STORIES OF OUR LOVE AFFAIR WITH HEISEY GLASS

Native son Jerry Juniper, who moved to Lake Wells, Florida, but comes home to Newark often.

Jerry grew on Cedar Street, about two blocks from the Heisey factory. As a child he saw men at work in the factory as he walked by. He and his friends walked by every day on his way to and from Lincoln Junior High School. "We could see the molten glass and the men with their tools," he said. He was fascinated by what he saw of this important industry right in his neighborhood.

Years later he was fascinated by the sight of the King House advancing down the street toward him. At that time he lived on 9th Street. He distinctly remembers going downtown to buy a New York Times. "I had to turn right on 6th Street and here was this house coming right at me," he said.

He admits he had no great interest in Heisey glass at the time. In fact, he remembers when Heisey glass was being sold by the bushel basket in Newark for \$5 or \$6 dollars, and sometimes people wanted the basket more than they wanted the glass! That was in the 1960's.

But, Heisey was part of his family history and he grew to value and admire it. His mother died when he was an infant and his father remarried. Jerry's new stepmother was a granddaughter of Louis Rehbeck, who was an executive of the A.H. Heisey Company. As a wedding gift from the company, she received a large punchbowl with hooks and cups. "Many years later, when she went on Social Security she had to start selling it off," said Jerry. "When she died, she had nine pieces left, I got three of the pieces."

His wife Millie inherited a lot of glassware and developed an interest in it. "She finds Heisey everywhere and she is now able to identify it pretty well," he said. He enjoys the hunt too, and coming back for the convention to visit friends and relatives. He remains proud of Newark and its industry, and pleased that the products fashioned by men and women using fire to create art from humble sand are still highly prized today.



HCA ABSENTEE VOTING INSTRUCTIONS for Electing HCA Board of Directors

All HCA Voting Members in good standing are eligible to cast votes at the Annual Meeting in June. We will be electing three people to serve on the HCA Board of Directors. Candidate information will be published in the May 2019 issue of the Heisey News. As your HCA Secretary, one of my duties is to oversee this election.

You, as a Voting Member, may vote in person at the June Annual Meeting or by Absentee Ballot. The current HCA Voting Members list was published on pages 12 & 13 of the March 2019 issue of the Heisey News. Check your status on the list to be sure we have it correct. If you have any questions, please contact the Membership Clerk at the Museum.

You may request an Absentee Ballot any time after the beginning of the calendar year, however the Absentee Ballots will be not be prepared until after the slate of candidates has been adopted at the quarterly membership meeting held at the Benefit Auction in April. Absentee Ballots will be available after May 1, 2019. You may pick up a ballot at the Museum or mail your request to:

Along with your written request, be sure to include a self-addressed envelope. If you affix a stamp too it would help to defray expenses. As your request arrives at the Museum, it will be assigned a voting number. When the Absentee Ballots are available, a blank corresponding-numbered Absentee Ballot will be placed in a new envelope, with your name and voting number written on the outside. This new envelope will be put into the self-addressed envelope you provided and mailed back to you.

When you receive your Absentee Ballot, remove it from the envelope, cast your vote, place the Absentee Ballot back into the envelope, and seal it. Put this envelope into a new envelope, addressing it back to the address above. Note: <u>To be included in the election, your Absentee Ballot must be received by the Membership Clerk by 4:00 pm (EST) on Friday, June 7, 2019.</u>

After the polls are closed, the absentee votes are combined with votes cast by the voting members present at the Annual Meeting and the ballot tallying begins.

Please note that according to HCA By-Laws, Article VII, Section f, as approved in June 2011: "If the number of nominees equals the number of Director vacancies, the ballot voting shall be deemed unnecessary when approved by the majority of voting members present."

Members offer suggestions for HCA services and activities

(Fourth in a series of articles on results of the HCA Member Survey. See October and December 2018 and February 2019 issues for previous stories.)

Many members of Heisey Collectors of America (HCA) showed their interest in the museum and the organization by providing a wealth of written comments through the online survey HCA conducted last June.

"Our members put a great deal of time and thought into their written comments. We appreciate the ideas they shared," said HCA President Michael Maher. "The board has been analyzing those results and using them to set priorities for the future."

In all, 27 pages of comments were gathered. Because of the sheer number of comments, this article focuses on only one question: *Please list other services or activities you would like HCA to offer*. (This question followed a 15-part question that asked members to rank the importance of the services, resources and activities currently offered).

Several themes were repeated in the comments:

- Need for more information or greater access to information
- Assistance to study clubs
- Suggestions for operations and programming at the Museum
- ♦ Marketing HCA
- ♦ Glass related services
- ♦ Finance

Most comments were suggestions for improvements, but 15 of the responses suggested that the Museum is fine as it is. Some of these indicated the Museum is constantly improving and looks great. Others acknowledged that additional services would require more time, money, and staff to accomplish.

Regarding the need for more information, a number of people suggested sharing more archived material in print or electronically, several asked for an online glass identification system and for a searchable digital photo database. Others suggested providing online reprints of old catalogs and more information on glassmaking. Several suggestions were related to improving the Museum's web presence and using the website as a way to get promotional videos* before the public.

Members also made a number of suggestions for Heisey News and the website, including more articles on Heisey



glass in general and on specific patterns, fewer noneducational articles, providing a space for members to express opinions and/or ask questions, and providing a space for member-to-member offerings of glass for sale or inquiries about glass they want.

Most of the suggestions regarding study clubs were related to providing Heisey information for meetings through such things as a traveling exhibit and prepared presentations that study clubs could use at their meetings or for outreach to other groups such as garden clubs or antique clubs, and informational videos on the website that could be used for small study clubs and individuals.

Several people suggested greater use of technology to bring people together and to provide information. One member suggested a study club with meetings via computer that could involve people from throughout the country and beyond. Another person suggested video streaming HCA seminars and events for those who are unable to attend.

A number of suggestions related specifically to the museum, such as providing evening hours once a week, offering blockbuster exhibits using rare pieces of Heisey glass in the collection, providing more educational programs in general and specifically for children and youth, teaching a table manners class to young people using Heisey glass, and providing opportunities for people to tour the old factory. Some asked for photos of museum gift shop items in the newsletter or online and one person suggested that HCA auction catalogs include photos.

Other suggestions for glass-related services included providing Heisey verification**, offering online bidding for HCA auctions and providing members help in liquidating private collections.

Watch for more member suggestions in upcoming issues of Heisey News. The next article will focus on members' suggestions for improving the National Heisey Glass Museum.

The King House

This home was built in 1831 for Samuel Dennis King, the first trial lawyer in Licking County. The King family had lived in the home for 142 years and the family had the house moved from the original location on the square in 1894. Great-granddaughter Elizabeth King still lived in the home when it was to be torn down for a new hotel. It was donated to the Heisey Collectors of America by the builders. It just had to be moved from its original location on North Second Street. The land it is currently on is the Newark Sixth Street Memorial Park. The house was moved here in September 1973. After repairs, renovations and additions of lighted cabinets it was opened September 1974 as the Heisey Museum.

The Outside of the House

The period of the house is Greek revival. The original Greek portico was reconstructed from photos. The foundation has some of the original sandstone from Second Street. The steps are made from grinding stones imported from England. They were used by the Heisey factory to finish the glass. There are four more in a wall on the Church Street side and another is in the porch floor. These were donated by Percy Moore of Newark. The porch light is a reproduction but the knocker and name plate are original.

Front Entrance Hall

The glass around the doorway and the plaster medallion on the ceiling are original. The candle lantern is of the same period of the house and is similar to the original. The stair rail of the hanging stairway is solid cherry. All woodwork is original.

Room One

The bookcases are original to the house and were formerly in the parlor. The glass shelves and lights were added. The cabinet holding the toothpicks is from a group of cabinets which were originally in the Fletcher's Drug Store located on the south side of the square in downtown Newark. Every known Heisey toothpick is on display.

Room Two

The mantel, fireplace and woodwork are original. The portraits above are of Augustus H. Heisey and his wife Susan Duncan Heisey, the daughter of George Duncan of the George Duncan & Sons Glass Company. The chandelier is original. The hanging wall cabinet was presented to the Museum by the Land of Legend Heisey Study Club.

Room Three

The original parlor. The chandelier is original. The portrait is of Samuel Dennis King, who had the house built. The mantel, fireplace and woodwork are original. The furniture is appropriate to the time period.

Theaters big in Newark

From the files of the Licking County Historical Society

Historical Society
The late Brandt G. Smythe wrote in a Newark Advocate article in 1940 that the first theater in Newark was in the upper story of a red-painted frame building, owned by Jacob Little.

The Auditorium Theatre, built by subscriptions from school children, was first known as The Soldiers and Sailors Memorial and was dedicated on Feb. 15, 1895.

The land was donated by Samuel D. King, a great-grandiather of Miss Elizabeth King, whose residence at 64 N. Second St. was moved from the Auditorium Theatre site and in 1973 was moved to Sixth Street Museum Park to be used as The Heisey Museum.

North of the house was the law office of Samuel D. King, now on Brice Court. The next theater built was the Midland Construction started in May 1928, and the

building opened in December 1928. In the 1880s and '90s there were many silent movie, one-room places called nickelodeons, costing a nickel. The Alhambra and Orpheum were in the Arcade the Mazda on the northeast corner of arcade annex on West Main Street; the Lyric located on South Third and the Bijou on West Mair Street.

On South Park Place, Abe Thomas ran the Grand on the site of Clary's or the Goodwil store; the Gem was on South Park Place near the bank.

Out in the popular Idlewilde Park, the summer theater was a place for summer stock theater and concerts. The new open side electric trolley street cars carried the crowds to and from the Idlewilde Part Theatre.

Room Four

This was originally the second parlor. Note the unusual doors with porcelain knobs. The doors were built for the wedding of the King's daughter. The portrait is of Mary Ann King, the wife of Samuel D. King. The chandelier is not original but of the same period. The banquet table was originally in the house and was donated by Elizabeth King. The cherry cabinets were made by Ollie Armentrout, a fine furniture maker in Newark, using some of the cherry wood from the Heisey factory. The mantel installed at the time the house was first moved with Embossed Art Tile Mantel Facing #1011f composed by sixteen, six inch by six inch tiles. They are shown in the 1902 catalog of the American Encaustic Tile company of Zanesville Ohio. To learn more see Heisey News vol. ZLI #4 April 2011.

Room Five

This was formerly the dining room. The cabinets circa 1850 came from a jewelry store in Pennsylvania. The chandelier is of the period but is not original to the house.

The Middle Room (Gallery 3)

This room created by the Heisey Collectors of America from original exterior space is now used as a rotating display area. A,H. Heisey's desk is located here.

Lower Level

This was opened as a display area in 1977. The cabinets on the right side were formerly in the Fletcher's Drug Store in Newark.

Upstairs is currently closed to visitors. This area is used for storage and accessing and de-accessing glass for the collection. It includes three rooms mimicking the downstairs with the original mantels, fireplaces and woodwork. The cabinets are from an old drugstore in Mansfield, Oho and date from the early 1900's. A fourth room is used to archive reproduction glass in built in wall cabinets.

Your Heisey Auction Committee members have been discussing ways to improve both the Dave Spahr Select and Spring Benefit Auctions. The desired result has always been and will continue to be a high-end auction of integrity. The more sought-after and rarer the items of Heisey glassware are, the more successful the auction will be for both the consignors and HCA. Yearly, a large amount of consignments and donations of glass are received and we are very thankful for this continued support. Even though most pieces are flawless and impeccable, many are damaged, unclean, and a few are not even Heisey. Receiving unclean, damaged glass creates more work for volunteers. They must wash the dirty glassware, remove any stickers before each item can be carefully examined for damage and condition.

In order to achieve our goals, your Committee plans to implement new guidelines. The consignor should ensure that the glass is Heisey, clean, sticker free, and undamaged. Please re-examine the glass for breaks, cracks or flea bites before packing. The only time a damaged piece might be accepted is when it is considered rare. In this instance, the extent of the damage will be the determining factor. If there are any questions as to what might be acceptable please contact a Committee member or the Museum.

Thank you for your assistance in maintaining the high level of integrity which Dave Spahr and others have worked so hard to establish and maintain.
