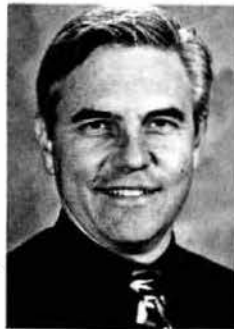

Therorems for Collecting

As a novice collector I talked too much, I let everyone know what I was into. Why not? I knew I was collecting the best glass in the world and was tickled silly at how easy it was to collect (remember, I go back a few years). Time was you could go into an antiques shop or show and have a choice of Heisey to buy. If I was as bright as I thought I was at the time, I wouldn't have made a choice, I would have bought it all.

No matter, Heisey collecting, as anything that becomes a worthy collectible, eventually develops into a litany of *shouldas*. If I wore hash marks on my sleeves for every piece of Heisey I *shoulda* bought, I couldn't lift my arms. No sense recounting them here, that's a stroll down memory lane that might reduce a grown man to tears. Maybe I'll tell you about my *shouldas* in the future—after my eyes have dried.

As I said, as a novice I talked too much. It got so everyone in North Jersey knew I was a glass collector, though few made the distinction that *Heisey* glass was the glass I collect. I wear the title "glass collector" to this day even though I clammed up about it years ago.

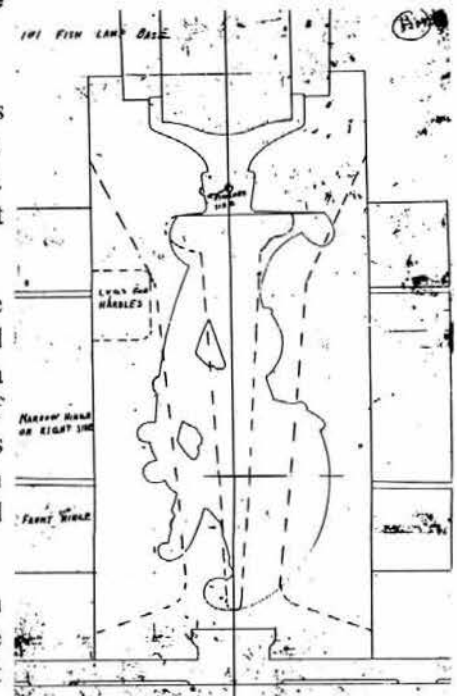
Focus on the Collection—Reporting from the Mold Warehouse

A couple of years ago several of us were going over the different animal molds at the warehouse trying to see what could be used for the different series offerings. There were several molds that I could not find listed on the warehouse master. One of these was the Tropical Fish piece. Well, it took me several stabs at that list and a couple of hours climbing over molds, but at last it was found.

It seems that Imperial listed this as the "Fish Lamp Base" and being a nosey type of person that I am I just had to find this lamp and see what it looked like. Could this be a new item never produced or mentioned before? Could I have found a monstrous discovery? Well, as it turned out the lamp base was the rusted hulk of the Tropical Fish piece minus ring and plunger. It took three of us to open this thing up and inspect the inside. Pretty much the rest is history except to thank Ken Dalzell for cleaning and polishing the mold and in helping us with the ring and plunger fittings.

As summer nears several of us plan to go down to the warehouse and straighten the place up. Really we just want to try our hand at driving the new fork lift! One of our goals is to look at each mold, catalog it, and redo the location system that was first placed in use. As I find unusual or different information, I will write a brief account for your reading pleasure. ♦

Endowment Fund Report

On June 15, 1983, Bob McClain, HCA president and Dick Marsh, treasurer, presented a check for \$3,700 to Licking County Foundation Chairman Frank Murphy to establish the Heisey Collectors of America Fund. The presentation took place at the museum. Today the Licking County Foundation still administers the fund through the Trust Department of Park National Bank. By combining assets with other small organizations in the LCF the joint effort would provide a larger sum in the hopes of better growth. Then the LCF assets were about \$740,000; today over \$10 million.

From July 1982 through 1986, donations from clubs and individuals had been about \$6,000. Information for the Endowment Fund was obtained through the past year-end auditor's reports. Due to the nature of reporting at that time the year-end endowment status did not show the total for the fund, only annual contributions. Beginning in 1986 the fund was recorded independently, with 1986 closing with \$18,584. From 1986 through 1988 the fund grew to \$30,351. In 1986 the fund grew from another direction with donation of twelve shares of USF&G stock. Now it consisted of the HCA share of the Licking County Fund and the USF&G stock.

HCA President Bob Rarey, during the 1988 annual convention, announced the Board of Directors had set a goal of \$50,000 for the fund and the HCA Endowment Fund was off and running in earnest. In 1990 the HCA Endowment Fund, through the hard work and fund raising efforts of individuals and clubs across the nation, the \$50,000 goal was exceeded.

With the undertaking of an expansion to the museum the future survivability of The National Heisey Glass Museum demonstrated a strong need for an Endowment Fund to eventually meet the financial requirements for sustaining the museum. In 1991, HCA President Dick Smith formed a seven member HCA Endowment Fund Committee to begin monitoring the growth of the fund through donations and projects.

The year 1992 found the fund receiving a gift of five hundred shares of Deluxe Corp. stock valued at approximately \$20,000. The dividends from the USF&G and Deluxe Corp. are deposited along with cash donations received into the Licking County Fund which also reinvests all dividends and interest earned. At the end of 1992 the HCA Endowment Fund totalled \$114,735 and was comprised of the LCF, USF&G stock and Deluxe Corp. stock. The stock certificates for USF&G and Deluxe Corp. are maintained separately from the LCF and are held in the HCA safety deposit box at Park National Bank where they are inventoried annually.

In March 1993 the Endowment Fund Committee established a goal of \$500,000 to be reached in ten years. With the completion of the museum expansion it was determined the fund could now begin to receive the major efforts of the HCA membership. This emphasis is beginning to be observed with the \$30,000 gained from the donations from the 1994 All-Heisey Benefit Auction and Cadillac-Lincoln Dinner.

Nearly twenty years ago two hundred shares of Bob Evans Farms, Inc. stock was given to HCA. In that time through dividend reinvestment and stock splits they have grown to over 10,000 shares. It was recommended to the Board of Directors by the Endowment Fund Committee that these shares be designated as part of the fund. The Board approved the recommendation at the March 14, 1994, meeting and the Bob Evans Farms, Inc. stock is now officially included in the HCA Endowment Fund. The stock certificates will continue to be maintained in the HCA safety deposit box at Park National Bank. Today the HCA Endowment Fund consists of USF&G stock, Deluxe Corp. stock, Bob Evans Farms, Inc. stock and Licking County Fund and totals approximately \$388,500.

Through the efforts of individual members and HCA clubs the Endowment Fund is inching closer to the goal set with the first deposit—support of The National Heisey Glass Museum. The results of the Mold Fund in 1983-1984 and the Expansion Fund 1990-1992 are clear indicators of membership support and interest maintaining the heritage of A.H. Heisey glass. This same dedication is reflected in the growth of the Endowment Fund and is the ingredient required to reach that self-sustaining goal.♦

From the Archives—T. Clarence Heisey Tries to Perfect the Shaver

Today I presented Karen with some interesting letters, ones I thought were highly suitable for the interest of collectors. I sent them on down to Karen as they were more technical than my limited Heisey glass knowledge was capable of handling. So she gets the by-line, I've got plenty more here. For example: I mentioned technical. Now I think of myself as being rather technically oriented and the technical orientation of a series of letters between T. Clarence and Mr. F. G. Evans of the Sunbeam Corporation's service department got me duly impressed. On October 21 of 1954, Mr. Heisey sent his electric razor to the service department for repair. (This was not unusual, he also sent his Parker pens back to the factory for rejuvenation.) It was his postscript that intrigued me.

P.S. If it is possible, why don't you people incorporate a small shaver on this large one so that one can get the hair around the nose shaved clean. As it is, the razor is too big to do that and you have to use a razor to finish the job or use the old style thin electric shaver that you used to make one of which I have.

If you enjoy these monthly tidbits from the archives, you'll love the seminar planned for the convention. See pages 11 and 12 for more information and the schedule.

Sunbeam's Mr. Evans promptly replied. The following is an excerpt:

We were particularly interested in the suggestions which was (sic) contained in the postscript of your letter because it indicates that you have had some difficulty in getting a good shave around the nose. We wonder why this should be for most men tell us that they have no difficulty in shaving all parts of the face with the Shavemaster comb. While it is rather large in comparison to previous models of the Shavemaster, there is no difficulty at all in shaving the upper lip if you start at the outside at the corners of the mouth and shave inward and upward toward the center of the nose. Remember that there is no danger of cutting the end of your nose so that you can use considerable pressure if necessary.

Now not for a minute would T. Clarence take a letter like this sitting down. He replied by return mail:

Frankly, I think you have a wonderful machine but it really isn't worth a damn to get around one's nose, and my nostrils, you might say, are scarcely patrician. They are really the old double-barrel variety. Still, it is just hell to get the whiskers right below my nostrils. In consequence, I still have one of your smaller machines that I use just for that purpose...

Unfortunately, however, T. C. had met his match in F. G. Evans. Within a few days Mr. Heisey received a reply which included this information:

We hope that if you visit one of the branch offices in the near future with your Shavemaster, you can arrange to go without having shaved too recently, for we are pretty sure that one of our branch managers can demonstrate to you how to shave around your nose and on other hard to get at parts of your face with the Shavemaster. It seems that these are matters which are very simple to demonstrate but pretty hard to explain in a letter...

I love it! But then, I have a beard.♦

Perhaps that is why this item is so scarce. Due to the complexity of the mold it is a challenge to try to force the glass through it. Ken has told us he will be using extra workers to help keep the mold hot to lessen the chances of wavy glass.

We have been told by those folks who saw the sample in March what a great addition the Lavender Ice tropical fish will make to their collection. However, if you are a perfectionist and expect no bubbles, mold mark, etc. in your glass I would suggest you examine the sample, on view in the Museum Shop, for yourself to be fully satisfied.

I personally feel this production is another world class item and in future years will increase in value. Again, this is one of the hardest animal types to find and this will be the only time it will be reproduced in Lavender Ice. Now is the time to add it to your collection.

Please read the ordering instructions carefully. We will be adding extra help to process the orders in a smooth and timely fashion. Please remember the proceeds from this project go directly to the general fund to help defray the operating expenses. As always, your help and support is greatly appreciated. ♦
