

Please feel free to contact any of us or any Board Member with your ideas, comments and suggestion suggestions. One received shortly before Convention was a request to keep membership informed of Board action in greater detail than I have done in the past. I am taking this suggestion seriously and I also plan

to do some review of HCA policies during the course of my writing to you this year. New members will be better informed this way and older members will have an opportunity to refresh their recollections.

The next Quarterly HCA meeting will be in the state of Washington. I hope to see as many of you there as possible. ◆

But, I have to say I have a favorite piece that was placed on loan at the last minute.

Carl Sparacio told us all about his saga with the marble—my quest has involved a mold on view at the HCA Glass Studio. In preparing the exhibit at the studio I discovered a mold for the Plantation goblet, however, it's not the typical design. The mold has four raised pineapples on the bowl, an elusive piece not yet seen by anyone I've spoken to. Much to my excitement, a fantastic example fell into HCA's hands during convention week. On your next trip to the museum please stop and see this and all of the new and interesting pieces the museum has acquired.

finishes all business—current, pending and future, and we'll go home secure in the knowledge that we left the organization running like a top and will never need another board meeting.



In the afternoon I picked up my helpmate and went to Adena Hall at The Ohio State University to set up for the official HCA Glass Show. Show Chairman, Walter Ludwig, seemed to have everything under control so I spared him my advice and we went about the back breaking chore of set-up. Helen handled herself admirable. You'd be amazed at how much a woman can lift when you offer a little encouragement.

Work was cut short to allow us to freshen up for the first official function—the welcoming Wiener Roast. It was held at the Institute of Industrial Technology which houses the HCA Glass Studio.

The building expansion has opened up the second floor and that's where the Wiener Roast was held. Since Ohio weather in June is, at best, unpredictable (you can translate that as *lousy*, if you wish) this was a wise move. The food was good, fine picnic fare which even I couldn't botch up. The pies, though, were spectacular—and just as great

were all the Heisey lovers who bragged about their latest finds through hot dog stuffed faces. The pies, by-theway, were made by Beth Barker who has a very special touch when it comes to pastry.

glass set out to be auctioned was mind boggling and of exceptional quality. It was tempting, but I stayed out of the auction action in the other room as I made notes of a few pieces I might try to return for the next day.

Wednesday, for us, was a busy day. Our booth had to be finished and made to look spiffy for the Show Preview which was to begin at 5 p.m. that evening. Getting it ready was no small job but I did manage to sneak

away to the auction to bid on a piece for my brother. I got to witness the highlight of the entire auction—the bidding war over a tall Moongleam Aristocrat covered candy jar. it was a lovely piece and only if Jackie O's name was attached to it could it have fetched more money. I would have gone for it had not the opening bid started above my limit. It's what's called "separating the men from the boys."

The Show Preview opened on time with a rush of the Heisey faithful. It's a most exciting time because it's the first time I get to see many of the folks I look forward all year to meeting again. Sales were brisk and many old friends came over with warm greetings and to ask, "Aren't you What-is-name?"

There were too many unusual items on the show floor to list but a couple stand out in my mind—no. 1251 Unique (a name given by researchers) which are caviar or tidbit dishes struck me as the most unusual and even more so because they were in

He's calling it "Baylee" and will place it on view in the museum. With the show over at eight I couldn't decide which my body needed more—dinner or a comfortable bed. I suggested dinner in bed but Mrs. What-is-name would have none of that.

Included in the 1997 Display was "Easter with the Edwards" which featured a beautiful presentation of Crystolite. This place setting combined a Plantation stem with Ivy etch and "Ivy" china made by Franciscan China.

Thursday began so early I couldn't even dream of breakfast in bed. We had to be over to the I.D. Session by 8 a.m. If you've never been to an I.D. Session, believe me when I tell you it's a fun thing. Fortunately, they did serve breakfast. It was buffet style and it was particularly good. HCA members bring glass to the I.D. Session for a panel of


experts to identify—we got to see some unusual Heisey, the most striking was the base of a Puritan candy made into a vase and had prisms dangling from the turned down scallops. We also learned about some of the products of other glass companies. Every year I wait for one of the "experts" to goof and every year they manage



to prove they're smarter than me. No matter, I hissed and booed whenever they identified a piece, to the disappointment of its owner, as not Heisey.

It was back to the show floor for the afternoon but I soon left my helpmate to hold down the fort so I could check out the Heisey glass display in another building. The display this year departed from the format of previous years. There were still the individual displays set up by clubs and individuals around the perimeter of the room but in the center, where tables set in most of the Heisey colors used to be, were, instead, long tables showing single place settings of Heisey glass with china, pottery, silver and other accent pieces one might use to set a table. The idea was to show how Heisey can be useful and need not only be displayed. The point made was that a collection is more enjoyable if it's made use of. It was an education.

amazes me that so much is available in each category. A favorite display was a table set with Heisey's Winchester etched glasses together with pottery painted in a Winchester gun design.

A last minute shift of locations for the seminars threw me for a loop. I found the right building but I went in at the wrong level and wandered aimlessly. A young man stopped to ask if I was the financial officer. I apologized for not being him and asked if when he found him he would put in a word for me. When I reached the proper level I followed the buzz to where the seminar of Heisey's Royal Patterns: the two Queen Anns and Empress, was being held. The lecture hall filled quickly and, when the lights were dimmed, I dozed off. No, no, just kidding Joe! The seminar the next day was

on Crystolite. Both were excellent and informative and it's a good thing there was not yet another seminar to attend—my brain had reached education overload.

Thursday evening was what has become an annual affair—the Swap and Silent Auction at the Apple Tree location. This is lots of fun. Members who wish bring Heisey to swap with other members who also brought Heisey to swap. It's amazing how much swapping gets done when you consider that everybody wants to trade up. The Silent Auction is misnamed. It is anything but silent. The glass to be bid on is spread across a couple of tables with tally sheets for people to write in their ID number and the amount of their bid. Then bidders go around and raise your bid and you try to get another shot. This goes on until someone gets the last bid before the closing bell. My wife beat the system by writing in her top bid first instead of raising it by increments. She did very

well that way.

If I was unhappy about the I.D. Session starting at 8 a.m., you can imagine how thrilled I was about the annual meeting's starting time of 7 a.m. This time the Cherry Valley Lodge served a continental breakfast but it was impossible to tell which continent it came from—Bangladesh might be a good bet. Oh, well, they can't all be gems. We voted, dispensed with the minutes of the last meeting and heard reports from the treasurer and committee chairman and also held a raffle. The voting was a necessary ritual even though there were just five candidates running for five board positions. The vote to reduce the Board of Directors from 20 to 16 held a lot more suspense as the outcome could not be predicted. You'll undoubtedly read about it elsewhere.



A delicious meal followed by a talented ventriloquist and his dummy and they were, in turn, followed by another dummy who introduced President Tom Bischoff who capped the convention with some witty and well chosen words.



FROM THE ARCHIVES—THE HOSTELRIES SERIES

DON VALDES

Last month I made a promise. Well, actually it was only a few minutes ago. I'm getting ahead in my column writing! The thought occurred to me that you might like to see the recipes the Heisey company included in the "Famous Hostelries" series, thereby adding a bit of spice (pun intended) to From the Archives.

As I noted last month, in March and April of 1926 Heisey began the first of a series of recipes in House Beautiful, House and Garden, National Geographic and Good Housekeeping. The copy preceding the recipe states:

Jashion Decrees GLASSWARE for the Jable Whether it be when you serve that long-looked-for fish dinner, celebrating his triumphant return from waters where the Bass were big, bold and baffling-or no matter what the occasion-fashion decrees glassware for the table.

Try this delicious recipe: Black Bass Palmer from a famous American hostelry. Courtesy Chef E. E. Amiet, Palmer House, Chicago.

Scale. Trim off fins of a three pound Black Bass. Wipe thoroughly. Cut in julienne two fresh mushrooms, a carrot, a few branches of celery. Place in a sauté pan with two ounces of butter and cook slowly for about five minutes. Lay Bass on top, season with salt and pepper, add two gills* of hot tomato sauce and juice of one lemon. Cover this with buttered paper. Boil about five minutes on top of range, then set in slow oven for 25 minutes. Remove from oven, take off paper and dress Bass on a hot dish. Give sauce one more boil, pour it over fish and sprinkle a few chopped chives over top. Serve.

The fish theme continues with the May and June ads in the previous magazines plus Vogue.

His THRILL is no Greater than YOURS

The exhilaration of the great outdoors-the breath of the open air-the utter freedom of the vast solitudes-the sudden strike-the spinning reel-the glorious battle-and the victory! To him there is no thrill to match this.

And to you there is no greater thrill than knowing that your table is perfectly appointed when he returns from the trout streams-and on every occasion when faultless hospitality is your deepest desire.

My, that sounds sexist! The recipe: Trout au four Davenpor By Edward Mathieu, Chef de Cuisine, Davenport Hotel, Spokane

Have trout fresh and well cleaned. Put in buttered gratin dish, add salt, pepper, fresh butter, lemon slice, fresh mushrooms and chopped shallots. Cover with chicken or beef broth, boil on top of range and finish cooking in the oven for twenty-five minutes. Take liquid out of pan and make sauce as follows: Flour, yolks of egg, chopped chives (or parsley) mixed well with a fork. Add slowly to fish broth to boiling point until the right creamy thickness. Stir well but don't allow to boil. Pour over the trout and serve immediately, finishing the sauce with a good size piece of fresh butter.

According to Sandra Stout the third in the series appeared only in the July and August issues House and Garden and House Beautiful. One wonders about the success of the first two recipes!

Sorry, I can't give you this one! It isn't that the recipe is secret - it is just that we have no decipherable copy of the ad. Should any one out there like to make a contribution to the archives, here is something we need. I have tried enlarging page 237 Heisey on Parade but alas, to no avail. Again, according to Ms. Stout, it appeared in July 1926 House Beautiful and August of the same year in Home (sic) and Garden.

We have a bit of better luck with the next in the series, When Duck Days are Here. Not only do we have a copy but it is a 19" by 28" poster size proof. Even these tired old eyes can read this one.

When Duck Days are Here

The hush of dawn-mist floating over the lonely lake—the flight of the mallard or canvasback-only dog and gun to share the spirit of the sport.

Then take the duck dinner—the magic touch of the inspired hostess-the glow and sparkle of fine glassware. What a tumult of joy duck days bring!

Here is the recipe: Long Island duck Bigarade By Anthony Giacofci, Chef, The New Willard Hotel, Washington, D. C.

Take one five-pound duckling and prepare for roasting. Roast for forty minutes in quick oven; baste well while cooking. When done take from oven and cut in ten pieces, six from breast and two from each leg. Add a spoonful of currant jelly to a pint of brown sauce from duckling. Cut julienne the rind of two oranges and one lemon. Partly boil in sauce; then add juice of one orange. Put sauce over duckling and boil in sauce pan fifteen minutes. Serve in platter decorated with quarter oranges.

The last of the series is also taken from the poster size proof for the November issues of House Beautiful and National Geographic, also the December issues of House and Garden and Good Housekeeping. Perhaps you remember it from our Heisey advertising exhibit two summers ago. It illustrates how times have changed. Today it would be regarded racist as well as sexist. Here goes:

In Golden Autumn Time

The gently whispering leaves of autumn are resplendent in their gorgeous golds and purples and reds. In this subtle background of the fall months the Quail hunter's joy mounts to its highest peak of the whole year.

And for the hostess, a season made memorable by happy guests, beautiful tables, the infinite charm of fine glassware.

An Old Southern Recipe for Quail
When Bacon, a distinguished-looking old darkey, presided over the cuisine of the Peabody Hotel at Memphis, it was famed for smothered quail on toast. Game laws now forbid public serving of quail, but this recipe survives in the possession of a charming Southern hostess:



Keep the birds cool and dry several days. Dress without wetting. Split down the back. Wipe with dry cloth. Heat deep iron skillet and grease with garlic pod. Have enough water to keep birds from sticking. Pin in bay leaf, lump of butter, pinch of salt and sprinkle black pepper. Put slice of bacon on each bird and place breast downward in skillet. Cover and weigh down. Cook 12 to 18 minutes, replenishing water to hold flavor. Stir in chopped mushrooms. Serve on platter with buttered toast. Pour mushroom gravy, apple jelly, pones of "cracklin" bread and black coffee.

* This is irresistible. "...two gills," says Chef Amiet. Why did he not say, "1 cup?" Clearly his sense of humor matches mine. ◆

HEISEY CANDLESTICKS—EVOLUTION OF A DESIGN PART II

Last month we began a discussion of a "family" of candlesticks which all evolved from one basic design which, with minor variations, became the inspiration for five different candlesticks. The first of these was the no. 100 Centennial, followed by the no. 103

Cupped Saucer footed candlestick.

No. 100 Centennial

The third variation, the no. 105 Pembroke candlestick is basically identical to the no. 100 candlestick, but with a wide lip added. It is also rather unusual in that instead of having a removable bobeche to hold the prisms, as most of Heisey's candelabra did, it has this extra wide lip instead, from which the prisms were hung. Although generally always seen with prisms, the no. 105's were also pictured in catalog 109 as candlesticks (that is, without prisms). It is not known whether the holes for the prisms were produced in the mold, in which case the candlestick would have a series of indentations around its rim, or whether the holes were added after it was removed from the mold.

The no. 105 was made first in a 9-inch size in May 1924. It wasn't until almost a year later in March 1925 that a 7-inch size was also introduced. Both sizes seem to have been quite popular and remained in production until the

early thirties. However, they are not particularly easy to find today and, as was sometimes the case during these years, are a little more common in Moongleam than they are in either Flamingo or Crystal.


No. 103 Cupped Saucer and No. 106 Inverted Saucer



Most commonly they are found with either "A" or "C" prisms. However, in a booklet entitled Gifts of Glassware which Heisey put out around 1930, the no. 105 candelabra were shown with tear drop prisms, which were available in a choice of either amethyst, amber, blue or crystal. The example in the accompanying photograph, which pictures the 7-inch height, has these prisms.

The no. 105 candelabra are generally marked in the constriction just underneath the candleholder.

In January 1925, over two and a half years after production on the no. 103 Cupped Saucer candlestick had commenced, it was redesigned by turning the foot down and a new pattern number was assigned to it, no. 106 Inverted Saucer, making it the fourth



candlestick in the little "family". (There were two other instances when Heisey made the same candlestick with two different treatments to the foot—no. 109 and no. 1559—but this is the only time that they actually assigned a different pattern number to the variant form. Presumably this was done for the sake of clarity in ordering, two numbers being the most reliable way of differentiating between the two styles.)

According to the available turn books, the no. 106 was made in somewhat lesser quantities than the no. 103. (For instance, only 3,000 of the no. 106's were made in 1925 and 1926, compared with 6,300 of the no. 103's made during the same time period.) Besides being made in Crystal and Flamingo, the no. 106 was also produced in Moongleam, a color for which we have no listing for the no. 103.


No. 108 Three Ring

And finally, the no. 108 Three Ring candlestick is yet another reworking of the no. 100 design, with three rings added to the center column. Of the five candlesticks in this little

"family", the no. 108 is by far the most difficult to find and, according to the turn books, this seems to be because it was only produced in very limited quantities. (213 were made in 1925 and none at all in 1926; there are no records available for the following years, but is seems likely that very few more were made, if any, before its final listing in catalog 109 in 1929.)

Somewhat surprisingly, considering the period during which it was made, the no. 108 seems to have been produced only in Crystal. Like the no. 100, it is marked at the top of the column. However, it was made in a 7-inch height only.

All of these candlesticks were discontinued sometime after 1929, except for the no. 105's which continued to be offered until 1933 or 1934. None of them have been reissued by Imperial, nor is it likely that nay of these molds are still in existence.
