

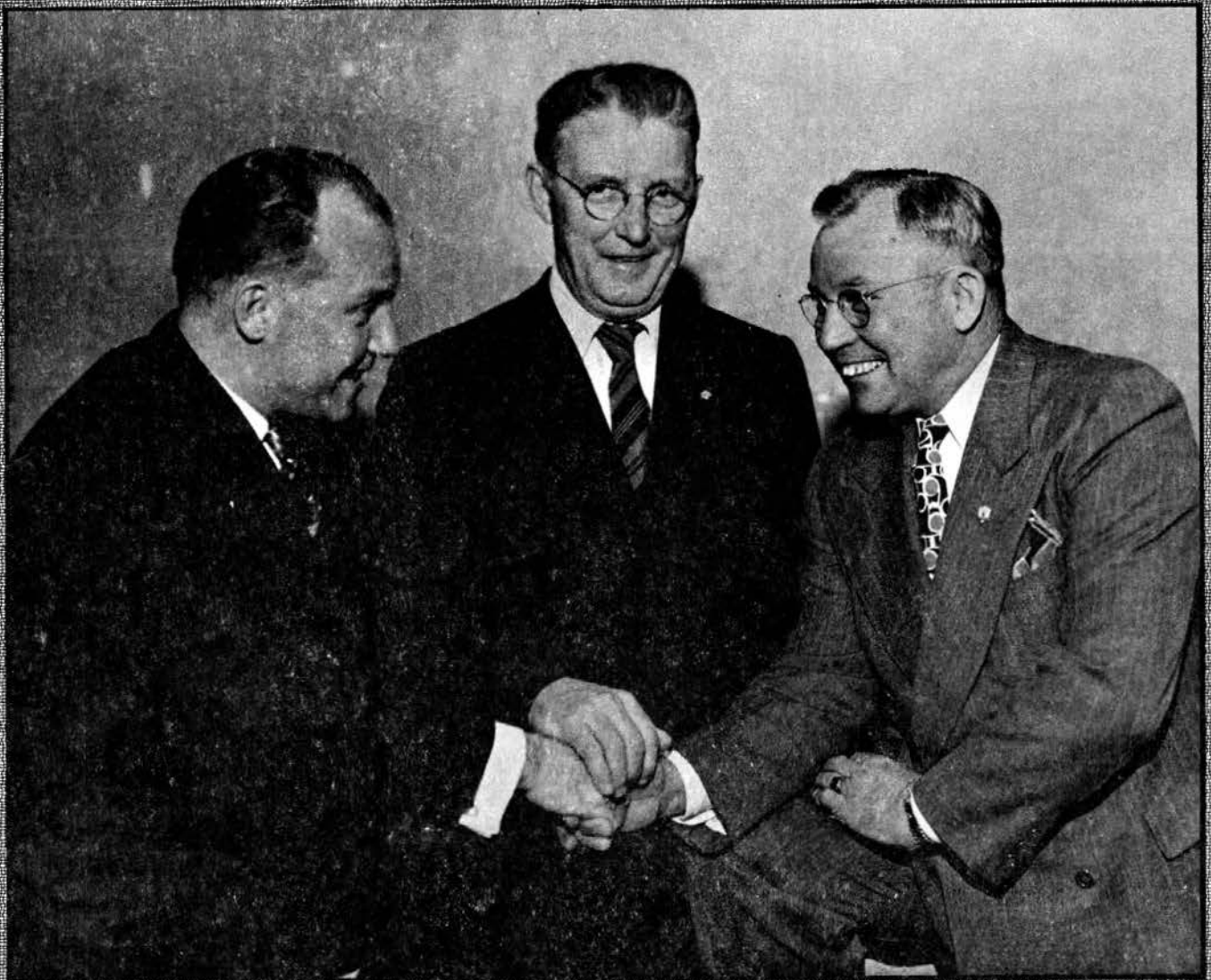

NO BUYER PREMIUM FOR CREDIT CARD USE AT
BENEFIT AUCTION

I reported in the January Heisey News that the Board of Directors had approved a 5% Buyers Premium charge for credit card use at the Museum Benefit Auction. This directive has been rescinded. Upon further investigation, it became apparent we had been given erroneous advice. While this practice may not be illegal, it is in violation of the contract between the card company and the merchant (HCA). Last year, the credit card charge at the Benefit Auction cost the Club approximately \$800.00.

If you are sending absentee bids, remember that early postmark wins in the event of a tie. The quarterly meeting will be held on Saturday, at which time the nominating committee will announce their nominations for the Board of Directors. Rosalene Oscars left over, if any, will go on sale on June 14 to the general public for \$27.00.

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

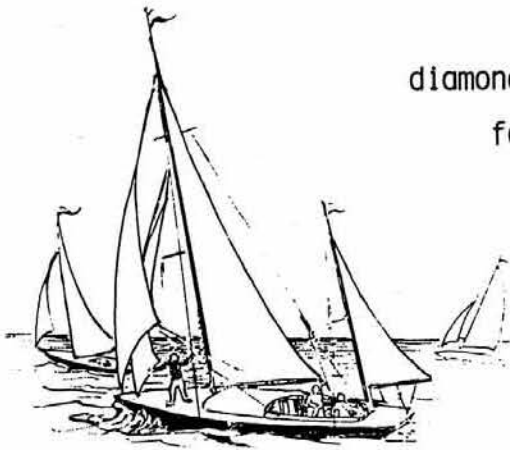

As I have written many times, the Yachting Center was a great fishing town noted for the shoe industry, the Burgess Aeroplane Company, and first in the Navy. (We are the birthplace of the American Navy). We are also known for candy.

George Moore was known as "Mr. Candy Man"; he owned and operated Stowaway Sweets. Many candy lovers remember him well; he passed away this past November at the age of 104. George Moore, along with his wife, Evelyn, founded "Stowaway Sweets", a confection to end all confections. For many years, the families of President Coolidge and President Roosevelt indulged in Stowaway Sweets at the White House. The Moores were avid theatergoers, attending all the performances of the High School. (Summer theater was held here for many years, with many of the top Hollywood stars performing on our stage). Each time the Moores attended one of these performances, they took boxes of candy to present to the stars and lead players. Mail orders, still today, come in from Washington, D.C., and Hollywood.

About ten years ago the business was taken over by J. Michael Canniffe, and is still producing the famous candies and shipping all over the world.

When you purchase elegant candy you must have an elegant receptacle to put it in and that is just what my "Sharp Eyed Friend" did when he became the proud owner of the regal #1504 Regency candy box with lid. He also picked up, to their great delight, a pair of horsehead bookends and a #1255 Pineapple & Fan toothpick holder.

"The Orchid Lady" reports an #1184 Yeoman diamond optic celery and, while on a trip to England awhile back, she picked up a beautiful Waldorf Astoria decanter that was marked £ 1.50. Very interesting to say the least. Nothing else was found there but that was enough.

"The Busy Bee" went out flitting from Co-op to Co-op and, finally, landed on the #1201 Fandango celery, along with the #352 Medium Flat Panel horse-radish.

There was an old ad discovered by "A Friend in Deed", which came from Raymonds Department Store, on the Lotus etching. The pieces of glass advertised were being sold from 15¢ to \$1.75. Some pieces were Heisey, while others were Cambridge, Morgantown, etc, as Lotus used blanks from many companies. There was also an old photograph of the Heisey Factory found, circa 1901, showing the factory with a single smoke stack. He also discovered the #1485 Saturn candleblocks, frosted and hand decorated, along with a #1447 Rococo 12 inch oval bowl.

"The Felicitous Flamingo Hunter" received a lovely gift of the #479 Petal cream and sugar in her color, Flamingo. She also talks about the #1503 Crystolite round footed cigarette holder; the #1280 Winged Scroll ½ gallon tankard and five (5) tumblers with good gold; #1220 Punt Band individual creamer in Custard, souvenir "East Boothbay, Maine.

"The Scribe" from the Garden State (nj) managed to persuade a dealer to try and find a piece of Heisey that she had told the Scribe about but had packed away. After the dealer poked around for a while she finally came up with the precious piece of glass - the 6½" #1558 (Droop) "vase-bowl" in Crystal. A lovely hunk of glass, heavy and quite beautiful. This is pictured in the Heisey catalog #33 - 1956, and Vogel Book 4, page 27.

"The Compassionate Beaver" unearthed a #406 Coarse Rib Flamingo creamer and, in a trade, she acquired another favor vase for her favor vase collection, namely the #4228 in Moongleam, which, by the way, completes the Moongleam "vases" for her.

"The Keystone Cops" are up to their old tricks again and have added a couple of floral blocks to their ever growing collection; the #19 floral block in Sahara and the #11 in Crystal.

"The Canadian Goose" was trying to "duck" the hunters and in succeeding to do just that she hunted and captured a Lariat footed cheese with a lid and the Moonglo cutting. Umm, nice hunting!

"The Cardinal" from the Bay State (ma) discovered, not too far from his own nest, the following tumblers: #411 Rib and Panel with an etching; #343½ Sunburst tumbler; #1469½ Ridgeleigh 12 oz soda, flared; #573 soda, 10 oz, with inside optic and flared.

Speaking of tumblers etc, "Yours Truly" purchased, at auction, a beautiful jelly jar - ½ pint, with a gorgeous etching. Another sumptuous piece is the #3381 Creole 7 oz champagne, diamond optic, and in the lovely Alexandrite. Beautiful color.

"The Tradin' Fools" from the Land of Lincoln (ill) are in a state of jubilation over a 14 inch pulled vase made from a colonial tumbler in Honey Amber. Another vase acquired was the 16 inch #2 swung vase in Emerald.

The other day the "Steadfast Colleague" called to chat about one thing or another and, in passing, mentioned a few things: #393 grapefruit that was cut by another company and has a sterling rim; #150 low footed sherbets and plates, seven (7) of them; a berry bowl in Custard, the pattern # he didn't know - but - Custard!

Sleeping soundly in a consignment shop "Hooked on Heisey" discovered and awakened the #341 Old Williamsburg 14 inch punch bowl, short base with twenty-one (21) cups. Nice!

"The Purple Passion" (from the Empire State N. Y.) did three shows and one Mall in two days, and found a few things. I shall tell you a couple of them now: #5058 Penquin decanter; #1540 Plug Horse; #1541 Scottie Dog. Very interesting - all animals. Oh, excuse me a minute; I must be getting a little absentminded - I forgot to relate to you that the Plug Horse was in Amber!! A nice note in which to end this months column, right?

Please, there are so many of you that I haven't heard from in such a long time - I need your input.

Remember, "We need old friends to help us grow, old & new friends to help us stay young".

FROM RODNEY IRWIN MATERIAL - FORMER SALES
MANAGER AT HEISEY

March 14, 1949

Dear Clarence:

Lee and I worked in Pittsburgh Monday and Tuesday, and then I came on to New York and worked with Joe through Friday night and we think we accomplished quite a bit.

Lee will report to you on the Kaufmann and Horne situation in Pittsburgh.

We had quite a pow-wow with Altmans and I think things are going to work out alright now that they have reached an agreement with the main office about more appropriation and getting orders signed when they are presented.

Altmans are moving their warehouse to a new building and the situation of opening up goods is going to be much better but they have a lot of new help and one of the great problems they have with our line is getting it opened up, marked, and sent over to the retail store. This new help is not able to identify one half of the items. Margie Lyons can't keep running back and forth giving them the assistance they need. Now, we should mark at least one or two pieces with the pattern number and the name of the item on each item shipped to Altmans. In that way they can identify the item, get the tags made, and the goods to the store in a week or ten days instead of some six to eight weeks, as it has been in the past. Now, Cambridge, Fostoria, and Duncan, I know definitely, mark most every piece with their number, pattern, and prices, and we should at least attempt to solve some of the problems that some of the big stores have in getting in 25 to 30 barrels of assorted merchandise. We have talked about this a number of times but have never done anything about it except to a few stores that have their stuff ply-packed, in which we mark every piece.

I think it is very important from now on to see to that, and issue orders to the shipping department that two pieces at least, of every item, be identified.

I have had several people remark about the tall stemmed cordial in #5040 pattern, on which we cut Moonglo and the new Ivy. This tall cordial is out of proportion to the rest of the line.

Altmans bought the Ivy pattern and so did Kaufmann's but the girls and buyers at both places remarked that they could not sell the cordial in Moonglo and that they would like to have it on a shorter stem in proportion to the other pieces, and I think we should see if we can't get the cordial bowl on either the cocktail or rhine stem. If it is too big, we will probably have to make another.

Joe and I went to see the Old Silver Classics and they have quite a number of items on file for Cut 941 -- bowls, plates and several other items which they need very badly to get samples out to their salesmen. Paul promised to get them out in two or three weeks, and it has been at least since the middle of January, and still nothing has been done. Would you see that they get at least a dozen or two of each item as soon as possible. Also, for Old

Silver Classics, would you take one of those #1184 Salad Bowls and notch the rim of the edge, like we used to do on some of the old patterns before the war. While #941 Cutting is alright the ?????? is not good enough for the high type grade of silver it is used with and, I believe, that a good notch around the ridge of the bowl will give the bowl more light and compliment the silver better. They also suggest some better cuttings but I think these should wait until I get back to the factory and try to experiment with a couple of the silver pieces they are sending to me so we can work out other designs for their Fall showing. But, I think that if you will have one bowl notched and send it to Mr. Lewis, with the price, they might adopt it right now.

Both Joe Lower and Altmans brought to my attention the price of * which is practically the same size * is only \$12.60 * Lariat would retail at \$2.10, and I note that Imperial and Fostoria's relishes are the same size and are retailing for \$2.00.

Also, check your price list on #4004 Vases. The small 9" Vase is \$48.00 while the 10½" is \$51.00 and then you note that either the Ice Tub is too low or the 9" Vase is too high.

I have noticed in practically every store I visited in Pittsburgh and New York that we are not putting our labels on the merchandise. We were up to Bloomingdale's, Macy's and Altmans and in 2/3's of the new shipments just received, there was not one sticker on any of the merchandise while our competitors have it on every piece. I think this is one of the best ways to tie in with our advertising and we should make it a standing order that stickers should go on every piece. Joe Lower said he told you about that when he saw you in New York just recently.

Will be in Boston Monday and Tuesday, Philadelphia on Wednesday and Thursday, Baltimore and Washington on Saturday and then will head on South, through Richmond and Raleigh, Savannah and Jacksonville.

Retail business in New York seems to be pretty good. They are howling about some of the high priced merchandise that is not moving; but, on the whole, things seem to be pretty good. Practically everybody in New York is on his way, or is in Europe.

I would also like to have you check with the samples Meier & Frank are sending for their tearoom, which we are going to duplicate as close as possible. I have written Paul a letter regarding this. If this original order is made properly and shipped complete, this will develop into a nice continuous business. We have practically every item they want in the line or something very similar to it. They do not have to be exactly like their samples but they all should be made with a medium optic and, of course, will be etched with their monogram. I would try to keep this price in line because I understand that Bryce Bros. are losing so much of their hotel business and are only working part time these days. Libby has taken away practically every good hotel account that they had and Meier & Frank have been using Bryce's line. So, we have to be careful and keep our price within reason. As you know, Bryce's price is considerably less but I believe that if we will just keep it about our regular price with the monogram price a little less than \$2.70 -- around \$2.50 -- you will find that we will be pretty much

in line, and if the items are made just normal service weight, with good glazed edges, so they will not chip too easily, we can keep this business indefinitely.

Lee Beardshear is putting up a squawk that since we do not have a section in Kauffmann's or paying a girl, that he is entitled to 10% commission on Kaufmann's shipments until such time as the girl is put back on the payroll. I told him I would drop you a line and ask you what you thought about it. I believe that he is entitled to the 10% until such time as we do start the section on a regular basis and that won't be until Estelle Dixon returns from Europe along the first of June.

I hope that Howard has done something about the wire flower holder for the epergnettes. We are getting the stores interested in getting behind them and promote them but they will never get to first base unless we can get a flower holder that will simplify arrangements of the flowers. We have been fooling around with this thing since last July and there are certainly plenty of people in this country that would make them if we would just contact them.

I saw the sales manager for the Frank Whiting Silver Company while in New York and, as you know, I wrote to the President before I left and asked permission to make a cutting and call it Boticelli, the same as their sterling flatware. They wrote me that they would be very happy to tie in with us and sent us samples. The sales manager, Mr. Peiz, tells me that this Boticelli pattern is one of the most phenomenal patterns ever put on the market. They are opening up hundreds of accounts all over the country -- they have some 45 accounts in New York City alone -- and he believes that 60% of them would buy the stemware to match. I believe that this would be an opportune time to try out placing a pattern in any store that bought the Boticelli flatware and see what happens. For instance, Altmans bought it, Black, Starr & Gorham, Bloomingdale's, Tiffany, Macy's, Wanamakers and hundreds of other fine jewelry stores, and if we would get a pattern placed like that throughout the country, we might really go to town. Maybe you would not be able to take care of all of it at once, but at least we could find out what is going on by the big silver companies who are not confining their flatware patterns for the last year or so. So, you will have some samples of this sterling flatware and to me it looks like it has plenty of possibilities to make a decent looking cutting at a popular price. That is, something that would retail for around \$30 per dozen. If you get it much higher than that, the sales will be limited. There is a definite trend against high priced stemware of all types. Stores report to me that anything over \$36 a dozen is absolutely out and they are closing out most of their expensive patterns.

So, until I return, you might have Butter Groves work on a few samples to match this Boticelli. But, please do not do anything with it until I return home because we don't want to put it on the market until this summer and we want to get the right design and the right price before we do anything about it.

I will report more as I go along, but, all in all, things are not too bad. When the weather is good, the women are out buying and sales are going just about the same as they did last year in most of the china and glass departments.

Q. I'm excited over what we think is a somewhat unusual find today.

It is a druggist bottle with a ground stopper. It has a one inch tall diamond H on the bottom. It is five inches across the bottom and 12 inches tall without the stopper. It is bluish greenish and very clear in color. The stopper is 2 5/8's inch and ground with a clear glass flat round top which measures 1 1/8 inch across.

It's in excellent shape (condition) after a good bath. Would appreciate any information you can give us on this. Thank you.

HEISEY IN THE TRADE JOURNALS Advertisements, 1903-1915

As mentioned in my last article, advertisements for No. 339 Continental and No. 339½ Footed Continental appeared in the trade journals between January and March, 1903. Although Heisey continued to advertise after this, it wasn't until many years later in the 1920's that they again used this medium to present their new patterns to the trade. Almost all of the ads which appeared after 1903 contained only text and, while they were often full page, as can be seen from the accompanying examples, their content was general in nature without mentioning specific patterns. (One exception was in January 1908, when No. 150 Banded Flute and No. 369 Hartman were cited as new fall lines currently on display.)

Why their advertising policy changed at this time, I don't know. It may simply have been that they were so firmly established with the trade, that it wasn't really necessary to spend a lot of money on advertising. It may be that their salesman were performing this function in person to such an extent that additional advertising was deemed unnecessary. I don't know the state of the economy at this time, but it may be that the country was in one of the many recessions that seem to have occurred in the early years of the century and the company may have been forced to cut back on expenses. Or it may have been a combination of factors, including some that we are simply unaware of. At any rate, it wasn't until 1909 when Heisey began advertising in several of the more specialized trade journals (for the confectionary and hardware trades, in particular) that they again began to feature specific patterns. And, of course, as is well known, in 1911 Heisey pioneered by becoming the first pressed glassware company to advertise nationally in such popular magazines as the Delineator, House and Garden and Woman's Home Companion.

What follows is a selection of the slogans used in Heisey's advertising during the period from 1903 to 1915:

Several of these deserve special notice. Figure 1 (#2) highlights the Plunger Cut trademark, while figure 2 (referred to in both #8 & #9) features the Diamond trademark. These were both short lived marks which, according to the papers filed with the Patent Office, were intended to be sued on glassware, either as stickers or impressed in the glass. (If impressed, only the words "Plunger Cut" would appear; presumably the sticker would look like the form appearing in the advertisement.) I don't know if either of these marks has ever been seen; the Diamond without an H would probably just look like the H had been fire polished out.

Several of the ads (#7, 13 & 15, among others) refer to how economical Heisey glass was, in comparison to other company's ware of an equal quality, because of its durability. Thus, in #15, Heisey glassware could be "considered the cheapest glassware on the market" not necessarily because it cost less than that made by competitors (much of which was considerably less expensive) but, by a rather forced logic, because it was less likely to break and require replacement. I suspect this really was a legitimate claim where the hotel and restaurant

trade was concerned, but I'm not sure how compelling an argument it would have been with the average housewife.

No. fourteen refers to consumer familiarity with Heisey glassware due to an "extensive publicity campaign" -- this, of course, is the series of advertisements which had begun to appear in popular magazines in 1911.

And, finally, I find #16 (figure 3) rather intriguing, since it is the only ad to my knowledge to proudly proclaim "Made in Ohio". At the time, when there were at least dozens, if not literally hundreds, of glass factories in Ohio, it was a symbol of A. H. Heisey's staunch support of American-made glassware. (He fought for years to get a strong tariff bill passed to prevent foreign imports from undercutting the domestic market.) Apparently the book was kept in numerical order according to mold numbers, not necessarily date order.

IS IT HEISEY - OR WESTMORELAND

These candlesticks can be very deceiving if you are not well educated on Heisey Candlesticks. There are several differences between the two. The top of the candle cup on the #2 Old Williamsburg is hexagonal and the top on the 1010 is round. The candle cup and the stem are much thinner than the 1010 also.

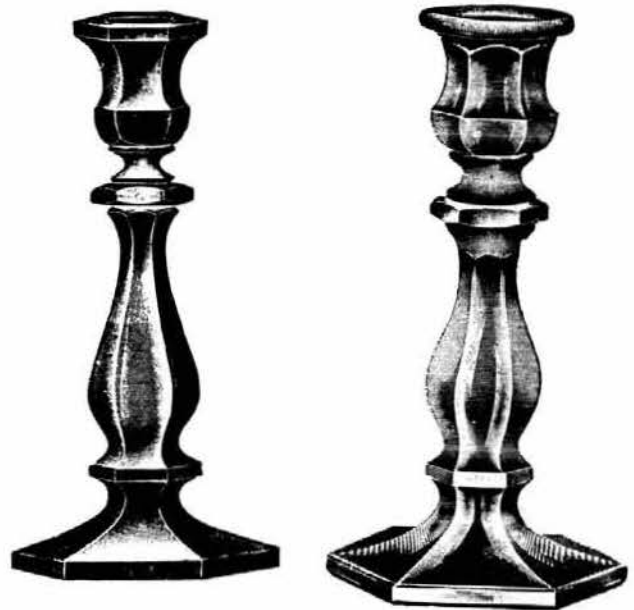
Of course, you all know that the one on the left is Heisey #2. The 11" size was made from 1902 - 1931. The 7" and 8" were in production much later with some being made until the factory closed. Imperial made one of these but the size is not mentioned in the material we have.

Other marks which we own include the Diamond H on glass and on paper and the word "Heisey", on glass.

Our registered trademark for glass which we have made is HCA, usually used with a date.
