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
National Heisey Glass Museum

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Little Dreams



"The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams". This quote is as relevant today as when it was said by **Eleanor Roosevelt**. We must dream and hope for the betterment of our Museum and organization. I am so proud of our Museum and the dedication of the early founding members (now those were real dreamers!) and look where they brought us! We have an amazing Museum campus and should be so proud of all the dreams that have been achieved.

Our recent "Dreams Donations campaign" has come to a close for now and I would like to thank every person and club who assisted in contributing to make our Museum a better place. In this article I will approach many dreams that have become a reality, as a result of your graciousness and confidence of our Heisey Glass Museum.

As you can see in monetary donations toward projects and Museum needs, we **blew the stopper off our cocktail shaker** thermometer! I am so proud of our achievements and what you contributed. Let's recap these donations.

Our dreams began with donations to our exterior needs with new blue glaze garden planters for the administration building porch. Thank you to **Bob and Bev Heise** for these gifts. These planters give a welcoming appearance and help us give a friendlier vibe to the neighborhood.

Next thanks to **Phyllis Deal** who pledged the money for the new entry sign. Our first impression is an important one and our current entry sign into the Museum courtyard was in need of an update. We are working on its replacement, thanks Phyllis.

Security and safety are two major important aspects of our Museum. On the exterior, the two alley ways at the sides of the Museum were always dark crevices that attracted unwanted behavior. Due to the graffiti, stolen bike stash corral, and drug paraphernalia being left behind, we knew we needed to install better lighting in those areas. **Suzanne Parker** donated the funds and the lights were installed in less than a week. Thank you, Suzanne.

Another donation came from **Robert Loch** toward improving the Museum's security and safety for our guests, members and staff... And of course, our glass. The donation netted \$5,019.00. I will be working with Robert to ensure these funds improve areas of our Museum concerns in security/safety. Thank you Robert.

We had some concerns for preservation at the Museum and those were generously addressed. The new Hollywood Gallery is one of our most popular spaces for visitors. We were concerned that the natural light coming in thru the windows may fade the enlarged images of celebrities holding Heisey. The windows were ultraviolet tinted to prevent the sun's harmful rays. Thanks again to **Bob and Bev Heise**.

The radio broadcast system (original Heisey radio ad) that played in the hall that connects Gallery One to the King House was not able to be played independently anymore. We had a donation to make it play on demand with a push of a button (versus playing on repeat all day long) for a more interactive visitor experience. Thank you, **Michigan Heisey Study Club**.

Our big preservation project is the HCA archives digitization and we are so blessed to have a donation of \$8,035.00 donated toward this important and needed project. The Archives Committee is working hard to

create a plan of action to ensure this is completed in the best way possible. Thanks again to **Robert Loch** for your faith and passion for Our Museum.

Another digitization project is capturing drone footage of the exterior of our Museum. For use in promotional videos and to create a dramatic display of an impactful welcome to the Heisey Museum. This opportunity was donated by, **Norman Crane, on behalf of the Northern Virginia Heisey Study Club.**

I believe, a Museum without needs would be a museum without growth. Some amenities that needed updating and improved included:

New table pad covers for the King House dining table (to protect the table top) Thank you to **the North Carolina Heisey Study Group.** These pads are in place and being used currently.

Those who volunteer at the museum know that an additional large wheel cart for moving glass around the Museum, specifically for auction glass movement was much needed. This was graciously donated by **Bobbie and Karen Taylo** and is in use today.

We always need to thank those who are anonymous! Several of the office chairs throughout the museum were in need of repair many were very worn and beat up. One was missing an arm and another missing wheels. These chairs have been replaced thanks to an **anonymous donor.** The Museum staff are very appreciative of this improvement.



We also had a few "undesigned" donations totaling \$1,100.00 by **Janice Weber** and **Sharon Holihan** for projects that the Museum or myself choose to use these funds for. There are plenty of dreams that still need fulfilled and these will be completed from this donation.

Our last and largest dream was the replacement of carpet in the 1993 Museum Addition. 

MUSEUM ACQUISITIONS (NON-MONETARY) JULY 2018 – JUNE 2019

The Museum has been extremely fortunate to be the recipient of a great deal of wonderful glass during the last year. Some pieces were donated specifically to be added to the collection, but we received a lot of glass that was designated for the benefit of HCA. All of this glass is reviewed and any item which is not found to be in the collection is also accessed into the Museum collection. The remainder is designated to be sold either in our Museum Shop or at a future auction.

Some of you have inquired as to what the Museum would like to add to our collection. For a long while the Museum's objective was to have a good representative collection with examples of all patterns, colors, and decorations done at the Heisey factory. We have now expanded the collection objective to have a solid study collection that encompasses all the production that A.H. Heisey & Company produced. Any piece that the Museum does not own would be accepted. If you have a piece that you think the Museum does not own, call the Museum and we will check our database. If you have many pieces, send us a list and we will gladly let you know which pieces the Museum would like.

HEISEY COVERED MARMALADES



The dictionary defines “marmalade” as “a jellylike preserve in which small pieces of fruit and fruit rind, as of oranges or lemons, are suspended” (Dictionary.com). Its origins can be traced to 15th-century Portugal, where it was made with quince. By the 17th century, oranges were being used, and several recipes for marmalade made with Seville oranges have survived from that time until the present day. It became a fixture on English and Scottish breakfast tables, primarily those of the well-to-do, as it was a luxury product, time-consuming to make. English and Scottish settlers brought it to the New World.


Throughout its sixty-year history, A. H. Heisey & Co. produced a wide variety of containers and serving dishes for marmalades, jellies, and preserves. It is not known why Heisey thought it necessary to provide different containers specifically for each of these very similar condiments. Perhaps it was simply a marketing strategy, to provide glassware for every conceivable purpose.

This program focuses on the covered containers for marmalade made by Heisey. Most of them are in the shape of jars, taller than they are wide, with notched covers to accommodate a spoon. They could be used with a sterling or silver plated spoon or Heisey’s no. 4 marmalade spoon. Some were marketed by Heisey as horseradish jars as well as marmalades. When supplied with covers without a notch for a spoon, some were sold as hotel sugar bowls or pickle or cherry jars. Those made in plain or Colonial patterns are often found with decorations by Heisey and other companies. Decorations found on marmalades include cuttings, etchings, gold, silver, enamel, and gold and enamel. Decorating companies sometimes purchased the marmalade jar only, without the cover, and added their own decoration (typically silver overlay or a cutting) and a sterling silver lid.


Heisey's earliest patterns, such as 1201 Fandango and 1205 Fancy Loop, did not include covered marmalade jars. The first covered marmalades were made around 1903, in the Colonial-style 341 Puritan pattern. Unlike later marmalades, they had stoppers instead of covers and were squat in shape. Soon afterward, several Colonial patterns, including 352 Flat Panel 353 Medium Flat Panel, 392-395 Narrow Flute, and 473 Narrow Flute with Rim, offered covered marmalade jars. The Narrow Flute pattern alone had four different marmalades; three of them are shown below.



Introduced in 1909 and 1913, respectively, the 353 Medium Flat Panel (photo) and 1183 Revere/1184 Yeoman covered marmalades were often used for decorating by Heisey and other companies and are the easiest for collectors to find today. The 1184 Yeoman line included a second marmalade, consisting of the Revere quarter pound footed candy jar with a notched cover. Also used for decorating were four blown marmalades, 4121 Glenn, 4122 Weaver, 4123, and 4125 (called an "individual marmalade". The Glenn marmalade is the easiest of these to find today and is especially desirable when decorated with Heisey's 507 Orchid etching.

Most of Heisey's covered marmalades were made in Crystal only, even during the 1920s and 1930s when colored glassware was popular. The exceptions were the 1401 Empress dolphin foot covered marmalade, made in Crystal, Flamingo, Moongleam, and Sahara, the 1000 marmalade, made in Crystal and Alexandrite, and the 1485 Saturn marmalade, made in Crystal and Zircon. The 479 Petal footed covered marmalade (photo) may have been made in Flamingo and Moongleam as well as Crystal.

Heisey continued to offer marmalades in several patterns from the late 1930s through the 1950s. The 1509 Queen Ann dolphin foot marmalade is the same as the Empress marmalade, except for an added optic. The 1511 Toujours apple marmalade is popular with collectors today. A lucky few may find one with a Krall cutting. The 1469 Ridgeleigh marmalade was apparently made from the mold for the 473 Narrow Flute with Rim marmalade, reworked to remove the plain rim of the earlier piece. The 1503 Crystolite "marmalade", was called a "jam jar" by Heisey, but it finds a place in most collections of marmalades. The 1567 Plantation marmalade was made in the shape of the pattern's pineapple motif, the symbol of hospitality. Heisey marketed it in sets of two marmalades, or one marmalade and one syrup, on a tray.

One of the more difficult marmalades to find is the 1506 Whirlpool/Provincial marmalade, made from the footed tumbler with an added cover. A mustard jar in the pattern was made in the same manner, using the footed oyster cocktail as a base. Another elusive item is the blown 5012 marmalade, produced for a short time during World War II. The 1593 Prism marmalade is also difficult to find today.

Spanning almost all of the company's history, Heisey's covered marmalade jars provide a representative sampling of the many styles of glassware the company produced during the sixty years it was in business.







Bylaws Changes

Constitution and Bylaws Committee

At the Annual Meeting of the membership on June 14, 2019, the following changes to the Bylaws were adopted.

ARTICLE I Meetings

Section 2 Annual Meetings

The annual meeting shall be held in June for the installation of elected directors and for the presentation of annual reports and transaction of other business. The election of Directors shall be held at the annual meeting which may be designated as the "election meeting." The term of Directors shall officially begin at the close of business of the annual meeting. (approved 6/14/2019)

ARTICLE II Duties of Officers

Section 4 Treasurer

It shall be the responsibility of the Treasurer to have custody of all funds, accounting for same to the organization at its annual meeting and at any other time upon demand by the Board of Directors and to perform such other duties as pertain to the office. The Treasurer shall be responsible for the collection of dues and funds of the organization and deposit them in the bank or depository named by the Board of Directors. Upon retirement from office, the Treasurer shall turn over to the successors or to the President all funds, books and accounts or any other organization property in the Treasurer's possession. The Treasurer shall furnish bond in the amount determined by the board of Directors, the cost of which bond shall be paid by the organization. (approved 6/14/2019)

ARTICLE III Board of Directors

Section 2 Functions

(a) The Board shall be responsible for the appropriation of all funds of the organization and shall, through the President or other duly authorized member of the Board, approve all vouchers before payment at the direction of the Treasurer. The Board shall designate the bank or depository in Licking County, Ohio for funds of the organization and determine the amount of the bond which shall be given by the President and Treasurer. The board shall receive and approve the Budget and the annual financial statement of the organization. (approved 6/14/2019)
