William (Pete) Rehbeck, a former mold maker at Heisey whose profile was written by Evelyn Allen in Heisey News, Vol. 2 #3 is the person who has made these. However, he does not have the cast iron mold and you don't need it to make the items he

Mr. Rehbeck is retired and his hobby is to make candles and the plaster of paris items to keep busy. He uses a glass item such as the elephant and makes a plaster of paris cast or rubber mold of it. For the rubber molds he uses a liquid rubber and a hardener. Many candle makers do this all of the time. It has been very common to use pieces of antique or collectible glass to use as patterns for candles. We have seen several, particularly made from the Fancy Loop vase and spooner. A dealer from Indiana has had these at the June show. There is no intent to defraud anyone with these items and several of you have probably made this type of candle or figurine yourself.










Many items from this line are almost identical to the Colonial #300 pattern which we know today as Peerless. The most noticable difference being the lack of the familiar band of pleats around the items sometimes referred to as a "petticoat". The arch at the top of the panels on #400 items is not as severe and the flutes have less curvature. The glass is of the average to fine quality, associated with the colonial era.

It appears that items from some of the earlier lines were combined with items from the #300 line to make up the majority of items in this pattern. For example, the water bottle, oil bottle, syrup jug and the #2 salt shaker all closely resemble those from the #339 Continental line. There is a drastic change in the stemware line, the bowls being cupped with straight panels and the stem being very straight and on a round foot. change from the tapered bowl and ornate two knob stem of the #300 line. Also only the goblet, sherbet, wine and egg cup were offered in stemware as compared to more than twenty five different items in Peerless. The cake salver is very unusual with a plain flat surface encircled with a fine scalloped skirt almost an inch wide.

Found only in crystal, most items from this line will contain the Heisey trademark. The scarcity of items indicate it was not a popular line and probably short lived. Stemware is especially hard to find. The toothpick is very desirable and it would be difficult to distinguish the oil, syrup,















HEISEY TRADEMARKS

HEISEY; oh yes! That's the company that marked their glassware with a diamond H. On June 21, 1901, five years after the A. H. Heisey Company started production, Mr. Augustus H.Heisey, President of the Company, filed an application at the U.S. Patent Office to register their trademark for pressed glassware. "To all whom it may concern, be it known that the A.H. Heisey & Co., a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of West Virginia, and located and doing business in the city of Newark, county of Licking, State of Ohio, has adopted for its use a Trademark for Glassware." It consists of the letter "H" as a plain Roman capital inclosed in a diamond-shaped figure. The diamond-shaped figure is arranged with its long axis in the same direction as the height of said letter. The position of the diamond-shaped figure may be changed with respect to the height of the letter, and different styles of the letter may be used without altering the character of the trademark, essential festure of which is the letter "H" inclosed in a diamond-shaped figure. On August 6, 1901, the Patent Office granted registration to the diamond H as Trademark no. 36,860.

The registration statement indicated that this trademark had been continuously used in the business of the Heisey Company since about November 1, 1900. The class of merchandise to which this trademark is appropriated is glassware, particular, pressed glassware. It is displayed on such glassware by pressing the same in any suitable place thereon, as on the inside of the bottom of the glass article when possible. When not possible, the trade-mark is displayed by placing on such glassware a printed label, usually having a blue ground, on which the described trademark is shown, usual-



ly in white. The reference to a label in the registration application raises an interesting question as to when did Heisey actually start using paper labels.

On June 22,1905, George Duncan Heisey, now President of the A.H. Heisey & Co., filed an application with the U.S. Patent Office for renewal of the diamond H trademark for pressed glassware. Renewal was granted on March 6, 1906 as trademark no. 50121. The registration statement was about the same as the original application. Reference is made to "doing business on Oakwood Avenue in Newark". Reference is also made to displaying the trademark on the package containing the goods, as well as on the

The original application declares that the trademark is used by Heisey in commerce between the United States and foreign nations or Indian tribes, and particularly with Canada. The renewal application declares that the trademark is used by Heisey in commerce among the several States of the United States, and particularly between the States of New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Illinois.

Thus, the renewel application added coverage for the trademark on the shipping package commerce within the U.S. and between States.

The diamond H trademark No. 36, 860 was again renewed by the A.H. Heisey & Co. on August 6,1931, exactly 30 years later.

For comparison, Cambridge began using the triangle C trademark in the mid-twenties. Imperial began using in about 1913, the word Imperial within the four quarters of a cross.

On October 16, 1905, George D. Heisey, President of A.H. Heisey & Co., filed an application with the U.S. Patent Office for a trademark consisting of the words "Plunger Cut". It was registered on January 30,1906 as trade-mark #49,335. The registration statement indicates that this "trademark had been continuously used since the 25th day of September,1905". The class of merchandise to which this trademark is appropriated is pressed or blown glassware. It is usually displayed on the packages containing the goods, as well as on the goods themselves by placing thereon a printed label with the trademark or the trademark may be pressed or blown in the glass. Reference is again made for use in commerce between the several States of the U. S., and particularly between the States of New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Illinois.

HEISEY ANIMALS --- FIGURINES

DINKY DO (The Doulton Girl) by Dick Marsh

The old expression says that in spring "a young man's fancy turns" to what young girls have been thinking about all year. Now me, I don't need to wait till spring to start thinking about girls.

"Dinky Do" is a copy of Royal Doultons porcelain figure called Dinky Do. It was never marketed commercially and most of the ones known have been gifts from the Heiseys or have come out of worker's homes. It is felt that it was not offered to the trade because of a possible law suit over design copy. The company had already been involved in a suit over bakeware and had to stop making it.

The doll was made in small quantity and the Imperial Glass Corp. has not made it so any found are Heisey and one of the rarest of the figurines. None are known to carry the Diamond H trademark.

She is a mid-sized figurine being 4-1/4" tall. Clear crystal is the only color known. The doll is solid glass and has a ground and pol-



ished base. She is shown in Victorian dress with a large flared out skirt which has many folds shown. She is holding out the skirt on either side with her hands, and her fingers are shown. The arms

are bare to about the elbow where the sleeves puff out and then come in to a band before puffing out again at the shoulders. The bodice of her dress is laced with the lacing shown.

The face is shown with highlights only. She has a definite chin but no mouth, as such. The nose is shown as a raised triangle and the eyes as indentations under the raised forehead. The ears are shown as small triangles. There are two curls of hair protruding from under the bonnet which surrounds the The back of the head is shown with the bonnet and ribbons. The back of the blouse is plain but the skirt has a number of folds.

The quality of the glass is superb.

ED NOTE: There were two of these dolls in one of the lots sold at the auction of the estate of Mrs. H. Melcher, a granddaughter of A.H. Heisey, in New York City on January 17, 1974 as reported in Heisey News, Vol. II, #12, 1973.

THAT during the years 1916-1954 there were three sizes of marks stamped into the molds. These were 1/8, 1/4, and 1/2 inches. For anything smaller than 1/8, such as a mark on a pressed stem, it had to be cut in by hand. Sometimes the center would chip out and all that was left was the diamond. Could this be the reason they registered the mark without the diamond?

THAT Heisey used sand from Glenford, Ohio?

THAT Heisey had a salesman named Kling in Hawaii. They shipped countless Lariat punch sets to him by parcel post and very few were broken.

THAT the animals were given to the play "The Glass Menagerie" in exchange for advertising in the program. The play was first in Chicago. Paul Fairall remembers shipping them new animals every few weeks. When the play was in New York the Heiseys went to see it and were acknowledged from the stage.

THAT glass sold to Tiffany had the mark removed?

THAT Heisey had three wheat cuttings? #942 Harvester was shown on


a #5022 Graceful stem. A 1952 price list shows #1059 Midwest on a #5057 Suez stem. The 1956 catalog shows #1091 Wheat cutting on the 1E96 stem?

THAT Heisey made glass handles for mirrors and brushes. We have some of the handles in the museum.

THAT Pairpoint used #4044 New Era rectangular plates for a Greek Key cut design? In an old catalog this fact is written in. Cost \$27.00 per dozen. It does not say whether that price was for the uncut plates to Pairpoint or the finished product.

HEISEY BEAUTY MARK

We are all inordinately proud of our old as well as our new aquisitions I called Emogene Shomaker, one of our early Heisey enthusiasts and founder, to tell her I had some exciting news; "I sold my entire collection of Heisey except the pieces which are on loan to the museum."

I felt a little like George Washington, "I could not tell a lie" --- with a straight face, especially immediately after drinking chocolate milk from a crystal Saturn goblet. We both laughed at the absurdity. Next I called our president, Louise Ream, but she wasn't home, so I called Loren Yeakley and told him the same thing. He exclaimed a startled, "You did!" My reply ---- "April Fool"! He tried to get out of that one by saying he thought I meant my paintings at the art gallery!

This is especially for our new collectors who are starting out in a smaller way. I was just as elated to acquire a crystal Saturn cream pitcher even with a slight nick in the handle, as I was with my vaseline Pinwheel and Fan eight inch nappy which I also bought at the auction.

I went to the auction with this in mind --- I would bid until I got that cream pitcher, no matter what! I have fourteen goblets, fourteen sherbets and juices, two sugars with lids, several bowls a jelly compote, two parfaits, two vases, but sadly only six dessert plates and no cups or saucers!

The nice thing about these bright crystal heavier pieces is that you can enjoy them every day even if you have a dear dog chewing at your shoe soles and strings and begging while you wash them. There is little danger of them chipping or breaking. Let's see -- waited anxiously for about seventeen or eighteen years for that pitcher; bless the dear soul who entered it!

Be careful with your new acquisitions; they are safer in use than in transit. I bought a flamingo cut Pleat and Panel sugar and creamer,



a Verly's Swallow ash trayand a pie, went to the bank and, coming out, proceeded to stumble over a white stone slab car-stopper obscured by snow. Down I went Heisey, pie, and all. All I could think about was that Heisey, not in a box. I felt it here, and poked it there, and shook the bundle all the while mumbling about the Heisey.

MORE ABOUT PLATES

We have been having a lot of questions about the plates. Some people are confused with the Illinois address for ordering. One of the organized study groups, they volunteered to take the job this year since all of the pre June work can be done anywhere and it takes a big load off local members here in Newark. The plates will not be delivered until nearly convention time and will stay right in Newark until shipped.

There are also a lot of inquiries concerning the limitation of one plate per members of the club you should have the right to a plate ahead of anyone else. If plates are left sales will be open to the public after June 1. Only 2000 plates have been ordered.

As of April 1, we are having to charge sales tax and the

rate here is 4½ percent. Plates mailed to states other than Ohio need not pay tax but Ohio residents must. There will also be tax on those picked up at convention.

While you may get a plate if you wait, you will be guaranteed one if you order to-day.

Remember, the pattern is #1447 Rococo in Imperial's new Ultra Blue. It has both the Diamond H mark and Imperial's IG. This is the fifth of a series of 6.

The price, when mailed, was wrong in last month's issue. It is \$12.00 plus tax if picked up in Newark or \$13.-50 if mailed and Ohio residents must add tax. (54¢.)

For comparison purposes, Mc-Kee-Jeannette Glass Co. registered "Prescut" on November 29, 1904 under trademark #43,792 and on October 10, 1905 under trademark #46,839. Cambridge Glass Co. registered "Nearcut" on November 28, 1905 under trademark #47,970.

On June 5,1909, George D. Heisey, President, filed an application for a trademark consisting of a diamond-shaped figure (no H inside) for pressed glassware. It was registered on November 23,1909 as trademark #75,897. The registration statement indicates "continual use since about November 1, 1900. trade mark is applied or affixed to the goods or to the containing the packages goods by pressing or by use of a printed label. My opinion is that Heisey registered the diamond shape as a precaution against someone

using it since it could easily be mistaken for the Heisey trademark.

On September 27, 1916, the Heisey Company filed an application for a trademark, consisting of a horizontal oval with the words "American Crystal", for lime-blown glass. No claim was made to the words "American Crystal" except in commection with the mark. The trademark registra-tion indicates continuous used since June 5, 1916. The trademark is blown or pressed in the glass article or is placed on by printed label including the package as The color of the articles. the oval is blue when used in a label. It was registered on May 15, 1917 under trademark #116,634. In this registration, no reference is made to a President; only to A.H. Heisey, E.W. Heisey and T.C. Heisey as members of the firm.



The #379 Urn toothpick and master salt were reversed by accident in last month's article.
