

After over seven years of collecting and studying Heisey's Crystolite pattern I am finally able to say, with some confidence, that I can tell all eight (8) of the regular production line stems apart. I honestly could not have made this statement in the first few years of my experience.

The difficulty for me was in distinguishing the difference between them when they were not lined up side-by-side as they are in the Heisey catalog pictures. This is particularly true of the 3 1/2 oz. cocktail and the 3 1/2 oz. oyster cocktail. I could never tell which one I had in my hand! In talking with other collectors I found I was not alone.

Experience taught me that the best way to deal with this problem was to study the different pieces, to be compared, by actually handling them. I believe this to hold true in dealing with other Heisey identification problems, as well.

In this article, an attempt will be made to give descriptions of each of the Crystolite stems which will help in distinguishing their differences.

However, there is yet another pitfall in identifying Crystolite Heisey used the same stem design in their No. 5077 Legionnaire line, designed in 1949 by Horace King. See Mr. King's article "Stemware....Bar Lines Novelties" in the December, 1973 issue of the Heisey News. article he mentions that he "...used modifications of the Crystolite stem and inverted in both cases." for his design of the No. 6003 Tempo and the 6004 Classic stem Neither of which is easily confused with Crystolite.

Legionnaire, with its stems being exactly the same as Crystolite, is the real confusing look-a-like. The size and shape of the eight Legionnaire pieces are the same as the eight Crystolite pieces; however, the bowls tend to be thicker.

There is one major difference between the two patterns. Crystolite has a wide optic in its bowls and Legionnaire does not. This is a very simple but distinctive difference. However, at first glance you may be deceived.

As part of the descriptions which follow, you will approximated dimensions to nearest one-eighth of an inch. These are intended to be used in comparing the different Crystolite stems to one another and are not to be taken as a guide for the height of a No. 5003 cordial, etc. Please remember, we are dealing with handmade glassware, therefore each piece can be expected to be slightly different. For example, eight (8) Crystolite goblets may range in height from 5 3/4" to 6".

Crystolite blown stems have simple, graceful lines that make for a somewhat plain but elegant appearance. The wide optic in the bowls sets off this elegance in each piece. These features, combined with Heisey's quality glass formulas, are surely responsible, if only in part, for the popularity that made this pattern a big seller for nineteen years.

All of these Crystolite stems, except the cordial, were produced by Heisey from 1938 to 1957 (nineteen years). The cordial was produced from 1944 to 1957 (thirteen years). You'd think they would be easy to find!

I have examples of each of the eight pieces with the Diamond H trademark pressed into the stem. Mostly the marks are very small and hard to find , especially in dim or artificial light, or have melted away in the fire polishing.

There is no reference in <u>Heisey</u>
<u>by Imperial</u> to Imperial having ever
made any of the Crystolite stems.

1. 10 oz. Goblet -

The goblet is of good medium proportion and weight. It feels good in use which makes drinking from it easy. It has a round full bowl which is not too high (4"). If you do not plan on buying all eight different shapes in this line the goblet is versatile enough for many uses. It is the second tallest of the eight Crystolite stems.

2. 3 1/2 oz. Claret -

The claret fits comfortably in the hand and is an appropriate size and shape for its intended use. I don't know any claret drinkers so I use mine for sherry. The shape is very similar to that of the goblet but of course the size is scaled down. It is the fourth tallest of the eight Crystolite stems.

3. 6 oz. Sherbet (Saucer Champagne) -

The sherbet's bowl is wide and shallow (2" high). It makes up more than one half of the total height. It is ideal for serving sherbet, of course, as well as fruit cocktail, pudding, etc. It is the fifth tallest of the eight Crystolite stems.

4. 3 1/2 oz. Cocktail -

The cocktail is the perfect serving piece for a Manhattan (who drinks Manhattans anymore?). I find it awkward to use but it was correct for its purpose. It has the same bowl height (1 3/4") and overall height (3 5/8") as the cordial. It is the sixth tallest of the eight Crystolite stems.

5. 1 oz. Cordial -

The cordial has, of course, the smallest bowl(1 3/4" high and only 1 1/2" dia.) and is the only fragile (thin) stem of the entire line. It is the only Crystolite stem in which the stem itself makes up the majority of its height. It has, by far, the most graceful lines and it is true elegance itself. It is the same height as the 3 1/2 oz. cocktail and so is also the sixth tallest of the eight Crystolite stems.

6. 3 1/2 oz. Oyster Cocktail -

The oyster cocktail has a bowl which is much deeper and more narrow than the 3 1/2 oz. cocktail. Its stem is much shorter, too. It is hardly more than the knob which is at the top of the preceding five stems. It appears to have the same bowl as on the claret but note the difference in the stem length. It is the seventh tallest (the shortest) of the eight Crystolite stems.

7. 5 oz. Footed Juice -

The footed juice has very vertical lines which make it slim and graceful. Its height is more than two and one half its diameter. It is perfect for a V-8 juice appetizer or an elegant orange juice. It is the third tallest of the eight Crystolite stems.

8. 12 oz. Footed Ice Tea -

The footed ice tea also has very vertical lines but is much taller and not nearly as slim as the footed juice. The stem, once again, is just the knob as in the oyster cocktail and the footed juice. It is, naturally, perfectly suited for ice tea or as a water goblet if you used your 10 oz. goblets for wine. It is the tallest of the eight Crystolite stems.



"The Pottery Man" has a #341 Old Williamsburg Crystal punch cup; the #1231 Ribbed Octagon hotel sugar in Flamingo; and, the steal of a century was eight (8) #1184 Yeoman 3 oz cocktails, diamond optic, in Crystal. These were purchased at a garage sale where all sorts of depression glass was priced at 'book' or more, but these gems! and marked to make the buy all the sweeter!! You see, the garage sales still hold many treasures. Don't go speeding by without stopping to take a look as who knows, there might be a 'tangerine' favor vase sitting on the hood of a car.

"The Cardinal" was chirping away the other day to tell the world that he found the #4163 beer mug with #467 Tally Ho silhouette etch, along with a #469 Hartman 9 oz goblet, optic, in Crystal.

"A Friend in Deed" came up with the #1540 Lariat champagne with Moonglo cut plus a cute little piglet. Again, let's not forget to mention an experimental item, namely the Dawn Swirl candleblock!*

At a recent meeting of the Bay State a member brought in a piece of Glastonbury Glass ** with the Moonglo cut, very interesting. Moonglo is found on Heisey's Lariat pattern.

"The Midnight Rider" (ma) had a dilemma when they discovered the #85 stand lamp with a Westminister base; how would they get it home? Believe me they didn't have that problem for very long. Also discovered was the #1185 Yeoman 10½" center handled sandwich tray with an unknown cutting along with an Imperial frosted #1 Madonna.

"The Wiz" displayed two (2) Wabash 12 oz footed sodas - holding up one you saw the Mayflower Pantograph etch - whoops, hers is the other - Pied Piper etch - magic!! He also has a #1401 Empress mint dish with the Normandie etch; the #341 Colonial water set, pitcher and six (6) tumblers, all marked.

"The Steadfast Colleague" has two #433 Greek Key flared sherbets, and a one-handled Fancy Loop jelly along with the Lariat pickle tray with Moonglo

"The Tradin Fools" found fifteen (15) pieces of #1205 Fancy Loop and five (5) pieces of #1201 Fandango. Included among the Fancy Loop were a creamer, covered sugar, spooner, and covered butter. All with good gold. Also, an 8" vase plus a salt bottle. In Fandango there was the hotel creamer and sugar, and the individual creamer and sugar with excellent gold.

"My Rebel Cousin" wants to boast about the #1469½ Ridgeleigh oval ash tray (without the holder); you can see this in Vogel Book III on page 108. Also, the #1506 Whirlpool 3½" violet vase seen in Vogel Book III page 124

As for "Yours Truly" - I have a #411 Rib and Panel sugar sifter; the insert for the Ipswich candlevase; a #1252 Twist oil in Moongleam and the #305 Punty and Diamond Point 8" vase.

For now, hope you all have good hunting, and come home with all sorts of good Heisey that you can write and tell me all about. I'll be watching my mailbox for your letters.

NORTHWEST HEISEY COLLECTORS

Northwest Heisey Collectors were invited by the Green River Depression Era Glass Club to have a "DISPLAY ONLY" table showing Heisey glass. After deciding on covered candy dishes, members searched their collections for the most unusual and rare items to be used in this show, held annually in Kent, Washington. The efforts were enjoyed by more than two thousand viewers commenting on the beauty of Aristocrat in Flamingo, Waverly in Cobalt, Flamingo & Moongleam (tall) Pleat & Panel, Tri-corner in Flamingo, various sizes of decorated pieces in Recessed Panel, three Crystolite with metal lids, a total of 24 in all. Flyers on the history of Heisey were available and membership information passed on to interested viewers. Gene Florence participated in the show by identifying glass for the public, selling

and autographing his books. Long lines kept him

busy for many hours.

The March meeting brought us together on the banks of the Green River in Auburn, Washington, at the home of Bill and Kathy Eytcheson. Just before meeting time our traditional wooden Heisey sign was placed out front. Moments later a man knocked at the door and asked if that sign meant the <u>House</u> was for sale. Real estate is booming in this area but this was a little too much. The meeting was brought to order by President, Mary LaPosa. A full house enjoyed the program on animals including such rare animals as a goose in Amber, bantam roosters in Amber and Crystal, a colt, horsehead, and seahorse stems in Crystal, Sultana and light Amber. 

Seeking his first term on the Board, Tom favors enhancement of the Endowment Fund, professional management of HCA and good communication between HCA and its club members.








She has been a voting member of HCA since 1976, and is a member of the Newark Diamond H Study Club.



NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGE TO THE CONSTITUTION OF HCA
