MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT CHARLIE WADE

Greetings!

Some time back, in a previous column, I stated that the Longaberger bunny project was dead, and now the bunnies are showing up at the Homestead for sale. To clarify the issue, first let me say that this statement was correct. At the time of my statement, HCA was in negotiations with the direct sales group of the Longaberger Company to provide them with items for sale through their associates. The bunny would have been one of the first items produced and sold in this manner. This project was discussed with the membership in June of 2000 at the annual breakfast, and approved by the voting members in attendance at that time. Since that time, Longaberger's Direct Sales group has decided not to pursue this venture. (However, that's not to say they won't come back at some time in the future and want to purchase an item or two.)

Instead, Longaberger's other sales group, the Homestead, is selling the bunny. For those of you who have never been to the Homestead, it's a shopping "mecca!" They sell Christmas ornaments, glass items, clothing, food, furniture, etc.

After hearing that the direct sales group was not going to offer the bunny, the Homestead sales group called HCA to get pricing for it. Fortunately or unfortunately, however you look at it, the numbers associated with the direct sales group would have been much greater than the ones we are presently looking at with the Homestead (some 30x greater). However, this is a very valuable source of income to the Museum as other revenue sources dry up. I hope this has clarified the situation.

This will be the first year that we don't have a volunteer to chair the Convention. No one seems interested in heading up this committee. Next year's Show could also be without a chairperson if no one is found between now and then. One has to ask will these events continue in their current format, as we now know them? Volunteers are at an all time low across this great country of ours, as many groups continue to look for new folks to help out so as not to burden any one person. Please, if you know someone in your club who would like to get more involved, contact the Museum.



The Lavender Ice Pheasants have arrived at the Museum. If you have not ordered yours, you better hurry up, as Mosser told us not to bring this mold back. The pheasant is very hard to produce, as Viking found out. Besides a few feasibility studies, including one with Viking, this is the first time the mold has been used since Imperial made the pheasant.

You should be getting your Auction listing shortly. Be sure to look it over and support your Museum by bidding generously. Remember, if you can't attend the Auction in person, absentee bids may be placed via mail, fax, Internet or phone. See your catalog for details.

FROM THE ARCHIVES: A Glassware 'Toon

Recently I found an original drawing of a cartoon by a famous cartoonist in the archives (shown below). The name of the cartoon is *The Girls*, and the cartoonist is Franklin Folger, a native of Cincinnati. The cartoon is inscribed to Harold Dunham, Heisey's manager of advertising and sales in later years. The date on it is 1955. I think you'll find it an amusing look at etched, cut, and otherwise decorated glassware.

About the Artist

Franklin Folger was born in 1919. His popular panel cartoon *The Girls* appeared in daily newspapers in the 1950s and 1960s, and featured suburban housewives. *The Girls* was originally created for the *Christian Science Monitor* of Boston in 1948. From there, Folger moved to the *Cincinnati Enquirer* in 1952, and then on to syndication in 1953. The popular cartoon was Folger's interpretation of the clubwoman types featured in the *New Yorker*. His cartoons have appeared in Australia, South America, England, the Philippines, and Canada, and have been collected into a series of books.

The cartoon originally depicted "chubby, genial matrons of the late middle years who, with home responsibilities lessened, enter into a zestful carefree life of dining out (and cheating on their diets), of club meetings, shopping, traveling, etc. But as publication of the cartoon became more widespread, Mr. Folger received an

increasing number of requests from young mothers and career girls to include their type also in the cheerful panel. It isn't only the stout older women, they wrote, who carry on like 'The Girls.'" (*Editor & Publisher*, December 22, 1962). Folger's cartoon never gave cause for offense. Instead he gave delicate treatment to amusing absurdities that caused all levels of society to laugh.

2002 BENEFIT AUCTION UPDATE BOB RYAN

The HCA Benefit Auction will be held at the Apple Tree Auction Center, April 5th and 6th. There is a lot of great Heisey glass for everyone. Thank you, to all who responded to the HCA's request, and sent a great array of Heisey glass.

The old patterns have been heard from in an unprecedented response. There are several table sets to be sold in the Auction including one in Fandango, Ring Band in Custard, and are you ready for this, one in #1776 Kalonyal. Yes, I saw it with my own eyes. There are cruets galore (I think there may even be two sizes of the Fandango cruets), and just about anything else you can think of including pieces from most of the older patterns, as well as toothpicks, toothpicks and more toothpicks. Additional patterns include a #365 Prison Stripe, #365 Old Queen Anne and #1776 Kalonyal. There is a never seen before stem, the Sanders-Ahern goblet. No, I am not going to describe it to you, come and see for yourself. Although it's signed, its blown bowl and pressed stem is like no other.

In addition, there is a pair of Georgian candlesticks in Moongleam; a fantastic Trident floral bowl, with what I believe to be the fare thee well cutting; pair of #135 Moongleam candlesticks; a beautiful flare Cathedral vase in Cobalt; more cordials; animals; bar and stemware; as well as cuttings, etchings and colors galore. I wasn't going to tell you about the #4054 Coronation cocktail shaker in Zircon, but I guess I had better. The shaker is small and has a Zircon base, crystal topper and strainer. You must come to the Auction if you can, as it is tremendous and the glass is awesome. ♦

Attention Study Clubs and Individual Members:

Would you be willing to display your glass in the all Heisey Display during the Heisey Convention? All glass must be Heisey - no reproductions or fakes. This year's theme will be "Anniversaries and Birthdays" to coincide with Newark, Ohio's Bicentennial. This is your opportunity to display your collection and/or dinner/luncheon sets. The response to last year's move to Adena Hall was very positive.

The rectangular tables are three by eight feet and the round tables are four feet in diameter. HCA will furnish table covers (white top with blue skirting) and risers for the rectangular tables and white tablecloths, napkins and silverware for the round tables. Two place settings with serving pieces will be adequate for the round tables.

The display glass is set up on Tuesday and/or Wednesday, and security will be available from setup to teardown. Teardown will be after the Show closes on Saturday. If you need help carrying, setting up or packing your glass, please let me know.

MEMORIES FROM HCA'S EARLY YEARS, PART III

(This article is the third in a series of articles written to honor Louise and Russell Ream, and to increase awareness of and contribution to the Louise and Russell Ream Endowment Fund.)

Do you remember the first outdoor flea market held on the Museum grounds after the King House had been moved there? I sure do.

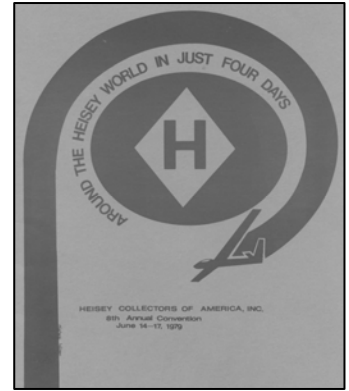
We were up at dawn (that's when I was younger) and on the Museum grounds as dawn was sneaking into Newark. The dew was so heavy you had to remove it to examine the glass. At the first table we stopped, our animal collector spotted a dew covered Flamingo frog-handled cheese plate and three Heisey swans. After purchasing the plate and choosing between the three swans, we proceeded to walk along the other tables oohing and aahing as we went. The next person we came across must have slept in, as it must have been six o'clock and on his card table was a #350 Pinwheel and Fan berry set in Vaseline. I hesitated and thought about the set, but lost it to a buyer who recognized it as the buy of the year, perhaps the decade. (Nobody said I was very bright.) There were so many great buys that morning that I know we came away broke, which was not unusual in those days. I would really have to hit the road on Monday and sell some bicycles, which I usually did. The soirees on Saturday were real incentives to sell the following week.

Over the years there have been other days like that day in September. I remember when we went to our first auction at the YWCA (pictured here and above, are programs from the 1978 and 1979 Conventions, which the YWCA hosted) and were in awe of what was going on. Although we were seated halfway back, we did manage to raise our hands enough to buy a couple of boxes of Heisey. At the Auction, another great item got away. Although our animal collector bid on a mother rabbit, the lady seated next to her



prevailed, paying \$200.00 for it.

We continued to enjoy our evening at the "Y" and filled two boxes with glass. However, when I went to pay for the glass, I discovered we'd forgotten the checkbook. Sam Schnaidt and Frank



Frye told me to take the glass home and mail them a check. Instead, I told them to hold the glass and I would be back on Wednesday, with a check, to pick it up. That's what I did, and it was the beginning of a great friendship. This was my first lesson on how trustworthy most people are in the Heisey-collecting family.

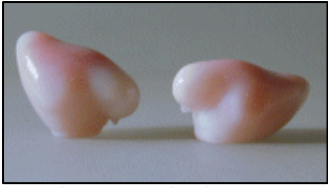
For many years, dealers also put their wares on display around the Courthouse Square early on Saturday mornings. These displays usually wrapped all around the square, on both sides of the walkways. You would not believe some of the items that these tables held. After several years, we even started to set up on the square. Being on the square gave us a chance to support our collecting habit and we always bought glass that did not fit our categories. After all, you can't walk away from Heisey that's under the money so to speak, now can you? (Raise your hand if you think you would leave it for the next person!)

The highlight of my square walking was when a very well known Heisey author would come walking around the square with his brown paper sacks filled with goodies. He would try to avoid me if his sacks contained a piece of Heisey he was uncertain about. He could not resist the stories about Heisey workers, and he made the mistake one prior time to show me what he had purchased, a real rarity, which turned out not to be Heisey. Although he became cautious about sharing his finds, he was a good scout and we laughed about it often. I couldn't believe the finds he made in good old 'Nerk, since everyone was on the lookout for Heisey.

The square was a wonderful thing. One time we purchased an antique walnut high chair on the square, which has been used by all of our grandchildren. While we bought lots of Heisey on the square over the years, I don't remember any of it. But I do remember the chair! (Mary, do you remember the chair?)

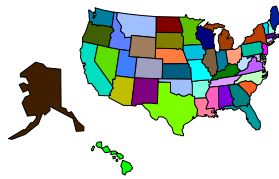

Two years ago Dunbar won second place in the Journalism category for a series of published articles in several magazines on the subject of jewelry and gemstones. ♦

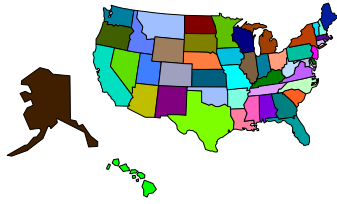


