

# FROM THE ARCHIVES—HISTORY AMONG HEISEY

While going over the contents of that big filing cabinet chuck full of letters, nine tenths of which I had never seen before, I came across a folder labeled salesmen. Sure enough, there, inside, were letters to salesmen circa 1947. The thrust of each of them was to show the sales personnel what local advertising was taking place, most of it with a

patriotic tone. Much as I love to read T. Clarence's letters, I do stray to other pages and articles in the paper. The Sept. 29th Newark Advocate had a few goodies. Let's see if any of you remembers:

Mrs. Brian Donlevy, 34, the former singer Marjorie Lane...testified that her former husband tricked her into an affair with another man... *Remember those two?* 

One of the lead headlines in the same issue states:

MACHINE GUN BANDITS RAID
PAINSVILLE GAMING HOUSE

...Mary Healy, a singer, and her husband, comedian Peter-Lind Hayes, were giving a performance when the gang burst into the club. The tall leader shouted; "That's all, boys. This is a stickup."

Customers thought this was part of the Healy-Hayes act, and Miss Healy turned to the gunman and said: "If you are going to misbehave I'll have to ask you to leave."

It didn't work and the twelve bandits made off with an approximate \$200,000.

Finally, from the "Bulletins" column:

**WASHINGTON**, Sept. 29, AP—The United States today demanded Russia disavow a Soviet writer's article comparing President Truman with Adolph Hitler and Moscow flatly rejected the American protest.

A bit deeper into the drawer I came across the folder, "Salesman's Letters-Woelfel 1945." Someday I, or my successor, will have to


correlate the correspondence I did very early on in my Heisey career with some of the correspondence I am finding lately. It wasn't altogether then (and, I might add, I don't have it altogether now)! Since we are using a different computer program from the one we used earlier, there is some adjusting to do. Be that as it may, the letters between Conrad Woelfel (manager of the Chicago office) and T.C. are of the same playful nature as were so many of those previously found and reported upon. Of course, I continue to chuckle over the way war-time shortages and the accompanying rationing (and black market) were handled by the ordinary citizen. Although a tea totaler and not concerned with the alcoholic beverage shortage, my own law-abiding father showed some creative

Both Waverly stemware and the Rooster Stem Cocktail were introduced around 1947.




Like Plantation. Crystolite was very popular among Heisey customers.

ingenuity in procuring various hard to get items. That there was mention of the scotch shortage in T.C.'s correspondence with Woelfel came as no surprise. If you recall from one of my earlier articles there were some very friendly notes exchanged with a friend, Fletcher Neal of Omaha regarding not only scotch but tires as well. Amid subjects such as the protective tariff, good customers (and bad) and hot selling items is this series<sup>1</sup>:<sup>1</sup>



Dear Clarence:

... That little guy in the News Department at the Mart, is just about the only boy around this town that has chewing gum and cigarettes available to his friends. Of course he is always holding out both hands and saying "Hello Uncle" I believe if we could send him 8 Crystolite Goblets and 8 Crystolite Sherbets and 8 Cocktails in same pattern (emphasis mine) it won't do us any harm in getting a future supply on these precious things called cigarettes and also gum. If you would like to send him that, I don't think I will have any trouble securing these much wanted items and if I can send Mrs. Heisey a carton of cigarettes from time to time, I will be only too happy to do so.



As you might suppose, T.C. is not red hot on this deal:

February 26, 1945

Dear Conrad:

... As to Jack Brusso, send him a pair of fish bookends. Crystolite Goblets are just out at this time.




The Crystolite matter seems to have been dropped by the time of the next letter.

February 26th., 1945

Dear Clarence:

...Under separate mail I am sending you two cartons of Beech Nut Spearmint, and I trust you will like these which I was lucky enough to get through our

friend on the second floor. In your leisure you can send me \$2.00 if you wish, I am sending the cartons of gum to your home address.

The great chewing gum caper was followed by a letter including this paragraph:



March 1, 1945

Dear Conrad:

...We are getting down to brass tacks on my keen spittin, (sic) so I look forward to receiving the chewing gum under separate cover at 372. Enclosed is \$2.00 to take care of Mr. Beechnut...

By the 16<sup>th</sup> of May cigarette and chewing gum cravings must have been suppressed.

Dear Conrad:

I want to thank you very much for that Blending Oil you sent us. It surely had a dash of the old heather. After drinking the Civet Cat Special we get here it was most refreshing. We are deeply grateful for your consideration. But please remember we do not want you to plunder your own private stock—your tonsils need as much of that kind of oil as do mine and it does not make any difference if I get any or not.

So much for that folder. Let's see what we find for next month. ◆



# DIAMOND BAND STEMWARE


Diamond Band is somewhat of a mystery pattern—there is little known about it. The goblet has been a subject of controversy but we'll deal with that after we pin down what we've been able to piece together about no. 423 Diamond Band.

I can say without fear of contradiction that Diamond Band is a rare pattern. How about that for raw coverage? Over the years I've found a set of nappies as well as the cover for a sugar bowl. I did see a coverless sugar bowl in less than pristine condition at a show but it was priced ridiculously high for what it was, chipped, sans cover and without a creamer. My cover remains bottomless. I had a punch cup at one time and I saw an egg cup a couple of times. I've also seen the jug and the goblet at the museum. There you have the sum total of my Diamond Band encounters in more than twenty years of Heisey hunting. Embarrassing, isn't it?



Diamond Band is a pleasing pattern and the glass (we experts usually say "metal" but I'm

talking down to your now) is bright and clear. In the February 1979 issue of the *Heisey News* this pattern is noted briefly and twenty items are listed. It mentions that "Diamond Band is not an original name..." this may be so, but I've not heard it before so it sounds original to me. If they had called it "Candlewick", then I'd agree that it lacked originality.



Later, in the *Heisey News* of March 1981, Tom Bredehoft did a bit on no. 423 Diamond Band in his column on tumblers. In his research he dug up a circa 1910 price list (no. 155) which listed only the punch cup. Isn't that weird? No reflection on Tom, of course.

Vogel's books contribute little more than conjecture, but he also mentions a copy of the no. 155 price list. His copy listed five items, one of which was a footed ale which I'd like to see.

So, what have we learned so far? We've learned that Heisey collectors might want to try for a complete set of no. 155 price lists.

Since this is a stem article, we'll skip on to the goblet, a piece that has presented a problem of sorts. I know of only one genuine Diamond Band goblet and that one is in the National Heisey Glass Museum, sometimes affectionately known by its nickname,

The Heisey Museum. You would think that a goblet in this pattern would be simple to identify, but there are problems. A few other Diamond Band goblets, all guaranteed to have come out of THE Heisey home, are making the rounds at rather stiff prices and, near as I can tell, they are pretenders to the throne.



"Egads!" and "Gadzooks?" you exclaim, "How can this be? A Heisey pattern out of THE Heisey home and not genuine Heisey?" Alas, my friends, it's true and you are indeed fortunate to have an expert to set you straight. A usually reliable source has reported a look-alike Diamond Band goblet identical to those reputedly out of the Heisey home and it was signed "Val St. Lambert", the fine French glass concern, though I've not seen one signed. There are obvious differences between the Diamond Band goblet in the museum and those believed to be French.

Somebody copied from somebody. A lot of that goes on in the glass business. We will not cast aspersions but we do know who's glasses were found in whose house, don't we.

I wrote to Val St. Lambert but have not received a response. I would have called France but my French is limited to, "Ou est la salle de bain", which I learned at the World's Fair up in Quebec in the sixties. Not much sense calling to ask the location of a bathroom, I can't afford to visit.

For all their apparent similarity, the goblet in the museum which is 100% pressed and has a large Diamond H under it's foot, is quite different from those said to be out of the Heisey home. The latter are unsigned and all of the design elements are cut. The glass, too, is more brilliant than Heisey's and the diamonds are a bit smaller as are the flutes. Nor do the number of flutes match. I counted 15 on the signed Heisey goblet and only 14 on brand X.

The drawings included here are not precise. They were sketched by a very shaky hand but they do show size and differences. If I could draw fuzzy they would look better. There can be no doubt that these goblets did not come out of the same mold. The bowl on the one that may be Val St. Lambert is not as deep and consequently the goblet appears shorter though both goblets are actually the same height.

The good news is I did get a Diamond Band goblet for my collection. It was bought at a June HCA Convention show. The bad news is that mine is unsigned, it is cut, it has a star bottom, small diamonds, fourteen short flutes on a short bowl and was very expensive.

I wish I had known an expert. •


# New Collector, Arizona

"I have several pieces of Heisey which are an odd shade of purple. I've not seen this color before and I've checked all the books available. Do you have any idea what they might be?"



First, rule out Hawthorne and Flamingo. And then rule out Alexandrite. All three are very pronounced colors and easily recognizable. The pieces are most likely sun-purpled glass. Items left on a window sill or another area bathed in sunlight will, over time, acquire a purplish tint. This is a fairly common question we are asked, and the unknowing collector usually suspect they have a rare piece of Heisey.

Upon hearing the answer, the woman was quite surprised. Ironically, she said she knew of a woman in Arizona who purposely left pieces on her roof for days on end so they would acquire the purple color! Further, she said she knew of people who only collected that color.



# Collector in New York:


"I have a tall stemmed piece, similar to a goblet or compote. Although not stamped with the diamond H, instead it is marked KrysTol. Any ideas?"

This piece was produced by the Ohio Flint Glass Company, also known as the Jefferson Glass Company and Central Glass Works in subsequent years. Additional common glass trademarks often confused with Heisey include the Illinois Glass Company, Hazel Atlas, and even Anchor Hocking.

# Email question:

"I recently discovered something that I think very unusual. Recently while antiquing I came across a few pieces of Heisey glass stamped with a British Registry number. I have never seen this before."

Finding a British Registry number on an American produced product is not too unusual. At one point, Heisey sold some of their glassware overseas in England. In order to protect the design, the company had to file for the British Regulation number and stamp it on the glassware. Heisey simply followed the same procedure as if they were acquiring a United States patent. The registry number is most often found on the earliest patterns, namely the no. 300 peerless pattern.

# A GREAT TIME IN SEATTLE





# INTERVIEW, PART III—FRED BOSWORTH HEISEY PERSONALITIES

You've asked me to speak on any of the top executives I might know or could reminisce about, and of course the first one, when you mention the Heisey Company is Clarence—Clarence Heisey—T. Clarence Heisey. After about five years in the retail china and glassware field, I decided to switch to the other side of the fence, selling those products to the retail stores. A vacancy had appeared in the Heisey sales force in

April, 1937, which I applied for. I met with Rod Irwin in New York and was tentatively hired, subject to the approval of Mr. T. Clarence Heisey. An interview was arranged at the factory and early in May I boarded the sleeper from Penn Station—arrival at Newark was very early in the morning.

As I was the only person to get off the train a gentleman approached me on the platform, stuck out his hand and said "I'm Clarence Heisey, are you Fred Bosworth?" That meeting always impressed me as typical of Clarence's courtesy and thoughtfulness. Here was the head of an important glass house at the station at 5:00 a.m. to receive personally an unimportant young man seeking a



job. We went to the Worden Hotel, a lovely old building on a beautiful square, and we went to work on a man-sized breakfast. I don't remember all we talked about, but I recall very vividly that I soon found out that he was a red hot Amherst College alumnus. As he knew from my resume that I had attended Wesleyan University in Connecticut, a member of the little Tree of Amherst, Williams and Wesleyan, we soon found a lot to talk about of old college days. When the breakfast was finished, and I went out to the factory, I had a firm feeling that I was the newest member of the Heisey family.

It was the beginning of a long and friendly relationship between Clarence and me. He's been called dogmatic and stubborn by many factory people, but I always found that he

would listen to a person's opinion, no matter how much he might disagree with it, and he always admired one who stuck to his guns. Clarence had some idiosyncrasies that used to amuse me. He couldn't stand being called Mr. Heisey. He often said, "I'd rather be called an S.O.B. than Heisey!" He'd even go so far as to write it down for the stranger—"HI-C". So to you Heisey collectors, remember to call it HI-C; it shows you are *really* in the club!

Often he was called Tim by his old friends and I suppose his family, but for those of us at the factory, he was always Clarence. Tim was a definite no-no. During my later years at the factory, after World War II, Clarence became very interested in the National Manufacturers'

Association. He always came to New York for their conventions, and Joe Lower and I used to attend meetings with him. I got to know Clarence best at this time. He loved New York City, particularly the fine restaurants. One of his favorites was Jansens at Grand Central Terminal and he was very welcome there. One of our calls would be to Selkas, the fine neckwear store on the avenue. He used to buy a tie for every executive and foreman at the factory, including Joe and me. They were very expensive, about \$8 each as I recall. I believe my own neckties were in the \$1.50 to \$4.00 range. He loved to go into Altman's, Bloomingdale's, Tiffany's where he received a lot of attention due T.C. Heisey and group to the fact that he was the head of a most prestigious glassware line. He really enjoyed these favors as who would not. Clarence Heisey was truly a gentleman of what we now like to call the old school. He represented a breed that is long gone from the business world today.

observing work at the factory.

The executive that I most worked with was Rodnev C. Irwin. Rod Irwin was a most happy fellow and one who really knew the territory to guote the Music Man. He came out of Missouri or Kansas and joined Heisey about 1915. He fought in the famous Rainbow Division and lived to talk about his experiences in World War I. He was the best sales manager I ever worked for, and I've worked for a lot of them in my 50 years in the industry. One of Rod's attributes was that he had been a salesman for many years. He knows all the tricks that a salesman was liable to



do, such as, well, skipping a town where he didn't have an account and dashing on to the next one where he knew an easy order awaited him. Of course, the proper thing was to really work the losing town to try to develop an account there. How else can a line grow?

Rod could look at a map and analyze your sales and quickly sense what you were doing wrong. He also was the only sales manager to keep track of the business that a salesman set for himself and a separate track of the orders that came in from the stores directly. It was very hard for a young salesman with lots of problems of this nature to fool him.

It was during the depression that he came into his own. He devised what he called "Heisey sections". He set up a plan where a major store such as Marshall Fields or Bloomingdale's or Altman's would create a complete Heisey section with usually a separate department number so that sales and orders would come through no matter how the rest of the department was doing. We had the very top stores in the USA featuring Heisey crystal, about sixteen of them at the peak, I believe. I would venture an estimate that better than 40% of our total business came from these stores.

The great concession that Rod gave to these stores was a Heisey trained woman who was paid by Heisey. While obeying the store rules, of course, she responded to the instruction of the Heisey salesman as to display stock control, training of the department sales people and so forth. The stores just ate this whole idea up. At least two of these women are still in stores, Verna Fonda, a Heisey girl who is now an executive of Bloomingdale's and Denise (I can't remember her last name!) who still does this same work at Altman's, New York, working now for Waterford Crystal.

When World War II came along, Rod was prepared by his earlier experiences. He once told me that when he came out of the army in 1918, his job was to go through the territory, canceling every order he could. I laughed it off as another exaggeration, but by 1942 I realized he was only too right. Every European and Japanese source of china and glass had dried up, and our own labor force was severely curtailed. We actually had so many orders that there were boxes of them lying around unopened.

Rod set up a quota system that worked extremely well. He took our 1940 business and gave each store its fair share according to that years purchases. In other terms, if the factory shipped 110% or its 1940 sales to you as a customer, you received 110% of your 1940 purchases in two shipments, fall and spring. Of course, we manufactured our


most easily produced items. There were a lot of Crystolite torte plates and bowls and figurines shipped, I assure you. The stores just accepted the shipments and howled for more.

While the above seems simple, it really was not. Big stores whom we had never sold, like Sears and other catalog houses, shook many dollars under our noses, but Clarence and Rod never wavered. Most of our competitors took the quick money and forgot the small stores but we did not. When I started traveling again around 1950, I never heard a complaint about A.H. Heisey's treatment of their small customers in World War II. Handsome, smooth, a hard worker, crazy about poker, crazy about golf, Rod was the old time sales manager with the emphasis on sales. I know because he was like a father to me.

It's very easy to talk about Rod and Clarence, but when you bring up the subject of Wilson Heisey, that becomes a lot more difficult. Wilson was a very withdrawn person, at least with causal people like myself. I don't think—no, I won't even say that—I'll say I'm sure that I never had a one-on-one

conversation with Mr. Wilson Heisey. He was at the factory, he ran the hot end of the factory—the manufacturing end—and was reputed to be an outstanding glass man. But as far as outgoing personality was concerned, I really didn't know him. And probably it was because I hadn't been with the factory all that long. He, I am sure, was much friendlier with older salesmen. In fact, Joe Lower, who was not that much older than me but who had been at the factory many years before me, he got along with Wils, as he called him, very well. He was not the type of man you would send out on a public relations drive, though the scuttlebutt at the factory always was that the factory employees loved Wilson and tolerated Clarence. And you can tell from my previous remarks, I didn't agree with these sentiments. •


