A Closer Look at the King House Fireplace

In the past we have had the privilege of hosting the regional meeting of the Ohio Museum Alliance here at the Museum. That brought in many museum professionals with whom we were happy to share our facility. The last event of the day was a tour of our Museum. When we got to the King House dining room one of the attendees was very interested in the fireplace with the tile surround that is in that room. He was a collector of Ohio tiles and was pretty sure that he knew who made these very attractive tiles.




Our beautiful King House fireplace surround as installed during the remodel that occurred after the first move early last century.

Sure enough, the following Tuesday I got an email from Mitch Taylor of the

Pioneer & Historical Society of Muskingum County. Attached to the message was the picture shown below. Take a look at the back cover of this issue and you will find a picture of this fireplace. When I take visitors around the Museum this fireplace is always of interest. Many times people have asked me who did the tiles. My answer up to now has always been that I believed they were Ohio tiles, but I did not know who made them. Now I can say for certain that they were done by American Encaustic Tiling Company of Zanesville, OH.

The catalog picture sent to me by Mitch came from a 1902 company catalog, so that gives us some more information on when they may have been installed in the King House.

Elizabeth King, when she used to take people through her family home after it became our Museum, would tell how she learned to count by counting the frogs that are pictured on these tiles. There are nine of them as the tiles were installed on our fireplace. Interestingly, there were two more frogs in the original design, but the center top tile was modified by removing those to make the tiles fit the width of our fireplace. It is a shame too, because those frogs make the picture more complete and show a larger frog instructing the smaller frogs. I think that Elizabeth who was a school teacher would have really liked that. Come and take a look at this interesting fireplace the next time you visit.

TREASURER'S REPORT

January Financials

January revenue is estimated at \$5,968 against a budget of \$5,918. Sales for the month equaled \$1,803 with Real Heisey accounting for \$916 of the total. Donations to the Endowment totaled \$4,735.

Paycheck Protection Program – Second Draw

The Small Business Administration began accepting applications for Second Draw PPP Loans on January 13, 2021.

The Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) allows certain eligible borrowers that previously received a PPP loan to apply for a Second Draw PPP Loan with the same general loan terms as the First Draw PPP Loan.

A borrower is generally eligible for a Second Draw PPP Loan if the borrower:

- Previously received a First Draw PPP Loan and will or has used the full amount only for authorized uses;
- Has no more than 300 employees; and
- Can demonstrate at least a 25% reduction in gross receipts between comparable quarters in 2019 and 2020.

I am happy to report the SBA approved our Second Draw PPP loan application. The funds have been received and will support payroll for the next few months.

Cash Position

Our cash position remains good. The infusion of cash from the PPP loan will help us get through the traditionally slow winter months. Your continued support, as always, remains the key to our financial stability.





HCA 2020 Year-End Financials

2020 Year End Financials

Remember the Treasurer's bucket list mentioned in last month's newsletter? Well, check another item off the list: Making budget during a global pandemic! Let's look at how YOU made that happen.

As a reminder, three revenue line items are not included in the Total Income: Donations – Dreams/Other, Donations – Museum Capital Fund and Acquisitions Donations. This revenue was not budgeted so it has been excluded from the total. On the Expense side, there are two line items not included in the Total Expenditures: Museum Expense – Dreams and Acquisitions. As with revenue, these expenses were not budgeted.

On the revenue side, December Gift Shop Sales equaled \$6,672, exceeding budget by \$672 for the month and improving the YTD negative variance to \$1,396. The Sales total includes 2020 eBay sales of \$1,822 and \$305 in December website sales.

Cash Donations totaled \$1,040, under budget by \$377 for the month. The YTD positive variance equaled \$41,797. We far exceeded our goal for the year, bringing in an astounding \$58,797 in donations for the operation of the Museum.

We also received generous donations totaling \$16,410 for the Capital Fund and other projects.

The remainder of the 2019 Endowment earnings, \$55,369, was transferred to the Operating account during the month.

The YTD Total Income shows a positive variance to budget of \$16,994...an absolutely amazing result for 2020 given we were not able to hold a single one of our traditional fundraising events.

On the Expenditures side, many of the line items were under budget for the year. Salaries & Wages, Repairs and Maintenance, Lawn/Grounds Care, Utilities, and Advertising to name a few.

Overall expenses were under budget in 2020 by \$11,680.

Four main factors contributed to this year's positive outcome:

Our 2019 Endowment earnings were better than usual, exceeding budget by \$14,369.

The Paycheck Protection Program loan of \$21,409 received to support payroll.

The commendable job Jack and the Museum staff did holding the line on expenses.

And, most importantly, the tremendous support from you, our members. I've said it many times before and I'll say it many times more: What a wonderful, generous group of members we have! Thank you for your ongoing support of our organization.

We are excited about our first endeavor at doing an online auction and have spent many hours planning and learning about the process. We expect to learn more as we go forward with future online HCA auctions.

This will be an internet-only timed auction with no opportunity for previewing. All bidding activity will take place online. A timed auction is where a lot is available for a set period of time You will be able to place bids any time before the closing of a particular lot.

Our auction will be available through **www.<u>Heiseymuseum.hibid.com</u>**. You must create your personal bidder account and register on <u>hibid.com</u> to be able to bid on any lot. The process for registration is included in the auction catalog.

You will be able to view pictures of auction lots anytime during the pre-bidding and the live auction. There will be pre-bidding starting on March 26 and live online competitive bidding starting at 12:00 noon EST on April 9, 10 and 11. During live bidding one lot will close every minute. However, if a lot gets a bid within 30 seconds of a close, the bidding will be extended for an additional 30 seconds.

The credit card you used to register will be charged for the total amount of your winning bid invoice. Winning bidders will receive – *via email* – a complete itemized statement of their winnings and the amount charged to their credit card. This statement serves as your paid receipt.

Winning bidders will need to make their own arrangements to have their glass shipped. Glass will be available to be picked up at the Museum during normal business hours at the Museum starting on Tuesday, April 20 and must be picked up by April 30. The minimum starting bid per lot is \$15.00 for an Absentee Bid. Your bids must reflect the lot number, pattern, and description of items as listed in the catalog. Note there may be minimum bid increment raises on certain items.

SUBMITTING YOUR ABSENTEE BIDS

Bids may be submitted via USPS or via Fax. Mail form to "Absentee Bid" HCA, 169 W. Church St, Newark OH 43055 or Fax to (740) 345-9638. When your Fax is complete, please contact the Museum (740) 345-2932 to confirm it has arrived and is removed from the Fax machine.

Your Absentee bids must be signed and received at the Museum no later than 4:00 pm EST on Wednesday, March 31, 2021.

All payments to be made via Visa, MasterCard, or DiscoverCard. A 5% buyer's premium will be added.

Highlights of the 2021 Spring On-line Auction



By Walter Ludwig

The items for the 2021 Spring HCA Auction represent the full range of production of the Heisey Glass Company from their beginnings until the doors closed in 1957. There is something for everyone in this auction from the standard production to true rarities that you never are given a chance to buy.

This is the auction to participate in if you would like to start a collection, find the ideal wedding gift, or if you are a long time collector needing to add a special piece to your collection. The auction abounds in those old standbys of 1503 and 5003 Crystolite, 1540 and 5004 Lariat, 1567 and 5067 Plantation, 507 Orchid etch, 515 Heisey Rose etch, and many examples from Heisey's colonial lines. This year we also have a good number of lots in 1469 Ridgeleigh and 1506 Provincial. This is an auction rich in candlesticks and creams and sugars, but there is also a large number of "little things" including an unusual number of ashtrays, nuts, and salt and peppers available.



The animal collector will not be disappointed with the wide array of offerings including a 4 Swan/5 Cygnet (Lot 65) and a 1540 Plug Horse in Cobalt (380).

Among the old patterns, we have several nice pieces in 160 Locket on Chain including table cream/sugar/lid (1118) molasses (1122), and a beautiful molasses with ruby stain/gold (1119). We have a complete 1235 Beaded Panel & Sunburst wine set – tray, decanter, and 6 wines (1201). Candy jars include a 465 Recessed Panel ½ pound in Moongleam (1121) and a 341 Puritan 5 pound (1120). There are many full punch bowl sets including 1235 Beaded Panel & Sunburst (18) 433 Greek Key cupped (45), 343 Sunburst (61), 341 Puritan (74), 1506 Provincial (76), 1205 Fancy Loop (336), 1540 Lariat (677), and 350 Pinwheel & Fan (703). I think one of

the most outstanding colonial pieces that Heisey made is the 351 Priscilla 10" extra high comport which we are offering as Lot 1011.

We have an exceptional number of lots in 150 Banded Flute this year including: 10" high footed bowl (668), molasses (758), and the rarely seen three piece oyster cocktail set (766). The oyster cocktail set includes underplate, large bar (oyster cocktail), and a fingerbowl that has a seat to hold the oyster cocktail.



Outstanding pieces in color include a pair of 1405 Ipswich candle vases in Flamingo with crystal inserts (1056) and a 1951A Elephant handled



mug in Amber (968). Lot 1213 is a pair of 1251 Unique plates in Moongleam; they are called unique because they are so unusual in that they have a built in well to hold cocktail sauce or the like. One consignor sent us four 1506 Provincial footed candy jars in Limelight (Lots 835-838) and they will be sold choice. Among the many cordials available there is a 3416 Barbara Fritchie with Sahara bowl (394).

Barware collectors will not be disappointed with the array of 3397 Gascony decanters with different decorations: 460 Club Drinking (338), 455 Sportsman (828), and 454 Antarctic (1059). Lot 1057 is a 4027 Christos decanter with 469 Mermaid etch. We also have an 8 ounce soda in 2401 with 2 Tall Sailboat etch (538).

Other interesting pieces include a mounted doorknob with the crisscross design (14), 7025 Twelve Rib compote (117), 1447 Rococo muffin (354), 3408 Jamestown bell with 913 Everglade cut (840), and a 3416 Barbara Fritchie comport (1014).

There are two 517/197 Daniels tumble up sets available in this auction (155 and 1013). Probably the cutest item is a little whimsy made in the 464 Ribbon Candy pattern (1077). A nappy has been cupped to make a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rose bowl and then further enhanced by frosting the ribbon candy band.

There are many large lots with a variety of items in them. These are perfect for the beginning collector. But if there is something in the lot you really want, the rest of the items will make good gifts or you can consider donating them back to the Museum for our fund-raising efforts.



Space limitations prevent me from going on, but as you can see there is plenty for offer in the auction. I hope you will be able to join me and all of your Heisey friends for this great event.





A LOOK BACK AT HEISEY HISTORY

1404 OLD SANDWICH

In the early 1930s, Heisey came out with two new patterns that were based on patterns that had been produced by Sandwich Glass in the late 1800s. These patterns are known as 1404 Old Sandwich and 1405 Ipswich. In this article, we will look at the 1404 Old Sandwich pattern.

The pattern is based on a series of vertical panels which alternate between plain and plain with punties. The Sandwich Glass pattern that this pattern is based upon is usually referred to as Pillar. The pattern is very attractive and falls within a category of patterns which I refer to as window patterns that were being produced by most of the glass companies at this time. Cambridge had Martha Washington and Fostoria had Hermitage. Heisey would later produce its 1506 Provincial pattern which falls under the same category. The first advertisement for the pattern called it Early American Thumbprint, but the name Old Sandwich quickly replaced it and that name stuck.

The first view of the pattern we get is some supplemental pages that were added to Catalog 109. It is obvious that this pattern was still being developed when these pages were produced, because there are several pieces that are not included that appear on the first Price List showing the pattern (PL #210 from 1933). Among the pieces missing are the ashtray, parfait, bar glass, toddy, salt/pepper, round floral bowl, and popcorn bowl.

The pattern seemed to be designed with the a view to the upcoming repeal of Prohibition. It was an extensive bar pattern with the addition of a few accessory pieces. It was not designed to compete with Heisey's main pattern of the time which was 1401 Empress. The inclusion of three sizes of beer mugs and many sizes of stemware and sodas attest to this pattern's appeal to those who were reestablishing their home's refreshment area after the long drought that had been Prohibition.

There are many interesting pieces in the pattern. Besides the mentioned beer mugs, there were three different sizes of bar creams included. These were made by pulling a spout on the rim of the beer mug while the glass was still hot. The 1-pint oval decanter is a very unusual piece. The stopper (which is always crystal) continues the alternating plain and puntied panels up from the body of the piece. The decanter was often sold at the retail level with either six wines (making a sherry set) or six bar glasses (making a whiskey set). Another unusual piece is the catsup bottle. Tall and elegant it certainly makes quite a statement on the table.

The pattern was made in the colors of the day. Sahara is the most available because the pattern was made for a longer time period in that color. Both Flamingo and Moongleam pieces are relatively hard to find,

although the full line was made in those colors. Only selected items were available in Cobalt. PL #210 (1933)

lists the 10 oz. footed tumbler, oyster cocktail, 12 oz. footed ice tea, bar, ashtray, decanter, and three sizes of beer mugs. The candlesticks are also known in Cobalt.

The Museum also owns a 10 oz. soda in Zircon and an 8" plate in Tangerine in the pattern. These were undoubtedly experimental and were not production pieces. The beer mugs are known in Amber. It is not known whether these were marketed by Heisey or were part of the Fred Harvey production.

The candlesticks and floral bowls are interesting. They are part of the trend at the time of having console sets in matching patterns. The oval floral bowl was made in two ways with two different wells in the center bottom. Only one of these wells will accommodate the #22 floral block that is shown with the pattern in the catalogs. The round floral bowl was probably made for those that wanted to

display the console set in the middle of their dining room table rather than on a sideboard or mantle piece. No doubt someone came up with the idea of cupping the edge of this bowl in and making a popcorn bowl out of the piece. The 1425 Victorian pattern has a similar piece but it is called a rose bowl in that pattern.

By 1938 (PL 213) most of the accessory pieces had been dropped from production. However, it is interesting to note that there were several different pieces added to the pattern after the initial launch with the last addition not made until price list #216 in 1941. (None of these additions are known in color – only crystal.) In 1935 we see a new beer mug added which is listed as 10 oz. with sham. This would have come from the same mold as the 12 oz. beer mug, but the addition of additional glass at the bottom would have reduced the capacity (sounds like the same trick that companies are doing now-a-days, reducing the size of the box, but charging the same amount.) From Catalog 211 (1938) 8 Heisey News March 2011

Added in 1938 was a cigarette holder. This is square with a

small foot. Prior to this, it is known that the 1404 ashtrays were often paired with the 3390 Carcassonne cigarette holder to make a set. The 1404 Old Sandwich cigarette holder is a difficult piece to find now. The 1939 addition was a 10 ounce pilsner. This is rarely seen today but really is very beautiful. In Price List 215 Cat. 212 (1939) from early 1941, a new 4 oz. sundae is listed. I have seen some flared oyster cocktails which may have been this item. In late 1941 Price List 216 lists a new cream and sugar set which has to be the rarely seen round cream and sugar. The oval cream and sugar were still being offered at this time.



Production of Old Sandwich continued into the 1950s. I am printing the illustration of the pattern from Catalog and Price List 31 from September 1950 (below). You can see the limited number of pieces available, but the round cream and sugar are illustrated. Also note that the plate is shown with a patterned center rather than the plain center that was in the earlier production. All three sizes of plates were made this way in the 1950s. The last appearance of the pattern was in Catalog and Price List 32 from January 1953. The same items appear there as in the 1950 catalog with the exception of the round cream and sugar.

Tom and Neila Bredehoft mention in "Heisey Glass: 1895 – 1957" the listing of a basket written in on one price list. This basket has been seen and it was made from a footed soda with an applied handle. It must have been made for only a very short time because it was never included in any price list and is extremely hard to find. Imperial Glass did make most of the stemware, sodas, and finger bowl in crystal only from 1959 to 1962. These pieces still retained the Diamond H when they were marketed as Heisey by Imperial.

The 1404 Old Sandwich pattern is certainly one of Heisey's most beautiful patterns. Whether you acquire just a few pieces or the whole set, it really does have an impact. It certainly does make quite an impression. It may take some work, but color sets can be put together in Sahara and Flamingo as well. A crystal set of the pattern would be equally impressive. Add a piece or two in Cobalt and it will really stand out. ◆


