TREASURER'S REPORT

I just received the December (Year End) Financial Statement. So, let's analyze it together, okay??

We'll start with Revenues. While we had challenges meeting budget in Membership, Cash Donations, Sales and the Benefit Auction, we had strong revenues from the Select Auction, and Convention. The Endowment Transfer amount was also higher than budgeted. Our total revenues were under budget by \$1,843.

On the Expenditure side, our Salary and Wages were under budget as were our Accounting Expense, Legal Fees/Retainers and Inventory Purchases. The Museum Staff brought Office Supplies in under budget. Two areas where we were significantly over budget: Repairs and Maintenance and Insurance. Many of you may not know, we had an elevator inspection with citations resulting in over \$5000 in repairs. Certainly, something we had not planned for, but we want to make sure all our guests are safe while using the elevator. The cost of our Insurance has increased each year since 2014. The report shows our expenses were over budget by \$3,214.

So, when you do the math, we missed budget by \$5,057. Darn that elevator inspector!!

I have included a spreadsheet providing Actual revenues and expenditures for 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017, along with the Budgets for 2017 and 2018. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions.

#439 Raised Loop: Sugar, Cream, and All the Rest

If there's one thing you'll remember after seeing a Raised Loop cream and sugar set, it will be the handles. Oh, what handles! Like nothing you've ever seen on another piece of Heisey. So, of course, I had to write about them. As you probably have guessed, I can't leave well enough alone; those handles lead us to explore other paths. Or loops, perhaps. Raised Loops.

The cream and sugar

I recently wrote about #429 Plain Panel Recess sugars and creams, how their handles were ear-shaped, but just barely, with the tops of the handles just lightly arched. In comparison, other companies gave their handles a more pronounced curve, even a bit of a point, a handy, quick warning that the sugar bowl on the other side of that booth in the antique mall isn't Heisey.

Even though Heisey's main designer, A.J. Sanford, was reluctant to adopt such an accentuated handle shape, he didn't ignore it entirely. Rising to the challenge, Sanford fearlessly proved that no one was going to outdo him. #439 Raised Loop was the proof (fig. 1). "You want ears on your sugar bowls? Well, here you go," his design announced. Such flamboyant handles had not been seen for decades, and never before on a piece coming out of the Heisey plant. And never again, one might add.

Take a look at those handles. Rollercoastering from just below the rim, they soar skyward, teeter way up high for a moment, and then plunge, careening all the way down to the bottom, a thrill ride the whole way. The handles are attached to round bodies that are lower, broader, more open than usual. Clearly, Mr. Sanford was feeling liberated.

The sugar was made to be open, no cover. Thank goodness for that. The Raised Loop sugar and cream are hard enough to find without having to locate a wayward lid. Cream and sugar were fully pressed, handles one piece with the body. The set was made in the hotel size only. Too bad. Wouldn't these have looked cute in an individual size? And I'd like to have seen what Sanford would have done with large pieces in a table set. What sort of fanciful knop would he have put on a sugar lid or a butter cover?

Other things about Raised Loop

For all their showiness, the cream and sugar handles aren't the main feature of the

Raised Loop design. Each piece in the pattern, other than the celeries, has six panels. Each panel bears a large hairpin loop. In the center of each loop rises up a gleaming, polished oblong cabochon of glass. That brilliant mound is important, as we'll see in a moment.

Clarence Vogel named the pattern. Fortunately, that's the only name used for this pattern, so no confusion on that point.

All pieces of Raised Loop are difficult to find. The design was patented in 1912, although the patent date (3/5/12) does not seem to have been used on the actual glass itself. Raised Loop gets two pages in Catalog 75, which was probably assembled late that same year. The corresponding price list, No. 175, is the only known price list to mention anything for this pattern number. Put that together with the patent date, and it appears that production was from about 1912 to only 1913. Interestingly, the catalog makes no mention of the patent, an unusual omission for A.H. Heisey & Co.

Besides the cream and sugar, there were five basic sizes of nappies, but each size could be had in one of three shapes: the regular "straight" shape, partly flattened out as "shallow," or cupped, which is, well, "cupped." Then there were four sizes of jug and one size of tumbler. Raised Loop included a custard cup (alas, with an ordinary off-the-shelf handle), but no punch bowl. A salt bottle with various tops, two celery dishes, and an oil were offered for relishes and condiments. Finally, for stemware there was the egg cup, which was made straight or cupped.

Remarkably, the copy of Price List 175 we have does not list all pieces of Raised Loop that appear in the catalog. It's usually the other way around; often the price lists mention items that are *not* illustrated in catalogs. (You may occasionally hear the cry of researchers ringing in the wilderness: "Yes, but what does it *look* like?") Nowhere do the #439 nappies or jugs show up in the

price list. The celeries aren't listed, either. Other pieces were listed, but scattered here and there and never grouped together as a pattern. This could help explain why there are so few pieces to be found today.

Did someone say "goblet"?

You may have noticed that I didn't mention a goblet in Raised Loop. Catalog 75 doesn't show one, and Price List 175 doesn't list one, either. But Bradley, Ryan, and Ryan list a Raised Loop goblet in their stemware book. If they are correct, it wouldn't be the first time an item is known that isn't documented by factory material. But I have my doubts. What's different in this case?

McKee & Bros. Glass Works made a pattern called O'Hara. This is the same pattern Alice Metz called Seneca Loop. This pattern was made at least as early as 1880, and probably into the 1890's or later. O'Hara included a range of pieces, including an egg cup and a goblet. McKee may have copied O'Hara from an earlier pattern, almost exactly identical, attributed to Boston and Sandwich and dating from the 1840's to 1860's (fig. 2). The earlier pieces are made of flint glass, that is, lead crystal, and have its distinctive high, clear, sustained ring when tapped. McKee's pieces are soda-lime glass of decent quality, but without lead, similar to Heisey's formula.







At first glance, it's easy to confuse either O'Hara or its leaded ancestor with Heisey's Raised Loop, especially if you've never seen Raised Loop in person. But remember that smooth, polished mound of glass I mentioned earlier? Heisey's catalog drawings do a poor job of showing it, and that causes the problem.

In short, Raised Loop has the mound (fig. 3). The others do not. In fact, the non-Heisey pieces have an actual depression, an elongated thumbprint if you like, right in the center of each panel (fig. 4).

McKee's O'Hara goblets seem to be more common than any piece of Heisey's Raised Loop, making the goblet an easy subject of wishful thinking for Heisey collectors (or those wanting to sell to them). Every goblet I have seen that purported to be Raised Loop turned out to be O'Hara. If Heisey ever made a Raised Loop goblet, it would almost certainly be marked, and for sure it would have that distinctive polished cabochon of glass in the center of each panel. The McKee pieces (never marked) may well have Heisey's Thev inspired design. have certainly inspired the mix-up.

That's why I suspect the Raised Loop goblet doesn't exist. But it would be exciting if it did. So, please speak up if you have one. You will earn the envy of Heisey stem collectors everywhere, not to mention proving some know-it-all writer wrong. And that's worth something, isn't it?

A related nappy and a hypothetical (?) jug

Also in the 1913 Catalog 75, we find an illustration for a nappy, #447, which Vogel called Raised Loop Variant (fig. 5). Several patterns came out about this time with nappies only, sometimes in just one size. All were made for a very short time. #447 appears to be one of them. You can see that it has the oblong cabochon on each panel, but there is no hairpin loop surrounding it. Another difference is there is a plain,

recessed band around the top rim of the nappy. The #447 nappy has nine panels, rather than the six panels of #439 Raised Loop. I have yet to see a #447 nappy; #439 nappies are scarce but do show up.

On Dec. 16, 1913, the U.S. Patent Office granted E.W. Heisey a design patent, #45044, for a jug which closely resembles #439 Raised Loop, but isn't quite the same (fig. 6). The hairpin-shaped element on each panel is a flat shield, not a mounded cabochon. It also lacks the hairpin loop that surrounds the cabochon on true #439 pieces. This patent design is closer to the #447 Raised Loop Variant nappy, but that's not an exact match, either.

It is possible that jugs looking just like this patent drawing were made, but that strikes me as unlikely given the similarity to #439 jugs. I doubt the patent was used to protect jugs, since the design is the #439 significantly different. It wouldn't have been a big leap to adapt the jug patent drawing to something resembling #447, but no jugs like that have surfaced. I think it is most likely that the 1913 patent wasn't really needed for extra protection for Raised Loop and this design was never used to make jugs or anything else. But I wanted to mention this patent, because there is a chance-a small, teeny tiny chance-that there is a jug out there somewhere that resembles the drawing.

Conclusion

#439 Raised Loop is marked. In the era around 1912, nearly everything was. I have not seen any piece that has a patent date, but it wouldn't be surprising to find "3/5/12" inside some piece or other. The cream and sugar, and most other pieces, too, have ground and polished bottoms with impressed stars. The #447 nappy is also said to have a ground and polished bottom and probably has a star. Raised Loop was already discontinued before Heisey had its own cutting shop and before the company started using acid etchings. I have never seen a piece of Raised Loop with any decoration from any company, for that matter. But that doesn't mean you might not find something, particularly a simple cutting along the plain rim, or maybe a daub of silver along an edge. Raised Loop was made only in crystal. All pieces I have seen have been in a particularly lively and vibrant clear glass.

Sugar: Height (body), $2\frac{1}{2}$ "; height to top of handle, $2\frac{7}{8}$ "; length handle to handle, $7\frac{1}{4}$ "; diameter at top, $4\frac{1}{8}$ "

Cream: Height (body), $2\frac{1}{2}$ "; height at spout, 3"; height to top of handle, $3\frac{1}{8}$ "; length handle to spout, 6"; diameter at top, $4\frac{1}{8}$ "

Both marked. Ground and polished star bottoms.
