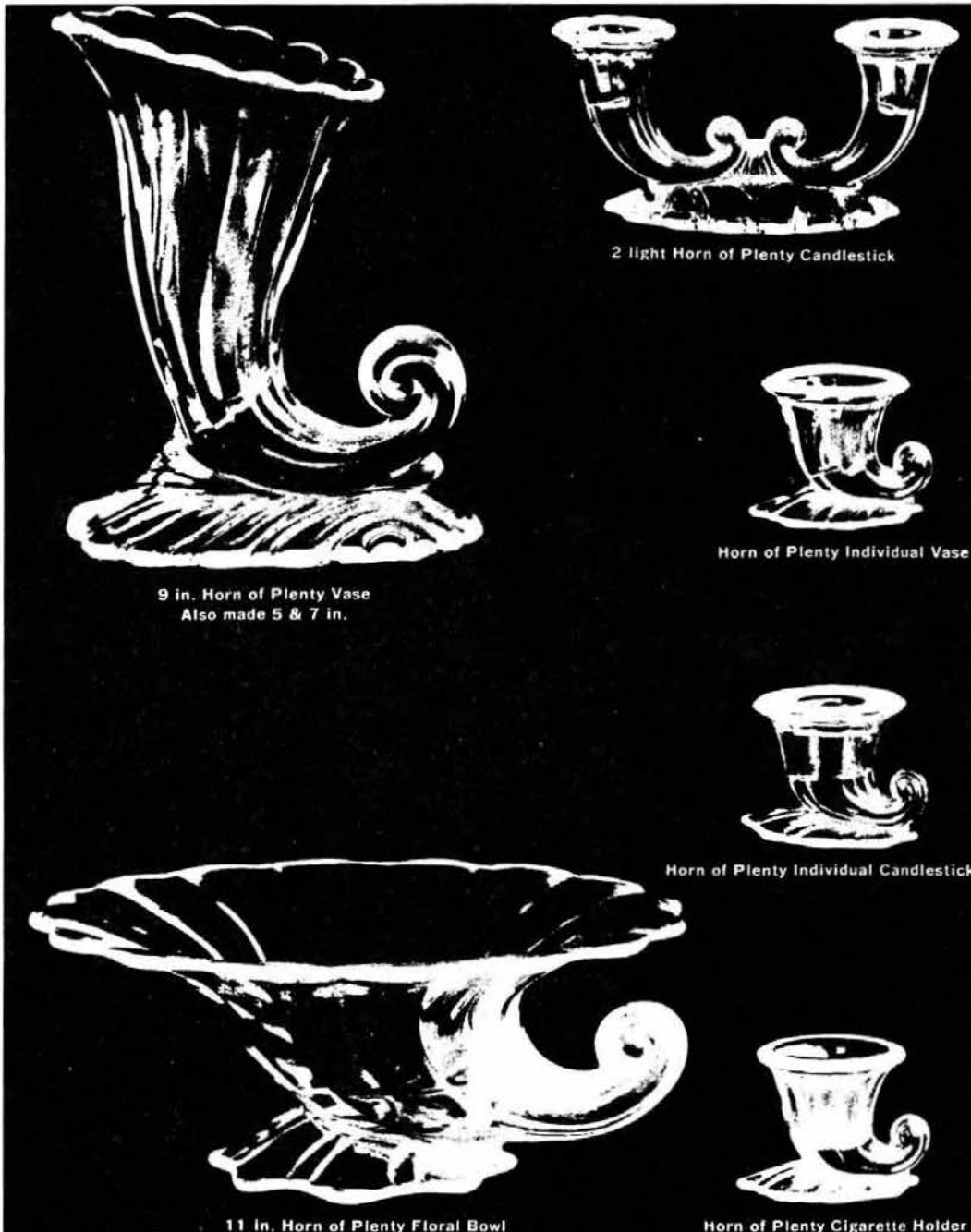

About the Cover: During this month we celebrate Thanksgiving. One of the symbols of Thanksgiving is the cornucopia or horn of plenty. Symbolizing abundance, the cornucopia is a decorative motif, dating from ancient Greece. The motif originated as a curved goat's horn filled and overflowing with fruit and grain.

The A. H. Heisey Company used the cornucopia motif as a model for some of the pieces in the #1428 Warwick pattern. The cover features such pieces which were also called "Horn of Plenty". The production dates for this pattern was 1933-1957. It was made in Moonglearn, Flamingo, Sahara, Cobalt and Alexandrite. See page 12 for more information about #1428 Warwick candlesticks.

"The number of consecutive four-year terms that a member may be elected to the Board of Directors shall be limited to two."

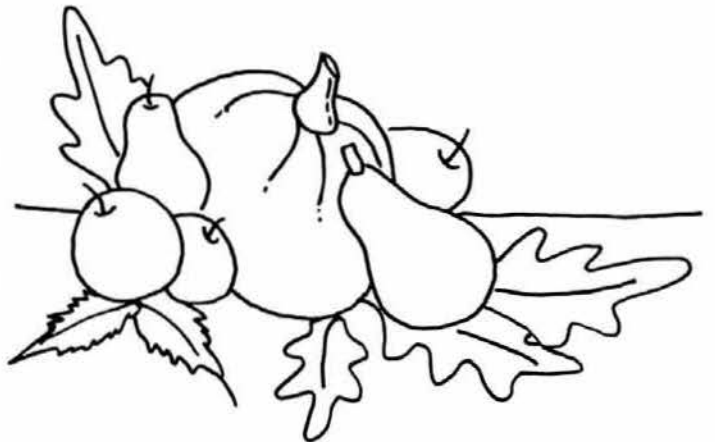
PROPOSED CHANGE:

Our quote for the month: "An expert is one who knows more and more about less and less".

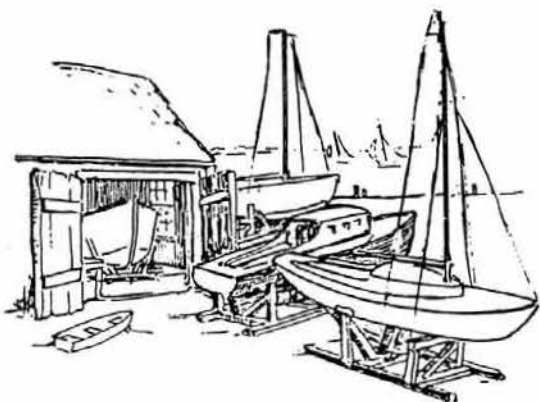

diamonds are forever ...

The Historic District Act was accepted for the Yachting Center in 1968. This Act enables the Yachting Center to continue to preserve its priceless, irreplaceable heritage for itself, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the entire country.

The Yachting Center's heritage of magnificent examples of Colonial architecture as well as smaller, charming old dwellings has been successfully preserved. These are the very homes where tough colonial fisherman and daring patriots of the 1600's, 1700's and 1800's lived. They are a direct link to our past.

Revealing much of the original town, the streets themselves are a reminder of the past. The original narrow streets twist and wind through the center of the business sections and to the water front. As one native once remarked, "The houses came first, then we made the paths". Believe me this is true, come visit us and see for yourself.

Just as history is being preserved in the Yachting Center other aspects of history are being preserved through the collection of Heisey glass. Not only is the glass itself beautiful but it is a reminder of our ancestors, the importance of their lives and how they have enriched our lives today through their hard work and dedication.

Many people have written in the last month or so to talk about their discoveries. "The Rebel" has a #4225 cocktail strainer and top along with a #412 Rib and Panel three pint jug.

As always "The Energetic Countess" has exquisite glass to report: #1255 Pineapple and Fan tumbler in Emerald with good gold, etched "Summer 1898", a Pineapple and Fan 6" vase, also in Emerald and a great find, and a #6 Sunburst toothpick. She also crowed about an individual Winged Scroll, Custard, oil lamp, and the #150 Pointed Oval and Diamond Point Pitcher.

"The Amicable Stroller" says she had a #1401 Empress individual creamer in Sahara, #1540 Lariat Orchid etched fan vase, #1255 Pineapple and Fan salt, a #355 Quator Hotel cream and sugar in Crystal etched, the Quator individual cream and sugar, and the #372 McGrady Sahara syrup. This can be found on page 54 of The Collector's Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass by Neila Bredehoft. Beautiful piece!

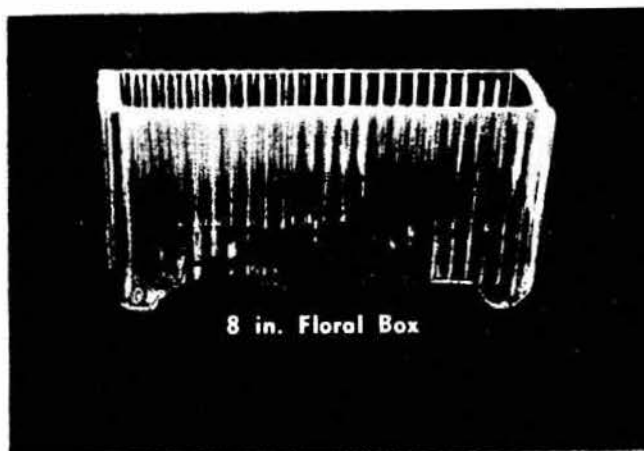


figure 1. #1469 Ridgeleigh floral box.

As for the other half of the family, "Mr. 1469" claims the #1401 Empress Moongleam, cup and saucer. In addition he found a real beauty, the #1469 Ridgeleigh floral box. This is an absolutely exquisite piece of glass. See figure 1.

Remember I told you about one of the "Original Members" of the Bay State and her table settings (the sugar, creamer, spooner and covered butter)? She reports acquiring the following: #1776 Kalonyal, #1201 Fandango and the #1205 Fancy Loop.

"The Stalwart Stem Collector" has an Imperial Whirlpool, #1506 juice in amber, a #3350 Wabash goblet with Pied Piper etch; and a #150 Banded Flute cordial.

"The Benevolent Philosopher" has a #1401 Empress Flamingo salt and pepper, a D/O plate in Flamingo with Trojan etch, a #343 Sunburst punch cup, and the #1235 Beaded Panel and Sunburst punch cup, a 5" footed jelly, a salt or pepper, a mayo and an underplate.

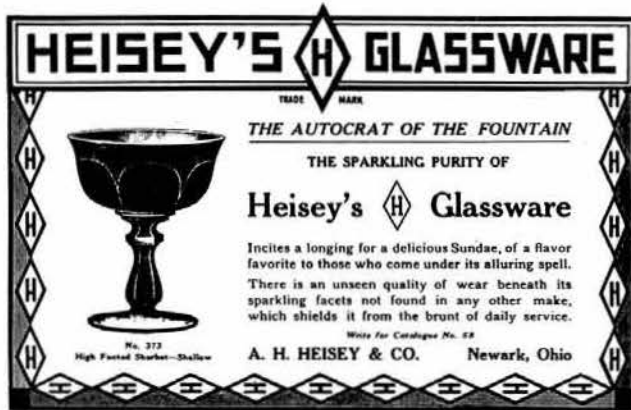


figure 2. Confectioners' Journal, May 1913, high footed sherbet.

"The Tradin Fools", from the Land of Lincoln (Illinois), have been very busy lately. The 'Mrs.' traded for two nice pieces of #1205 Fancy Loop - the 13 oz. molasses and a footed orange bowl. See figure 2 for illustration of the orange bowl. She also acquired a #353 Medium Flat Panel 10" vase and the #1205 fruit basket.

"The Farmer" has had a bit of time on his hands since it is between planting and harvesting. So, he took his truck and proceeded to bring home the following 'produce': a #1184 Yeoman covered sugar in Marigold, two #150 Banded Flute handled chambersticks, two #99 Lil Squater sticks, a #1252 Twist 8" floral bowl with sterling overlay and the #17 Classic 16" candleabra with "C" prisms.

"The Steadfast Colleague" called me on the phone quite a while back to report some of his finds, here they are: four #1229 Octagon nut cups in Moongleam, an Oval and Diamond Point nut cup in Crystal, a Mercury short candlestick also in Moongleam, a #1540 Lariat candlestick,

a #429 individual salt, and lastly an Imperial carmel slag (on the dark side) oscar.

Hey!, "Ole and Minnie" where have you been, Yours Truly misses hearing from you. Last time you wrote you had found a 13" torte plate, Orchid etch plus a pair of square candleholders. Write. Remember, I miss you!

Did I mention that the "Cardinal" has a beautiful #2930 Plain and Fancy 10 oz. tumbler with Black-Berry etch? Quite rare, I would say!

I know this sounds like a broken record, but please write, I need your input. Would also love to hear how you started collecting glass so I can pass it on to all my wonderful friends all over Heisey Land.

Heisey in the Trade Journals: #373 Colonial

The #373 Colonial stemware line was to become probably the single most popular and easily recognized pattern ever issued by Heisey. It's amazing how little is known about its origin. Before trying to unravel that particular mystery, I'll jump ahead a number of years and introduce it under the guise it is best known today.

In 1937, the #371 Puritan line was renamed "Old Williamsburg". This began a process of amalgamation resulting in that pattern becoming what might be called "the best of" Heisey's old colonial designs. Among many other pieces which became part of Old Williamsburg, the #373 Colonial stemware line eventually was incorporated into the "new" pattern. This is the stemware we associate with the line today. It became so popular that during the later years it was frequently one of the top choices for bride's crystal. In addition it became a perennial best seller for Imperial after they purchased Heisey's molds. In fact, because of its commercial viability, Old Williamsburg was the one pattern priced separately when the molds were sold after Imperial's bankruptcy. Therefore, it was the one group of molds which the H.C.A. was unable to acquire. Most of us accepted this with a certain amount of equanimity since they were so widely reproduced.

What was the origin of this extremely popular pattern? According to Clarence Vogel, it dates back to around 1907. Presumably this date is based on the sequence of pattern numbers which came out around that time. However, I've been unable to find any other support for an attribution of the pattern as being this early. Unfortunately, we do not have all of the catalogs for the period from 1908-1910. The earliest one which does include #373 is catalog 75 of 1913. However, there is one other piece of evidence which tends to support a later date of introduction: figure 1 shows the patent for the goblet in this pattern, which was submitted May 6, 1912 and approved July 2, 1912 as D42,710. Although patterns were not necessarily always patented when they were new, it doesn't seem likely that this one would have been applied for

as much as five years later. Absent any evidence of an earlier introduction, I suspect that this stemware line was first introduced sometime around 1911, when the first advertisement for it appeared in both The Hardware Reporter and Iron Age-Hardware.

According to the patent application, Andrew J. Sanford was the designer of this line. Sanford was by far the most prolific designer of Heisey's early years. Unlike some of the other Colonial patterns brought out by Heisey in these years, #373 was confined to stemware only, including a 9 oz. goblet, 7 oz. champagne, 4 1/2 oz. claret, 3 oz. burgundy, 1 1/2 oz. wine, 3/4 oz. cordial, 5 oz. low footed sherbet, 3 oz. cocktail, and 5 oz. saucer champagne.

Although never heavily advertised, there were a few additional ads featuring pieces of #373 which came out in May 1913. Figure 2 is from the Confectioners Journal and shows the high footed sherbet. Considering the targeted market of that periodical, it's not surprising to discover that this is the same as the "saucer champagne" in the catalog. It is also listed as a

sherbet in figure 3, where it is portrayed along with the burgundy and goblet. Figure 3 was repeated between May and August 1913 in the Hardware Dealer s' Magazine, The Hardware Reporter, Hardware World and Iron Age-Hardware.

I don't know how long #373 remained in production in these early years, but presumably it was not nearly as popular at this time as it was to become later when incorporated into the Old Williamsburg line.

We do have a pretty good idea when the #373 line was reintroduced, since Heisey's Table Talk for July-August 1937 includes it under the heading, "a few of Heisey's new patterns." Called simply "Colonial" (the same heading used in the 1913 catalog), it came out at a time when interest in older styles was once more evident. It was at some point after this that it was subsumed into the Old Williamsburg line and became one of the most enduring patterns ever made.

There are, however, still some unanswered questions about this later reissue. For instance, the goblet is known in Alexandrite, a color which went out of production in 1935--does this mean that the goblet was made earlier in the thirties or that Alexandrite was experimented with at some point after 1937?

Other known colors (all of which are rare) date from the later years, including Dawn, Amber and Limelight.

Considering Old Williamsburg's popularity, it's a little surprising to discover that it was rarely advertised even during the heyday of the pattern. Figure 4 is one of the few exceptions, appearing in Living for Young Homemakers and House Beautiful in October 1952, offering a 16-piece starter set for only \$8.95.

Nevertheless, Old Williamsburg did continue to be a major seller for Heisey up until the factory closed in 1957. When Imperial acquired the molds in 1958, it was one of the first patterns to be reissued. Of the pieces originally from the #373 line, this included the tall goblet, the tall sherbet (saucer champagne), low sherbet, and claret. They were made by Imperial in at least twelve production colors, including Crystal, Blue Haze, Nut Brown, Verde, Azalea, Antique Blue, Amber, Sunshine Yellow, Ultra Blue, Rose Pink, Ruby, and Emerald Green, with feasibility items known in several other colors, including Light Blue, Imperial Jade, Meadow Green, and Smoke. After the Old Williamsburg molds were acquired by Lan-

caster Colony in 1985, there were even a few pieces in this pattern made in Crystal, Blue, and Brown by Fostoria, which was a subsidiary of Lancaster Colony at that time. However, Lancaster almost immediately closed down Fostoria's domestic production. If they have plans to continue to use the Old Williamsburg molds in one of their other plants either here and abroad, nothing further is known.

**From Heisey Candlesticks,
Candelabras and Lamps**

No.1428 Warwick "Horn of Plenty"



2-light candlestick, 1933-1955.

Of the two candlesticks which were part of the #1428 Warwick pattern, the first to be produced was the two-light. A vase in this pattern was reported as being new in the August 1933 issue of China, Glass & Lamps and it is probably that the two-light candlestick was first made at about this same time or shortly after. At any rate, it appears in a factory worksheet dated December 27, 1933 and in February of the following year was featured in an advertisement in the Crockery and Glass Journal as part of a "new ... Horn of Plenty Console Set," with the 11 inch floral bowl from the same pattern. (It is interesting that the bowl in this advertisement is cut, while the candlesticks have been left plain.)

Although a small line, with only six pieces total, Warwick seems to have been quite popular, and the two-light candlestick was no exception. It remained in production over sixteen years, until it was discontinued in January 1950.

It is most common in crystal. Sahara is occasionally seen, but the other colors are difficult to find. One of these candlesticks is known in trial blue, but is probably the only one to have been made in that experimental color.

The candlestick was reissued by Imperial, sometime in the 1960's, in both Verde and Heather. It is not common in these colors. It is not known if it was made in crystal by Imperial.

All of the pieces in the Warwick pattern are made up of various of the horn of plenty form. The two-light has two of them, back to back, resting on an oval base. The horns themselves have twelve ribs, with scalloped tops. The bottom of the base is cut smooth and polished.



individual candlestick, 1935-1944.

This single candlestick was not added to the Warwick pattern until sometime around 1935, a year or two after the other pieces in the pattern were introduced. It was made in large quantities and, even though it was not made for quite as long a period as the two-light candlestick, having been discontinued around 1944, it is nevertheless quite common today. It is somewhat easier to find in both Sahara and Cobalt than the two-light, but like the latter is quite rare in both Flamingo and Moongleam.

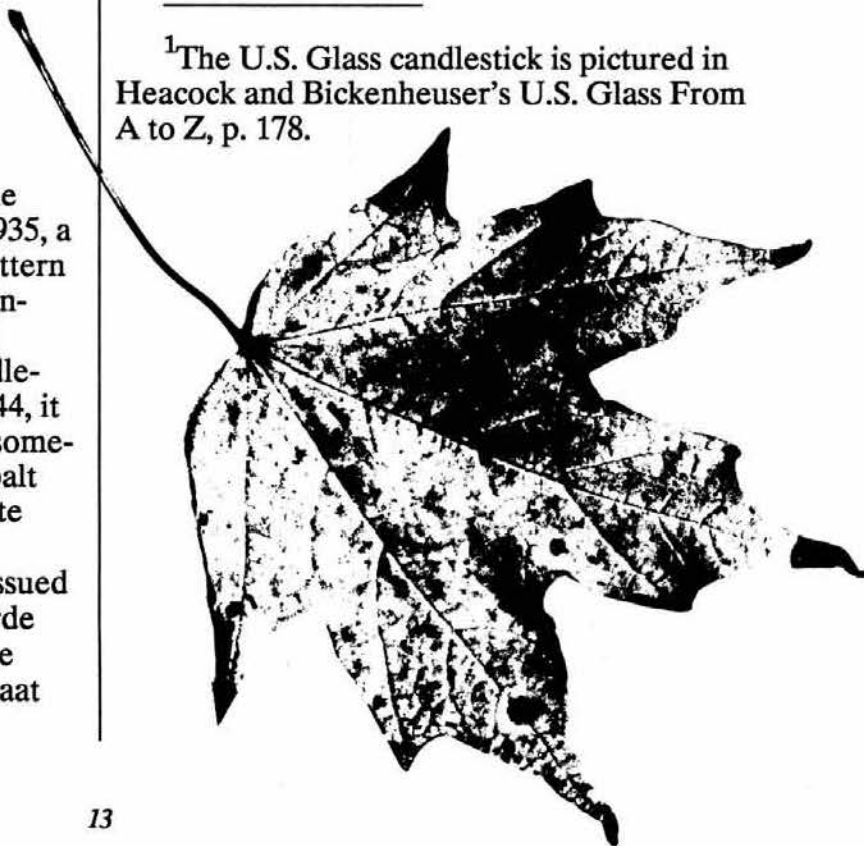
The individual candlestick was also reissued by Imperial some time in the 1960's in Verde and heather, but is also uncommon in those colors. There is no evidence to indicate that

this candlestick was ever made in crystal by Imperial.

There is some confusion involved in identifying the individual candlestick, since there were three items in the Warwick line, all of which are similar in appearance. The cigarette holder has the widest opening and cannot be confused with the candlestick. The individual vase, on the other hand, has a similar opening and is only differentiated from the candlestick (in the catalogues) by the fact that the latter is flat on the top. But the real difficulty is caused by the fact that the latter will not hold a candle securely, whereas the item identified in the catalogues as the vase, will. There is a possibility that the catalogues were consistently in error, with the wrong labels attached to these two items, but if so this error seems to have been perpetuated repeatedly. In catalogue 214-19, however, the individual candlestick as pictured does not appear to have the flat lip.

A very similar candlestick was made by the United States Glass Company,¹ probably at about the same time that Warwick was in production. The main difference between the two is that the U.S. Glass candlestick has a wave-like treatment to the tail of the horn, whereas the Heisey candlestick is plain, with just twelve ribs that run the length of the entire horn.

Accuracy: If you are an advertiser, please check the accuracy of your information. Include pattern number, pattern name, item, decoration, color (if other than Crystal), H if marked, quantity and price. Don't forget your readers are both novices and experts.

Lines not items: *Excluding name, address and other information that appears at the top of the ad*, the amount of information in an ad will be measured by lines instead of by items.

See chart at right for number of characters per line per display space. Characters are: all punctuation, letters, numbers, symbols and spaces. For example the last sentence has 70 characters and this sentence has 73.

The reason for this change is that often times a description for one item may run to two lines, therefore using more space which

eliminates space for another item. Also some advertisers like to include other information about where they will show next or special services for their customers. I would like to be consistent and fair with every advertiser.

Camera ready ads: If you would prefer to send in your ads camera-ready (typeset & ready for printing) you are welcome to at your own cost. However, the dimensions must be exactly as specified in the chart. The type style we use is called Dutch.

Abbreviations: In the December Heisey News, I will list recommended abbreviations.

Questions: If you have any questions, feel free to call me at The National Heisey Glass Museum. All of this may seem a bit complicated at first. Please be patient and I am sure that you will see the benefits in no time. Advertisers will know what they are getting for their advertising dollar (every time they advertise). 
