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
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APPLICATION TO MAIL

This is one of the early unmarked patterns made very large and popular line as evidenced by the amount available on today's market. It is entirely possible that this pattern was made by the George Duncan and Sons Co. while A.H. Heisey was employed there. We have examined an early issue of the Crockery and Glass Journal and shown was a table of this pattern and the caption which read: "This is a new line from the George Duncan and Sons Company". This may be the reason we see so much of this pattern available since it is so rarely marked.

Christened "Beaded Panel and Sunburst" by Vogel, it was introduced probably around 1896-7 and continued into the early 1900's. It is of average quality crystal, a very heavy pressed pattern. The main body of the items contain very large pressed hob stars and separating each will be three narrow inverted panels. The panels closest to the hob stars each contain a row of beading from top to bottom. Some of the

items in this line, both large and small, do not have the beading in the panels. One would think this might be a variant but the catalogs show both as #1235. A trade magazine found recently listed this pattern as Chrysanthemum.

The early price lists offer more than 90 items for this line. Included were the table set, many different sizes of comports and bowls, some covered, celery, pickle tray, pitcher and tumblers, salt and pepper, several sizes of cake plates and creamer and sugars and other items which would make up the dinnerware line. Noticeably absent from these early pressed patterns are dinner plates and cups and saucers,

> advertised as such. We assume this glass was used with the fine china available during this time.

Several different de-50 corations were offered for this line. The same price list offered No. 25, Gold Color; No. 26, Green; No. 27, Bronze; and No. 28, Ruby. We assume this was a stain flashing applied to the glass and then refired. The gold flashing is fairly common on the See Heisey's #1235, pg 9

A basic piece of Heisey folklore for the beginning collector is that the impressed Diamond is on every piece of Heisey glass. But eventually the collector runs into a piece of glass without the but instead has a paper label. Heisey used a variety of these fragile stickers over the years when the permanent mark was not practical or desirable.

Heisey patented their first paper sticker as early as 1905; a simple diamond shape, and by the 1930's Heisey's trade catalogs and advertisements were using the phase "adhesive sticker" beside the permanent mark for public identification. How common was the use of these labels early in the century is in some dispute, unfortunately most of the interesting examples of these Heisey memorabilia have vanished from the glass, but the dedicated collector can ferret out several of these labels that have survived, still attached to a variety of Heisey glassware.

We have illustrated eight of these paper labels which were in use by Heisey at various times over sixty years of its existance.



A. This is probably one of the earliest labels; rather large, with a wealth of information on a company new to the glass trade. The sticker is dark blue with shite lettering and was

found on a clear #300 single candlestick which was otherwise unsigned.



B. Possibly a variation on the early patented label, we believe it was primarily on blown-ware during the 'twenties. (Ours is on the base of a #4157 Moongleam vase). Although faded, it ori-

ginally was black on a white back-ground.



C. A colorful red on gold sticker showing a flamingo, no doubt used to introduce and promote the color "Flamingo" to the glass buying public; it is attached to a #1252 sugar which dates it in the 1920's.

HEISEY'S PAPER LABELS by Gerald Dixon & Walter Rogala



D. The most commonly seen Heisey label; in use from the early 1930's onward. After World War II the wording on this silver, blue and red sticker became just "Heisey Glass". This is usually the la-

bel on an obvious piece of non-Heisey Glass which the unsuspecting collector may find, re-glued by a dealer eager for a dishonest buck.

(replacing the impressed dates as found on earlier Heisey). The oval red on white is on a #1401 nappy (patented 1030), and the "patentapplied-for" dark blue on white label is on a Crystolite cologne bottle (patented 1940).

G. A later patent label found on one of Heisey's natented "epergnettes", again dark blue and white and dating from the 1940's.



H. This is not really a Heisey label but was used by Imperial, after buying all the assets of the Heisey co. including the molds and rights to the mark to further the prestige of Heisey glass.

As Heisey collectors, the finding of different examples of these elusive labels is a challenge and a puzzle. Did Heisey really produce a label for their 1905 "Plunger Cut" patent? And what about the 1917 oval blue label that the patent papers say may contain the words "American Crystal". There is also a "Verlys by Heisey" sticker.

We do envy the "Hawthorne by Heisey" label as seen at Clarence Vogel's Heisey museum, could there have been stickers for the rest of Heisey's popular colors as well? We eagerly await the finding of yet another Heisey label and we would welcome any other information and examples from other club members who find these Heisey stickers an interesting collecting sideline. We have added the "Verlys by Heisey" label, the Hawthorne label and the last one used which drops the "s" from Heisey's. The Verlys label is the familiar silver, blue and red as is the "Heisey" one. The Hawthorne one is done in lavender and gold with white letters.

COLOR OF THE MONTH

" ALEXANDRITE " by Frances Law

How best to describe this elusive color is a large job. The national Geographic for May 1930, reads, "It is tinted like some rare orchid petal. It flashes with the delicate glow of treasured gems. A dainty, tantalizing purple, highly prized and long sought". Thus did Heisey advertising describe the color.

It is often difficult for the new collector, especially, to tell the difference in Alexandrite and Hawthorne. The Hawthorne is more of a muddy color, while the Alexandrite is a pure lively shade of lavender. If Alexandrite is placed under a fluorescent light it turns a true blue. It also shows up best on a white background. If you place these two colors on a white tablecloth, it is easy to tell the difference. Be sure the lighting is good and bright.

Vogel says the Alexandrite color is a "transparent blue amethyst." He lists this shade as number 17 on the color chart of 21 colors. It seems to be more available than Hawthorne, which wasn't a popular color.

We know of several collectors who have one full dinner set of Alexandrite-cups & saucers, boullion cups, plates, nut cups, goblets, etc, very beautiful on a white

cloth. Those who have Hawthorne only have odds and ends; no one seems to find dinner sets in it. On the other hand, they may not be looking, as the Hawthorne is definitely not as pretty or collectible.*

The production years for Alexandrite are believed to be from the late 20's till about 1933. Catalogs seen bear these dates and so set the period it was made. It is rumored that Heisey was attempting to find a color more attractive and popular than the slow selling Hawthorne. Succeed they did, with the lovely, lively Alexandrite. However, this color was expensive to make, and the price during years of production ran higher th n other colors. It is available today, but costs a great deal.

When we started buying Heisey, our first piece of color was an Alexandrite small plate. The price seemed excessively high at the time, the dealer laughed at us in later years, and chided us for being so reluctant to pay the price. Of course, by this time the price has doubled from the original price paid. So this color has a fond remembrance for us.

The Yeakley book, plate No. 8 shows the color of Alexandrite very

clearly. If you hold it beside the Hawthorne, plate No. 5, it is easy to see the similarity of colors, the Hawthorne being just a shade darker. We tend to use the fluorescent light test, if at all possible.

At the last all-Heisey in the Newark area a single piece of Heisey was sold for a new high as far as is known. The rare filly with the head turned back went for \$1650.00.

The small amber elephant and the bull each brought \$450.00. Animals and the rarer colors continue to soar in price. Many of the more plentiful pieces sold in price ranges which most any collector could afford. More interest is building in stemware and in the beautiful cuttings and etchings. Some of the usually unrecognized, and often neglected, diamond optic blownware is also starting to come into its own. The auction was attended by collectors and dealers from many different states.



PLUG HORSE

This month's subject is for the over thirty group. Not that it is X rated, but because it is nostalgia time. As the old expression goes, "I'll see you in the funny papers." If you can find a newspaper old enough or remember the Out Our Way Gang with Barney Google you will see or remember the Plug Horse.

The Plug Horse is a comical looking fellow like his comic strip name bearer. He is cast in excellent crystal. He also was made in frosted crystal and sometimes parts of the frosting polished back. We have seen this fellow decorated in various ways such as follows: Painted spots, painted teeth, painted hoofs, painted mane and painted tail. He was also made in amber which is much rarer than crystal. The rarest and most wanted ones were made in cobalt, as there were

very few made in cobalt.

While Heisey made many of these so did the Imperial Glass Corp, in crystal and caramel slag.

Our friend stands on a parallelogram shaped base, which is 1-1/2" across by 3-1/4" and he stands 4" tall. The base is polished and it's heighth varies. He is shown in a walking pose with each hoof meeting the base at staggered points. The areas between the legs are not open, but solid glass.

The right front leg is raised with just the tip of the hoof touching the base. Most of the detail of this leg is to the front and right side. The glass narrows at the top of the hoofs. The glass now swells out quickly then gradually tapers in to form the fetlock. It is just a short distance to the knee which is round shaped. The leg becomes larger to form the thigh as it rises to the body.

The right rear leg is the same as the front left but the letter is slightly larger. The hoofs set flat on the base. The front of them is rounded and is higher than the rear. The area over the hoofs represents the fetlocks. The glass tapers to the knee and the glass at the knees swells in a semi-circle. As the semi-circle is completed the body is reached. The left rear starts

with its hoofs, also flat on the base. This one's fetlock does not extend over the front of the hoofs but over the back. The back of the fetlock is triangular shaped. The leg now gains in thickness to the knee and the thigh widens to the body.

The middle of the body is narrower than the front quarters or the flanks, giving him body shape. From the top of the rump his tail rises in a concical design. Half way up to the top of the tail there are vertical ridges.

The head contains most of our friend's features. The name starts at his back and runs up his neck, over the top of his head to just past the ears. The ears are the same height as the mane, and extend across the top of the head. sides and the front edge of the ears are concave giving him ear openings. His eyes are dots of glass set in a shallowed out area. These dots are large for the size of his head giving him bulging eyes. His muzzle flares out with his nostrils. There is a dip for each nostril to show his nose openings. His mouth is open with large lips both upper and lower. His crowning glory is the large toothy grin.

When marked, it is between the front legs.

HEISEY HUNTER HAPPENINGS!!!

Dateline: ELLENTON, FLORIDA.....I thought that all you fellow cold weather inhabitants would enjoy a column written from warm, sunny Florida, so I checked the budget and couldn't afford the trip, so here I am....the weather is great, the Heisey is scarce and no wonder from all the stories I've heard emanating from collectors and dealers who have returned from Florida with tales of findings...pressed for details they were somewhat evasive as to just what they did find....

A dealer told me at the Wintermute show in Dayton, Ohio about finding a very, very rare cruet in the area of Plymouth, Ohio, a #1776 Kalonyal....great find and I know a collector who is drooling right now, go get it boy another dealer reporting at the same show told me of finding six #1205 FANCY LOOP punch cups....always a good find...at the same show a Michigan dealer was #305 PUNTY AND DIAMOND showing POINT squatty syrup jug and the large syrup jug....same dealer had an unusual puff box in the RIDGE-LEIGH, #1469 pattern....it looked like two nappies with a gold filigree ornament on top...It was a Heisey production piece, at least it shows in a Heisey catalog....missed that one...Connie found a real rare one at the same show in deep plate etching, #481 LANCASTER on a tumbler....the tumbler had been repaired, but so what, it did not interfere with the etching ...

An amber SPARKY sparkled from a shelf of another dealer at a fine show...at a Wintermute show earlier in January a new dealer exhibited much Heisey glass including a rarity in deep plate etching, #496 SKIER on a #4002 Cocktail glass.... a rare cutting on a bitter's bottle.....lots of #507 ORCHID etched pattern....several animals were on display also...from Michigan a dealer had several pieces of #1245 RING BAND in custard glass....a #333 WAL-DORF ASTORIA bitters bottle with the metal tag still hanging around the neck.....#451 CROSS LINED FLUTE in the form of two small nappies were displayed by the couple's son....a #433 GRECIAN KEY thampagne was found in a New Yorker's booth

From Illinois comes the report of a collecting couple finding #116 candleholders with Moongleam feet, a #1776 KALONYAL tall compote and a #325 PILLOWS compote.....a touring Ohio collector reports finding some Heisey on a Tour from Tulsa to Charleston (didn't say W. Va or S.C.) and the find of the month and a candidate for the Sleeper Hall of Fame. Would you believe a pair of Moongleam #111 CHERUB candlesticks from a dealer who "begged" him to buy them so he wouldn't have to repack them....same collector found a pair of goblets in #451 CROSS LINED FLUTE....a real stem rarity.....

From the hills of Kentucky comes a report of a color minded collector who "fell into it" and came up smiling with several pieces of MARIGOLD in the #1252 TWIST pattern...many more pieces on DUQUESNE #3389 stem, in SAHARA with the beautiful CHINTZ etching #450....in this color it is an unequaled pattern, truly beautiful....excellent find.....to break up the monotony they pursued a rumor and found several #1401 EMPRESS ELEXANDRITE plates of various sizes.....and same collector had a similar experience as the man from Minnesota reported some time back, of a jewelry store going out of business and ran that down, at the end of the rainbow was a box of #1567 PLANTATION.....fantastic....if you've noticed the ink turning green, even this Heisey typewriter finds it difficult to stay neutral on a report like that.no use moving to Kentucky, he found all the goodies there

New York collector reports finding several #1238 Beehive plates with AMETHYST centers, WOW...a Toledo, Ohio collector reports finding a #433 GRECIAN KEY punch bowl and cups, a CLYDESDALE and a STANDING PONY....a nice roundup podner.....

While wandering through our favorite flea market in Florida our good friend and Heisey collector from Bradenton bumped into us, accompanied by her cousin and husband visiting from Iowa who have been converted to Heisey.....being the perfect hostess she directed us to some #1184 YEOMAN goblets at a bargain price....we gathered later at

her house to discuss some of the things we have all seen and during this discussion it was discovered that the full rooster stem cocktail, #5063 was missed at a mid western show....we all grieved together as this is a particularly difficult item to come by...while talking about animal stems yours truly came across a horsehead stem cocktail, very rare and very welcome to our stem collection...took another look at a very beautiful limelight humidor with inscription "BENSON and HEDGES"....

This is a very short pattern group, usually marked and seen mostly in color. It was first made around 1931 and was also shown in the Heisey firm's last catalog in 1956. Items made include a 12 oz. footed soda, 9 oz. footed tumbler, 5 oz. juice, sherbet, cereal bowl and underplate and/one pint pitcher and cream and sugar, nine items in all.

The glass is fairly heavy and of good quality. Colors include moongleam, flamingo, sahara,cobalt, dawn and crystal. It is shown only in dawn in the '56 catalog. Even though Dawn is a late color it was only offered in the last catalog so is included in the rare category.

The base of each item is shaped like a four leaf clover and consists of three stacked clovers, each smaller than the one below. Extending upward from each of the top four "leaves" is a narrow, spear-like design of raised glass reaching nearly to the top of each piece. The mark appears on the center of the outside bottom.

As far as is known, this pattern, Town and Country was also made in only a few items. Designed by Eva Zeisel during the last years, it won the "Good Design" award for 1955. Eva Zeisel also designed other patterns for Heisey, at least some of which were never marketed according two longtime Heisey employees. Most pieces of Town and Country observed have not been marked, except for the Tumbler.

The items made include 12 oz. tumbler, 8" plate, 5" dessert, 8" round serving dish, 14" sandwich plate, and 11" salad bowl. The sandwich plate, salad bowl and 8" plate, were made in limelight and all pieces were made in dawn. Probably all were made in crystal, also.

The glass is very thick and in some of the pieces, at least, has a saturn optic, which means there are rings encircling each piece which

can be felt on the inside. In fact the pattern looks very much like #1485 Saturn and is, indeed, shown with items in Saturn on page 21 of the '56 catalog.


The small dessert dish and small plate are known in the opaque black usually considered to be experimental. These are owned by two members of the HCA.

Most of the items of Town and Country could have been purchased for next to nothing when the factory closed but we all become "too late smart". Serving dishes in dawn which we did purchase were used for everyday and washed so often in the dishwasher in our city's excessively limey water that they were ruined. Oh well, they only cost a few cents when we bought them.

This is shown as a one item pattern on page 18 of the 1956 catalog. It looks like a modern free form piece. The item shown is a jelly dish but there is also a much larger bowl in the same shape, probably for flowers. Shown in the catalog in dawn only, it does also come in clear. The two items are marked.

IMPERIAL GLASS CORP. SOLD

As many of you may have already heard, the Lenox Inc. of New Jersey has recently acquired the Imperial Glass Corp. of Bellaire, Ohio. The sale was consummated in exchange for some \$1.8 million in Lenox common stock. Imperial sales for the year ending Dec. 31, 1972 were \$4.3 million.

Imperial stockholders approved the sale 65% to 35%. The Jeanette Corp. which owns approximately 30% of the Imperial stock opposed the agreement with Lenox. The Lenox Inc. is a maker of fine china and crystal.

According to Lucille Kennedy of Imperial, there have been no major changes and none are anticipated in the near future. Imperial will be operated as a separate subsidiary and, contrary to rumor, will continue to use the familiar IG mark.

Miss Kennedy has been made Sales Manager of Imperial. She stated that she sees no possibility of the HCA or anyone else obtaining the Heisey trademark since they are the owners of it and are still in business. There has always been a very pleasant relationship between the HCA and Imperial and this is expected to continue.

Imperial will again be making the souvenir plate this year for the Newark Heisey Collectors Club. All proceeds from the sale of these plates will be donated to the HCA's Museum Fund.

Creating hand-wrought glassware is more than a science...it is a compound of chemistry, skill, experience and fine ingredients. The complete and detailed story of its making would take more time to tell than you might wish to spare, but here's a capsul-sized account of it.

If you should visit the A. H. Heisey factory (and we hope you will if you come to Newark, Ohio),

you would be amazed at the agility with which the Glass Gatherers, the Blowers, the Pressers and the Finishers handle "globs" of hot fluid glass...with precision team work and rhythm as the molten glass is passed along from one hand operation to another.

It's more fascinating than watching a three ring circus!

After the glasses are tempered in long ovens, they are rigidly inspected. Those with even minute imperfections are rejected while the perfect ones may receive still further processing and additional inspection. Etching involves the application of a wax stencil to the glassware,

items found today but one rarely
finds any of the other colors.

This pattern was made in crystal only and not signed, with two exceptions. The punch bowl, stand and punch cups (called custards at that time) are found with the H in the Diamond and these items have also been found in custard. A 10cal Heisey enthusiast owns the punch bowl and base in custard and it is a striking addition to a collection. It was shown last June during the Heisey display. A.H. Heisey II or "Gus", as he is known by his friends, owns a punch bowl in this pattern in opal or milk glass, and was also on display last June. This, as well as the items in custard, must be placed in the rare catagory.

Probably discontinued early in the 1900's with the exception of the punch bowl and cups, made later due to the presence of the trademark, it is doubtful any reissues will appear due to the age of the pattern.

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

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
