FROM THE ARCHIVES—YOU GOTTA KNOW THE TERRITORY

I hope you find the early correspondence as interesting as I do. Regardless, here is a second installment!

In 1924 A.H. Heisey was clearly in charge. Rod Irwin was selling for the firm, headquartered, I believe, in Kansas City. I would like to quote a letter from A.H. to Irwin in full. It lays out the territory a salesman was expected to cover in 1924. I particularly enjoy the second paragraph. Irwin is told: "...in routing yourself..." After the "suggestions" that follow I wonder at how much "routing yourself" he was able to accomplish!

Dear Sir:

As you no doubt heard our Mr. Whipple is going to make his headquarters in Los Angeles in the future, and insomuch as he will not work any farther east than Salt Lake City, it will be necessary for you to cover Denver and towns surrounding.

This will add to your territory, San Antonio, Houston, Galveston, New Orleans and Memphis, so in routing yourself for your next trip consider this additional territory.

We presume that you would want to work Missouri River towns from Kansas City, then to Omaha and from Omaha to Denver, covering towns between Omaha and Denver such as Grand Island, Hastings, Kearney, North Platte, etc. This should bring you into Greeley, Colo., and you should at this point cover Boulder and Fort Collins before reaching Denver.

From Denver you would naturally go to Colorado Springs, Pueblo and Trinidad, and we believe it would be an economical matter to go from Trinidad to Amarillo, Texas, then to Fort Worth and Dallas, covering towns such as Cleburne, Hillsboro, etc. on your way to Waco and Austin. From Austin, San Antonio would be next then Galveston, Houston, from Houston to New Orleans and Memphis, then back to Little Rock, and (either Ft. Smith, Ark) or Texarkana, Shreveport, Marshall, Texas, Mount Pleasant, Paris, and Sherman, then into your Oklahoma territory.

You might find it more convenient to avoid Ft. Smith from Little Rock and make this town from your Oklahoma territory. Or is it possible that you might be able to cover Ft. Smith in making Joplin from Ft. Scott, Kansas.

By making the territory as we have described it, would naturally leave the Kansas territory for the second trip, and insomuch as most of these Kansas towns are all small or medium size, we really believe it would be policy to leave them until such time as you had covered the larger ones.

This would still leave open your trip into smaller towns of Iowa and Missouri and Western Illinois.

The matter of making this territory as above described is our opinion of the route you should follow. Of course you being on the ground, may find it convenient to make some changes.

You note we have mentioned Amarillo, Texas. This has about twelve thousand people, and we believe you should stop over, if you go from Trinidad to Ft. Worth, inasmuch as it would only be one day's hotel bill to make the town.

There is a possibility that next season we may make a change in the Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota territory. If this is done we would naturally re-route your trip into this territory.

However, this is future consideration and we desire that you on your next trip, cover such towns as you have been making in Iowa and along the Mississippi river.

DEALING THE DEAL

I am writing this month about dealing in antiques, so the collectors among you might gain insight into what makes an antiques dealer tick and why we are the way we are—surly, penny pinching, money grabbers. This article is a primer in the name of education which, after all is the stated purpose of this column (no matter that I wasn't the one who stated it). Basically an antiques dealer's purpose is to buy low and sell high and convince his customer that he actually bought high and is selling low.

The toughest part of antiques dealing is finding merchandise to sell at a salable price. Once you overcome that hurdle you're on your way to becoming the most successful dealer that ever was. I can't give away the secret of where we find merchandise because I'm bound by the strict dealer code of silence (the last dealer who broke the code woke up with a broken Heisey horse head in his bed). I can, however, tell you where to look. As long as I'm not specific, I won't be drummed out of the corp.

The best way to stock a booth or shop is to inherit the goods. It helps if your relatives are named Heisey or Duncan (was there a Mr. Cambridge?). Better yet, a Tiffany name on the family tree will do wonders for your antiques business and insure instant wealth—assuming, of course, you weren't a black sheep. Inheritance is the ideal but many of us won't ever inherit and, if we do, the folks in my age group tend to inherit Depression glass more than anything else. Much of it is chipped, all of it depressing.

House sales used to be a prime source until professional house sale services got into the act. They price everything by the book—literally, and seldom leave anything to "discover." Garage sales were also once a major source of supply. If you get into this business one of the first things you'll find is that people who hold garage sales look familiar but you can't place them. Here's a way to jog your memory; picture the garage sale person standing upright while jotting notes into a small pad. There you have it—she was in your booth making note of prices.

Every once in awhile you'll gain insight into the grand scheme of the antiques business—the overall picture, so to speak. You grasp this concept once you see the very same piece you sold just last week sitting on a card table at a garage sale at twice your price. The little old lady holding the sale gives you a detailed history of the piece back to her great, great, great grandmother even as you scratch at the remnants of your own tag still clinging to it.

Of course there are always flea markets. Or at least there used to be. Flea markets have become antiques shows with sweatshirt and sock dealers. You *can* make a good find at a flea market but odds are you'll win your state's lottery first.

Other good sources are referrals. People will call and say, "I understand you deal in Heisey." You plead guilty and then they tell you that so and so told them to call you about some Heisey pieces they have. Nine times out of ten they're looking for an appraisal. The tenth caller is looking to dump his stuff. He'll say, "The book says..." and

then ask how much you'll pay. If he's been calling around you may have a shot at buying it below book—if not, the guy he calls last gets a shot at it.

Never make an offer, you may insult the seller—the seller should set the price. If you're pressed to make an offer—make it ridiculously low to make your point.

Hey, sometimes you get lucky.

Used to be we did most of our buying in antiques shops and at antiques shows. The disadvantage being you have to work with smaller margins when you resell unless the dealer you buy from is out of the loop. The big advantage of buying this way is there is less wear and tear on you—someone else has done the hunting and sorting through the maze of miserable house and garage sales.

Shows and shops are still our primary sources of supply but it's much easier now than it used to be. The advent of the antiques center has cut our travel time considerably. Enter just one center and you've visited at least fifty dealers.

It might be time at this point to tell you of the types of buyers one encounters in the antiques business but no one has that much time and the *Heisey News* doesn't have that much space. The good buyers are gems and then there are the others.

OK, maybe just one. There's the guy (substitute "lady" if you're an equal opportunity customer basher) who approaches to ask about the most expensive piece in your booth. Your heart quickens—this is the item you paid much too much for because you needed it to add class to your otherwise sorry merchandise. You give him a five minute two dollar spiel. He says, "Wow, isn't that something!" Your sales book, already at the ready, snaps shut when he adds, "I just paid two dollars for the same thing at a flea market!"

One of the toughest things you do as a dealer is sell to friends. Since most of the folks I deal with are friends, I'm in a constant state of angst. The problem is charging them for what they'd like to buy. That you'd do even better on a price than planned is a given. Announcing the discounted price in an apologetic tone doesn't help. If I had my druthers I'd **give** them whatever it was they wanted.

I don't, of course, I'm not stupid. I'm just tenderhearted, which also may explain why I'm not rich. It might explain my unbearable show floor headaches, too. It could be worse but, since I am talking about friends, most understand what it's all about and accept that you do what you gotta do and that does help ease the pain. You can't lower your price too much anyway, the tax man questions your honesty when you show too many losses.

By and large it's a fun business and I'd really enjoy it if it wasn't for the work involved. Oh, didn't I mention the endless record keeping, the intimidating tax reports, the constant cleaning and polishing, and the back breaking set up and breakdown at each show?

I didn't?

IN THE THICK OF IIT

Now is the time of year when a young man's fancy turns to love and every school teacher's to field trips. Translated, this means that during the months of April and May area schools are flocking into the Institute. Of course one of the largest draws is the HCA Glass Studio. It is here where children of all ages ooh and aah as the glass is produced and gasp from the unexpected heat of the furnace. Coupled with the tours of the Institute's galleries, students leave IIT with a better understanding of why industries, such as Heisey, were in Licking County and how industry affects them today. No matter how excited the students seem to be, the teachers seem to come away even more excited by the experience. Therefore the good word is traveling through the school systems like wildfire.

Contrasting all of the young faces are those of the construction workers. Yes, in spite of increased visitation we are still working on Phase II construction. Although construction delays have forced us to push back the opening of the second floor until mid-May, progress is still very apparent. We are nearing our first hurdle, which of course is the completion of the elevator, with a wrap-around staircase, in the central exhibit gallery. This will be followed by an annex building which will replace the current main entrance and then finally the completion of the second floor with exhibits and a classroom. Phase II is scheduled for completion by late Summer, 1998.

While we are all very excited by the prospects of Phase II, admittedly it is still in the not so near future. As we will have "an elevator to nowhere" for almost a year, we have invited the Shawnee Society of Model Railroaders to

create a temporary display for us. A local miniature railroad club, the Society is creating "The Newark & Western". A fourteen by twenty-four foot HO scale display, "The Newark & Western" will be housed in IIT's second floor until the end of December, 1997 and will depict scenes from Licking County during the 1950's to 1970's.

Of course the railroaders and the elevator will both be ready in time for the HCA Annual Convention in June. We invite you to come in and see the glassblowers in the studio and then take a few extra minutes to see the rest of the facility. I think you will be surprised at our progress and appreciate how well the HCA Glass Studio fits in to the building's atmosphere and further the Institute's mission. ♦

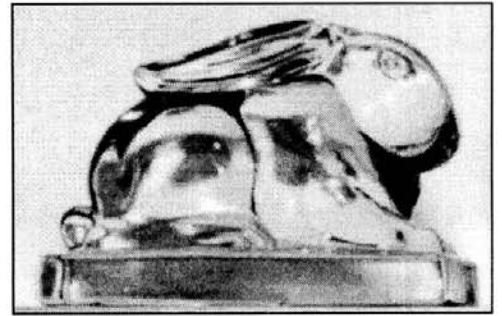

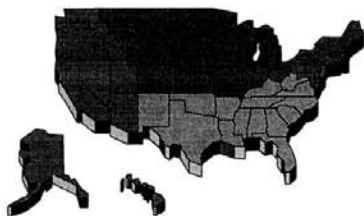

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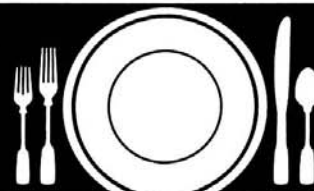
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
