


Words From Your Director – Curator



Late July and August have been full of activities and excitement here at your Heisey home base and as we find ourselves, way too fast, at the start of September there are many exhilarating opportunities awaiting us !

Michael and I had the unusual and fantastic opening, thanks to the generosity of the Hill family, to spend an entire day at The Heisey Factory. We are continuing to work on our new introduction Video as well as a future planned installation in Gallery 3. We packed and took to the factory, eight boxes of fine items from our Museum collection to be photographed where they were “born”. As we unpacked and laid out for staging many items that had not been in the space for over one hundred years, it was an amazing feeling of somehow reliving history. There was time in-between the photo sets to just sit and try to take it all in. Many of

the windows have been block infilled or boarded over since the Heisey production days however one is still hit with an incredible amount and quality of natural light and shows how it changes in a day. The contrast between the honest grit of the factory and the beauty of the glass produced there, really hits home when you have the luxury of time and views in this “PLACE”. The cross shape with glass on all sides allows for good viewing of the items from many angles and made for very informative displays. There was also an alcove area set up with two very effective period dining rooms; one of the Victorian era, and one Mid-Century. “Taking Heisey Home”

I am very honored to have been ‘behind the scenes’ for the filming of our New Heisey Introductory video. If you are connected to the Museum’s page on Facebook, you too may have experienced a sneak peak.

The many interviews are completed, footage of the glass captured, and I added a humbling and enlightening experience I had that I hope will help viewers feel the experience as well.

The result...We couldn't be happier with the correct lighting and background. It was very humbling that the earliest pieces from 1896 were filmed on the brick herringbone patterned floor where they were born from fire 123 years ago!

Photography footage and video footage of glass, as we know, is a tricky thing. Our goal was to create an experience for the viewer to see the different Heisey colors, eras and specialties in its true beauty. We filmed 16 production colors (including crystal), in addition to eras of production. For the early years: imitation cut pieces, war era: military cap ashtray, Lariat, Crystalite, and as for the late years: designs of Town and Country, Dawn and Eva Zeisel inspirations. These items all together accounted for 23 groupings of 5-6 pieces of glass. This segment of filming totaled nearly 130 pieces of Heisey History documented.

We discussed backdrop options, black, white, blue cloth... But what better back drop than the factory where these pieces were created? We sought permission from the owners of the original Heisey factory to use their space as the ambient background for our footage. We took the Heisey glassware from our Museum collection to the Original Historic Heisey factory to film it for the New Introductory Video.

The entire experience was amazing. Of course any opportunity to be in the factory is great, but this was much different. Seeing the different eras of production right before our eyes, viewing how styles, trends, colors and production changed in the places where it took place was enlightening. In the moment I pondered about the changes that Heisey went through in their production. Early years, Emerald, Custard, Opal, Vaseline, colonial era, Etchings, Flamingo, Moongleam, Marigold, Hawthorne, Alexandrite, Sahara, cuttings, Cobalt, Tangerine, war years, Amber, animals, Zircon, Dawn, late years. Just seeing and holding these successful creations that were produced here, not just in Newark, Ohio, but here in this exact space, and I was touching it- this was incredibly humbling. We used elements from the space to elevate and accent the items, using original bricks, wood "ware bins," carts and stools, and a metal ladle used for stirring the batches of glass. These elements provided an industrial view on this art glass and highlighted the glassware's beauty.



We also were fortunate to film two interviews in the rustic space. One interview was captured in a glass storage room and another was in the mould department.

The glass storage room was one of the earliest spaces still intact. It was lined with tall, to the ceiling, cabinets (some with doors, and others just open storage). These shelves would have held stock glassware to be pulled for orders as they were processed. As the archives note, Heisey was able to produce the orders on demand, they made the items sent them to storage and as orders were placed, they were filled, but if something was out of stock then it went into production again. These wooden shelves had paper tags still in place listing what would have sat in that designated space. I found two dated ones 1953 and 1955. Showing that this early room was used up until the end of their production. The walls had exposed pipes and electric lines running up the walls to the ceiling. There were old capped gas pipes which were used for gas lighting (probably up until 1900) when the electric knob and tube wiring would have been installed. There also was a fire sprinkler system with pipes and sprayers attached. It was a mechanical setup for success and was all still intact and able to show us how the factory dynamics had evolved, just like their production designs that would have sat in those wooden cupboards. The walls had peeling paint and lots of debris on the floor, but the room gave me chills. Amongst the rubble was a #1567 Plantation salt shaker, just laying there.



The other room we filmed in was the mould department, and it was very humbling for me. As my great grandfather, Roy Rector Smith, who was employed by Heisey from 1919-1957 was titled: Mould Foreman. This space is filled with large windows, of natural light, coming in from Newark, Ohio's Oakwood Avenue, the sounds of the Holophane glass company (still in business) hummed through the room and gave an eerily reminiscent sound of what hustling and bustling occurred in this space.



The absolute coolest thing occurred while we were in this room a train came bustling down the tracks in front of the factory. Although it was not delivering silica sand, raw precious minerals for the formulas or leaving with barrels of glass cargo, the train's cars and wheels have a rumbling sound which echoed through the factory walls and really was bone chilling.



The rumble of the tracks and the shrill of the horn hit me like the train itself. I was very emotional after hearing the sounds of an era gone by in the spaces that they once occurred. The mould room still has wooden models made for casting moulds, most of items we as collectors would not recognize. They are labeled with #s and abbreviations. Most are for cylinders and gauges (either for war use, or for use in the factory itself). These mould models have been in this room for nearly 75 years and yet we still don't know about their use or need. We are so very fortunate the current owners are respectfully preserving these for their personal interest.




The mysteries and unknowns that still exist in the factory are amazing. The place is huge. Many rooms have been identified and their uses are known, but others we just studied and tried

to figure out why it was here. The Heisey company added on building expansions as the need occurred. They would have had stone/brick masons and carpenters on staff. The Cooper shop (Barrel makers) employees were probably the carpenters and the Masons would have been needed for the constant attention to the firebrick, the furnaces, and glory holes. Speaking of furnaces, we were in the factory from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. and the morning was very comfortable. As day went on the factory became very hot, we were sweating while doing very minimal moving, the interviews were spent wiping brows of perspiration. It was very hot, on a mid-80s temperature day the heat inside was nearly unbearable. I cannot imagine the intense heat while the furnaces were lit, glory hole flames blasting and annealing ovens blowing. The heat must have been exhausting.



In reference of the glory holes, I was wondering what the divots in the concrete floor were surrounding the circle on the floor where the small furnace (glory hole) once stood. There were 8 different sets of indentations scarred into the concrete floor. I was told, these were from the "snap" tool banging on the floor when removing items to and from the flame of the fire polishing furnace. The tool would "snap" on the bust off or foot of the item, and a different snap tools was needed for each item. It was very neat to see the scars of the production and confirm to us that each glory hole had 8 openings for use.



Its a cheesy thing to say, but I would love to hear the Walls Talk. If only we could go back in time and listen to the walls of the factory tell us the stories of the daily activity. I guess it wouldn't matter if they could because we wouldn't be able to hear them over the sounds of the production, the furnace, the trains, the steam compression engines, belts and pulleys, the workers' feet, conversations and carts that were rolling across the floors, the banging of tools and moulds.



The sounds are still there and the glassware produced still survives, living on as the legacy of those artists who came before us producing the best glassware for the masses of the highest quality and design.

The preservation of this quality and care will be shown in the New Introductory Video, an industrial giant in Newark Ohio and a legacy that is living strong thanks to you, our National Membership!

A continued thank you for all you do to promote, educate and preserve our future.



Highlights of the 2019 Dave Spahr Fall Select Auction

The Dave Spahr Fall Auction glass has now been cataloged and I can hardly wait to tell you all about it. On October 19, there will be 324 lots offered for sale. Last year's auction was exceptional in its quality, and I can truly say that this year we come very close to that high mark. We have rarities throughout this auction – items which you may have never seen and have never had a chance to purchase. I will list a few of these wonderful items here but be sure to look at the catalog because I just do not have the room to mention all of the great items we are offering in this auction.

The auction starts out with a group of water pitchers and jugs including a beautiful 325 Pillow ½ gallon (Lot 11). Animals include a 104 Gazelle (105), 5 Show Horse (108), 1 Airedale (109), and a pair of 1 Doe Head bookends (116). Candlesticks are also well represented including a pair of 1488 Kohinoor candelabra in Zircon (180) and singles in the rarely seen 111 Cherub frosted (215) and 104 Bertha (219) both in Moongleam. There is also a 300-5 Old Williamsburg 5-light candelabrum (312).

We have pieces in almost all Heisey production colors. Among the special items are a 1404 Old Sandwich 12 oz Amber beer mug (94). There are several lots of Flamingo 447 Empress etch (172-178) and Moongleam 1252 Twist (244-253). There is an excellent array of colored vases including 4217 Frances 7" (20) and 4214 Elaine DO (21) both in Moongleam, 4159 Classic in Hawthorne (24), and 4209 Oval 9" in Flamingo (25). There are also four Favor Vases: 4228 Cobalt, 4232 Moongleam, 4228 Sahara, and 4231 Cobalt (88-91 respectively).

This auction is especially good for some of Heisey's earlier patterns. There are 10 lots of 335 Prince of Wales Plumes (12-13, 27-34) including cake stand, finger bowl, and molasses can. There are four lots of 365 Old Queen Anne (293-296) including 2 oz oil and high footed shallow comport. Other early pieces include a 1200 Cut Block water bottle (53) and cake salvers in 1295 Beaded Swag (58) and 339 Continental (59).

Nice colonial pieces include 461 Convex Circle candy (14), 357 crushed fruit (15), 355 24 oz syrup with molded in "USMC 1920" probably made as a special order of the US Marine Corps, and a full set of 465 Recessed Panel candy jars (205-210) including the hard to find 8 lb.

There are a good number of items in 1567 Plantation (97-104) including the rarely seen coupe plate and snack set. Other individual pieces from latter patterns include a 1485 Saturn mustard with attached paddle (82), a pair of 4044 New Era 9" plates with 825 Sea Glade cutting (165), a 1489 ½ Puritan 13" floral bowl in the hexagon shape (314), a 1447 Rococo gardenia bowl made from the cracker plate (319), and two sets of 2 salad fork and spoon – lot 277 plain and lot 278 with beaded handles.

This auction will complete the dispersal of the fabulous collection of cordials that we have been selling over the last couple of years (61-80). Included in this auction are a 3416 Barbara Fritchie Alexandrite bowl (66) and a set of six 5011 Yorktown with extremely elaborate cutting (80). Other stems include a 3419 Cognac pony brandy (134), 3376 Adam in Flamingo with 169 Biltmore etch (189), and a nice set of 3404 Spanish in Cobalt (182-184). Other barware items of note include a 5060 Washington Square decanter (282) and 4036 Marshall footed decanter with 945 Virginia cutting (289).

Other special pieces of note are a mirror advertising sign (128), 1121 marked individual salt (84), and a rarely seen 5015 9" vase with nice cutting (311). There are three unusual salt and pepper shakers: a set of number 6 (140), a set of 1951 Cabochon with 1015 Dolly Madison Rose cutting (141), and a set of 1776 Kalonyal (142). We have three unusual punch sets: 364 Old Queen Anne w/8 cups (279), 1776 Kalonyal shallow w/1 cup (281), and 343 Sunburst cupped w/12 cups (301).

Space prevents me from listing more but the full auction catalog is available to you in this issue of the Heisey News. Please consider coming to this outstanding auction, or, if you cannot make it, send in an absentee bid on any of the great lots available. I will be there and I hope to see you, too.

- 1) All lots are sold in numerical cataloged order.
- 2) The minimum starting bid per lot is \$15.
- 3) Payment: Cash, traveler's check, certified check or personal check or money order with proper ID. Visa, MasterCard and Discover cards are accepted. A 5% buyer's premium will be added. Buyer's premium waived for cash, cashier's check, money order or approved check payments. Cash only payment may be specified for individual bidders at HCA's request.
- 4) HCA has endeavored to describe all items to the best of their ability; however this is not a warranty. All items are sold as is and where is. The auctioneer has the right to make any verbal corrections at the time of sale and to provide additional information. Inspection is welcomed during preview and before the item is sold.
- 5) In the case of a disputed bid the auctioneers have the authority to settle disputes to the best of their ability and their decision(s) is/are final. Resale of items will be handled at the auctioneer's discretion.
- 6) The auctioneer has the right to set opening bids and reject any bid raise not in line with established bid increments. Items are sold without reserve, unless advertised otherwise.
- 7) All sales are final and all items must be paid for each day of sale. A moving and storage fee may be assessed for items not picked up within seven (7) calendar days after the last day of sale of the auction.
- 8) Buyers assume full responsibility for items once they are sold unless otherwise specified by HCA or the auctioneer. Buyer must have receipt in hand to pick up items.

Absentee Bid Instructions



As absentee bidders, we will bid competitively for you at the 2019 HCA Heisey Fall Select Auction to be held October 19, 2019. In case of duplicate bid amounts, the earliest postmark wins. Bids must reflect the listing in the catalog as to lot number, pattern, description, and condition. The minimum absentee bid per lot is \$15.

You set the maximum amount you are willing to pay on each lot. If successful, the remainder will be refunded. Please use good judgment in arriving at your maximum bid figure. Remember, there are minimum limits to raises that the auctioneer will accept (smaller items \$2.50, larger items \$5, \$10 or as much as \$25). Lots containing multiple items will be as one lot to the successful bidder. Normally, these are not split up, however, there may be some exceptions to this.

Please indicate on your bid the desired condition of the item on which you are bidding. We have endeavored to describe all items to the best of our ability and a bid on an item reflects your acceptance of the condition as listed. (As you know, if no flaws are noted, that means the glass is in generally good condition.) If you mark your bid "near mint only," we will use no discretion in your bid. If there is a variance on a lot not called in the catalog (such as unlisted damage or a difference in the number of items in a lot), we will not bid on that lot for you. Please use the form (or a copy) available in the *Heisey News*, or from this catalog, or from our website www.HeiseyMuseum.org to submit your bid. Absentee bids can be submitted by e-mail, fax, or postal service.

PAYMENT Cash, check, cashier's check, or money order payable to HCA Auction, and Visa/MasterCard/DiscoverCard accepted. A 5% buyer's premium will be added. Buyer's premium is deleted for cash, cashier's check, money order, or approved check payments. You may send a separate check for each lot or you may send one check covering the maximum amount of all bids. Absentee Bidders must make their own shipping arrangements. See Shipping section below for further information.

In addition, if you would like to pay by check, **Please** consider leaving the amount blank. Designate in the memo blank of your check an amount not to exceed the total amount of your bids. The Auction Manager or HCA Treasurer will fill in the exact amount of your purchase, thus greatly cutting back on refunds. Surplus bid money will be refunded. Send in a self-addressed, stamped envelope to return your checks. HCA reserves the right to reject any bid.

SHIPPING Buyers must make their own shipping arrangements including payments for shipping directly to the shipper. Glass is available to be picked up by your shipper on Tuesday, October 22, 2019, after 10:00 AM at the National Heisey Glass Museum, 169 W. Church St., Newark, OH 43055. HCA is aware of the following area shippers: Express Pack and Ship: 740-366-1325, Pakmail: 740-522-2564, and UPS Store 3910: 614-939-5195. HCA is not responsible for any services provided by these vendors. HCA will work with these vendors to make sure your glass is available.

BID SUBMISSION Absentee bids must be **received** no later than Friday, October 11, 2019, at 4:00 PM. Eastern Standard Time. When using a credit card number, bids may be faxed to 740-345-9638 using the Absentee Bidding Form. When your Fax is complete, please contact the Museum to ensure it has arrived and is removed from the Museum Fax machine as soon as it arrives. The Absentee Forms with personal checks, et. al., must be mailed to Absentee Bids, National Heisey Glass Museum, 169 W. Church Street, Newark, OH 43055. HCA, Inc. must have credit card information or cash, a personal check, money order, or traveler's check in its possession prior to executing a bid.

Show 'n' Tell brought out a #1590 Zodiac covered candy dish, a seldom seen Peerless 12" orange bowl and a #400 tab handled jelly. There was also a #1229 Octagon jelly mounted on a cherub and a green and gold painted trefoil ashtray. The #1183 Revere French Dressing set may fall in the never seen before category. We believe the decoration was done by an outside company.



The program was on Heisey's bi-color items. I do not remember seeing anything in Hawthorne but the other major colors were present. Crystal was the most represented color. Okay, yes, every piece was crystal and another color. Let me see there was a #5077 Legionnaire ice tea in amber & crystal. In tangerine there was a #3404 Spanish goblet, a #3389 Duquesne saucer champagne and sherbet. In Stiegel blue there was a #3397 Gascony cigarette holder and a #2323 Navy plate. In Limelight there was a #4083 Stanhope goblet. I saw a #3390 Carcassonne Alexandrite & Crystal sherbet.





Moongleam and Crystal seemed to be the most popular combination. There was a Twist mayo with a Moongleam foot, the delicate Biltmore nut dish, the #500 Octagon sugar with Moongleam handles, a #411Tudor sugar with cutting and Moongleam handles, Oak Leaf candlesticks with Moongleam bases and a pair of jugs, Fairacre and Koors. Second Quarter Financials

The first six furlongs of our race to the end of the year have been run. So, no more horsing around, let's talk numbers....

On the Revenue side, we are showing a positive YTD variance to budget of \$15,445. This is a bit deceptive due to the Convention Net amount. Our budget for the Convention was \$10,000. The financials show a net of \$22,093. This number will change due to a number of Convention related expenses paid in July.

Gift shop sales were very strong in June and helped us post a positive YTD variance of \$2,940. Cash donations are below budget by \$1,790.

There are three revenue line items not included in the Total Income: Acquisitions, Donations – Dreams/Other, and Donations – Museum Capital Fund. This revenue was not budgeted so it has been excluded from the total.

On to Expenses....We are over budgeted expenditures by \$5,151. The Museum staff is working to address these overages and monitor expenses going forward.

Two line items are not included in the Total Expenditures: Museum Expense – Dreams, and Advertising – Video Project. As with the revenue, these expenses were not budgeted and, therefore, are excluded from the total.

Making budget will be a challenge this year. The key to our success is, and always has been, the support of our members. Thank you for the many ways you contribute to the success of HCA and the Museum.

As of the end of June, Cash Donations are at 39.47% of budget, or, in other terms, \$1790 below our 6 month goal.


Our Cash Donations goal for 2019 (if you haven't noticed my Diamond H thermometer) is \$17,000. This is only about 8% of our total budgeted revenue, but it's an important 8%. Our Utilities expenses are budgeted at \$19,000 so it's an 8% that helps keep the lights on, the water flowing, the trash picked up and the telephones ringing at the Museum.
