Participation makes HCA membership more worthwhile.

As presiding officer for the last three years, I hope I have provided an opportunity for all sides of issues to be represented even if it meant placing an extreme idea on the table for discussion and focus.

While seeking suggestions from the staff for information to pass along, the staff unanimously said I should say what a pleasure it has been to work with them for three years. Maybe next month! ♦

## UPDATE FROM THE SPECIAL PROJECTS COMMITTEE

As President Tom Bischoff mentioned, we are pleased to announce that Mosser Glass, Inc. will be making our A.H. Heisey and Company reproductions. Several items are currently being made in Vaseline, with more items and colors to follow.

Due to the switch in glassmakers, we have some important changes to tell you about:

All refunds for the Lavender Ice Doe Head have been sent.

The Tiger paperweight will be produced in Hunter Green, as the pink color we intended to use will not be available until very late this year. Production of this item will begin as soon as possible and we hope it will be ready for shipping in June.

The 1998 Convention souvenir will be the Minuet Girl in Vaseline, *not* the Rabbit Paperweight in Forest Green. The souvenir will be ready for shipping and pickup orders by the June Convention. ♦

### 1998 MINUET GIRL CONVENTION SOUVENIR



Due to the change in glassmakers, HCA is unable to offer Bonnie Bunny in Evergreen. However, we are pleased to announce our new convention souvenir, the Minuet Girl in Vaseline, complete with a special etching on the base. This item is often referred to by many as the "Dinky-Do" because of its resemblance to a Royal Dalton figurine of the same name. Due to the design similarities, Heisey opted not to market the Minuet Girl. It has been reported that only a small quantity of this item was produced.

The 1998 souvenir is currently being made and will be ready for the June convention. The cost is \$25.00 each plus \$6.00 for shipping; Ohio residents must pay sales tax (\$1.50). The souvenir sale is for members only through June 17 at which date the exclusive sale of the Minuet Girl becomes available to the public and the cost is raised to \$30.00. ♦

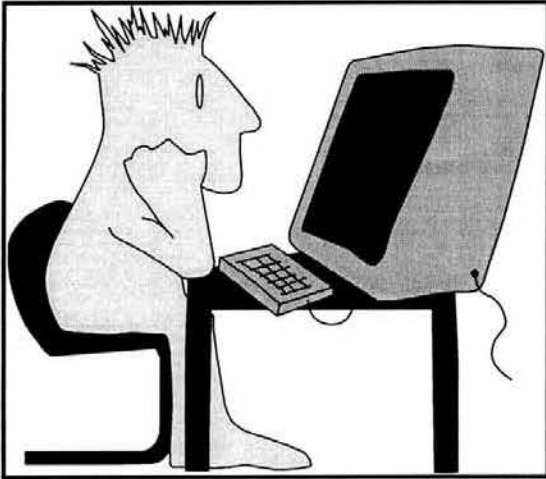

# GETTING CONNECTED WITH HEISEY ONLINE

A reader took me to task because I didn't give more specific information in my article on Heisey on the Internet. "Specific" in this instance means, "what do we need and how much is it going to cost?"



**TA DAAA! It's free!** Really, you don't need anything if you're connected to a business with computers already on line, or your town library has an internet connection, or if you have an in at an institution or university (one that squanders money for computers and internet access for everybody but me). Most institutions will allow you to use their facilities. The drawbacks to "free" here are restrictions and limited access. If, like me, you play at home and do your best browsing in the middle of the night, you're out of luck. Your local library keeps its own hours and won't let you sit around in your pajamas even if they were open (and don't even think about it if you sleep in the buff).

The ideal situation is having a computer at home where you are lord of the realm (that is if your spouse allows it—you being lord of the realm, that is).

There are fine name brand computers available now for under \$1,000. Some even come complete with monitors but most ads say, "does not include monitor." If that's the case, you'll have to count on spending a couple of hundred dollars more. The best advice I can give is to tell you to buy the most you can afford. For speed, you'll want at least 233 megahertz (don't worry, I don't know what it is either). You'll want, too, a hard drive of multiple gigabytes (the amount of information it will hold), especially if everything you take from the Internet or put into a computer is precious to you and you have a compelling need to save it forever. You can get by with a thirteen-inch monitor (the thing that looks like a TV screen) but 15 is better and 17 is even better than that. Unfortunately, the 19" monitors, though great, are pricey.

You'll want a CD ROM drive even though they'll soon be obsolete but don't let that throw you—everything in any new computer is obsolete the minute you buy it. And you'll need a minimum of 33 megabytes of RAM because the more RAM you have the faster your computer processes stuff (I used a computer back in the stone age that couldn't get my words up on the screen as fast as I could type them. I'd type something, lean back, then watch as my pearls of wisdom unfolded before me).

As for a modem, the doo-hickey that sends out and brings in the Internet through telephone lines for your computer, you'll need at least a 28.8 modem. Here, too, faster is available and some of the under \$1,000 machines are offering 56.6 modems (those numbers indicate how fast they move bits and bytes in and out and that kind of stuff).

I've touched on the basics here—there are many more bells and whistles that will be offered but keep in mind that you're only looking to get onto the Internet to hunt Heisey—you will not be producing *Toy Story* on your computer. And don't forget, there are great deals available on second hand computers—you'd find a lot on the Internet if you were on it. I can't stress enough that the items I've touched on here are minimums. When buying, buy all you can afford. Bigger and faster is usually better.

The cost of the computer is only part of it. Now you must consider an ISP. Doesn't that sound technical? It means *Internet Service Provider* and the software needed to join an ISP will be thrown at you free of charge once you own a computer. Many computers come with the necessary software already installed. No matter, you do have choices. You can choose between America Online or Microsoft Explorer, two of the biggest. These run about \$20 a month. But there are local providers that get you in and out for less than that—you just won't get the pretty interfaces. Look for their ads in your newspaper.

Another thing to consider is the telephone access needed to get onto the Internet. You can plug into the phone line you already have or you can have a separate line installed just for the computer. The drawback to using the line already available is that calls will get a busy signal whenever you're on the Internet. Some phone companies will allow you to install a "student line" at half the monthly rate of a standard line—with this you give up a telephone book listing for that line, something you don't need anyway.

Lastly, talk to friends who are already hooked—they can tell you what works best for them and regale you with the mistakes they've made so you can avoid them. The biggest mistakes you can make, however, is to procrastinate. It's less complicated than it sounds and more fun than you can imagine. ♦

## ***ATTENTION MEMBERS***

Don't forget, your membership renewal date is always printed on your mailing label of the *Heisey News*!

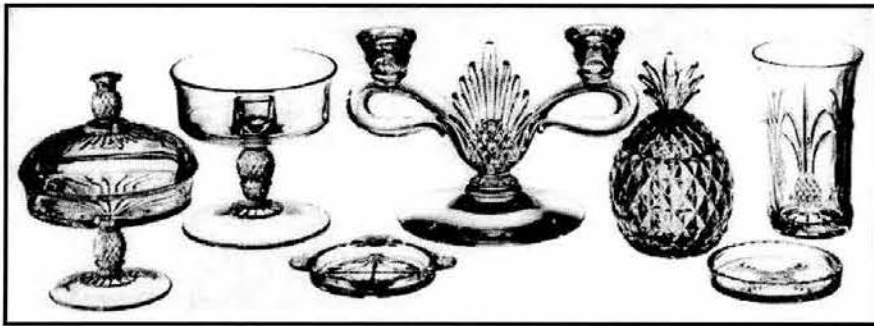

## FROM THE ARCHIVES—QUALITY CONTROL

My curiosity in a stack of papers found in a folder marked "Questionnaires Requiring Special Attention." was understandable. As a sociologist, albeit retired, questionnaires continue to be part of my trade and, consequently, attract special attention in and about themselves. Second, even a cursory glance revealed that the topic had to do with

customer (retail dealer) satisfaction. The year the study was done, 1949, was only eight years before the plants closing and might throw further light on the reasons for the company's demise. It isn't that I don't trust Tom Felt's explanation<sup>1</sup> that presents excellent reasons for the demise of U.S. fine table glass production in general. It just seems



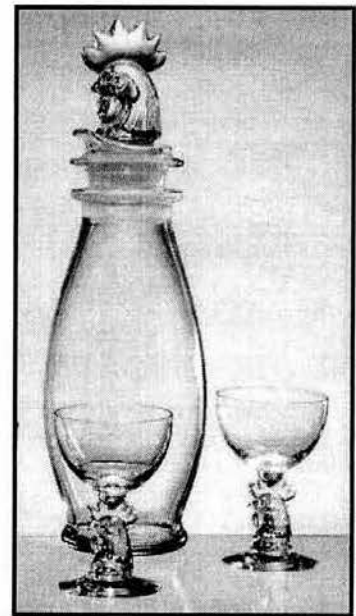
that there is more to the passing of the A.H. Heisey Company than that. Some years ago, in cataloging the correspondence of Joe Lower, I reported the dissatisfaction that sales rep felt with not only production but also the packing and shipping departments. He complained about the delay in filling orders, the poor quality control, even the failure of some department to affix labels on the glassware. Perhaps these questionnaire results would provide additional understanding.

One hundred forty-four single page questionnaires are in the folder. I do not know the number that the company sent. That so many customers would respond is rather startling in itself. Hal Dunham, the sales manager, carefully replied to each of them. Clearly, the task was taken seriously.

From here on I will assume the position of Hal Dunham. No, I don't mean to take off to Sanibel, certainly not with summer just around the corner. Rather, what would I, in Hal's shoes, notice about the responses?

The most bothersome were the many remarks about the slowness of delivery and the quality of production. Some comments were: "It is best to allow from four to six months for delivery on most blown items in stemware."

How can Heisey headquarters serve you more effectively? "By not taking 2 years to send 8 salad plates." or, "Invoices arrive weeks ahead of merchandise." A surprisingly large number complained of the quality of the merchandise, Plantation, in particular,

seems to have had problems with flaws of one sort or another. There was a policy of replacement but return shipping costs were costly and resented.

One glaring advertising flaw regards the matter of advertising in *Crockery & Glass Journal*. Very few of the respondents ever saw the trade magazine. The advertising in popular magazines was generally highly regarded.

As sales manager I would be bothered by the responses to the question about sales representatives. A startling number of the stores had very seldom been visited, and some, never, by representatives. The desire for visitation and advice from sales representatives is surprisingly emphatic and frequently stated.

There seems to have been poor interaction between the factory and customers, e.g., mats for newspaper ads had arrived but the order for that particular pattern had not yet arrived. Many had received no *Table Talks*, *Choosing Your Crystal Pattern*, and other publications. One dealer wrote that he had not received any radio scripts although he advertised on radio with his own transcripts.

There were several requests for less emphasis on new patterns and greater on the continuation of the old. "If you bought an auto and could not get necessary parts to keep it running, how would you feel toward the factory?"

Many dealers wanted an illustrated catalogue. Fostoria is frequently mentioned as a stronger competitor and for that reason—for example "The picture catalogue Fostoria supplies dealers with is a great help..."



While all but one of responses was friendly, many were unhappy. A lengthy response, presented in "the spirit of cooperation" may serve as something of a summary. On the back of one questionnaire is the following from a customer of "almost two decades:"

"The best ways Heisey can help us sell crystal are:

- 1) Make the crystal we want and have been asking for for half a decade now.
- 2) Deliver crystal equal in every way to the show room sample. (Our basement is loaded with Pineapple stemware which is in no way the color or size of the showroom sample. It is not even fit to be displayed and will probably have to be cracked up, publicly, in the gutter at a loss to us.
- 3) Honestly listen to what customers and your own salesmen have to report. We've been trying to get some answers back to you for a long time.
- 4) Begin once more to emphasize quality and to heed what the customers will pay, rather than the profit you intend to get.
- 5) Forget the past and its lush profits for you. Begin to really be of service to the public.
- 6) Salable goods are better than any form of advertising you can devise." ♦

## ***IN TRIBUTE***

### ***CARL SPARACIO***

Within a short time the Heisey Collectors of America lost two of its founding members—members without whom HCA could not have become what it is today. They are Russ Ream and Ann Holman—two who helped build the foundation that this organization rests upon, an organization arguably the envy of every other glass collecting group in the country.

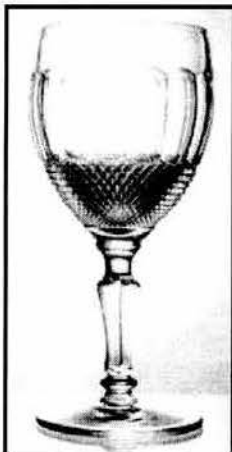
I'm honored to have known them both and regret that distance limited the closer relationship we might have had. It's been years since I've seen Russ but it seems only yesterday that I talked to Ann. I turned to Loren Yeakley, also a founding member, to lend insight to their contributions to HCA.



#### ***Russ Ream***

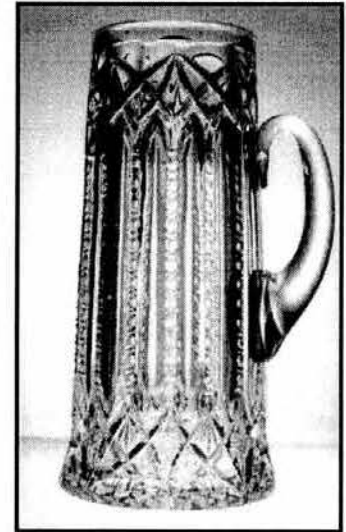
Of Russ Ream, Loren says, "As you know, Louise (Russ' wife and President of HCA for many years) was a true Heisey scholar but Russ was very supportive and also very knowledgeable in his own right.

"Russ and Louise were both raised in the Columbus, Ohio area but when Louise became so active in HCA they pulled up stakes and moved to Newark. Russ was a valuable asset on the Board of Directors of HCA and, as Louise devoted more and more time to HCA he was always very supportive and understanding besides being of immeasurable help to her.



"He was an avid golf enthusiast and played regularly until his health began to fail. After poor health restricted him to his home, we spent many an enjoyable evening there playing penny-ante poker. Eventually he had to spend his last years in a nursing home but his mind was clear to the end."

My own memories of Russ Ream are not as personal as Loren's, they're restricted to Heisey meetings and HCA occasions. I've seen first hand the effort he contributed to building this organization but I remember best his friendliness and quick wit. He was sorely missed when illness first restricted him and now, with his passing, those who knew him grieve again.



## **Ann Holman**

Because of the longer time span, I got to know Ann Holman very well and Ann Holman, as much as anyone, was responsible for putting our HCA organization together. Loren bears this out. When we spoke he said, "I first met Ann when she came to our home with Evelyn Allen in the late sixties. They told us they were interested in forming a study club (Ann had contacted Evelyn and suggested the club so I guess you could say she was largely responsible for starting the Newark Study Club)."



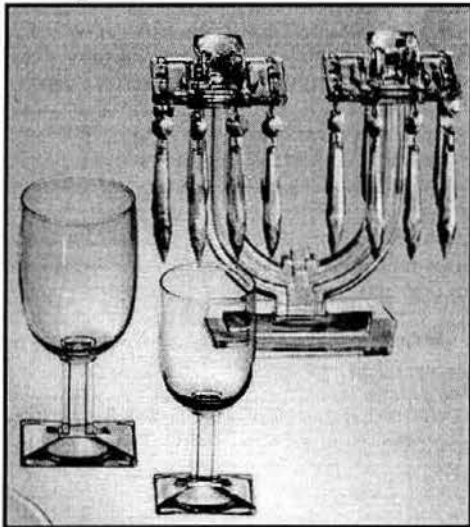
"From this nucleus the Newark Study Club came together and later, as a group, founded the Heisey Collectors of America, Inc. Ann worked in an office and when her

husband Maurice, whom everyone calls "Mouse," retired on disability, they moved to a farm. Ann was secretary of the Newark club for many years and when we formed the national club she served a very long time in the same capacity. She was such a dedicated worker—she handled all the correspondence and membership records manually for many years, she sent out meeting notifications and always had copies of the minutes of the previous meeting ready. She did all this while working full time and helping Mouse run the farm. Later she ran a small antiques shop in Hebron. She never lost her enthusiasm or support for HCA. She was there taking orders for animals when HCA was raising money to buy the molds."



Ann did not have a long lingering illness so her passing fell heavily upon friends and family. All of us, whether we knew her personally or not, mourn her passing as we all were touched by her through her work in HCA.

The Heisey Collectors of America, Inc. and all its members extend our sincere condolences to the Ream and Holman families. ♦

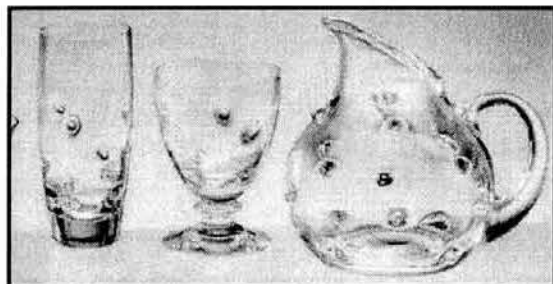

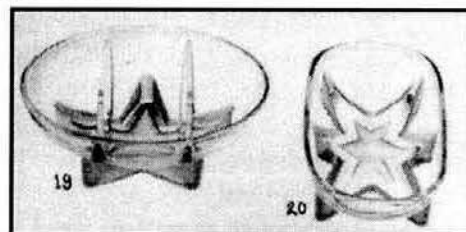


come up with something intelligent to say about each one. More than once a panelist has announced to the audience that a piece looks good but it was not Heisey, only to have someone call out “But it is marked.”

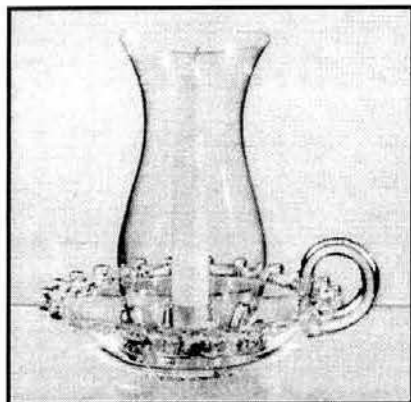

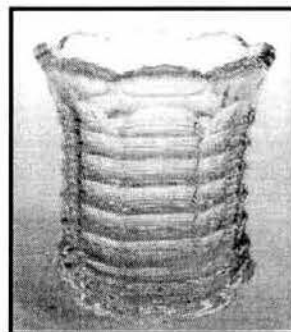

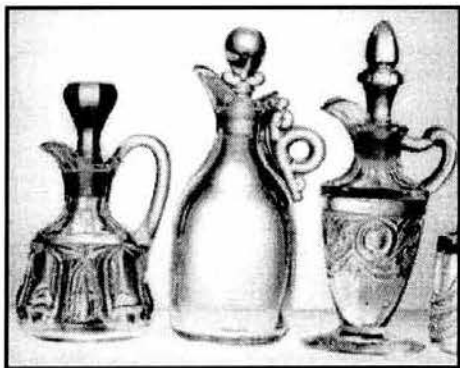
The dealers at this well managed show, mostly club members, put out a selection of "elegant" glass that dazzled eager buyers.
