# TUMBLERS

I'm going to start the year off right, first by missing the first month completely, and then by promoting someone else's Newsletter. Not that it is competitive. "The Tumbler and Mug News", first published in January, will feature news and information on carnival pieces in these areas. It will also cover goblets and wines. More information will be available from the editor, O. Joe Olson, P.O. Box 5421, Kansas City, Mo. 64131. I could wish that the editor would branch out a little, not confining his subject to Carnival, and include some of the better wares from the same period, but I guess that's his interest, and his prerogative.

Three more new tumblers this month, still from that catalogue #76 which introduced so many interesting items that were discontinued before the next catalogue was printed. It must have been a very trying time for Cap't Heisey. These three, Nos. one eighty seven, one eighty nine and one ninety, (I'm omitting #188 at this point, haven't done enough research on it.) are sequential, picking up where catalogue #75 left off. The first two of these are unusual for the band

about the top, and the third is unusual because it doesn't have a band about the top. Not the same band, but the bands do make these three different. The first two, without the bands would be part of that terrible three hundred series which I've been putting off for two years, and the third, one ninety would be part of the 116-117 pair which I discussed a couple of months ago.

While I don't know for sure, I think

we can assume that all of these will be signed and will have a ground bottom, either a base ring, or a full grind. They all date from about 1916, no earlier, and very little later, and I would not expect to find any Heisey decoration on any of them. I cannot state that these three tumblers are unseen. I haven't seen them, but the #190 is reported having been found in the December news letter.

Imperial as they added stippling around the figures. This cup is sometimes referred to as the Elephant Handled Mug, Nursery Rhyme Mug or Fairy Tale Mug. Imperial has made this in at least 11 colors and crystal. All become more or less collectible when discontinued and the only one presently being made is crystal. We still have milk glass and blue in the shop, however.

The auction is rapidly approaching. This past week we unpacked, put on lot numbers, identified, arranged in selling order, numbered and listed it all (around 600 lots) and repacked it so everything is all set to go. The list will be out soon and possibly even before you get this HN. There is a lot of good glass so we hope for many mail bids plus a good attendance.

The "Table Talk" which was in last issue is but one of many which we now own. We will be printing them when possible in date order.

These brochures were sent to the trade. Note the dates on these and on the ads when you read them.

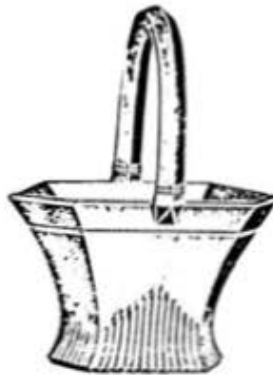

These two etchings represent the earliest examples of Heisey Silhouette Etchings. It is very likely they were developed in 1932 during the period of perfecting the Silhouette Etching process. They differ in style from later silhouettes in that they do not use the silhouette shapes for their designs, but the patterns are achieved either from a somewhat random and all-over effect or an all-over etching with a formal band.

Both etchings were produced from 1932 to about 1937. The majority of production was in crystal but Arctic was available in some items in moongleam (shown in price lists) and Antarctic has a few items available in cobalt -- a rather rare color for Heisey etchings.

Arctic is the original factory name for this etching but an original number has not been found. Arctic is available on a wide variety of unrelated items -- several old items and some new wares in 1932. A trade journal ad in August, 1932, shows a #4224 Ivy Vase, a #4157 Rose Bowl, and a #1413 Cathedral Vase all with Arctic etching. To quote the article: "Another striking new line is their Arctic etching, several items of which are shown here. This assortment presents a combination of frosted and crystal glass with the design worked out in the frosted effect. Beverage sets, ice tubs, cocktail shakers, vases, bowls, and candlesticks are among the items shown in this line."

It is difficult to describe Arctic etching. It might be described as random size and shapes of squiggles and dots which are clear glass on a background of deeply frosted, etched glass. This produces a very unusual effect and once seen, is easy to remember.

### #454 Antarctic Silhouette Etching

Antarctic etching is a background etching with decorative bands. The bands are etched formal leaves and

scrolls enclosed in clear borders between the large, solid frosted areas of the remainder of the item. Several items I have seen with this etching have the background very deeply etched forming an extremely rough finish. Antarctic is available on a limited number of items in cobalt. The cobalt pieces I have seen have had only the decorative band etched with the rough background absent. Some of the cobalt items also have a gold or yellow filling in the band. This is probably an experimental effect.

# HEISEY CANDLESTICKS

#1493 "World"

This two light candleholder is commonly called "World" despite the fact that the 5-light candelabrum is sometimes also called the World; due to its two glass hemispheres, which comprise the central portion. If I had my druthers, I'd probably call this #1493 the "Saturn" due to the rings around the world, but it seems that that name is already used up. So "World" seems like an appropriate enough name except that we don't have rings around our world. We do have a single moon however, and that seems well represented by the candle socket at the end of the upswept arm.

No etchings or cuttings\* are listed in the documents at the HCA museum. The first mention is in the 212 Price List of 1937 and last is in the 216 price list of September, 1941, indicating that it was phased out between 1942 and 1944 when the next price list was published. A more definite final date is not possible at present.

Every example which I have seen has been very excellent glass; massive, clear

crystal with a flat ground base. No colors are listed in the HCA documents nor have any come to our attention. It is possible, though not likely, that a cobalt or lime-light item could surface from a long sleep, because none of the ones which I have seen have been marked. So you all

should keep looking, and turning over rocks.

Ed Note - The research for the cutting book shows that #893 Carlton was used. A pair of #1493's owned by the museum also have a cutting - so far unidentified.

## #423 DIAMOND BAND



Diamond Band is not an original name for this pattern but was given by researchers. Items in this elusive pattern are marked and the glass is of excellent quality. Any piece would be a prize addition to a collection and especially the stem pieces, table set, jug, tumbler and custard. It was made in the early 'teens' when several unusual patterns were introduced.

# STEMS

Since our stem author did not come through with a column this month we've snatched one from the Diamond Dust, newsletter of Carl's home club, the Heisey Heritage Society. I don't know if this is one of Carl's columns for that paper or not. If it isn't his twin brother, Vince, probably wrote it. In any case HHS has given us permission to take articles from 'DD' when we want to.

At the 1939-40 New York World's Fair, the Federal building consisted of the United States exhibit plus the official State Apartments and the State Dining Room. The Libbey Glass Company was given the assignment of designing the making a special service for the dining room. The glasses illustrated above (engraved with a crest that featured a stylized eagle and thirteen stars) was the result. An individual place setting consisted

A.H. Heisey and Co. some ten years later with their "Park Avenue" pattern. A quick glance reveals that the similarities between "Ambassador" and "Park Avenue" are such that it would be a strain to chalk it up to mere coincidence. The Libbey stem is slightly taller and is decorated with column-like flutes. The Heisey stem has three ridges running down the length of its flat, broad surface. Of course it was then, (and is now), accepted practice in most industries to freely borrow patented designs and rework them just enough to avoid a lawsuit. We don't honestly know whether "Ambassador" was the inspirational spark that caused the creation of "Park Avenue" but it certainly could have been. Both companies marked their stems but no

of ten different style glasses and all but the parfait shared the exact same flat column stem. Libbey touted this as an innovation but in truth it was the pressure of time helped determine that one stem height would serve all bowls (only one stem mold was needed and even the bowl

shapes were adapted from a pattern then in production). Following the fair, Libbey was permitted to offer this pattern (without the crest) to their trade. They did this after christening it "Ambassador". Then along came.....

mattern which one you come across, you've found a gem. They both tend to be elusive along the collecting trail....The original crested "World's Fair" set that Libbey created is now in the hands of the White House and was used occasionally into the 1950's. They are now in storage.

You could ask them if they could spare a stem, after all, they were given 10 dozen of each bowl style! (We are indebted to Carl U. Fauster's article, "Libbey Crystal for New York 1939 World's Fair" that appeared in the October 1972 issue of "Hobbies".)

## SEVENTH ANNUAL FLEA MARKET

# March Auction - Mail Bid Tips

by **BOB RAREY**

It's that time again - the ANNUAL MARCH MUSEUM BENEFIT AUCTION!!! As in past years, we want to make it possible for all members to participate by offering mail bid service to those who can not attend in person. Each mail bid will be handled competitively and every effort will be made to purchase the items you want at the lowest possible figure. As Mailman II, I can assure you that no one except my wife and I will know who the mail bidders are or what they bid until after the auction. Then the treasurer, Loren Yeakley, will make the refunds on your checks. However, as Bob Johnson reminded you a year ago in his article, there are limitations. You, as bidder, must set your maximum limit. The worst that can happen is that when the bidding ends another party who is present may be on your maximum bid and will get the item. This happens at least once every sale to some unfortunate mail bidder. It is impossible to anticipate in advance what the bidding sequence will be and for you to get the item it must be my turn to bid when the bidding stops.

To borrow again from Bob Johnson, the following tips are offered for those who would like to bid on one or more lots:

- 1- Lots containing multiple items (cream and sugar, set or pair of anything, console sets, etc.) are usually sold "by the piece, "both or set to go", so a total lot figure must be a dollar value for each piece times the number of items in the lot. (Example - 6 orchid etched plates at \$10.00 each - total \$60.00 plus shipping)
- 2- There are minimum limits to raises that will be accepted. Normally, on items under \$20.00 the minimum raise is \$1.00; on items selling over \$20.00, a \$2.50; on higher priced items, the minimum can be \$5.00, \$10.00 or in some cases \$25.00. Use good judgement in arriving at your maximum bid figure with these minimum raise figures in mind.
- 3- Multiple item lots are not normally split up, but sold as a lot to one bidder. An exception, for example, might be a lot containing several "very desirable" pieces, where the sale manager might sell choice one time. Don't count on this however.
- 4- You may send a separate check for each lot to be bid on or if bidding on two or more lots, you can list the maximum bid for each lot and send one

check covering the total top limit price of all lots, but in either case include shipping. Any surplus bid money or shipping charge will be refunded.

5- An "S.A.S.E." is requested as it not only saves H.C.A. postage and envelopes, but also hastens return of unused checks, refunds and a letter giving results of the bids.

If you recall in Bob's 1978 Mail Bid Report there were 67 bidders who made 334 bids, at a rate of from 1 to 29 bids per bidder. Mail bids won 104 lots and he shipped 46 boxes containing 189 pieces of Heisey glassware. A tremendous job and very well done, Bob and Ann - many thanks!

This year the mail bid glass will be

packed and shipped from the mailing room of our new administration building. This should facilitate faster handling than was possible when Bob & Ann did it alone.

Remember, in case of duplicate bids, earliest postmark wins, so get your bids in as early as possible. All bids must be received by me by Thursday, March 15 at the following address in order to be prepared for the Auction on Saturday:

## Questions & Answers

**Q** I have a bell in the shape of a girl. I know she is Imperial but is it a Heisey mold?

**a** The only girl bell made by Heisey was the #1560 bell which we are selling. The taller girl bell which you show is not made from a Heisey mold.

**Q** I was interested in an answer in Heisey News about the Beehive plate. Are these marked?

**a** No.

**Q** Is the Eagle plate marked? What colors was it made in?

**a** The eagle plate is known in crystal, moongleam and cobalt. The latter is very rare. Looking at the bottom of the plate and about one inch to the left of the eagle's beak you see what may be two sides of a diamond. This may show better on some plates than others. The plates are 8", finely stippled on the underside.

# 400 Heisey Colonial Cake Stand and Others

You have heard about the design features of ump-teen types of Heisey tumblers and stemware, and you have heard about so-in-so number of candlestick design to look for; but, do you know how many designs of Heisey cake stands there are??? Don't feel too bad, I don't either. The purpose of this article is to tell you in detail about one Heisey cake stand or salver, as some call it. A list is also included of some of the other Heisey patterns that include cake stands.

The #400 cake stand is of a typical colonial design and contains the flutes and scallops normally associated with that style of colonial design. The cake stand came in two sizes; 9" and 10". The size relates to the diameter of the circular flat surface on top of the stand. The cake stand is 6½" tall. The flat circular surface has a short glass skirt around its perimeter which is about one inch in height and contains 20 panels; each panel having 5 small scallops. The stem or leg of the cake stand has 6 large panels. There is a small ring of glass at the top of the leg near where it joins the flat surface. This cake stand is signed with a large diamond H in the center of the flat circular surface. I have seen one #400 cake stand that was either unsigned or, more likely, the mark in the mold was so worn that the diamond H was no longer formed in the glass. I believe the #400 cake stand was made in crystal only.

The cake stand was shown in two Heisey catalogs; catalog 56, circa 1908 and catalog 75, circa 1913. Vogel II, page 62 which shows the #400 cake stand is a copy of Heisey catalog 75, page 233. Indications are that the production period for the cake stand was about 1907 to 1916 or approximately 10 years. The stand was pictured in a June 1913 Heisey ad

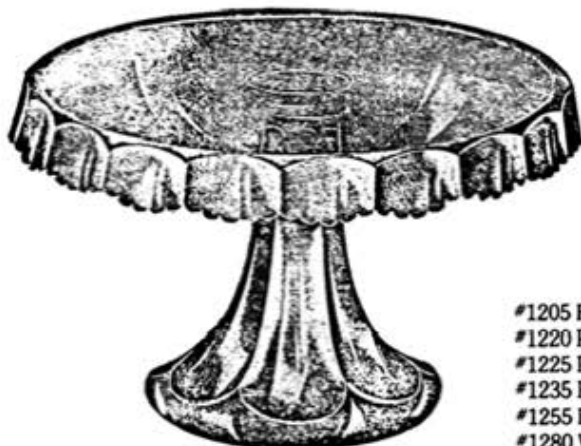
that appeared in both the Ladies Home Journal and Woman's Home Companion. A copy of that ad is shown with this article.

As a matter of curiosity, I glanced through Vogel's four books and through some of the Heisey catalogs at the HCA library to see what I could find in cake stands. I found 28 Heisey pattern lines with cake stands. There were round ones, square ones, a high footed one and low footed ones. The high footed one is in the #1776 Kalonyal pattern. The common round sizes are 9" and 10" diameters. Other round sizes are 7, 8, 11 and 12 inches. The cake stand was offered in 5 sizes in the #1235 Beaded Panel & Sunburst pattern.

Two cake stands that I have seen that I would classify as prize pieces for a cake stand collection are the Locket On Chain in Emerald green and the Winged Scroll stand in Custard.

We closed the meeting a little earlier than usual so that we could all enjoy the sumptuous array of desserts & coffee.

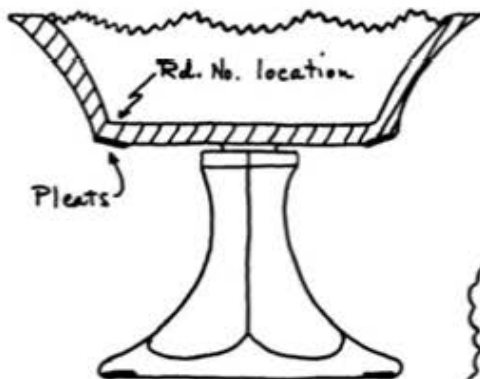

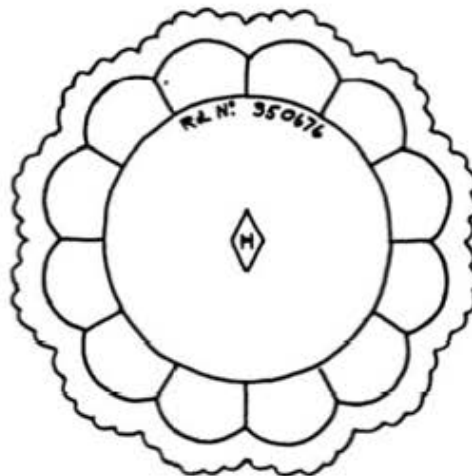

After my last article about the location of the registration number on the #300 covered sugar and butter, I received a note about a #300 footed jelly that has the number on it. I have a #300 footed jelly in my collection, so I went and examined it and found the registration number. My footed jelly also has a large diamond H on it. The purpose of this brief article is to show the location of the Rd. No. 350676 on the jelly.

As shown in the sketch, the Rd. No.

is located on the inside of the bottom surface of the bowl at the perimeter or, as one prefer to say, where the side wall and bottom join. The letters and numbers follow the curvature of the side wall. At first it is hard to see because the circle of pleats characteristic to the #300 Peerless pattern are directly under the embossed Rd. No. I first found the number by feel, and then examined it under a close good light source. The letters and numbers are about 1/16 of an inch tall, or perhaps

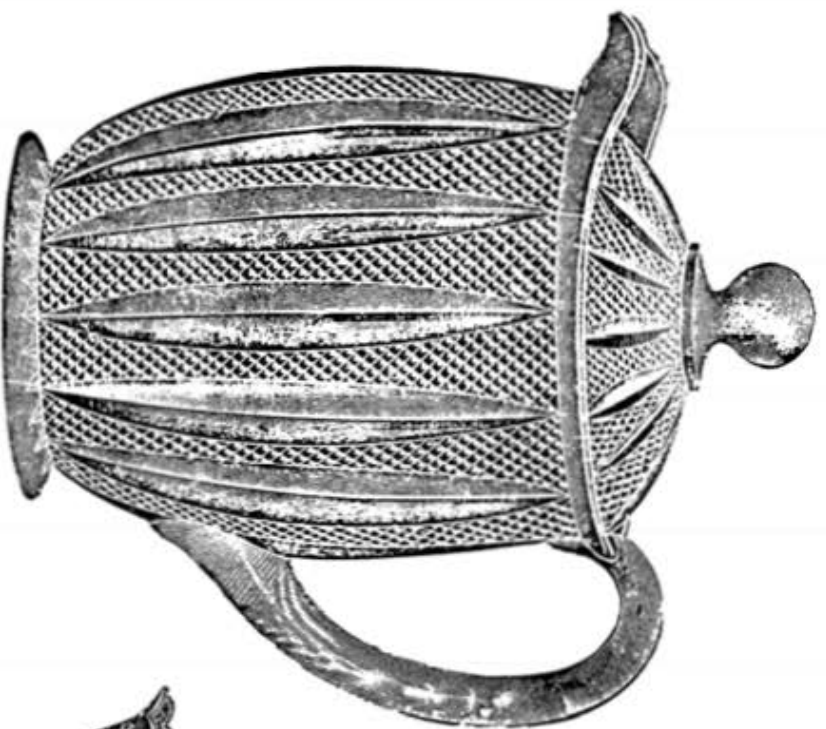
slightly taller. The length is in the order of 1 inch.

There are 4 sizes of #300 footed jellies shown in Vogel book 1, page 84; namely, 4, 4½, 5 and 5½ inches. There are some 145 items in Heisey's #300 colonial pattern. I wonder how many varieties have registration numbers on them. The Rd. No. 350676 was registered in England on December 28, 1899.

\*Ed. Note-In an early (pre 1900) Catalog there are six sizes of jelly comports.

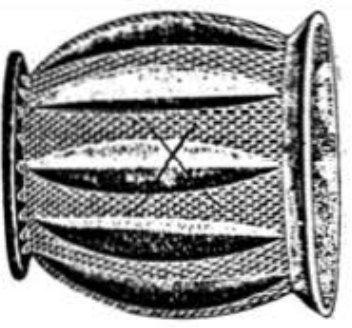

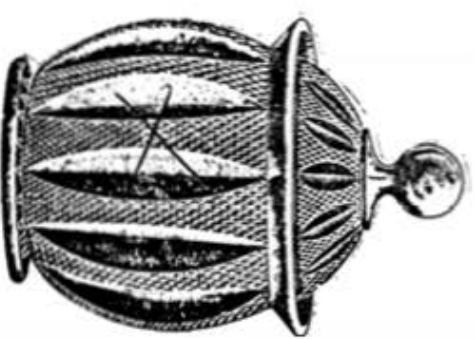

#150 was named "Pointed Oval in Diamond Point" by Vogel and is not an original name. Very few early patterns were named when they were made. While there are many low numbers in the listing of ALL Heisey items #150 is the lowest for a PATTERN GROUP. The number was used a few years later for another pattern which is referred to as Banded Flute or Wedding Band.

In an 1897 price list #150 is not listed at all even though #1201 (Fandango) #1205 (Fancy Loop), #1220 (Punty Band), #1225 (Plain Band or Sawtooth Band), #1235 (Beaded Panel and Sunburst) and #1255 (Pineapple and Fan) ARE listed and are the only major patterns which are. So the date for #150 must be later than that but prior to late 1900 when the mark was first used since none of it is marked.

The glass is of medium thickness and the equality is not as good as most Heisey

of the period. There are quite prominent mold marks and it is not finished on the bottom. Listed in crystal, emerald and canary (vaseline) it has been seen only in crystal and emerald. A piece of vaseline would be a real find! Let us know if you have seen it.

The pointed ovals are indented and are surrounded by diamond point which is a haven for soap scum and usually looks dull until given a good scrubbing. There is a star on the bottom of each piece. All items have an inside ridge at the top which would indicate the need for a lid, however only the sugar and the jug have lids and the jug came either way. The table set is small and the spooner is a little taller and smaller around than the sugar, even more so than the pictures indicate. There are only the jug, 8" nappy, 4 1/2" nappy, butter, cream, sugar and spooner in the line.

Loren Yeakley wrote first on #150 back in the early years of Heisey News.

We are reviewing it since we now have better pictures and also have many new members who don't yet have the early sets of Heisey News. Collecting some of the old patterns which are always unmarked can be very exciting for a collector.

In late years Heisey made a similar pattern and gave it the name and number #1535 Diamond. These have little balls on the edges and are of much better quality than the earlier pattern. Some of these items are marked and some were pictured on the cover of Heisey News, July 1978. Imperial has reissued the torte plate and salad bowl in #1535, unmarked.

For information on animals, colors and early patterns you can order any or all of the first seven years newsletters, 1972-1978 at \$8.00 per year's set of 12 issues. 1972 and 74 are Xerox copies but the rest are original. We always have 400 extra copies made and have had some reprinted.

## LETTERS, we get letters....

We liked the article "A Message To All Members" in the December, 1978, "HEISEY NEWS". It's good to be reminded at least once each year of the aspirations, goals, and operation of our HCA. We have a couple of comments to make.

The first is the reference to HCA contracting with Imperial to have exclusive rights to the sale of the reproduced Heisey animals. When the blue colts were marketed by an individual, it soon became evident that the animals would be available for every "Tom, Dick & Harry" to have made and sell for themselves. We agree that HCA made the right decision to control the animal sales and, instead of being detrimental to the animal collector, be a safeguard in the future.

The second comment concerns the paragraph about the few people who complain about "those people in Newark". We believe that the thing which has made HCA progress can be summed up in one word -- "UNSELFISHNESS". Many work hard and

give freely of their time -- their greatest wealth -- so that we who live hundreds of miles away can enjoy the meetings, our beautiful museum and "Heisey News".

We have learned over the years that it is not wise to be influenced by the opinions of others -- we find out for ourselves before forming them. A visit to Newark, the HCA museum and talking to "those people" will make one realize that it is real dedication, the love for Heisey glass and not personal gain which prompts them to do all the work they do. 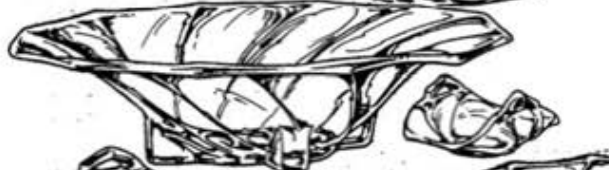
