To say that there is a lot going on at the Museum would be an understatement! With wrapping up the details from the auction, to visitors, to convention planning, to brochure production, to book production, to acquiring new tables for shipping, to ordering new display cases, there is not a lack of things to do!!

Visitors: Even with the high gas prices we had two very enthusiastic groups the past few weeks. We had 15 students and chaperones from the Welsh Hills Elementary School. They were studying recycling and

wanted to know more about recycling of glass, so we did some research and gave them a short class on how glass is made and recycled. We also made a scavenger hunt for them to find certain pieces in the different galleries.

Last week we had 30 members of the Ohio State University Retired Alumni visit the Museum and they enjoyed shopping in the gift shop!

Convention Planning: The planning for Convention continues. All the little details are coming together and with the help of many volunteers, it looks like it will be a fun and educational time. In addition to the billboards and ads in key trade magazines, we are sending out 260 press releases and an article on Convention. The article was a collaborative effort of Karen & Jim Clark, Phyllis Deal, and myself. It is a great overall view of the Convention and other attractions to draw people to Convention.

Museum Brochure: Thanks to Sharon Orienter, we now have a first class, four-color rack brochure for the Museum. The brochure is approximately four inches by nine inches and printed on both sides. NOW THIS TAKES THE CAKE!

Most people reading the Heisey News will fall into the category of *collector* and already collect Heisey glass! Many of you who have Heisey glass also enjoy entertaining in your home. Using your glass can bring great satisfaction. Not only is it a chance to show off premier pieces, but also, since food is something we all need/want, having it prepared using various recipes and presented in different settings is an absolute delight!

From an article written by Debra Muller Price, "Three hundred years after they first appeared on American tables, footed serving plates show no sign of stepping out of the spotlight. In 18th-century America, dining *à la française* was all the rage, and accomplished hostesses were expected to present their guests with a feast for the eye as well as the palate." The article continued "While dining in America has evolved into a much more casual affair, the practice of placing desserts on salvers – better known today as cake stands – has passed from generation to generation. From the ironstone and pressed-glass stands churned out by Victorian factories to the "Elegant Glass" serving pieces marketed by companies like Fostoria and Heisey during the Depression era, cake stands remain appreciated as much for their graceful form as for their utility."

Starting with a table covering, and perhaps a theme for a meal, is an excellent first step. Is this a sit-down meal or a buffet? Regardless, now that the table is covered, it is time to select the serving pieces and plan your presentation. Some of you are gardeners also, right? Think about your garden landscape for a minute.....not all plants are the same height are they? Okay, now consider your tablescape; your food, and may I add your decorations as well, will make a wonderful statement if they are presented on different levels. Enter the Heisey cake salver!

Ever notice how food on a footed server seems so much more enticing; raised above the other foods as if it had a status all its own? Don't guests at a wedding reception always marvel at the tiered wedding cake? The same can be true at your table.

Heisey Glass Company offered a variety of cake salvers beginning in the late 1890's with patterns such as Fandango and Fancy Loop and continued into the 1950's with Plantation and Cabochon. I have looked through many references searching for Heisey salvers. What I have recorded may not be all-inclusive but is what I was able to find. And, these salvers I have listed are either high or low footed. None sit flat on a table. So, as you look at the listing and some of the pictures, think about your

next table setting and how you will place your food and/or decorations on a Heisey footed salver. Now doesn't that do more than *just take the cake?* ♥

THERE IS MORE TO THE WEEK THAN CONVENTION

The old adage that all work and no playwell, there are a lot of things you may want to include on your trip to Newark before, during, or after convention week. Newark, Ohio is nestled out of the hustle and bustle, in the rolling countryside, just 45 minutes east of Columbus and is easily accessible from many parts of the country either by plane or car. Using Newark as your base of operation, there are multitudes of things to do only a few minutes away.

Just south east of the beautiful Licking County Court House, enjoy browsing through The Works. This artistic center of discovery inspires an appreciation for the creative process. While there, you can see demonstrations of how glass is blown, see the first fiberglass car, and see exhibits on the history of manufacturing in Newark.

If you like ice cream, then a stop at the Ye Olde Mill in Utica, just 10 miles north of Newark, is a must. The home of the Velvet Ice Cream Company, features factory tours where you can see the world famous Velvet Ice Cream being made. Stop by the Ye Olde Mill, built in 1817, and see the Museum of Milling and the History of Ice Cream, as well as try some of the sweet treats made at the ice cream capital of Ohio.

If you like trees and the outdoors, then a stop at The Dawes Arboretum is a must. Located just south of Newark on State Route 13, this spectacular arboretum features 3,000 species on 1,149 acres. It is also home to the world's largest hedge lettering. Guided tours are available or you can drive through the rolling countryside in your own vehicle.

There are over a dozen natural excursions in Licking County. One of the most famous of these is The Newark Earthworks, home to the Great Circle Earthworks. The Earthworks is known for its prehistoric geometric enclosures that once spanned four miles before urban development destroyed much of it.

Should you be a basket collector as well, you will have time to see the Longaberger Headquarters and

make a trip to the Homestead where the Longaberger baskets are made. In the charming town of Dresden, Ohio you can browse the many little shops and antique stores.

Within a short drive east of Newark in Cambridge, you can visit the beautiful Cambridge Glass Museum or see glass being made at the Mosser Glass Company. Mosser is doing the special reissue pieces from the original Heisey molds for HCA.

The Chihuly exhibit has been held over at the Franklin Park Conservatory in Columbus, Ohio and only 55 minutes from Newark. Franklin Park Conservatory proudly presents the breathtaking blown glass art glass of Dale Chihuly displayed within the lush surroundings of their indoor gardens. Many of the pieces in this display were made especially for this exhibit. The butterfly habitat within the Conservatory is a special added attraction!

If golf is your bag, there are eighteen golf courses in Licking County. There is a course for players of all levels from the scratch golfer to the par-challenged enthusiast!

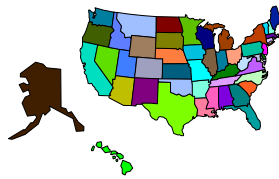

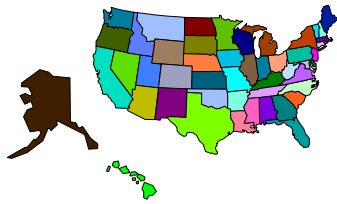
