Glass tip: Cleaning glass.... When or if you find Heisey in the wild most of it is dirty from sitting around for years in a cabinet somewhere. I first wash it in warm soapy water and dry it with a lint free cloth. When I am at a show where water is not available I use a glass cleaner like Windex or Glass-plus. The Museum has a spray cleaner called Hi-Sheen which makes the glass sparkle and shine.

The highly anticipated "Build Your Best Heisey" contest was a highlight of the Celebration as members got to show off glass from their collection. Chris and Becky Gallagher had a display of table sets and cream & sugar sets. Elaine Hart showed the "Colors of Heisey" from early to late. Earle Hart had a table full of decanters including some individual ones. Emogene Hardy showed some of her candy dishes. Frachele Scott showed many Heisey animals. Michele Scott had a display of Heisey glass in color. Frank Scott had a table of cocktail shakers and another table of jugs, pitchers and tankards. Jaime Robinson showed decorated Heisey with corresponding decorated china settings. Carolyn Crozier and Sally Abrams had a refreshments table of cake salvers filled with sweets. Ed and Virginia Perva showed a part of their Heisey lighting collection. Bob and Pat Moreno showed a beautiful array of Heisey items.

Judging of the 'Build Your Best Heisey' tables was by Greensboro Mayor, Nancy Vaughan: City Councilwoman, Nancy Hoffmann, and Preservation Greensboro Director, Benjamin Briggs. Judging criteria which was unknown to participants until the banquet were: (A) Completeness and best use of space, (B) Theme originality, (C) Visual Impact, (D) Craftsmanship – How well is display put together, (E) Judges Choice and discretion.

There was a tie 3-way for 3rd place: Ed & Virginia Perva, Heisey Lighting; Frank Scott, Heisey Pitchers, Jugs and Tankards; and Carolyn Crozier & Sally Abrams, Birthday Sweets. "Best in Show" and 1st place went to Michele Scott for her display of "Heisey Colors". 2nd place went to Frank Scott for his "End of Prohibition" Heisey cocktail shakers display.

The Celebration Banquet, which was held at the Charlotte Hawkins Brown Museum, was preceded by a donated cocktail hour featuring North Carolina sourced wines. The meal entrée was Asian pork medallion and salmon with apple pie for dessert. Following the great meal, Jack Burriss, HCA Museum Director and Curator, brought greetings and a report from Newark, Ohio and HCA. The NCHSG was glad to hear that the Arts and Craft style clock which they donated during Convention had been hung in the library. His report was well received and enlightening. Afterward, there was a recognition of our guests from Ohio, Massachusetts, Alabama and Georgia.



I have been asked by several members to share our experience of the Heisey Factory Tour, taken during the 2016 National Convention. What a great opportunity for collectors and those interested in Newark's history. The tour was offered for bid in the Silent Auction at the Museum and the live auction at the Banquet. Winning Bidders received a tour book of copied original factory photos to accompany them while walking the Heisey Factory. This tour book allowed participants to visualize the "Then and Now" of the factory. The tour was limited to 10 individuals and raised nearly \$500 for the Museum. Ask anyone who attended the Private Tour and they would tell you it was a wonderful time and well worth the donation.

First, I want to thank the business and family who owns the former Heisey Factory and Complex. The Hill Family, owners of Contour Forming, Terri and Traci Hill have been very courteous and welcoming to my questions, and they personally made this tour available. Thank you both!



We started the tour at 9 a.m. Sunday, June 19 (Father's Day) at the Heisey factory office building and showroom (the small white house in front of the factory). Owner, Traci Hill guided us through the building. The owners have used this building as a rental to help with the costs of the upkeep and preservation of the building. Therefore, changes have been made to keep the building intact, but many things still remain the same as they were in the days the factory was active.

Now, it appears to be a charming old house, but this building was built to serve as the office and showroom for Heisey. As we walked into the lobby, or foyer area, there are Holophane retro shades still in use from when the building was a rented space in the 1960s. To the immediate left is where T. Clarence Heisey's office was laid out. It is a beautiful room which features hewed beams across the ceiling. The beams are still marked with carved diamond H's in the joining (woodwork). Also featured in the room are two, built-in, glass-doored curio cabinets that in their day I am sure held wonderful glass items. Between the cabinets is a fireplace and mantel. Beneath the left curio is a disguised door that opens to a small holding area for firewood, this allowed firewood to be passed through instead of carrying it into the


office. The room also has a separate, private entry way and small bathroom. In this office T. Clarence Heisey made many important decisions that affected the future of the Heisey Company.


In addition to the office there are many rooms decorated with beautiful, white paneled walls and arched doorways. It must have been a very lavish space in its day as its charm could still be felt in it's empty rooms. Near the back of one of the offices, Traci showed us that there is still a Heisey safe hidden by a closet door. I have heard stories from former employees who have said that Heisey paid employees in cash. It would seem that the in-house safe supports the story; in addition the current owners, Terri and Traci, validated that the story is true. It wasn't until the 1940's and 1950s that they started issuing payroll checks. The payroll office was at the back of the office building and employees could walk up to receive their pay. Several tour participants took turns standing at the backdoor of this building to take a look at the factory.

Next our tour guide, Traci, took us up a steep stairwell to the original Heisey showroom. The showroom was

my favorite room on the tour. As you climb the stairs to the second story you are taken back in time to where all Heisey items would have been displayed to allow commercial buyers and salesmen to view the Heisey products available. This was not an area that the public would have had access to, instead this was the room where orders would have been placed for a large shipment to retailers, or where salesmen were trained on the product. Large mirrored top tables scattered the room - these are still in place today. Heisey electric shades were hanging from the ceiling and tucked away in the corner there was a small utility sink. The sink is where ALL the items were cleaned and dipped in a bucket of glycerin so that they "sparkled and shined".

The bead board, walls, and ceilings are still intact and the built-in spindle shelves that held the glass, still surround the





From there we headed to the oldest of the factory buildings which was built in 1895. The brick and stone (fireproof) building still has the original furnace and in it is an "un-annealed, 8' x 10' tall, batch of glass which still glistens under the bricks and soot. The buildings have Roman arch ceilings that are strong and supportive, but also fireproof. We left the furnace area and went to the main floor of the factory (the second level). The space is all open and all three buildings, although built in different time periods and built with different materials (concrete and masonry block for the newer buildings), are all connected in one uniform space. They built the three buildings to be consistent with the first one. As we walked into the wide open area we saw a table full of Heisey items and we would soon discover that the owners had saved and preserved a number of Heisey memories; employee checks, photos of employees and factory buildings, company stocks, and wooden mold carvings of machine parts. There were a few other items in the room like a large cullet of glass still sitting in the middle of the last furnace building, this "piece" of glass was about 3' x 3' and was dark in color. Gaging by the timing of the production, it is most likely a large piece of Dawn.

We looked around in the factory space for awhile, the lines are still visible where the main furnace/smokestacks were, as well as the smaller furnaces or "glory holes". As explained by factory workers in the radio commercials we had restored, and play at the Museum, the Glory Hole was called this because it's heat was much less intense and therefore much more "glorious". We viewed the large open Hot Shop (as it would have been called during Heisey production days), and marveled at the shear size of the main floor.



As we continued our journey back through the factory we realized that we were traveling in the same path that the glass did as it left the factory so many years ago. Leaving the Hot Shop, we walked back to where the annealing ovens would have been. From the original photos we had in our book, it was very clear to see exactly how large they had been and how many there really were. After this we came to several different rooms that were all wooden construction as the glass in production was cooled by this point so there was no risk of fire. Massive trees served as the

support system beams, and you could see the difference in the size of the beams as we continued back into the plant but closer in time, if you will. The larger trees used in early construction were no longer present for the later buildings that were added. These large buildings and rooms held many "shops" and facets of the company production; inspection/packing areas, the cutting department, etching department, mould working area and, of course, shipping which for some very odd reason ended up on the 3rd floor. One room contained the majority of artifacts that had been found over the years, there were many more models and wooden forms to be cast, a crate that was marked with the casting companies name and the town of Zanesville, Ohio, (a town about an hour east of Newark). Also discovered in this room was a loft where many whiskey bottles along with a small Heisey punch cup were found. It is likely that a night watchman or slacking employee likely put them to good use!

The finished glass had to be sent down from the 3rd floor to be loaded onto rail cars. It is a very large building (495,000 square feet). The large arched brick tunnels, used for the rail road shipments, were most impressive. The space was so secure that it was designated for a fallout shelter during the war. These tunnels not only exported the materials out of the plant, but brought in the silica and raw materials to make the glass. The tunnel was the beginning and the end for the production process of Heisey Glass, the finest hand made glass in America, or so the company claimed.



I certainly believe it is the best glass. Seeing the walls and areas in which the glass was made and shipped, seeing the employee spaces, the offices, payroll, and of course my favorite the showroom, make me appreciate the glass, the history, and the provenance of a bygone era even more.

Thank you again to the owners of Contour Forming and to Traci Hill for making this experience possible for us.

I hope you have enjoyed this article and the photos, and if we are given the opportunity in the future, I highly recommend you take a tour of the factory, but don't just take my opinion, hear it for yourself by asking those who donated and experienced it firsthand in the space where our Heisey was born.

First Half 2016 Financial Results

The first half on 2016 is complete so I would like to share with you how HCA has performed financially over that time period.

I'm going to start with the balance sheet. The strong cash position that we began the year with has been maintained. Having this cash on hand has allowed us to sustain from utilizing our line of credit while concurrently postponing the drawdown of cash from the Endowment fund. Speaking of the Endowment Fund, its balance as of June 30th was \$3,872,962! This is a new record for HCA!

To help with communicating our Revenues and Expenses, I have displayed a comparison of the P&L to our budget. Please notice that I have made adjustments to two line items. The first adjustment relates to the net income from this year's convention. Since the convention occurs late in the month, quite a few of the expenses didn't get paid until July. Therefore, I am adjusting the Convention line downward to reflect where I believe we will end up in comparison to the budget. This amount, \$10,206 is a tremendous success and should make us thankful to the Convention Planners, the Newark Community and to the Convention participants. The second adjustment is to the Endowment Income Drawdown. While we have not needed to draw this money down so far this year, we will need to by year-end. Therefore, the current variance to budget will be eliminated by December 31st.

The overall picture painted here is one of a strong balance sheet and an operation that is achieving its budget. A more in-depth look shows that the budget achievement is due to the Benefit Auction and Convention successes, which have been partially offset by an under achievement of Sales. Our Gift Shop is capable of tremendous sales and as an organization we need to be able to fill it with high margin, high volume sustainable items to sell. Please don't hesitate to share your Gift Shop ideas with any member of the Board of Directors.

Let's have a great second half of 2016!

DO YOU HAVE ONE OF THE MUSEUM'S MISSING CUTTINGS

Jack and I attended the North Carolina Study Club's 30th Birthday Celebration in July. The Heisey fellowship was great and a good time was had by all. But I had an ulterior motive in making the trip to Greensboro, NC in that I wanted to see what we could find at Replacements, Ltd in the way of Heisey cuttings that the Museum did not have examples of. We had contacted Jamie Robinson of Replacements before we went and sent him a list of 169 patterns that the Museum did not have a goblet in (for 51 of these patterns we did have at least one piece but not the goblet). Jamie was able to check this list and came up with 24 pieces. Replacements provided a discount for the Museum and we were able to use Acquisition Funds to add these pieces to the collection. (Jaime also donated an additional goblet from his own collection.)

This was a great step in fulfilling the Museum's desire to have a representative piece of every production cutting that the factory produced. But we still have a ways to go to achieve this goal. I will ask the membership to check their collections to see if they have a piece of any of these cuttings. The Museum would be thrilled to add these to the collection. We would prefer donations, but are certainly willing to consider purchasing. Please contact the Museum if you can provide examples of any of these cuttings. Thank you.

Plans for a Lariat Refectory Table

In 1945, T.C. Heisey, then A. H. Heisey & Co. president, wrote his long-time friend and Heisey sales representative for the southern California region, Clyde Whipple. The letter was a update to tell 'Whip' of the news from Newark including 'the lifting of the face of the old office'. Mr. Heisey described in detail large windows, many of them big palladium bay windows, being installed in the offices on his floor of the factory saying, "We are putting a little stoop and pillars on each doorway so we should have a pretty decent dump before we are through." The sales representative from the Denver, Colorado, region had visited and commented later, "It was indeed a real pleasure to see you so nicely located in your new office and I presume on my next visit you will have all the finishing touches including the pictures on the wall, etc. Nevertheless, you are going to be very cozily situated and it is nice that you do have the fireplace there so that when things get too top-heavy you can just take an easy chair and look in the fire and dream."

When, subsequently, drawings were discovered in company business files for a refectory table with legs featuring designs from the Lariat pattern, included were letters dated beginning in January 1945 between T. C. Heisey and Walter Zirkle, founder and president of the Virginia Craftsmen Studios in Harrisonburg, Virginia, the

assumption was made the proposed table was for T.C.'s new office. Apparently, he had first approached a local construction firm, A. C. Simpson, who agreed to manufacture the table. However, as he told Mr. Zirkle, "they are so darned high that I didn't want 59% of the capital stock when I got through paying for the table." (It is interesting that A. C. Simpson had been the general contractor for the Sparta restaurant which is remembered so fondly as an early morning gathering place before the Flea Market on the Square, for many convention attendees in years past.) Included in this letter, but not the file, were other drawings which had been drawn up by the Simpson company.

On January 20, 1945, Mr. Zirkle advised T. C. Heisey that "Unfortunately, at the present time, however, due to conditions with which you are familiar, we are not able to execute any orders for furniture for ordinary household use, but if the table to which you refer is for your business, it is possible that we can make it up for you sometime this spring." With the previous correspondence found referencing the offices' redo, the conclusion was the table would be for the business office of the president of the A. H. Heisey & Co.


In February, Mr. Zirkle asked for some clarification of the design aspects of the drawings which seemed to show two different tables - a three pedestal refectory table and the second an entirely different table - a tavern table with six or eight legs. To his craftsmen, the specs were very confusing. However he stated, "I think we can make one or both of these tables up for you later this spring, and we will try not to ask quite as much of your capital stock as the Simpson Co did, but, as I recall your company is a pretty good size one, so they must have wanted a fortune for building this table."

Mr. Zirkle went into great detail describing construction constraints due to the best type of wood for a refectory table, which traditionally was maple or oak. However, because of the time frame in which Mr. Heisey wanted the table delivered, pine was recommended due to the 10' length of the table. Maple or oak would take too long to cure and not doing so would surely result in the 'opening up' as had such tables the

company made for the Wren Building on the campus of College of William and Mary in Williamsburg. Lamination was preferred as a construction choice, but wartime restrictions on plywood usually had a priority rating for such projects. The very words 'pine' and 'lamination' probably were a huge disappointment for T.C. and even Mr. Zirkle stated "Knowing your own appreciation of having things done as they should be done, I am calling these various details to your attention." At this point, Mr. Heisey asked for the drawings to be returned to him so he could best determine the table he wanted.

After many entreaties through the end of 1945 for the return of the drawings, the next correspondence in the file referred to a phone call T. C. Heisey placed to the Craftsmen company February 21, 1947, more than two years after the initial contact. After acquainting himself again with the old request, Mr. Zirkle laid out in a response letter two main concerns – again – and they repeated his earlier ones of not using a laminated top due to U.S. Plywood Corporation in New York not accepting any orders for three years for this class of work and the bulk of the 'carved bulbous pedestal' which would necessitate the carved section being 'glued up'. He asked if the table could be re-designed so the bulbous part not be over 5 3/4" in diameter at the largest point.

Horace King to the rescue with a letter, including his new drawings, dated March 17, 1947, sent to Mr. Zirkle. However, Horace went back to the idea of a solid wood top of narrow boards "approximately 7" wide and 10' long." This, even though one drawing does have an annotation of 'top should be laminated'. It is intriguing the drawings are dated November 7, 1944. Were these originally sent to A. C. Simpson Co. as an illustration of T. C. Heisey's original idea? No way to know.



In response to the drawings, Mr. Heisey received a quote for the table from Virginia Craftsmen dated March 21, 1947. It noted '1 Special Refectory Table, according to design by Mr. King of solid American black walnut, finished to specifications, pedestals from solid pieces of walnut, not glued up, 5 3/4" diameter largest point (not a satisfactory mental image when T. C. had 8" in mind originally), carved to details shown. . . . ' The sum was \$545.00 (nearly \$7,300 in 2016 dollars) with a shipping date of October 15, 1947.

The account ends here. No other correspondence or payment record

has been discovered. A photo of T.C.'s office depicting the fireplace with a portrait over the mantle of Tim Heisey astride Goodness Gracious is in the archives and has been previously featured on the cover of the *Heisey News*. No photo, to date, has been found with a 'Lariat' refectory table. In what is undoubtedly an incomplete accounting, a list was found of contents in Mr. Heisey's office which were sold when the factory closed. No refectory table was listed.

During the 1945 time frame in which the table was contemplated, no other design T. C. Heisey could have envisioned would have been more fitting for the A. H. Heisey & Co. president's office. A table featuring Lariat, one of the company's bestselling designs, a table reflecting the equine passion of T. C., and an example of exquisite American craftsmanship - how glorious such a table would have been.

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
