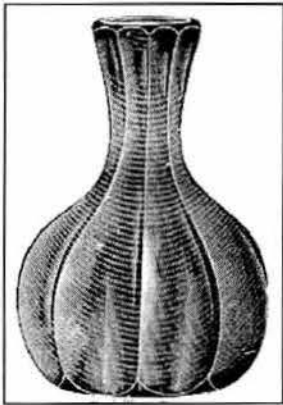

HOW SWEET IT IS—HOW I FOUND HEISEY

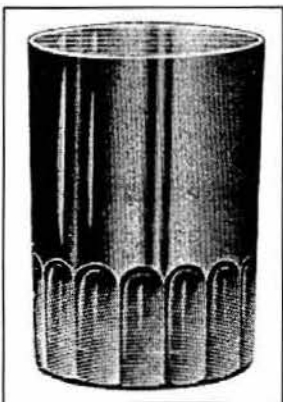

The first person I know who collected Heisey was Jeanette Burton. This was in the early 1960's, before Heisey collecting became so popular. Jeanette and her husband John came to Mansfield to operate the Travelodge. She was a quiet person who liked Heisey because it was marked with the Diamond H and because it was good, clear glass. John wouldn't have cared if his wife collected moose hides. His concern was the Travelodge.

I didn't see her Heisey until the early 70's after John died and she moved into a house. It was then I discovered her treasured pieces—a no. 106 hotel tumbler and a 300½ water bottle. Why? Because they were salvaged from the Evergreen's Cafeteria fire in 1969. The cafeteria was a very popular restaurant in downtown Mansfield where the civic clubs met. I can remember trays and trays of tumblers stacked, ready for use. These were the no. 106 as I later identified from Jeanette's. Every table had a water bottle, probably all Heisey no. 300½. This was the way Heisey was then used and used and used.

Unfortunately, with the exception of Jeanettes two pieces all were destroyed in the fire. These remained in her collection until just recently when her daughter took them, after she passed away.

What a history and a story. Remember, this was in the early 1960's before HCA and any reference books. Thanks, Jeanette, for sparking my interest in Heisey, long ago. *How sweet it is!* ♦



HEISEY ON THE CHEAP—(AND WHAT YOU CAN DO WITH IT)

Now let's discuss what's wrong with collecting Heisey.

No, I'm not out of my mind.

From the HCA Board of Directors to each study club, the cry is the same, "How can we attract young people to Heisey?" The problem is real and it has nothing to do with the aging of America. At least one other reason is often given: Heisey has become too expensive for beginners.

Of course, it doesn't hurt that Heisey leads the pack in increased value among glass collectibles. As early collectors with collections well established, we're happy because we look pretty smart, at least on paper. But, if Heisey prices were only high prices, the Heisey market would surely dry up. Interest would wane and few would seek Heisey in places other than museums.



Fortunately, that it is too expensive and out of reach for the new collector is a misconception. Think about it a minute. Isn't there a lot of inexpensive beautiful Heisey still available? Sure, the rare stuff may be too expensive for even some "serious" collectors but a new collector can still accumulate enough Heisey to enjoy without spending a fortune. What's more, much of it is inexpensive enough to use and Heisey is most fun to own when you use it.

I can hear you scoffing. Follow my reasoning now; luncheon plates are easy to find and are inexpensive (if you're not looking for Tangerine or Trial Blue, that is). Even Limelight and Cobalt are within most budgets—they're equal in price to the finer ware sold in department stores today, either glass or china. Have you priced a Lenox table setting recently?

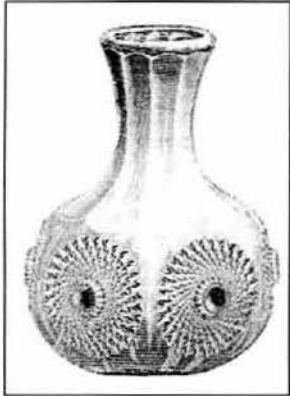
Heisey luncheon plates are nowhere near the price level of Heisey dinner plates but on a table set with grandma's fine china, her dinner plates really look better with a crystal or complimentary colored glass luncheon plate set on them for a salad or an appetizer course. Actually it looks better than glass on glass or china on china. This is true especially for china with a fussy pattern.

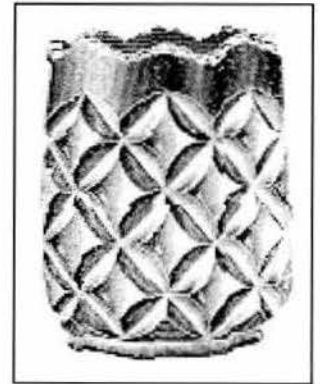

At home we have a Flamingo dinnerware set complete with all the serving pieces and stemware. The most fun about our set was putting it together (you'll agree, I'm sure, that the best part of collecting anything is the hunt). We set a table with all this lovely Flamingo but, without other things to set it off, it would be boring. (It'd be the same with any color). It's like the color tables at our convention display—without the contrasting appointments the settings would be dull.



Most Heisey cups and saucers are priced reasonably when compared to what you'd pay for a new set at a fine store. It boggles the mind that folks spend money on new things in these days of mass production (even the fanciest imported cut crystal is made by machine today). Few manufacturers can match the quality of the old. This is what new collectors must be shown.

Now, suppose your Heisey is etched or cut—mating it with fancy china would cause a confusion of designs. Etched glass looks best with plain china or pottery or those with just a simple edge design. All it takes is a bit of clever mixing and matching to have something great and original (I read that in *Better Homes and Gardens*).

But Heisey is not just luncheon plates and dining pieces. You can find vases that won't break the bank and, best of all, the fun multiplies when you make use of other things for other than their original purpose.

At our house a Puntly and Diamond Point spoon holder hasn't seen a spoon in years but it does a great job holding our toothbrushes and it glistens in sunlight, too. A Pillows spooner holds pens and pencils on my desk, a Fancy Loop bowl holds our fruit and a plain Heisey covered candy is made fancy by the candy in it. Then, too, there's that Sunburst water bottle with a "no harm" chip that shows off flowers better than a vase by Baccarat. We're not talking expensive here, we're talking beautiful.

My wife's wooden mixing spoons found a home in a Fandango celery vase and it sits on the kitchen counter being useful all day while showing itself off. Shoot, I doubt that we'd ever use it for celery anyway. And what about Heisey coasters? They're inexpensive and useful, too, even when used as the coasters they're supposed to be. Did you ever think of using one under a small flower pot to protect furniture? We have a pretty one that acts as a caddie for the small stack of plastic bathroom cups turned upside down on it.

When you find a pretty Heisey stem—buy it. don't turn up your nose because it's not a complete set—who can find a whole set anymore anyway. Put

different stems at each place when entertaining company. Not only is it attractive, it's a great way to get the conversation jump started. And Jello chilled in a variety of Heisey nappies will get guests talking once again. When we visit friends near Boston they always let us choose the Heisey wine glass we will use—they have just one in each pattern. It's special to start a meal with your own favorite.

Here's something else you can do with an inexpensive piece of Heisey. Take anything with a pronounced diamond optic pattern (a tumbler's good), put a votive candle in it, light it, then watch the light dance as the optic traces its pattern on the table or walls.

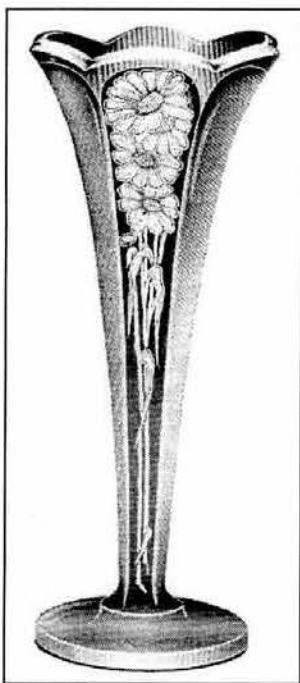
If you love beautiful glass (and there's not much glass as beautiful as Heisey's there's no need to deprive yourself. Some patterns compliment just about anything. Yeoman for one and Ridgeleigh and Crystolite, too, lend a spark to any decor. But, then, I can't think of any Heisey pattern that wouldn't dress up a table, a shelf, or a window sill.

Let's get the word out to the people who just look and admire and hesitate to buy and enjoy. If plans pass the talking stage, you may see some of what I've tried to say here put to use at the table display during convention. It's something to look forward to.

Meanwhile, you'll have to excuse me...Martha Stewart is waiting to consult. ♦

FROM THE ARCHIVES—ANOTHER T.C. HEISEY GEM

I'm a fan of Agatha Christie's Hercule Poirot. A&E has one of those mysteries every Monday night and, thanks to our trusty VCR, if we know we are going to miss a Monday night or someone calls in the middle of the program we can always tape it for later consumption. And one of the bonuses of old age—even if we have seen a particular episode we usually have forgotten how it ended therefore viewing again is no problem! For those of you who are unacquainted with this marvelous Belgian detective and his two sidekicks, Captain Hastings, the automobile buff and Miss Lemon, the secretary with the unassailable filing system, I urge you to try it. Monday nights at nine.

All this to share with you the problems inherent in filing systems. It would seem that unless you have a Library of Congress guiding you every step of the way who knows what system one might devise. Clearly, my predecessors followed a different star than mine. Today I came across a packet of photocopied letters, the originals of which I had not seen. For the most part they represent communication of one sort or another between T. Clarence Heisey and Rod Irwin. For the uninitiated, the latter was a salesman and eventually sales manager for the company. Why the originals are not with the bulk of T. Clarence's correspondence I do not know. My guess is that these were copied from a bundle of letters given from Rod Irwin's estate. Of course, I haven't begun to tackle that filing cabinet loaded with, I am sure, all sorts of gems.

Forgive me if some of what follows has already been covered in some previous *Heisey News*. Of all the correspondence these several letters were photocopied, obviously for some purpose. But, as my faithful readers know, I have become something of a T. Clarence Heisey fan and these epistles contain some real gems. There is a letter written to Rod Irwin in January of 1933, the depths of the depression. Irwin is working out of the Merchandise Mart in Chicago. It begins:

Dear Sir:

As a further curtailment of expense, we have been shooting our people who have been traveling by machine on the 5¢ a mile basis. In this, we have consulted with not only the companies here that are using machines on the road, but some of our friends in the trade, and in no place do we find them paying more than 5¢ a mile.

T.C. goes on to break down hypothetical expenses. You might enjoy comparing cost of travel by automobile then and now. The underlining and italics are mine. I quote:

To figure this out from a proper analytical basis, we have taken a unit of 30,000 miles. You will probably use 2,000 gallon of gasoline, which at 20¢ per gallon (and we can buy all the gas in the world here for 14¢) would amount to \$400.00. We also estimate that you will use 300 Qts. of Oil at 30¢ per Quart, or about \$90.00 worth of oil during that period. Washing Car \$50.00; Storage \$150.00; Tires, 2 sets, \$80.00 ; Repairs, \$200.00, making

\$970.00 Total. 30,000 miles at 5¢ a mile is \$1500.00, which leaves you a balance to make a trade-in on your car, \$530.00, which seems to us more than ample when the 30,000 miles has been finished. (Italics mine)

Notice: While some things are better, some are worse. While gasoline is better than a dollar cheaper, my calculations indicate expectations of about 20 miles to a gallon. And can you imagine two sets of tires for \$80! But what about having them last only 15,000 miles per set? And what must the price of a car have been? Rod Irwin calculates a new car, and he indicates he is referring to a Chevrolet or Essex, at \$900!

Mr. Irwin's reply lacks the humor of T.C.'s (and why wouldn't it!) He supplies a list of expenses "...from my expense book which is not guess work." From the itemized list I find the following interesting:

30 greasings @ \$1.50
traveling @ 75¢ per day
1 extra set 4 tires \$12 apiece
Washing 35 times - \$50
Liability, Fire, Theft Insurance \$65.50 per year in Illinois
Tire repairs \$1.00 19 times

Irwin concludes by noting that salesmen in various territories have differing state gasoline taxes with which to contend, the total amount ranging from 6¢ to 8¢. In filling up my tank this morning I read a notice my service station dealer had posted on his tanks: "Federal and state tax is 40.3¢ a gallon."

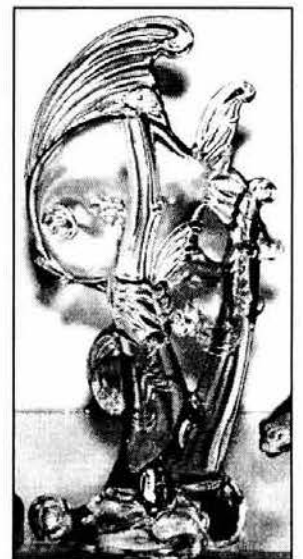
I resolved my filing problem by placing the packet in the box with Irwin correspondence. That one was easy, but where are the originals? ♦

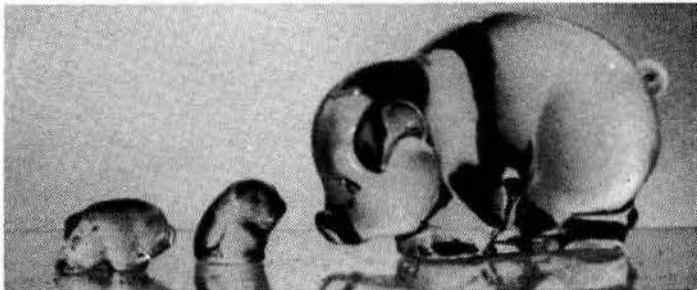

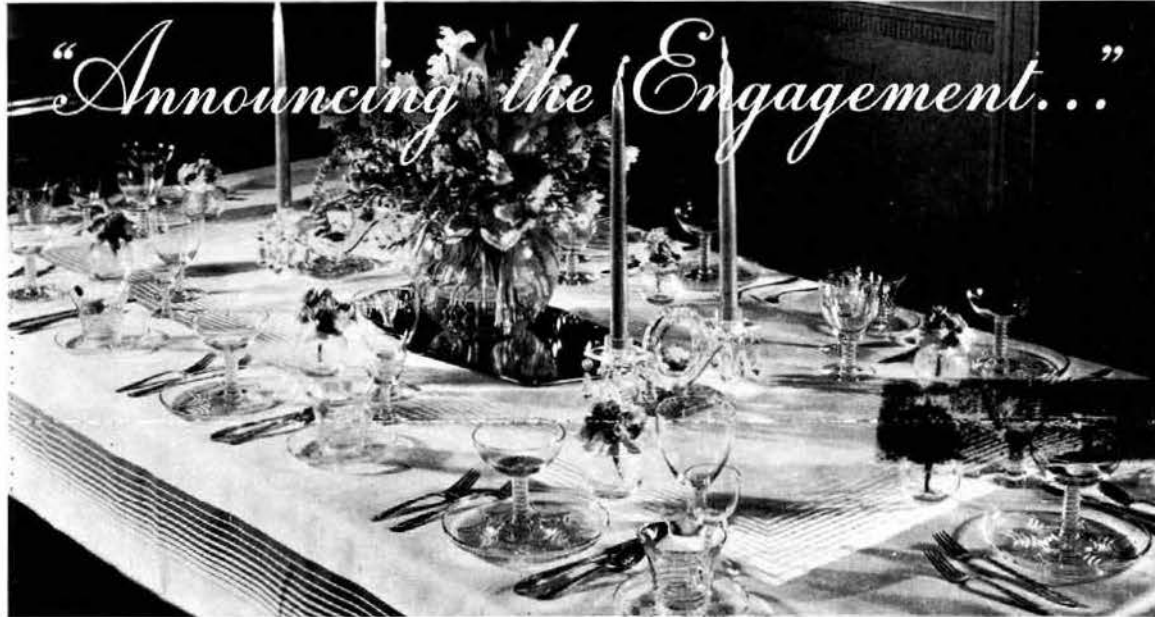

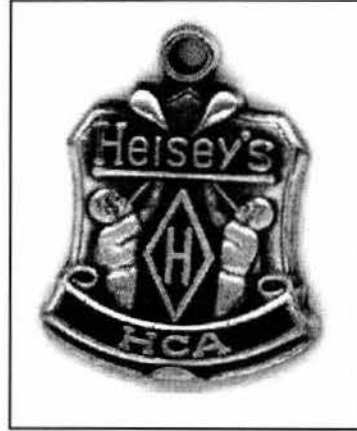

FLAWS IN GLASS

“What is considered a flaw in glass?” is a common question we hear in the Museum Shop. Always keep in mind that Heisey glassware and HCA reproductions are handmade. And anything made by hand cannot always be *perfect*. It takes great skill to produce handmade glass. Here are some of the common questions:

1. Is a mold mark a sign of imperfection? No. However, a too-prominent mold mark or ridge in a piece of pressed glass is an indication of careless workmanship. In fine quality hand pressed glass mold marks are so imperceptible as not to constitute a so-called flaw.
2. What is a shear-mark? A shear-mark is a slight puckering of the glass made when the artisan snips off excess molten glass when working the piece or adding glass to the mold.
3. Why can't these small irregularities be entirely eliminated from handmade glass? For the reason that the glass *is* handmade. No matter how deft the touch of the sensitive hands of glassware craftsmen, it is impossible to entirely eliminate these variations, which are not properly classed as flaws. Nor can it be done by machinery. Glass is one of the most tricky substances known with which to work. It is said that even the finest diamond, examined under a jeweler's lens, rarely shows up with absolute perfection.
4. What is a cord? A cord is an almost invisible difference in density in the glass, caused during the fusing of the molten glass. It is only visible to the naked eye by reason of the fact that, owing to the variation in density, it refracts light. When a goblet which has a cored is filled with water, no light is refracted and the so-called flaw disappears. ♦

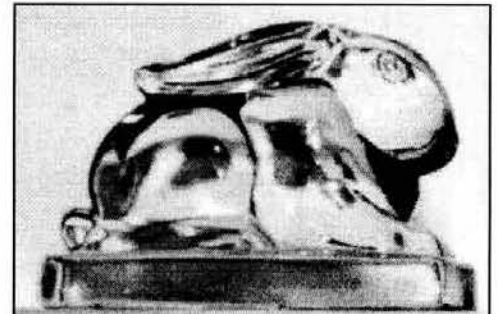

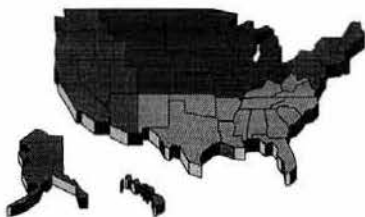
