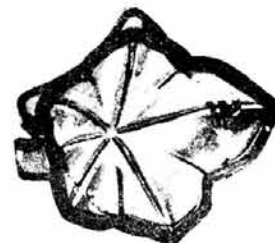
4. An apparatus for making an article of glassware with a handle thereon comprising a mold and a mold ring, said mold and mold ring having complementary indentations formed in the abutting surfaces thereof to form a handle, each of said indentations forming substantially one-half of said handle.

5. An apparatus for making an article of glassware with a handle thereon comprising a mold and a mold ring, said mold and mold ring having complementary indentations formed in the abutting surfaces thereof to form a handle and such abutting surfaces being free from interfitting projections.

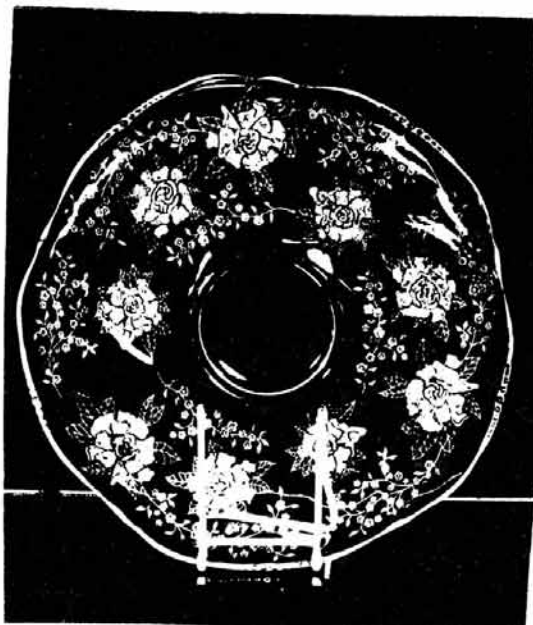
6. An apparatus for making an article of glassware with a handle thereon comprising a mold and a mold ring, said mold and mold ring having complementary indentations formed in the abutting surfaces thereof to form a handle with an opening therethrough, said indentations being of such form that the removal of the ring from the mold will leave the top and a portion of both the inner and outer sides of the handle exposed.

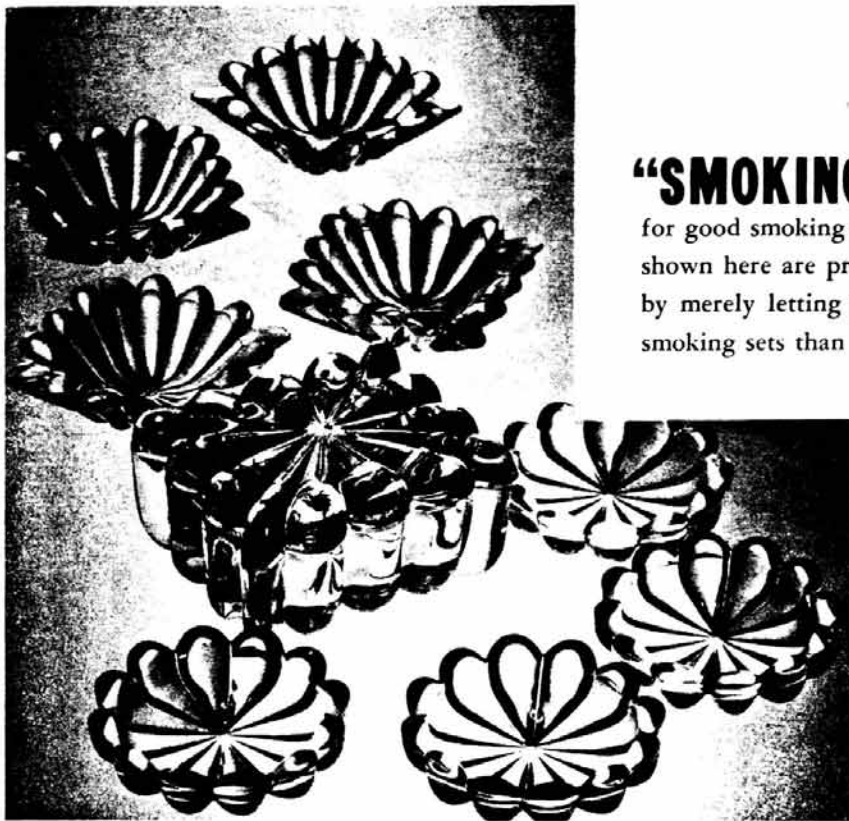

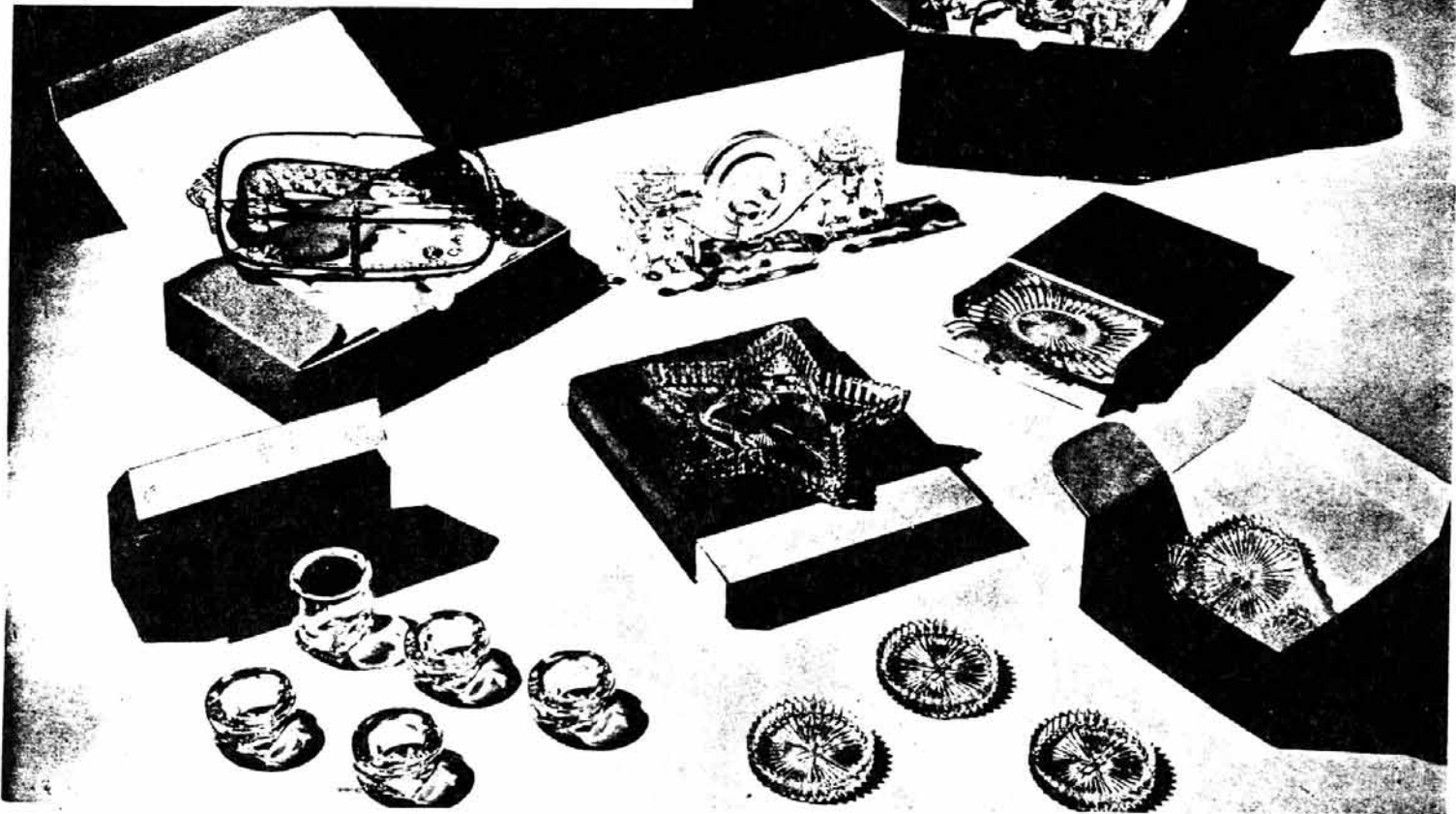

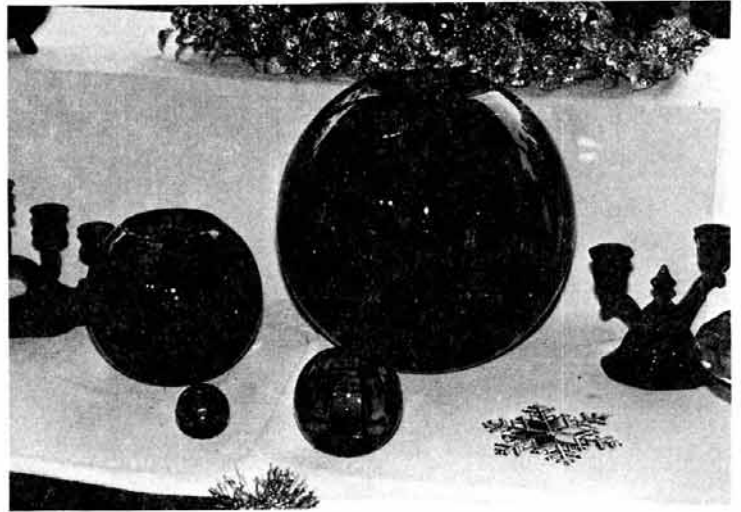

THE TWO SISTERS MINING COMPANY

From some new archives recently acquired we have learned that A. H. Heisey and James E. Duncan were in partnership in the Two Sisters Mining Company. The only location given on the stock certificate is listed as Pittsburgh, Pa., but it is possible that the actual company operated in the west. The Heiseys, at least, did own some land and had mining interests in the west, especially in Denver, Colorado. It is also possible that the Duncans held similar interests since one of the Duncan brothers, Wilbur, was treasurer of a mining company in Cheyenne, Wyoming, before his death in 1886.

Apparently the brothers-in-law, James E. Duncan and A. H. Heisey, were involved in several financial ventures as partners. The most obvious, of course, was the Geo. Duncan & Sons Glass Co. of Pittsburgh from 1875 to 1892. They also purchased land near Pittsburgh and developed it partially and sold lots from it in the late 1800's. Now we find that they also held mining interests together.

What I find very interesting is the name of the company, Two Sisters. This becomes more interesting when reading the reverse of the certificate which says: "Know all men by these presents, That I do hereby appoint Susan N. Heisey attorney irrevocable for _____ to sell and transfer to _____ of the within-named shares, with power to appoint one or more attorneys under _____ for that purpose.

"Witness my hand and seal this 16 day of Nov 1886"

[Signed] A. H. Heisey"

"Sealed and delivered in the Presence of D. C. Snyder"

To me this seems to indicate that Heisey and Duncan established the company but listed their wives as official participants and thus the inspiration for the company name.

These certificates are an interesting sidelight to the lives of these two men and the glass companies they established. One can only assume that at one time, certificates existed with the signature of Mrs. Duncan in the same capacity as Mrs. Heisey.

In case it is impossible to read the front of the certificate the wording is as follows:

"Two Sisters Mining Company

No. 143 - 10- Shares

Pittsburgh, PA. May 4th 1886

This certifies that A. H. Heisey is entitled to Ten shares of the capital stock of The Two Sisters Mining Company transferable on the books of the Company by endorsement hereon and surrender of this certificate. Witness the Seal of said Company and the signatures of the President and Secretary. Stock Full Paid and Non-Assessable.

[Signed] James E. Duncan Secretary A. H. Heisey President"

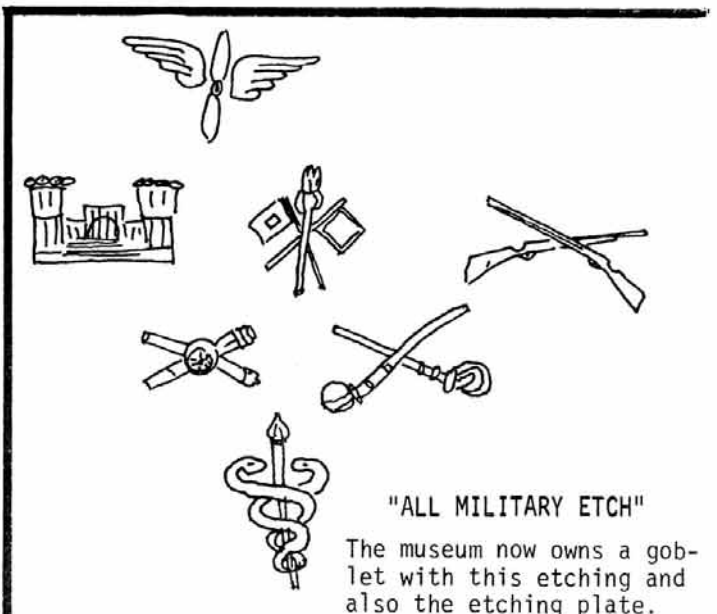

It contains many excellent pictures in black and white and in color.

Phyllis Freier presented a very informative pro-

gram on patterns related to or produced at the same time as Crystolite. Sometimes these patterns were shown in advertisements along with Crystolite. She also showed us Heisey patterns that look like they could belong to the Crystolite line and patterns by other companies that could be mistaken for Crystolite. Her talk was documented by eight pages of pictures of these various categories.

The number of items for Show and Tell was not as large as usual. I guess everyone is waiting for Santa. However, a beautiful Sunburst spooner was shown that will go with the owner's covered butter dish; also, a ten inch Twist utility dish in Flamingo which was unusual because it has four feet. In Vogel's and Neila Bredehoft's books, the catalog reprints indicate that this dish has three small feet. Does this mean that one of our members has a rarity? Several other pieces were brought for confirmation as to their maker. Among them were some pieces in a pink shade that is very much like Flamingo. I guess they will have to be taken to the convention to the experts for identification.

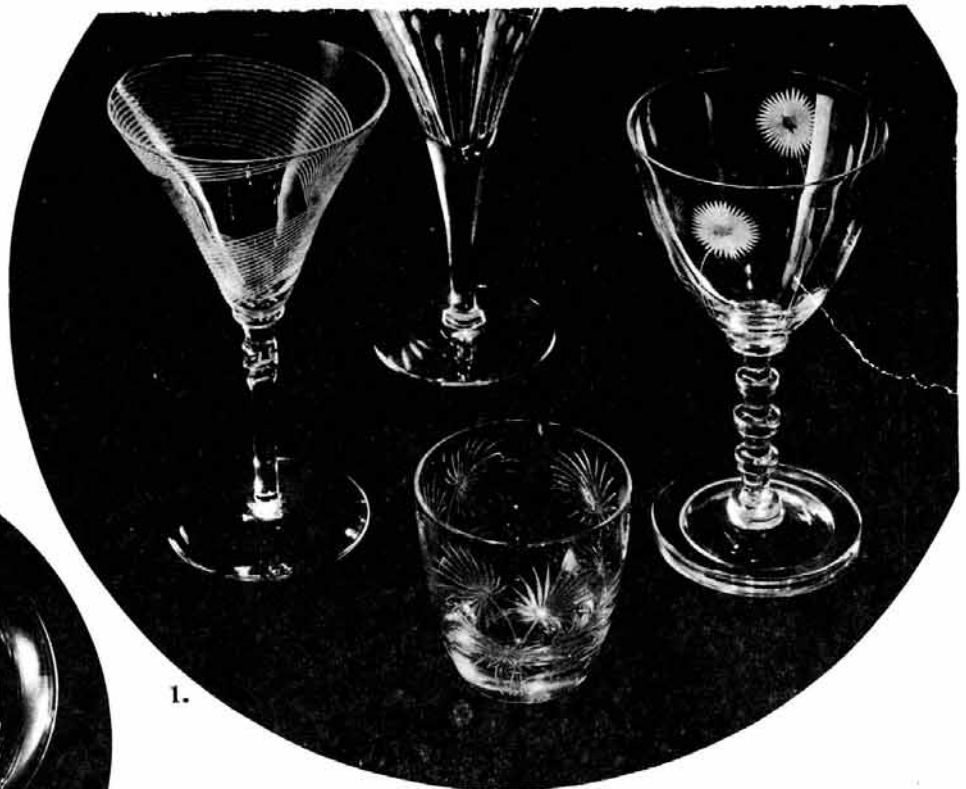

Dates of Kohinoor pattern
approximately 1937 - 1939

1. Four modern glass shapes and decorations. The well-proportioned goblet left is *Ski*, an abstract Cataract-*Sharpe* design inspired by skiers' tracks. From Wallace and Bowes. At the top is Morgantown Glass's goblet *Arabia*, with the vertical lines of the decoration accentuating an illusion of natural growth from the base. At the right is the *Straw Flower* pattern on Cambridge Glass's new *Pristine* goblet. In front is *Lido*, Fostoria's new etched pattern on their rounded *Standish* tumbler.

2. Blank goblet, sherbet and salad plate in the *Pristine* line from Cambridge Glass. The base is thick at the edge for stability and balance, but is hollowed underneath in a circle. The ringed stem repeats the circle motif.

3. *Rings of Saturn*, a new swirl optic group from Heisey. A large diamond joins the hexagonally cut stem to the round base of the stemware, and gives the name of *Kohinoor* to the shape. *Kohinoor* comes in colors and many other types of decoration, including new cuttings and etchings. Designed by *Walter Von Nessen*.

4. Examples of Duncan and Miller's new nautical line. The straight tumbler, with either plain or frosted foot, comes in many nautical designs.

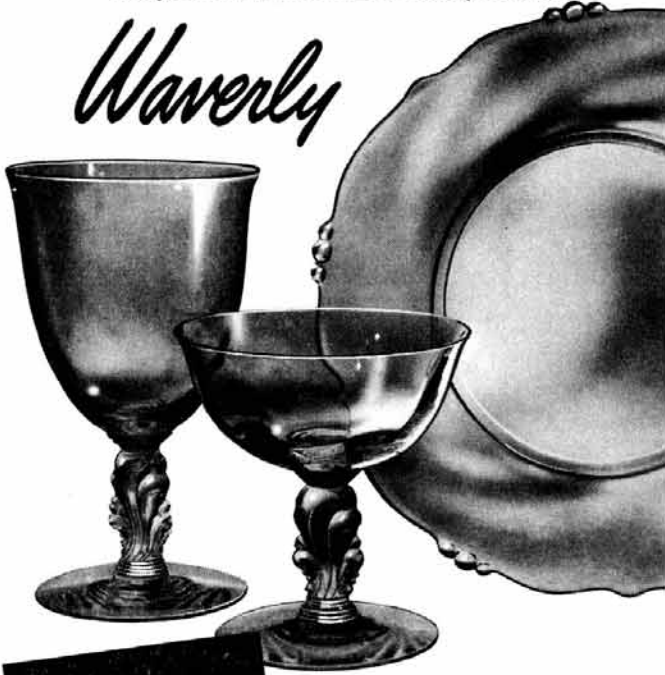

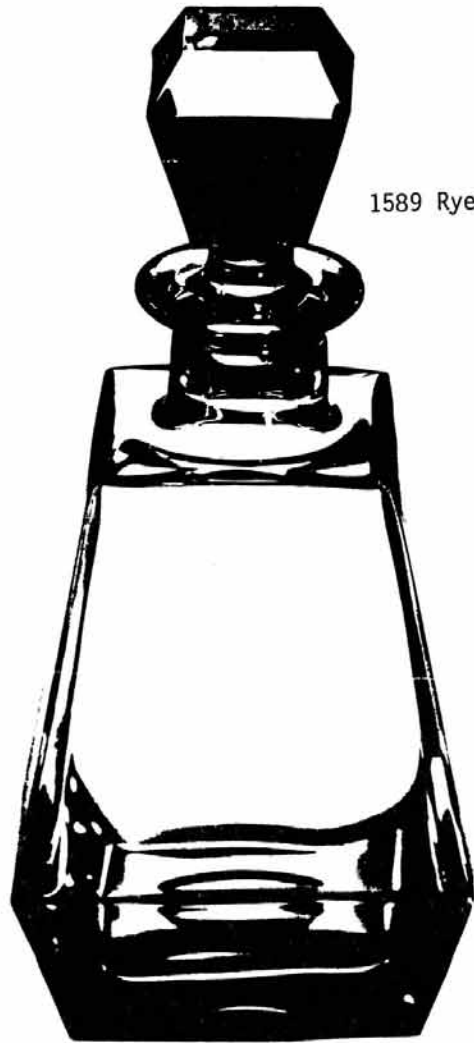
