I forgot to mention last month that Dick Smith's mother passed away after a long illness. Our sincere condolences to Dick and his family.

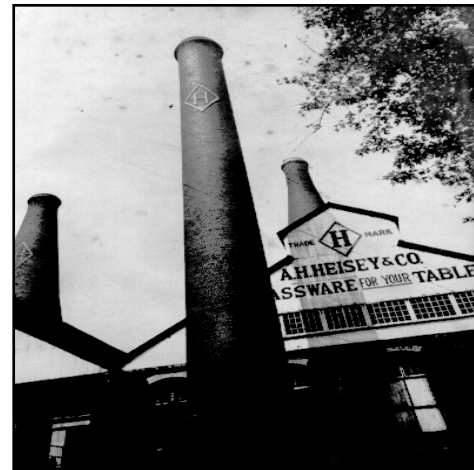
Also, I must apologize to the Capital Heisey Collectors as my wife and I were unable to attend their wonderful event this year. Hopefully, we will be able to go next year.

Next up for us of course is Convention. If you haven't yet registered, you'll want to do so by May 23rd for a chance at this year's early registration raffle prize—a ruby tiger by Dalzell-Viking. For those of you who missed the former Heisey factory tours last year (or for those of you who just want to come back for another look!), we hope you'll join us. Note that *only* the weekday tours will include a tour of the neighboring Holophane factory (former producers of Verlys of America glassware) as it is still in operation and they only offer tours when the plant is open. Some of the tours are already half full, so register soon if you want to take a tour this year. And when registering for a tour and paying by check, please leave the amount of the check blank or consider donating the amount of the tour in the event that your tour choices are unavailable. This will save us the time and expense of issuing refund checks. Also, please note that flat, closed toe shoes are required for the tours this year.

Another new for this year's Convention is the glass blowing class being offered Wednesday morning. Since many of our Convention paperweight class participants are repeat customers, we thought we'd try a blowing glass this year in addition to the paperweight classes to see how things go. The class fee is higher, but the class size is smaller to allow participants more individual instruction time. And for those of you trying it, you'll probably find that you need that extra time! Glass blowing is fun, but it's harder work than you might think. You'll really appreciate the skill of Heisey's glass blowers after this class!

I hope to get the chance to see many of you at Convention this year (I've already arranged for a visit from my mother-in-law that week, so I have a babysitter!). Have a great month. ♦

AN EBAY TREASURE "EXPOSED"

In addition to our fascination for collecting Heisey glassware, my wife and I have several other glassware collections, one of which is Tiffin—more specifically, Pamela stemware. The stemware has an intricate floral cutting, is extremely fragile with three sixteenths diameter stem, and is absolutely gorgeous. Should any reader want to look, it is illustrated on page 145 of the Page and Frederiksen book titled: *Tiffin is Forever*. Ours wasn't quite "forever" for after many years of careful use, we finally shattered a stem on one of the goblets.

After a short period of appropriate mourning, I decided to search for a replacement on eBay. In my "search" box I typed in "tiffin pamela." I struck "enter" and there before my eyes appeared four possibilities for tiffin pamela. To my dismay and amusement, none of those options had anything to do with cut glass but were, instead, pictures of a scantily clad movie star whose photos were up for bid. Her name is Pamela Tiffin.

After viewing the shapely and revealing Pamela in her four options for an interminable period, I thought through a strategy for further search for glassware, that even today, amazes me with how insightful I was. If female pulchritude was going to clutter my search for Tiffin goblets, then, indeed I should be searching among the women for collectible stemware. Without giving the decision another thought, I typed "photo nude woman" into the search box. I struck "enter" and lo and behold, there appeared on my screen a list of about 34 possibilities of "nude woman." As I sat there viewing one partial nude after another, I came across one which was mounted in a glass frame. The photo was badly faded and it was difficult for me to make out those personal and intimate details, but the glass picture frame really caught my attention. There, around the

perimeter of the rectangular glass frame was the unmistakable pattern of the Heisey "petticoat." Apparently, sometime around 1900, someone had mounted their favorite nude in the underside of a Heisey paperweight. The photograph was blurred, perhaps out of focus, but to our discerning eyes (Clara and I) it appeared that the nude woman was indeed in her B-day suit. The photo could have been of more

recent vintage, of course, but the leather covering the back

of the photograph appeared to be badly worn. This paperweight is shown on page 105 of Vogel's book, *Heisey's First Ten Years*, illustration # 6.

I first bid on the item when the current offer was at approximately \$10.50. Did any of those other bidders realize the significance of the nude's glass frame? I didn't think so! However, I knew at this point that I had to have that piece of value-added Heisey! But I lost any semblance of intelligence, so adequately described in the third paragraph, that I may have had. I decided to bid. As the auction was finally resolved, I could have saved a few dollars had I been more patient.

In any event, I became the sixth bidder at \$23.00, thus gaining high bid. However, I didn't have high bid for very long as "skywalker 10" came in around \$24.00 shortly thereafter.

At this point I decided not to play games with "skywalker 10" or anyone else who might be waiting for the near conclusion of the auction and who might, in those last few minutes/seconds, submit an outlandish bid that others would chase in vain. I wanted that paperweight! What a great story to share with my colleague collectors at a future Northwest Heisey Club Meeting! I would be the one to submit the outlandish bid!

After considerable deliberation I decided to bid \$127.00. Surely no one could

chase such an insane bid successfully in the last few seconds of the auction. The only problem with this scenario is that I am frequently and inexplicably disconnected, without any warning, from my server. This does not create a stable and confident position for last second bidding. Fortunately for me, Corey Priddy, another Heisey member, volunteered to bid for me on her computer. With 40 seconds remaining in auction time, Corey submitted my bid of \$127.00. Thanks Corey! My fear of other knowledgeable Heisey bidders was unfounded, for I got the paperweight for \$27.50 plus shipping and handling. I should have known that there wouldn't be any other Heisey collectors searching for their favorite glassware among nude photos of women. Shame on me!

In conclusion and also as an introduction to this story, it should be mentioned that until a Northwest Heisey Collectors meeting of last year, I hadn't really thought much about Heisey paperweights. Oh, there are tigers, rabbits, scotties, plug horses, and rearing ponies, but those paperweights are of relatively recent manufacture, that is, from 1933-57.

What had people used to hold papers in place around 1900? Did they use rocks? Perhaps some did, but apparently great numbers of glass paperweights were made at that time for that function. Thousands more were made as souvenir pieces. That Heisey had participated in the production of paperweights in the early 1900s was news to me and that bit of education came about through our study club. At that particular meeting Glenna and Don Wehmeyer displayed and described several Heisey paperweights that they had purchased during one of their vacation/shopping trips. Thanks Glenna and Don! I immediately set aside a small portion of my limited memory for paperweights and just six months later found two at an estate sale for \$5.00 each. Unsigned, they were a great discovery!

My regards also to Pamela Tiffin for her inspiration and my subsequent risqué adventure among women of limited raiment. ♦

2001 HEISEY DISPLAY – "A HEISEY GARDEN" MARILYN SMITH

Dear Study Clubs & Individual Members:

This year, the theme for the Heisey Display during Convention, June 13-16, 2001, is "A Heisey Garden."

This theme could be worked into a display of floral bowls, baskets, nut cups/dishes, bar sets, stems and/or a pattern or etch with a floral or garden name.

Some examples are: Bamboo, Crocus, Daisy & Leaves, Fairacre, Fandango, Oakleaf, Paneled Cane, Pineapple & Fan, Plantation, Rose, Sunflower, Waverly, Prince of Wales Plumes, Greek Key, Raindrop, Eagle/beehive plates, Victorian, Sunflowers, Daffodil and many cuttings and etchings such as rose, orchid, chintz, narcissus, maytime, and ivy.

The rectangular tables are three feet by eight feet. The round tables are four feet in diameter. For a round table, you do not need four place settings, two with serving pieces is adequate.

The HCA club will provide table covers, risers and for the round tables, napkins, silverware and floral arrangement (we need to know the floral bowl you will be using, if any, to get the right size of arrangement).

The Display glass is set up on Tuesday and/or Wednesday and security will be available from set-up to tear-down. Tear-down will be Saturday after the Show closes, as the Display will be in Adena Hall. If you need help carrying or setting up or packing the glass, please let me know.

All glass must be Heisey—no reproductions or fakes.

DAVE SPAHR

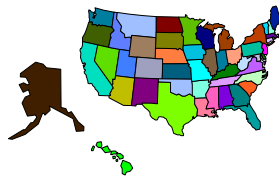

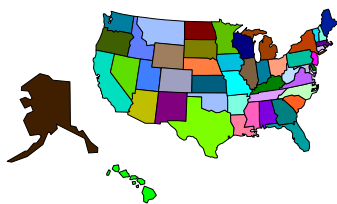

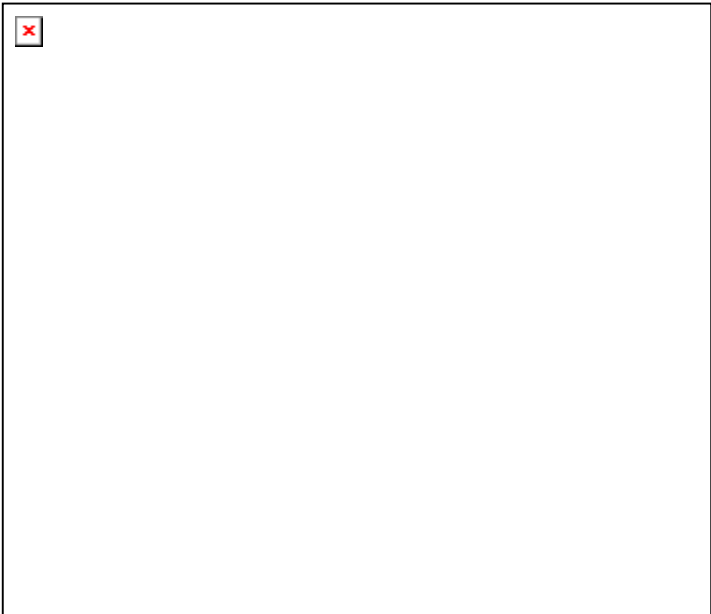
