Plans for Convention are coming together. I obtained a grant from National City Bank for \$500 to produce an 8.5 X11 four-color flyer. Name the Pattern Raffle

Have you ever dreamed that a Heisey pattern could be named after you? Well, at convention this year everyone will be able to take a chance to name a Heisey pattern. We will raffle off the right to name a genuine Heisey pattern that has never been named before. The name can be derived from your name, be descriptive of the piece, or named as a tribute to another. The only stipulation is that the curator must give his blessing to the final name (he will check that it is not a duplicate of one that was previously assigned).

Of course, all the well-known patterns were either named by Heisey or were named by earlier researchers, but there are several smaller patterns that have never been named. One of these is pattern 484 that is made up of several sizes of rolled edge floral bowls. It dates from the early 20s and is often found with decorations done by decorating companies. An example is shown on page 181 of Catalog 102 (1924) with Windsor cutting. When encountered it is often mistaken for 1183 Revere because it is so plain.

For \$5.00 anyone can enter the raffle and win not only the right to name the pattern, but also a 9" marked bowl in the pattern. Entries will be available at the HCA Gift Shop and at the HCA booth at the Convention Show as well as at the annual meeting dinner. All entries must be submitted before the drawing that will be held at the dinner on Friday night. If you wish to submit an entry by mail, you may send a check for \$5.00 with your contact information as well as the suggested name to the Museum ATTN: Name the Pattern. ♦



TREASURER'S REPORT- FIRST QUARTER 2005

You will find the 2005 Budget vs. Actual Report through March 2005 on another page in this newsletter. Basically for the first quarter, we have reduced revenues and offsetting reduced expenses, which have kept things relatively balanced.

Our revenues have lagged behind the norm. With twenty-five percent (25%) of the year completed, we have received 20.47% of our revenue. Please note only some preliminary costs for the auction are shown and not any auction revenue since it occurred in April. Please also note our special project income is lagging well behind our budgeted revenues. We have a few projects beginning but really need some money-making ideas from the membership to help us out! We have transferred into our operating funds one half of our planned yearly transfer from the endowment fund (last year's earned income) because of cash flow needs in the first three months of the year.

Our expenses, with twenty-five percent (25%) of the year completed, are less or 23.60% of our anticipated yearly amount. Nothing really unusual has occurred and as usual, we have paid the semiannual insurance premium this quarter.

On balance, the overall picture hasn't markedly changed or improved. We need increased revenues to sustain our operating budget. New special projects and a financially successful Convention are a must for us. What actions have we taken this year? We have instituted some reductions in personnel costs which will impact (reduce) our salary costs for the rest of the year. Also instituted, beginning last month, is an inventory reduction sale for overstocked items. This is a chance for all to purchase some nice glass for presents (or for yourself) at reduced prices and at the same time help your association.

The HCA Endowment fund balance has grown to \$1,738,900.20, an increase of \$151,833.46 over last year's ending balance. We have deposited \$189,123 in the endowment fund this quarter, most of which (\$180,000) coming from the Kennon Estate. The fund balance also reflects a draw of \$16,000 in

2004 earned income transferred out and placed in our operating funds. The endowment fund had a first quarter consistent with market indices over the period and lost approximately 1.3% in value, not considering our deposit into the fund.

If you have any questions or have some fund-raising ideas, I will be happy to answer them and listen to your ideas. Rest assured, I will share your thoughts with other board members. 1025 ARCADIA CUTTING

Arcadia is a late Heisey cutting probably introduced in 1950 at the same time that the 5077 Legionnaire stem came out. It was produced to go with the Arcadia pattern of Gladding-McBean's Franciscan china.



We have a plate in the Museum in the pattern made in green (they did blue also) with gold border (shown to the left). The cutting came on Legionnaire stemware as well as 6060 Country Club bar ware. A few matching pieces in 1183 Revere and 1951 Cabochon were also made.

The cutting is actually a combination cut

where part of the pattern was cut and then dipped in acid to produce a shiny effect, then the remainder of the pattern was cut and left gray giving the leaves a more realistic look. Very few Heisey cuttings utilized this combination effect.

The sales promotion pamphlet for Arcadia is presented on the cover of this issue. It is only a one sheet (front and back) with no color enhancement unlike the earlier pamphlets we have presented. Arcadia was still being sold in Heisey's last catalog of 1956. Unlike earlier pamphlets, the company uses very straightforward text and forgoes any elaborate imagery. PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHANGE

The following recommendation was approved

during the Board Meeting on April 1, 2005:

That the number of HCA board members be reduced from sixteen (16) to twelve (12) by amending the Constitution, Article VI, Section 1 to read as follows:

Section 1 - The Board of Directors shall consist of (12) Directors elected by the voting members of the organization. Terms of office are to be as provided in the Bylaws. (Note: see Bylaws Art. VII, Sec. 4)

That the above be carried out by amending Bylaws Article VII, Section 4 to read as follows:

Section 4 - The Board of Directors shall consist of 12 members elected from the roll of voting members. The term of office shall be for four years. The number of consecutive four-year terms that a member may be elected to the Board of Directors shall be limited to two (Approved 6-20-82.)

To provide for a reduction in the number of directors from 16 to 12, only three persons shall be elected starting in the years 2006 through 2009 and thereafter.

The vote to accept or reject this proposal will be taken during the Annual Meeting at Convention. ♦

Circus Animal Holdback AUCTION

In the case of a tie, the earliest date-stamped bid wins. All bids will be competitively bid. Payment, including shipping and insurance, will not be requested until after the auction. Once a bid is placed, it cannot be withdrawn.

All items are on display in the Gift Shop of the Museum and will remain there throughout the auction.

Winning bidders will be notified within seven days after the auction and the amounts of the winning bids will be published in a future issue of the *Heisey News*.♥

Lavender Jars #352, #353 and #354

First we will look at the spelling of Lavender. The dictionary spells it with “er” at the end. The Heisey catalog spells it Lavendar.

What is Lavender? It is a fragrant plant of the mint family with narrow aromatic leaves and pale purple or lilac-purple flowers. The flowers and leaves are dried and used to fill sachets or lavender jars to scent clothes, beds or rooms with the smell of lavender. You can buy lavender water, lavender perfume or lavender toilet water. What it is depends on whether the fluid contains a little or a lot of lavender oil. Then there is the word Potpourri, a mixture of dried flowers and spices for perfuming a room.

There was a set of seven lavender jars offered in each of the three colonial patterns. The smallest was 1 oz., the size of a shot glass, and the largest was 30 oz., a little smaller than a quart jar (32 oz.). I can see the use for the small size jars, but what about the real big ones? Perhaps they are for storage when you sell lavender or refill your own small ones. The various sizes are shown with the pictures of the lavender jars. The pictures are from Heisey catalog #75 (circa 1913). Still I wonder, why seven jars of so many sizes in each set?

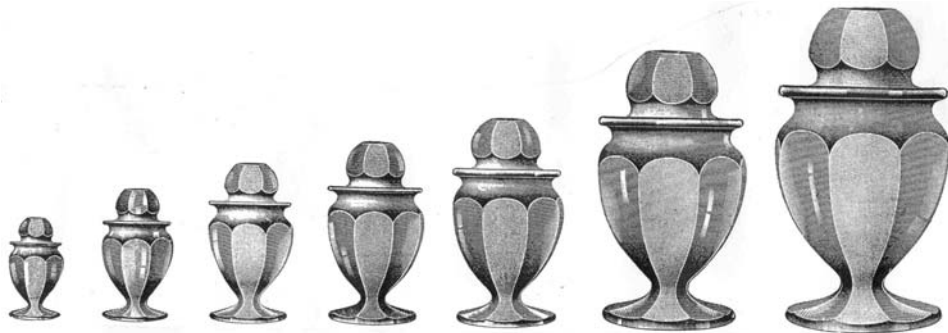
All the lavender jars have ground-in stoppers. This makes them air tight when closed. To me, the jars could be used for almost any other purpose such as spice jars, jelly jars, tobacco jars, etc.

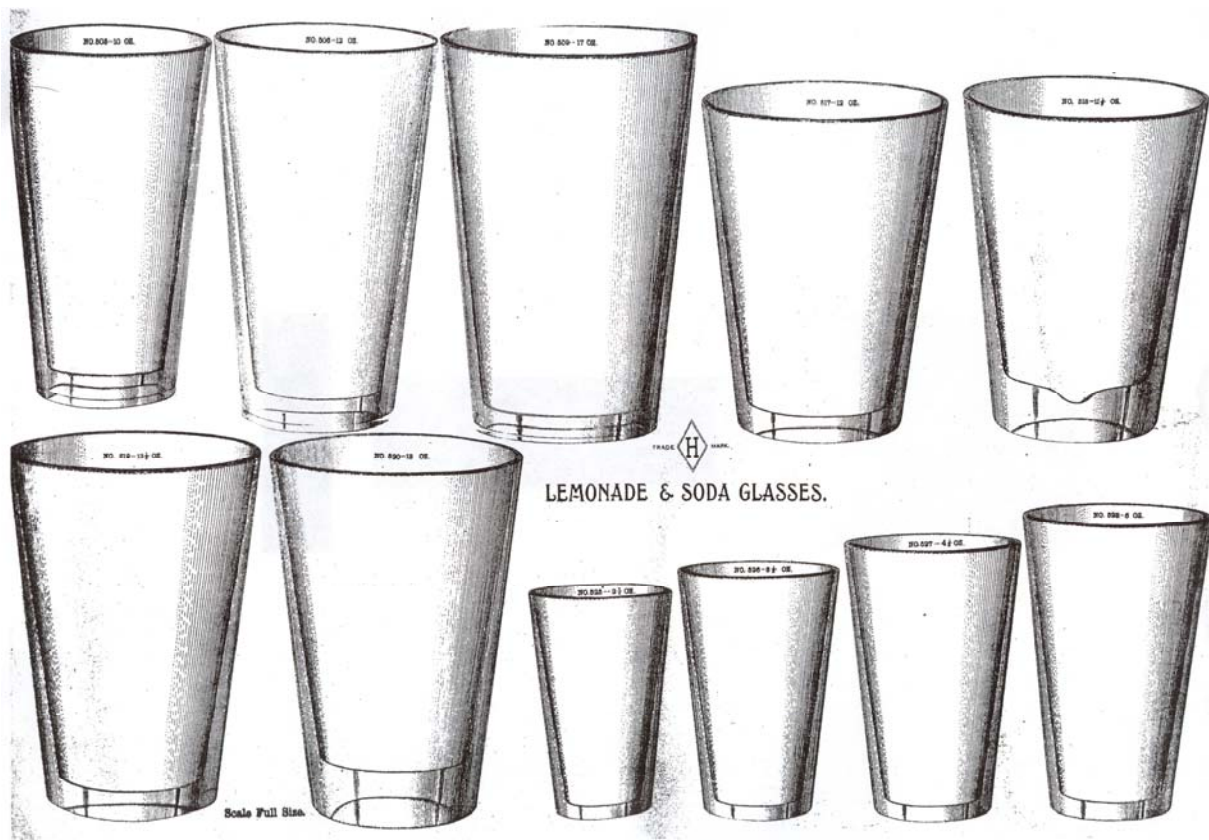
LEMONADE AND SODA GLASSES

A recent addition to the Museum collection was a handled lemonade. It had not been seen until a small group of them were in a recent auction at Apple Tree Auction Center. The person who purchased it and donated it to the Museum thought that it was a whimsey made from a regular soda. I felt that it was probably production because this type of vessel would have been in demand in the soda fountains of that era.

In one of the earliest full catalogs (circa 1902), we have three pages labeled Lemonade and Soda Glasses. Since the example we now have is marked, we can expect all of these to be marked. Pattern numbers for these depend on the exact size. The handleless ones range from 2½ oz. to 16 oz. and are assigned to pattern number 525-534, while the handled ones in the same sizes have pattern numbers 535-544. Also included are sodas 505, 506, 509, 517, and 519 that appear to have half shams, and 518 and 520 having full shams. Pattern 518 has the additional distinction of having a dip in the bottom of the glass. The 521 handled lemonade seems to have a half sham.

The handled lemonade that was donated to the Museum is 10 oz., so that would be pattern number 540. ♥

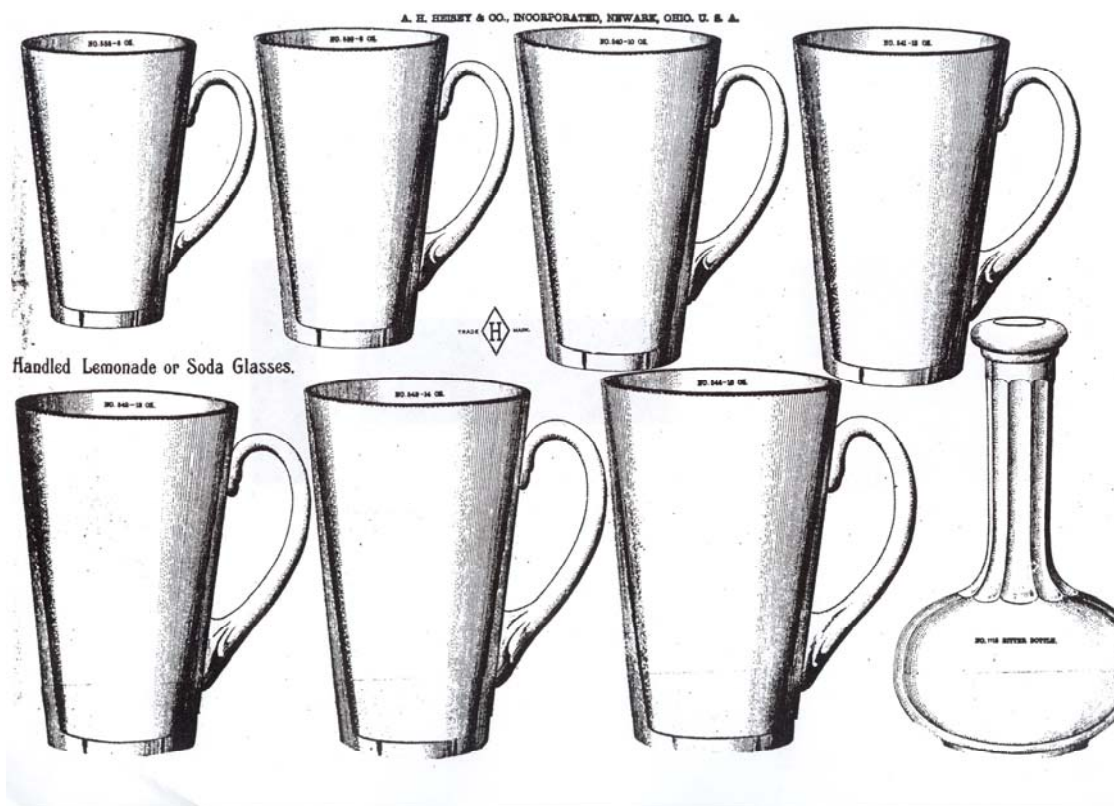


Top row: No. 505 10 oz., No. 506 12 oz., No. 509 17 oz., No. 517 12 oz., No. 518 11 ½ oz.

While on-line looking at a picture of a standing pony I noticed the area just above the hooves did not have any detail or striations. In other words the area just above the hooves is plain. The Standing Pony I have has some detail or striations just above the hooves. Approximately five on each side. My question is this: Did Heisey make two versions of the Standing Pony or is one of the ponies a reproduction?

Answer:

Well -- you have posed a question that I did not have an answer for. I had at first thought you were talking about either the Paden City or Mosser standing ponies -- neither of which are that close to the Heisey one. I went to our animal display case and brought out the three Standing Ponies that we have in our collection: Crystal signed and Cobalt and Light Amber unsigned. A close examination of all three revealed that the Cobalt one did indeed have what could be called striations above the hooves on the sides of the figurine -- but neither the Amber nor the signed Crystal one did. A close examination of the horses produced one other difference. That was in the mane. On the Cobalt one running your finger over the top, you got a relatively smooth feeling whereas on the Crystal and Amber, it felt bumpy.

A check of articles in the Heisey News showed that in the very second issue of the Heisey News in

February of 1972 Dick Marsh wrote about the ponies on page four. He made one statement that I thought of note, "As Imperial did make many of these the thing to look for is the fetlocks because the reproductions do not have them." That sent me to the dictionary to find out exactly what a fetlock was and if the difference you noted would qualify as a fetlock. Answer was not really – the fetlock is a tuft of hair on the back of the leg just above the hoof, this is not where the striations were. Back to the glass pieces. Feeling behind the rear leg just above the hoof there was a small bump on the Cobalt one, this might be more visible on a Crystal piece but on the Cobalt you could hardly see it. The bump was missing on our other two pieces.

Now was Dick's statement correct? A check in Bredehoff's Heisey Glass: 1896-1957 finds that the Kicking and Balking Ponies were made from 1941 to 1945 and the standing one from 1941 to 1952. Since production in Cobalt ceased with the US entering World War II and the government nationalizing all Cobalt supplies, we know that the Cobalt Standing Pony was done very early in the production span. A look at an article in the September 1976 Heisey News on page six by Joe Lokay shows the drawings that were part of the granting of the Design Patent to Heisey for the Standing Pony does show the striations in the details. But what of our Amber and marked Crystal ponies? Are these not Heisey production? Dating the Light Amber production is a little difficult. In 1952, Heisey introduced Sultana that was a dark Amber, but that is not this color. This color is usually referred to as honey Amber that could just be a variation on the Sultana. Anyway, its date does overlap the end of production for the Standing Pony which I believe is the only Pony known in this color. Our marked Crystal one is of the quality we would expect of a factory product.

What is the answer? The probable one, is that as with a lot of the things that Heisey made for a long time, the mold wore out and had to be replaced. In creating a new mold some subtle changes were made - whether deliberately or inadvertently, it's hard to say. Dick Marsh's statement was made early on in the study and research of Heisey glass and so

does not reflect the true nature of what is Heisey and what is not. It does say though, that any of the Standing Ponies with the fetlocks and striations over the hooves are definitely Heisey because they were all produced before the mold was changed.

I guess you got more of an answer than you bargained for but I can assure you that it was well worth looking into.

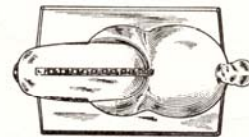

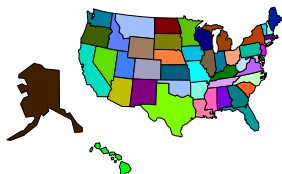

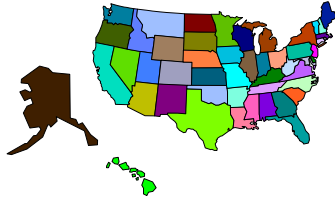
