Some Indiana residents are sharing their very rare #160 Locket On Chain opal table set with all who visit. This is of top rarity. A #4163 Pretzel jar and 4 mugs with the Club Drinking Scene have found their way to the deep plate etching collection. A #1489 Puritan ash tray with an etching of Tim Heisey astride the show horse "Goodness Gracious" is also shown in that same cupboard. The mold for the #4222 Horseshoe sugar bowl is also



To add a piece of this pattern to your Heisey collection you will have to be content with a choice from a very different items available. We must assume this line was produced for the hotel and restaurant trade since most of the items offer-

ed were nappies, plates, finger bowls, bar and tumbler ware, jugs and stemware. Also offered was a custard or punch cup, however, we have not heard of a punch bowl.

The Heisey Company named this pattern Hartman

and most items found will contain the trade-



mark with the possible exception of the finger bowl. stemware will be marked on the stem or at times on the bottom of the foot. The glass is typical of that produced during the Colonial era, heavy, brilliant and of excellent quality. The mold design is also typical of the Colonial period being wide flutes, each separated by very narrow concave slash. The nappies and plates have star bottoms ground and polished. The finger bowl, bar and tumbler ware, and stemware were all offered in plain or a very narrow optic.

The items made in optic appear to be more brilliant than the plain.

You will not find items from this line produced in color. Some collectors refer to the #469, 1 pound candy jar as Hartman but close examination will reveal the differences. Where the Hartman pattern has a slash between the ridges, #469 has a raised rib. They appear the same in pictures but when you see the actual items they are not alike. Other glass companies offered lines similar to this but in most cases the quality of the glass just isn't there. The nappies are the easiest to find and the stemware the hardest and thus the more desirable. No reissues of this pattern have been offered and the molds more than likely destroyed long ago.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish each and every one of you in Heiseyland a wonderful and prosperous 1975 and express my gratitude for all the recent kind expressions of sympathy received from our friends. Heisey Ads in the National Geographic Magazine

Over its life, the A.H. Heisey Company placed 25 advertisements in the National Geographic magazine. The ads ranged in size from 1/8 of a page to a full page. The accompanying table lists the 25 issues that contain the ads. Page numbers are not included because NG only numbers the pages of text and not the pages of advertisement. Twenty three are located in the ad section in the back of the magazine and two are located in the ad section in the front.

All of the ads but one show pictures of Heisey items with occasional reference to colors and etchings. A booklet containing one copy of each of NG Heisey Ads plus identification of most of the glassware pictured has been compiled by the author and donated to the Reference Library of the Heisey Museum in Newark.

Etchings shown are #430 "Pied Piper" in 5-24, 9-24 and 3-27. (The first number is month, ie, 5 for May, and the second number is year ie. 24 for 1924), #168 "Adam" in 2-25, #442 "Diana" in 6-25,#440 "Frontenac" in 5-26,#448 "Old Colony" in 11-30, and #507 "Orchid" in 4-43. Major patterns shown are #411-13 Rib & Panel, #417 Double Rib & Panel, #1183 Revere, #1184-86 Yeoman, #1231 Ribbed Octagon and #1401 Empress. In the ads of 1924-30, stem-

Of the 25 ads, only one makes specific reference to a pattern design number, namely, #1401 "Empress" in Reference is the March 1930 ad. made to the "new" Diana goblet with the #442 Diana etching on the #3357 King Arthur goblet in June 1925, to the "new" Moongleam and Flamingo colors in April 1926, to the "new" Sahara color in May 1930. The first mention of Hawthorne color was in May 1927. Adjectives used to help describe the colors are the "soft rose glow" or the "sunset glow" of Flamingo, the "cool green" of Moon Gleam, the "delicate amethyst tint" of Hawthorne, the "golden tint" of Sahara, the "rare orchid petal tint" of Alexandrite and "gleaming" crystal.

In November 1930, mention is made of the fascinating combination of crystal and Moon Gleam green. There is no elaboration as to what this means, i.e. green plates and crystal goblets or i.e. goblets with crystal stems and green bowls. Reference is also made in several ads to sets of glassware for complete table service. In the September 1926 and November 1926 ads, people were invited to write to the Company in Newark for a descriptive folder of Heisey glass and a booklet of recipes from famous chefs. In the March 1927 ad, people were invited to write for a copy of the new booklet "Gifts of Glassware" printed in colors.

Further reference is made to writing for this free booklet in the 5-27, 7-27, 9-27, 11-27, 3-30, 5-30, 9-30 and 11-30 ads. The April 1943 ad mentions writing for a illustrated folder about orchid etched items.

Reference through words and pictures is continually made to the Diamond "H" trademark, Heisey's symbol of quality in glassware.

HEISEY ANIMALS --- FIGURINES

" TIGER PAPERWEIGHT "

TIGER PAPERWEIGHT

January in Ohio is a winter wonderland rain and mud, snow and ice, and once in a while the sun shines and then it gets cold. Makes one wonder what kind of land it is. It's a good place to be far away from this time of year. After thinking over a number of options, a trip to India strikes my fancy. A tiger hunt has always sounded like fun, although I plan to do some hunting for girls with, rubys in their navels-seems like it might be more fun than tiger hunting.

The Tiger Paperweight was made in crystal and crystal, frosted, and sometimes frosted with highlights in crystal. I know of none in any color. Imperial Glass Company has not reissued this item so they are all Heisey. It is one of the smaller animals, being only 2-5/8" tall, 2-3/8" across and 7-3/4" long. It is well designed showing the graceful lines of all the cat family. The bottom is its belly as it lies flat, and it is ground and polished.

The left paw and leg are a little higher than the right giving the appearance of laying over part of the right. The leg detail is shown by the glass curving in at the sides and top to show the ankles and rises for the knees. The back of the leg cuts in sharply to the body at the start of its shoulder which is shown as very muscular.

The chest is puffed up and the chin rests on it. There is no mouth shown but the nose forms a bridge to the top of the eyes. The eyes are shown as a nearly flat area. The ears stick out from the side of the head and have a small cupped Behind the area on the outside. head the lines of the shoulders continue to meet the body which is smaller than the body. The back has a hump in the middle. The hind legs are shown as being drawn up under for a quick rising. The tail curls around its left side to near its left rear foot.



THREE LITTLE PIG'S


Pictured is a 4044 New Era decanter with the Three Little Pigs etchings. It was photographed during the 1974 Display and we apologize for the poor detail. On the front is the Big, Bad Wolf, while the 3 little pigs appear on the sides and back. The decanter was loaned by Ruth Moats Landis of Gardena, Calif. the daughter of Phyllis Moats who worked in the etching room at the Heisey factory.

According to Grace Wooles who had arranged to have the bottle displayed here the etching was experimental and done before 1934. Her husband, who was in charge of the etching room, made it with the help of Phyllis, and her daughter now owns it.

Mrs. Wooles says it is probably one of a kind. However, we also know of a decanter of another style with the same etching in Newark and a 4027 decanter was recently reported from New Jersey. An article in Diamond Dust, the publication of the Heisey Heritage Society, an HCA affiliate, indicates that Disney was very much opposed to this pat-

tern being made.

[The date given in Vogel's books for New Era is 1936. However this decanter must have been prior to this since Mrs. Moats who helped make it, died in 1934.]


Membership Before It Expires

Couple 'Addicted' To Collecting Glass

Reprinted from KILGORE NEWS HERALD, Kilgore, Texas.

Most true collectors of treasures-whether oil paintings, first edition books or ancestors -- are avid enthusiasts of their particular pursuit.

And, usually, only one member of a family--husband or wife--is really "addicted," the other perhaps just going along to get along.

But not so with a new family in Kilgore, the Roger L. Hulslanders.

Both of them are Diamond H collectors whose enjoyment even involves and interests their teenagers.

Sounding all the world like the name of a Texas ranch, Diamond H enthusiasts collect Heisey Glass which was handmade in Newark, Ohio, from 1896 through 1957. The factory's 61-year existence ended when mass production by machine made handcrafted glass prohibitive in cost to produce.

Each year since 1957, Heisey Glass has become a more important item to collect as knowledge about the scarcity of it spread. Antique collectible items.

The Hulslanders have about 255 pieces -- bowls, vases, candlesticks, nut cups, various stemware, relish dishes, salt and pepper shakers,etc. The majority of their collection is high quality, crystal clear transparent pieces, but they also have some of the luscious colors Heisey produced.

"Some people go for just one pattern, or one color, or colors only, because they are harder to find,but we go for it all," laughingly explains Mrs. Hulslander.

Their favorite cutting is the Dolly Madison Rose which actually launched them into serious collecting of Heisey. They thought it a very beautiful cutting, and when they accidentally "stumbled" upon 18 stems available from one person they bought themselves a Christmas present.

"That was the year we couldn't go home (to Ohio where they were both born and where they have family still), so we just spent the money on Heisey that the trip would have cost," Mrs. Hulslander explained.

The price tag for each stem today would run from \$30 to \$40. The Hulslanders paid \$6 apiece.

Why the Diamond H moniker to such collecting?

Heisey Glass was "signed" by its makers from 1901 on with an "H" inside a diamond. A son of the firm founder convinced his father that this superior glass should be marked. The first four years' production was unmarded---all of which makes the earnest collector constantly study Heisey patterns, etchings and colors so as not to pass up "a real find" just because it is unmarked.

The first markings were a large Diamond H, but later the signature was made much smaller. It is not always found on the bottom either. Sometimes it's so tiny it is almost indiscernible and sometimes it seems purposely "hidden" in the crevice of the stem and bowl of a goblet or stemmed glass.

Where do the Hulslanders find their "finds?"

At flea markets in Canton, Sexton City, Garrison, Gary, Jacksonville, Jefferson, Texarkana and Longview!

"Every Saturday there's some place to go in search of Heisey," say the couple.

What's more, they have found the majority of their collection right here in East Texas.

They theorize that perhaps during the Oil Boom years in this area people were able, financially, to buy an above-average quality of glassware for their homes, and that now, some four decades later, some of these old households are being done away with.

To the uninitiated, they theorize, Heisey Glass might appear to be just another piece of transparent or colored glass, thereby causing some persons to sell off, at a bargain, grandmother's dishes without knowing they are now collector's items.

The couple's rarest items are a U-shaped candlesticks found at a flea market in Pond, Mo.

One of Mrs. Hulslander's prized possessions is a pendant-type necklace made of Heisey Glass of a delicate pink hue. It glistens like diamonds!

An argument can fire up immediately when one starts defining what-it-anantique?

Some of the experts say: "Anything which has been discontinued in manufacturing, is 'antique.' "Others say "anything 50 to 75 years old is antique." The dictionary defines the word as "something belonging or remaining from ancient times."

The Hulslanders don't argue about the antique aspect. They just appreciate Heisey Glass and will go on searching for it and collecting it.

The Hulslanders are members of HCA.



A MINOR PATTERN

As shown by the picture, this is an extremely plain pattern notable only for the raised base. The pattern has not heretofore appeared in published reference books and was found in an old price list belonging to a club officer.

Since it is shown only in a $4\frac{1}{2}$ " nappy one wonders what the other pieces might look like. Being so plain it would be easy to have passed it up as nothing unusual.

THE HEISEY FACTORY

The Walls All Up and Roof to Be Put on This Week.

(Ed Note: This clipping is from a Newark newspaper from 1895. It was sent to us by Mrs. Clarence (Anne) Heisey.)

A reporter yesterday paid a visit to the Heisey glass plant, and found that the contractors had fully appreciated the excellent building weather up to Friday and had pushed the plant almost to completion, so far as the outside walls and the roof are concerned. A visit to the Heisey addition now will convince any one that Newark has at least one of the finest manufacturing establishments to be found in the State of Ohio. So far, the people have received a hundred cents on the dollar so far as the promises of this company are concerned. When they left the vacant land and promised to assist in locating other factories, some of our people were a little skeptical as to whether this plant would ever be completed, much less, getting other industries to locate here. It seems to us that it is high time Newark people should attach the proper estimate upon the statements of their fellow business man. The lack of confidence in one's self begets the lack of confidence in everything else around him, and if we were to criticise Newark in any way, it would be for not having sufficient confidence in Newark, and everything that pertains to Newark's development. We fully believe that the people who have given us this magnificent factory, will do all that they have promised, and it behooves our people to extend to them their most cordial support.

The 1183 to 1189 patterns known as Revere and Yeoman are both very plain also, with many Yeoman items being in diamond optic in the middle years. The base makes this different from either of those patterns.

Does anyone think they may have a piece of #486? Let us know. It would be particularly interesting to find the table set. Vogel lists a cologne in the same number but it is one in series of Colognes numbered from 485 to 492 and would bear no relationship to this pattern.


