

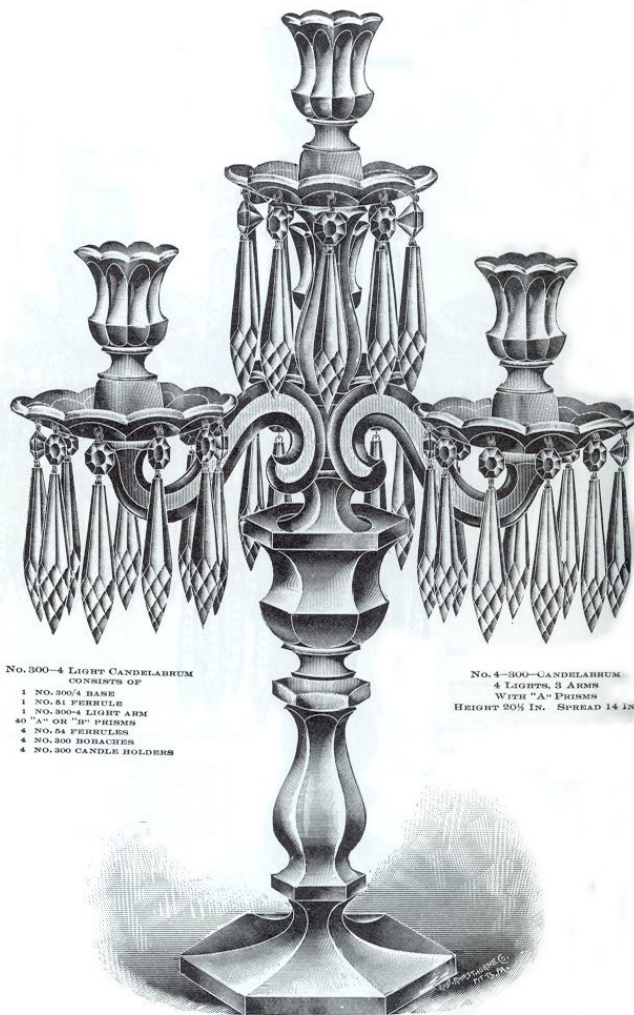

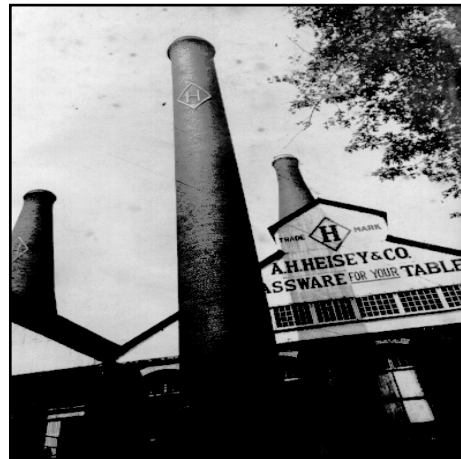
MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT CHARLIE WADE

Have you ever wondered if Heisey was sold overseas? I have unearthed some documents

regarding payment for overseas shipments of glassware from 1922 to 1929.

Countries to which glassware was sold include:

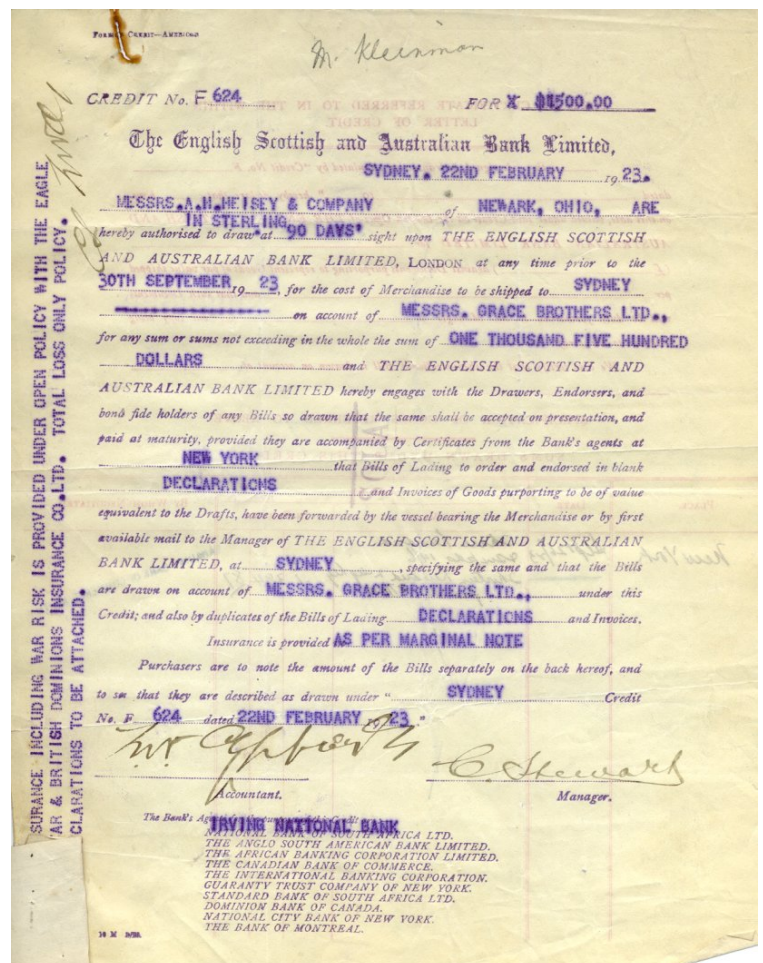
- Philippines
- Australia – One bill lists the items shipped, including pattern numbers 411, 393, 394, 429, 341, and 341 ½.
- Spain
- Sweden

Payments are relatively small, from 40 pounds sterling to 1500 U.S. dollars. There are quite a few bank credit statements regarding the accounts of Australian stores. There seemed to be a bit of demand for Heisey.

Aside from a photo of Blas Mitidieri, Heisey's Cuban sales representative, I haven't found much actual evidence of business outside the states. However, I know there must be other documents hiding somewhere.

At any rate, don't forget to check for Heisey on your next trip overseas!♥

He said he had another sighting but couldn't remember the details and promised to get the information to me when he got home. True to his word, a few days

later we got an e-mail from Scott the read as follows:

“Just wanted to let you know that I rented the 1933 version of *The Invisible Man* starring Claude Rains. About 23 minutes into the movie is a close up shot of an Old Williamsburg, 4 lite Candelabra. There is a pair of the candelabras on the mantle above the fireplace. There could be more Heisey in the movie, there is a scene in the bar where a pitcher is slid down the bar, that pitcher looks like it could be Heisey as well.”

Thanks Scott, your input is appreciated, though we worry about all the time you spend watching old movies – it can't be healthy.

Coincidentally, on a sad note, as this was being written I heard from the Heron boys, Scott and Jon. They advised me that their father Bill had passed on after an illness. Bill was a staunch HCA supporter and a good friend. He will be missed.♥

NEWARK BICENTENNIAL PLATTERS TO BE SIGNED BY “HEISEY BOYS”



The third generation “Heisey boys” will be at the Museum signing tags for the Newark Bicentennial platter on Saturday, June 22nd, from 11 a.m.-2 p.m.

If you aren't familiar with this particular piece, it was made from the same #1252 Twist mold in which the A. H Heisey & Co. produced commemorative platters for both the Newark and Ohio sesquicentennials in 1952 and 1953, respectively. The original platters were produced in Crystal.

The Bicentennial reproduction platters are being made by Mosser Glass inc. of Cambridge and differ from the originals in three ways: they are teal; the sesquicentennial

seal on the left side of the platter has been replaced with the Newark Bicentennial Commission's seal; and they were not flattened after being removed from the mold, as the Heisey platters were, so they are actually more of a bowl shape. Only 2002 of the platters will be made, and they will be numbered.

Four of company founder A.H.'s great-grandsons (George D., John F., Tom and Gus Heisey) will be signing special oval labels featuring an image of the Heisey factory.

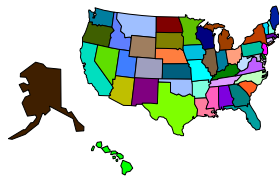
In order to include the Benefit Auction results in this issue, some Convention details such as the Swap & Blind Auction rules and the Convention event descriptions had to be removed.

If you happen to come across this item while unpacking your own auction goodies, please contact the Museum!

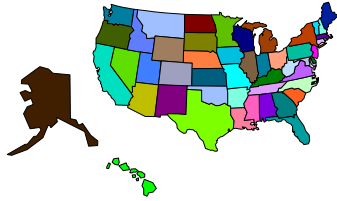

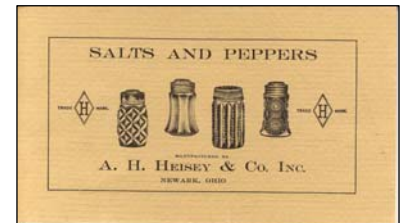
