The Crystolite pattern was popular with *Brides to Be*. In the early 1940s, *House Beautiful's* spring issues featured a *Guide for Brides* which contained advertisements for a variety of Crystolite pieces, including serving pieces and the Crystolite candy box with metal lid and candleblock flower.

Louise Ream's article in this issue refers to the Crystolite candy box, as well as the floral bowl pictured on the cover (first self of the display, just left of center).

Lots of work is being done in the King House as well, to make it ready for June. The Museum shop (formerly the Gift Shop) will be expanded and the rooms upstairs will be available for small meetings or just a quiet place to relax.

The museum will be closed until the dedication on Wednesday evening, June 16. Please don't ask to go through before then, as there is so much to be done between now and that important date.

If anyone would care to donate money for furnishings, it would be appreciated. We need chairs, occasional tables, bookcases and other pieces for both the King House and the new addition.

By the time you read this, the Lavender Ice Flying Mares may be sold out. A great deal of planning and discussion went into this project and let me assure you that everything has been handled as fairly as possible. On April 20th, we will have equal order takers for mail orders, phone orders, and walk-in customers. The local people and the committee members have no better chance than those of you who live out of state. Dalzell-Viking will start making Flying Mares the week of April 13th and orders will be processed in numerical order – (1 through 450) following the sale on April 20.

Excitement is beginning to mount for the convention. There will be so much to do this year! We will start on Tuesday with a choice of a *Golf Outing* or a *Bus Tour* to Dalzell-Viking. Members from the south and east may wish to drive to Dalzell and meet the tour there. If you want to do this, plan to arrive at about 10:30 or 11:00 and

sign up for lunch. The lunch will be a cold cut buffet served in the factory. It may be warm, so dress accordingly. Dalzell will be making the Flying Mare. This will be quite a sight to see.

Wednesday will be the *Dedication of The Museum Complex* at 6:30 p.m., with a delicious cocktail and hors d'oeuvre buffet catered by Gene Campolo and *Open House* of the museum for registered members who sign up for this. Of course, Thursday will be the opening of the *Show and Display*. Friday will be the *ID Breakfast*, *Former Employees Reception*, the *Wiener Roast*, *Swap and Silent Auction* will be combined for a fun filled evening. Ken Dalzell has agreed to be our *Banquet* speaker for Saturday evening. *The Annual Meeting* will be on Sunday morning at Curtis Hall, Denison University, (the sight of the 1993 Cadillac/Lincoln Dinner held during the great snow storm). KEEPING IN TOUCH

Louise Ream

Several years ago, I loaned the museum a *Black* 1503 Crystolite 10" bowl (looks like the Crystal Crystolite floral bowl pictured on the cover). At the time, I believed that it was made by Imperial. A few years later a former employee gave me some papers which contained a letter dated November 13, 1952 written to Joe Lower who was in charge of the New York City office. It was an order from *Old Silver Classics*, a company that made various types of silver or silver plate holders for glass bowls of many kinds. Heisey was the supplier of the bowls. Since Heisey did make *Dawn*, the company had asked for the *Black* 10 inch floral bowls. They also said that they had asked for *Black* before but it wasn't being made at that time. It was then that I realized that I probably had one of those bowls. The bowl had been displayed with the Imperial Glass in the lower level of the museum but was moved to the first floor. Its value has increased now that it is known to be a rare piece of Heisey Dawn.

I don't believe that we have ever given a date for the Heisey glass mail box, which is in the doorway between rooms 7 and 8 of the King House. It was made around September 1, 1942 and uncut ones sold for \$24.00 a dozen. The fixtures for it cost \$30.00 a dozen. I assume that was the wholesale price. The one referred to here had at one time been on Edgar Wilson Heisey's house.

Not long before I left the museum in 1990, we purchased some 6-1/2" square plates. I recently found out that they were made for the Warren-Kessler firm in New York City. The ones which we have vary somewhat in size and probably are experimental. They were displayed in the lower level for a few years but will now move to the new building along with the rest of the Heisey glass from the lower level. The pattern of these plates is #1544 square.

Warren Kessler is the same company which bought the bottoms of Crystolite low candy boxes and used metal lids on them. They added various decorations on the lids which include the #1503 Crystolite candle block which was drilled



and sometimes had metal leaves. They also used glass grapes and Fostoria colts and finials.

The West Point Crest was used on the #5024 Oxford stemware which includes the goblet, champagne, cocktail, ice tea with sham, 8 oz highball also with sham and possibly other items. Imperial used the same Oxford pattern for this crest, though I do not know how many different items they made. There is really no way to tell the difference between Heisey's and the Imperial pieces.



FORT WILLIAM HENRY ETCH

This etch was first shown in Vogel's *Newscaster*. Mr. Vogel felt that it was ordered by the government for use at the Fort. Later information reveals that it was a custom etch ordered by the Fort William Henry Motor Inn. This Inn is still

operating at Lake George, New York. The Fort, that was built in 1757 by the British, now operates as a museum with artifacts from the 1757-90 displayed. The French captured the Fort during the French & Indian War. Since it was located at the southern tip of Lake George, it was of extreme importance during that period. This Fort was used in the movie *The Last of the Mohicans*. The etch, as shown with drawings, is a "deep plate" type with a military motif. The hotel ordered the etch on plain paneled glassware. The #351-355 ale or sham, tumblers & #21 candles were among the Heisey items used. This etch is rarely seen (The information about Fort William Henry etching was provided by David Curley. His grandson, Nathan, pictured below did the drawings on the glass.)
