My wife and I flew to Washington state for the September Quarterly Meeting of the Heisey Collectors of America. Actually, we didn't fly, the airplane did. You may think that's dumb but, believe me—to paraphrase MacArthur, "Old English teachers never die, they just hassle syntax challenged writers."

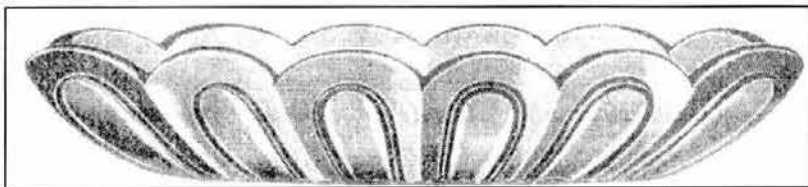
It was a looong flight. Seattle's airport is much like Newark's in New Jersey. It's smaller but the distances from where you are to where you're supposed to go are just as great. It's a mystery how they do that.

Car rental counters were conveniently located near the luggage carousel (read that, *baggage dump*) but the rental cars themselves were up one level, across a bridge that spans a highway, then down two levels to a parking garage. Now I know why O.J. Simpson was running so hard in those Hertz ads. Unfortunately, we carried more luggage than O.J. did.



By the time we gathered our luggage and picked up our car, it was dusk. We didn't have a clue as to where we were going. The car rental folks pointed us towards the town in which our motel was located. The town was easy to find but the motel location was a mystery—even to the natives. After many fruitless inquiry stops I called the motel for positive directions and once we agreed on what was a landmark and what wasn't, they did their best to guide us. *Starbucks* is not a landmark because there's one on every corner.

In the morning we got our first real glimpse of northwest Washington and suburban Seattle. There are an awful lot of very tall evergreen trees out there. If they put Christmas lights on every one of those trees we'd see the glow as far east as New Jersey. And mountains! I never really knew from mountains. When you fly over them you don't comprehend their mass. My bride fell in love with Mt. Rainier. It gets my vote, too, for the most beautiful mountain in the lower 48.

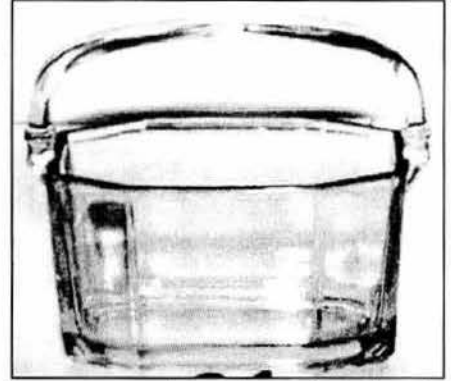


We took a day to visit Mt. Rainier. That's another thing about mountains, they always look close but your drive for hours

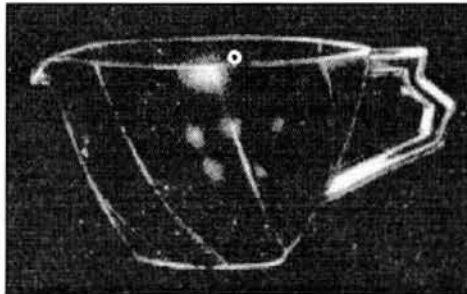

We did all the tourist things during the next few days—the Space Needle at Seattle Center, the museums and the waterfront with its many souvenir shops. One of the most exciting things we did was get caught next to the King Dome when a game let out. This stadium is smack in the middle of downtown Seattle. There are no visible parking lots. What makes it doubly fascinating is that Seattle has absolutely no mass transit. Anywhere you want to go you must either walk or drive. A zillion people came out of that stadium that day. Lord knows how they got home.

After being frozen in place next to the King Dome for hours, the next day we opted for the wide open spaces. We went to Canada. We drove north for a couple of hours until we crossed the Canadian border, then aimed for Vancouver—a city we'd heard glowing reports about.

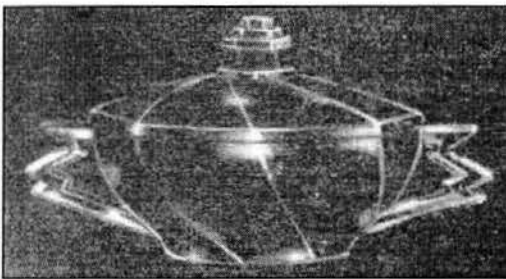


One thing that strikes you as you enter Canada is how pretty they dress their border entrance. There are lovely flower beds and flags and welcome signs. On the other side of the coin—when you re-enter the United States, there are no flowers or flags and the few signs there are list the penalties awaiting law-breakers. As a citizen, my wife was chagrined that our car was sniffed by drug sniffing dogs upon our return. I explained that the photo on my driver's license probably made them suspicious.



After Vancouver, on another day (two actually) we did Victoria, another picture book Canadian city. But probably the most fun I had was in Snohomish back in Washington state. Believe it

or not that's the name of a city. It sits between Seattle and Canada. Snohomish is known for its antiques shops and centers. If you wonder why Heisey is tough to find in your area, believe me when I tell you it's all in Snohomish. We saw some great stuff, though few bargains. Regardless, we went there twice.



At last, for the final days of our trip we headed for the reason we made the trip in the first place: the HCA Quarterly Meeting held in Issaquah (that's the name of a city, too, just east of Seattle). The meeting was hosted by the Northwest Heisey Club and the Oregon Trail Heisey Club.

The host clubs did a wonderful job of making us feel at home. It was great seeing so many HCA members gathered at this beautiful spot. A reception on Friday evening allowed us to greet and meet so many nice people, some I already know and others asked me, "Who the heck are you?"

Early Saturday morning I had to attend a Board meeting so I missed the fun of everyone bumping into each other at the local antiques shops. Then at noon the host clubs'

fundraiser, the All Heisey Auction, began. It was a wonderful auction. I don't think I've ever seen so many no. 439 Raised Loop pieces in one place. Included were a half gallon pitcher, a cream and sugar and a celery tray.

The auction had many bargains but many pieces brought heavy money. A Cabochon ¼ pound covered butter with the Orchid etching brought \$300, the Raised Loop cream and sugar was knocked down at \$210. A Crystolite master swan with four little swans was bought for \$150 and a large Twist cream and sugar with lightening handles in Moongleam went for \$375. I asked my wife, "Don't we have a set of those?" and she said, "In you dreams."

A complete Sawtooth Band child's set also went for \$375, a Victorian water jug brought \$225 and an Octagon 5" basket in Flamingo went for that same price while an Ivy vase in Moongleam with Arctic etch pulled in \$350. I said before that there were bargains but I should change that to "there were less expensive things." By and large I found Heisey prices (excluding *sleepers*) higher in the northwest than those back east.

It was a fun auction and our President, Tom Bischoff, handled most of the auctioning. Tom kept things hopping and, though I'd never admit it to him, he does as fine a job auctioning as the best in the field. Shhhhhh, we don't want his head to swell.

In the evening the annual Vivian and Percy Moore Memorial Dinner was held. Again, the hosts outdid themselves. The Emerald Green Lotus souvenir candlesticks given to attendees were perfect and the food was fine. I had the salmon. President Tom Bischoff presided over the meeting and there were some fascinating reports which you have undoubtedly read about elsewhere. As usual, members voted to dispense with the reading of the minutes and Secretary Ginny Marsh ran crying from the room.

Gordon Cochran of the Northwest Heisey Club was an outstanding MC and Tom Bischoff remembered everything I taught him and did a fine job when he got up to speak. It was a kick, too, meeting members of the Moore family and reminiscing about Percy and Vivian.



The evening ended with the auctioning of limited edition Heisey items from Imperial and Dalzell Viking. A nice chunk of change was raised for the Endowment Fund. All-in-all, it was a marvelous experience. The host clubs did a great job, it was a wonderful meeting and it was exciting meeting Heisey collectors I hadn't met before.

The last time I visited the Seattle area was 50 years ago. Things were different—I didn't know how to spell Snohomish or Issaquah then. ♦

FROM THE ARCHIVES—HEISEY IS THE GREATEST!

Back to the filing cabinet drawers we go for this month's discovery. There was a great letter I thought you might, as Heisey enthusiasts, enjoy. It is dated January 19, 1945.

Gentlemen:

For more than 40 years I have been divorced from the glass business, but previous to that was rather active in that line at which time I used to see a great deal of the Heisey glass products in the salesroom of Clarence Marter ¹who then handled your line in New York.

The first contact I had with the Heisey Company was around 1892 when Mr. Heisey brought out the first line of high-grade pressed stemware which was a copy of a cut-glass pattern made by Val St. Lambert and was originally designed by my Grandfather.

What I am coming to is that while at Altman's in New York City the other day, I saw some of your present products and I was thrilled to see that the descendants of old Gus Heisey had lived up to the traditions of the Colonel in turning out some very fine glassware and having the courage of the venerable old gent, to charge prices in keeping with the quality of the glassware.

The thought passed through my mind that if dear old Gus could see the glassware which is being turned out in the factory today, that the old gent would rise from the grave, pass his hand over his goatee, and say to you, "Boys, well done."

Congratulations are not adequate but it certainly not only gave me a thrill but also a sense of well being to recognize that for once, the descendants of an industrial glass-man had lived up to the traditions set up by its Founder who, from a bare-footed boy became the foremost glass man in the United States, and I might say, in the world, for neither Galle in France nor anyone that I know in the glass business, has equaled the fine specimens of glass ware which was my pleasure to see at Altman's.

Gentlemen, you made an old man feel good.

The letter is signed by Jules Dierckx of Antwerp, Belgium. He was apparently president of an international engineering company.

¹ In subsequent correspondence with Mr. Dierckx reveals that T.C. received his middle name from this man, something T.C. later denies.

Of course the reply is typical T.C. Heisey:

I wish my father might be here to read your very gracious and complimentary letter of January 19th. It would have simply suffocated him with pleasure, and it doesn't make us feel bad either. Once in a while we get a pat on the back but nobody around here has ever gotten lumbago from that sort of thing. Anyway, in the thirty-five years that I have been here this is the finest and greatest tribute to father that we have ever received.

I am sorry that my brother George and brother Wilson are not here to enjoy this letter. They too, have gone beyond and I am the only one of the sons remaining. However, I am not taking all these bons mots to myself. Father was smart in surrounding himself with a lot of good men. He couldn't do anything about his sons; they were wished on him, but through the men he originally had with him we built up a nucleus that has carried on his policies and his desires to make the best table glassware in the world, both pressed and blown. With pardonable pride, I might say, that we believe to some extent we have achieved that goal. However, we are not resting on our oars. We are constantly making every effort to produce better and better merchandise and to make the word "service" mean what Noah Webster intended it to mean.

My brother, the late George D. Heisey, was responsible too, for many of the fine designs we had and the quality of our merchandise as he was very close to father and knew what he wanted. We missed him very much here when he went into the cattle business. However, my second brother Wilson, carried on after father's death in the way that Dad would have liked and I think when he died, he was possibly as well liked as any President ever was by his employees. Since that time, we have been fortunate to have had an unusual demand for our merchandise and we have done everything we can in the way of research, new paraphernalia or better mechanism, which we think has naturally resulted in improvement of our product.

We shall frame your letter as it is the greatest one we have ever received and the finest tribute father ever had because I know it came from the heart.

If I may, I am going to send you, one of these days, it may be a month or possibly six weeks as we never had as much business in our lives or as little help, some Rock Crystal goblets. In spite of this condition which I have mentioned, we closed the biggest year in our history and we think 1945 will be ever bigger, but the man-power situation is a problem.

With every good wish, and again with much appreciation, we remain...

A note is attached, "Advised Paul on January 25 to make up 15 or 16 goblets and advise T.C. who will then select cutting to be put on goblets and shipped to Jules Dierckx..." ♦

WAREHOUSE REORGANIZATION

Having joined the ranks of the unemployed (I retired) Tom asked me if I would clean up and reorganize the mould warehouse. As we all know, there is no fool like an old fool, so I said "yes".

The first order of business appeared to be the area outside the warehouse. Our property had been used as a trash dump for the neighborhood. The highlight of this is that the City of Newark will tow vehicles that have been left on ones property. This let us get rid of a pickup truck free of charge.

Next it was weed eating time to cut the tall weeds. With the weeds down out came the chain saw. Would you believe I'm still allowed to use one after cutting my foot with

the machine? At any rate we had much brush and small trees around the building that needed to be removed. The aftermath of the weed eating, cutting down of the brush and picking up of general trash is we filled a large dumpster. Sanford and Son have nothing on me!

Next came the interior. No one has been responsible for the upkeep for years. Therefore, it became a place to put anything someone was in doubt what to do with. A week later aisle ways were clean and the floor swept several

times. This was followed by renumbering all of the racks where the moulds sit so each bay has it's own individual number. There are 25 bays and each bay has 12 bins of moulds.

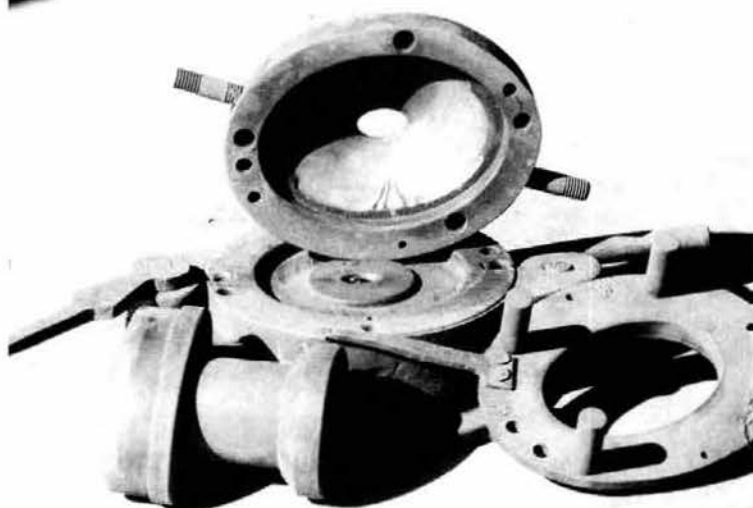
Jack Metcalf has loaned HCA a data base program which the staff at the museum loaded on a stand alone personal computer. The computer was donated by my former employer. We are checking each mould and entering into the computer the pattern number and the item name.

Before I tell you some of the interesting items we've found let me say many thanks to Bob McClain, Chuck Jones and Mary Holmquist. Mary is a pro at data entry.



In no order I give pattern number, item name and description. Some of these items we know of but I have never seen them in glass. Sizes are approximate.

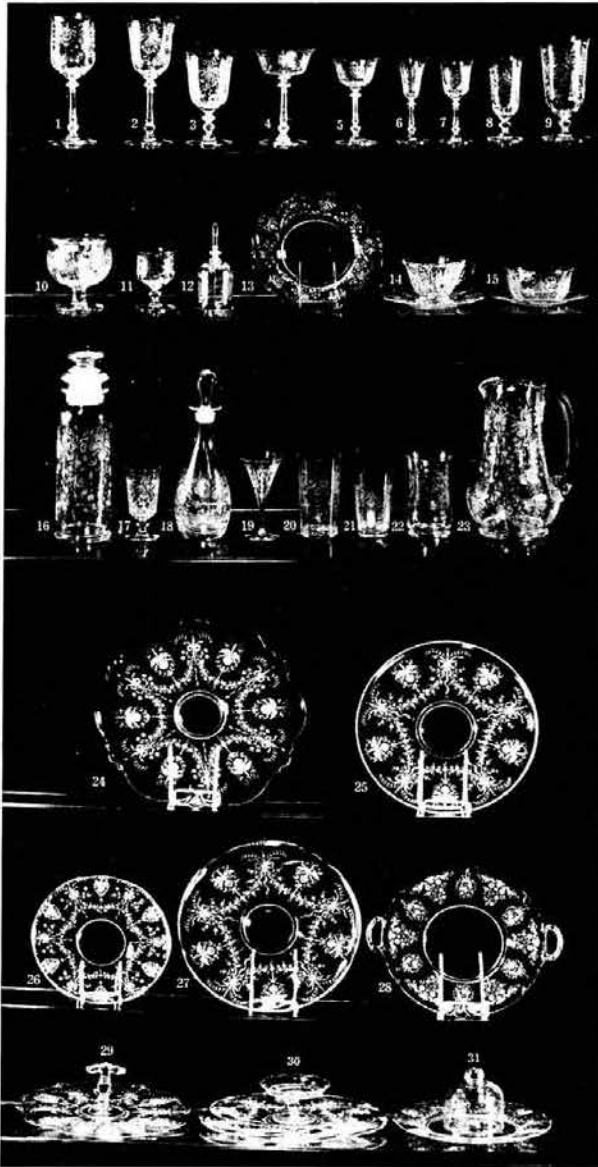
- #5003 Crystolite 11" bowl. The archives has a picture of this.
- #5003 Crystolite blown mayo, 5" wide x 3½" high.
- #1 Clock face, 9x9" with a hole in the center. There are 14 rays radiating out from the center.
- #1 Auto tail light.
- #200 Toast cutter block. This is the size of the old style of bread with a diagonal groove and a small pin raise on either side of one end of the groove.
- #1534 Bookend about 6" tall and 4" across with a series of 1/8" step downs.
- #1517 Oyster plate. We know of this one; it has half shells around the dish.
- #1516 Brush handle. We have these on display in the museum, but now we also have their number. A plunger was also found for a mirror handle, but no mold was found for the piece yet.
- #16-400 This is either a contract job or not Heisey. Bottle to hold water for a metered mail machine
- #1 Display piece 8½x4½x1" with a round pin in the center
- #1633 Handled 6" bon bon. Looks like a tad pole swimming around dish
- #25 Building block, 5x6x6". This is like the ones used in the 1950's as room dividers only this is smaller.
- #1600 Ice tub. Plain, round with two small shell handles.
- #1442 Floral bowl, fluted around lower sides. Half way up is a band of swirls with eight diamonds equally spaced.
- #1525 6" ashtray, hexagon shaped.
- #1929 Blown puff box.
- #1520 Blown sugar shaker, looks like pattern #407.
- #1618 8" plate has a scalloped edge with a scroll coming from each scallop.
- #5062 Stem only. Looks like a pineapple growing on plant.
- #1183 Finger rest. We know of this and have seen it. This also gives a pattern.
- #3375 Four sided tumbler. Looks like Prison Stripe.
- #1634 Cup. Looks like a 12 or 14 oz. dipper with a short handle.
- #1171 Cologne, blown. Looks like 2 oz. 33485 cologne except it is all round.



If we can get the proper supplies and knowledge of how to use them we will pour these moulds in wax so they can be photographed for the newsletter. We will also keep the casting for display at the next convention.

Twenty-five percent of the moulds have been inventoried. Good luck finding these items! ♦

ORCHID ETCH AND THE WAR TIME SALESMAN



One of many requests recently received at the museum pertained to the War Time Salesman campaign. More specifically, exactly what information appeared on one of A. H. Heisey and Company sales flyers. The following text comes from a May 1943 advertisement in the Crockery and Glass Journal.

"Here's how Heisey's War Time Salesmen save you time and trouble"

Realizing that war time conditions call for unusual solutions, Heisey developed four "War Time Salesmen".

Briefly, they are brochures, one each on the Crystolite and Lariat Patterns, Orchid Etching and Gift Items. There is a photograph of every item, each one is numbered, priced, and there is a column for checking the quantity needed.

All you need to do is check your stock of each of these patterns, enter quantities needed in proper space, fill in your name and address, seal, stamp and mail to Newark. These are even self-addressed.

Then when the crystal arrives in your store, the "War Time Salesmen" enable you to identify and price each item correctly, even with "green" help. See how easy it is to keep up your stock?

Take a tip from the thousands of stores already using them—all enthusiastically, too. If you're not already using them, write TODAY for a complete set.

A.H. Heisey and Co., Newark, Ohio.

Due to shortages of manpower and materials, Heisey turned the tables on its customers and offered them an alternative to make ordering their products easier. This too was an additional help to the Heisey sales force who sometimes had great trouble keeping up with their popular demand. Of course, no one felt this demand more than the workers back at the factory!

The following information comes from the Orchid etch wartime salesman. May it be of help to all of our Orchid collectors. ♦

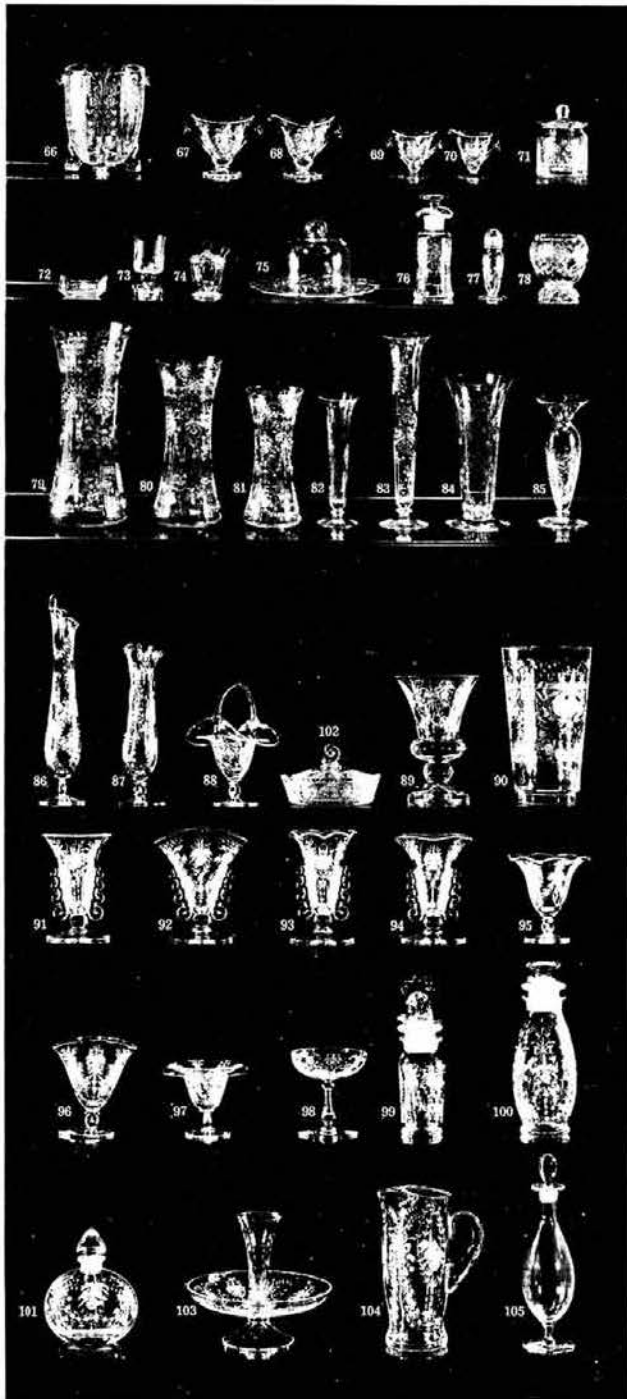

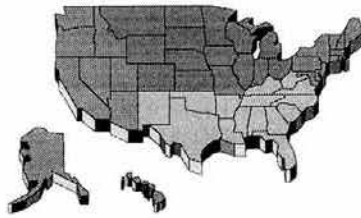

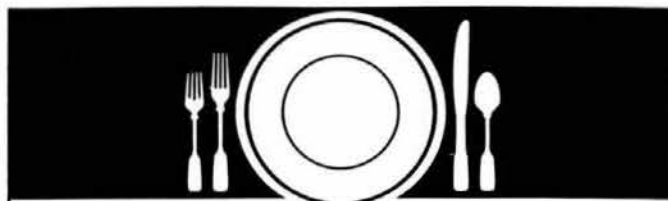
