STATE FARM DONATES COMPUTERS

The State Farm Insurance Newark Operations Center, has granted a request from the Heisey Museum for computer equipment. State Farm systematically upgrades their computer equipment and makes that equipment available to local non-profit groups. The Museum submitted a request to State Farm to replace six of the seven computers in the office. Ms. Kim Lust, a public affairs specialist with State Farm informed the Museum their request had been granted and the Museum picked up the computers on November 7th.

The computers are complete desktop units with processor, monitor, keyboard and mouse. The monitors are already in use, replacing smaller monitors with lower resolution now in use in the Business Office. New software will need to be purchased since all the units have been wiped clean. One Central Processing Unit may be modified to act as a new server. The Staff is working in concert with the Technology Committee to determine the best way to utilize the equipment and obtain software that will allow for greater efficiency and productivity. Thank you State Farm for being a good neighbor. ♦

LICKING/GUERNSEY TOURISM ALLIANCE UPDATE

The quarterly meeting of the Licking/ Guernsey Tourism Alliance was held at the National Heisey Glass Museum on Monday, November 11th. The group started to finalize plans for the proposed "Glass Pass." The pass will be sold by each county's visitors bureaus and promoted especially to bus and tour operators. Representatives from each county's visitors bureaus will be attending a major travel show in Chicago this coming February. The group feels this will be an excellent opportunity to draw attention to all of our facilities and increase attendance. Current venues participating in the "Glass Pass" are: The National Heisey Glass Museum, The Works, The National Museum of Cambridge Glass, Cambridge Glass Museum, Degenhart Glass Museum, and Mosser Glass.

Each venue will receive a portion of the sale of the "Glass Pass" whether the group visits the venue or

not. The Bureaus are also working on a major mail campaign to announce the pass to bus and tour operators. A suggested itinerary has been developed to show how the area could become an excellent two or three day tour destination.

As the program grows and gains recognition, other venues may be added. Each venue will have a distinctive way of canceling their portion of the pass. It is thought, the pass itself may become somewhat of a collector's item. Once the "Glass Pass" is finalized each group will carry info on the pass in their publication and on their web site. The group will meet again on March 13, 2003 in Cambridge. ♦

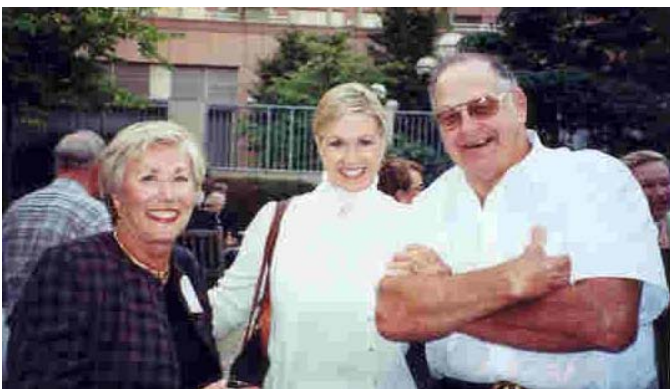

Owner (consignor) agrees to accept all responsibility for providing merchantable title for all glass sold. Each member may donate an unlimited number of lots to HCA. HCA, however, at its discretion, will consign items for auction, add items to the museum collection, and/or sell items in the museum shop.

Each member may consign a maximum of (20) twenty lots to the sale. There is no limit of number in each lot, but HCA retains the right to increase/decrease size/make up of each lot.

Consignors of glassware to this sale will be charged on the following sliding scale of commission: \$5.00-\$49.99 = 30%; \$50.00-\$199.99 = 25%; \$200.00-\$399.99 = 20%; \$400.00-\$749.99 = 15%; \$800 and over = 10%. Settlement for glass sold will be made in full within (10) business days of completed auction, together with a donation slip for commissions charged. All monies received from the sale are held and paid from the HCA Trust Account.

Glassware for the Benefit Auction will be accepted at any time with a cut-off date for the 2003 Auction being January 15, 2003. Glassware will be catalogued in the order it is received.

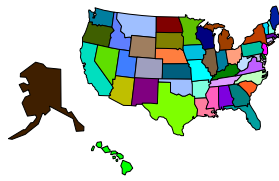

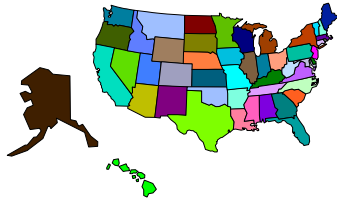

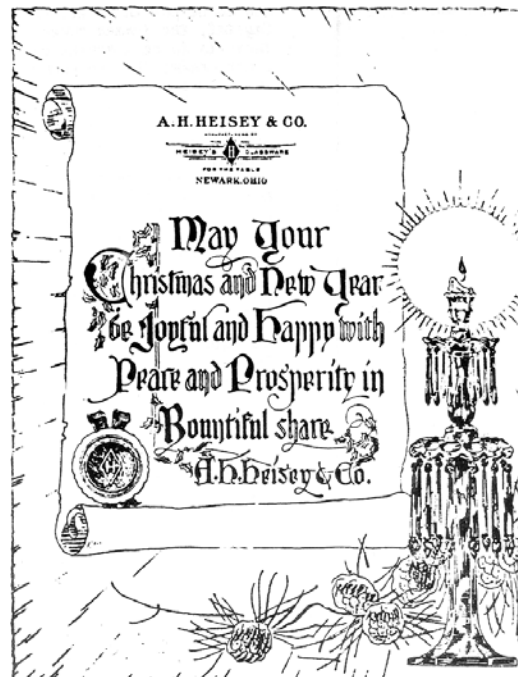
