CURATOR'S REPORT

It hardly seems possible that I have been on the job as Curator for one year now. I look back on the last year with great pride because so much has been done: the cleaning and inventorying of all glass owned and on loan to the Museum is now finished, major improvements have been made in how the glass is cataloged and tracked, several small exhibits have been mounted bringing the story of Heisey glassware to new audiences. But there is so much more that still needs to be done: a lot more work must be put into the Archives to discover what we own and make the material available to ourselves and serious researchers, a push into digitalization of the collection needs to be made, expanded educational outreach needs to be done. I look forward to the continued challenges that this job provides.

This last month has seen things a bit calmer as we wrapped up all the Convention activities. There were a great many donations to the collection during Convention that have now been processed. Look elsewhere in this issue for acknowledgement of all gifts to the Museum during the first 6 months of this year. Do look at the new acquisition case located next to the entry door of the Museum the next time you visit to see some of these treasures. The Bill and Isabelle Gibbs Collection of 119 punch cups has been added to the Museum's collection. Look for them to be on display soon in the Multi-Purpose Room of the Museum.

There has been a definite upturn in visitors to the Museum in the last couple of weeks. It is great to be able to show off our Museum and watch the people being amazed by what we have to offer. All go

away appreciative of the product put out by A. H. Heisey & Co. over its 60 years of existence.

A new display has been put into the Midland, the restored theater located on the Square here in Newark. For the first time we are featuring pieces all in the same pattern and color. Marigold 1252 Twist makes a beautiful summer splash in the showcase there. If you are in the area do stop by the Midland and see this display.

HEISEY PUNCH CUPS: A QUIZ

At convention this year, the museum received the collection of Heisey punch cups put together by Isabelle Gibbs and her late husband, Bill. This collection contains examples of all the known handled Heisey punch cups or custards as they were referred to in early catalogs. How well do you know your punch cups? Here is a little quiz to test your knowledge. Answers will be found on page ____.

1. How many early patterns had colored punch cups? What were these patterns?
2. Which two patterns do not seem to have crystal punch cups – only those that were made in color?
3. How many punch cups were made in color in the middle period (1925-1935)? Name pattern and color.
4. What was the last pattern that Heisey produced that had a punch cup?
5. Which punch cup set an auction price record for punch cups when it was sold many years ago?
6. Which 4 patterns had variation punch cups that had pattern designations ending in ½?
7. Which 2 patterns had the most different variations in the punch cups produced in them?
8. Which two other patterns had punch cups that came in more than one size?
9. Which patterned punch cups might come with ruby stain?
10. Name 8 major patterns that had a punch cup but no punch bowl. ♦

4004 IMPROMPTU

Featured on our cover this month is a promotional leaflet for Heisey's 4004 Impromptu pattern. Joan Cimini donated the leaflet to the Museum during Convention this year. This leaflet is only a front and back single sheet with no additional color used to enhance it. When first introduced in 1941 the pattern was called Polka Dot and was not renamed until 1952 when Rod Irwin, Sales Manager, came up with the name Impromptu to emphasize the use of glassware for casual dining. This leaflet probably was introduced with the renaming of the pattern. The catch phrase on the cover is "a delightfully different pattern designed for informal living." On the back the text reads "Impromptu ... the perfect one-word description for this lovely, new Heisey pattern. Impromptu is delightfully different ... with hand-wrought crystal to suit every need for informal living. Be sure to see Impromptu at your Heisey dealer's." The cover features just the goblet in the pattern while the reverse shows 12 additional pieces in the pattern. The detailed list of all pieces in the pattern adds an additional 10 pieces.

There are many oddities about the impromptu pattern. In 1939 Heisey introduced a new stemware line called 4004 Jacobean made up of just a goblet, cocktail, and sherbet. In 1941 Heisey used the same pattern number 4004 for the Polka Dot line. In reality the exact same stem pieces from 4004 Jacobean were used with the addition of what the promotional literature called a spot optic. This optic effect produced small protrusions seemingly randomly over the glass. The Heisey workers had another even more descriptive name for this, they called it belly button optic. 4004 Polka Dot at that time also included some flat sodas with the same optic effect. The intrusion of World War II saw the suspension of production in this pattern in 1942. It appears again in Catalog 30 for 1949 under the name Polka Dot with the addition of all the items shown on the leaflet plus 3 other interesting items. Listed are a 1 oz cordial, a foursome cocktail jug, and a 9" ball vase – I have seen the ball vase but never a cordial and have no idea what a foursome cocktail jug may be (the martini pitcher, cocktail shaker, decanter, and ice jug are all listed in the catalog so it is none of them).

In 1950 Heisey introduced the 6060 Country Club line which included the 3 original stemmed pieces of 4004 Jacobean (was it confusing to Heisey to have two different patterns with the same number?). Country Club also included all the soda and barware shapes that were listed in 4004 Polka Dot only without the optic.

So you can see when this leaflet touts the pattern as "new" and "delightfully different" there is a lot of advertising license being taken for this already 11 year old pattern. ♦

HEISEY SUNDAE DISHES WITH PRESSED HANDLES

Sundae anyone! I'll have hot fudge with mint ice cream. Now, what shall we use to serve it in?

I can remember when the dish for a sundae was like a footed goblet, flared at the top. Now you get a plastic bowl to throw away when finished. At a restaurant you may find a glass or china bowl used.

From about 1910 to 1921, Heisey offered pressed handled dishes for sundaes. They looked similar to a punch cup but had a larger diameter at the top, and were shorter in height. Heisey Price List 155, circa 1910, offered 15 handled sundae dishes. The capacities ranged from 4 to 7 ounces, and the design was either plain or colonial. All 15 had pattern numbers in the 1500s.

After three years, the flared version of 1506 and 1507, the non-flared version of 1513 colonial and 1514 colonial, and 1515 were dropped while 150 Banded Flute was added. Price List 175, circa 1913, and Price List 205, circa 1919, still offered the remaining 11 sundae dishes. Production of the sundae dishes stopped in about 1921 with the exception of 150 Banded Flute that went on for two more years. Other large punch cups could be used as sundae dishes.

There was one pressed handled dish called an ice cream rather than a sundae. It certainly could be used for a sundae. This was in pattern 337 Touraine. This piece actually pre-dates the handled sundae dishes.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Dave Spahr

Please consider this article a brief synopsis of our financial status as of June 30, 2005. The 2005 Budget Vs. Actual Report showing revenues and expenditures are shown on page 17 in this Newsletter. Please refer to the report as you read this article.

A brief review of the revenues show we have received 65.25% of our annual revenue. Our main revenue producing activities are basically over for the year. We had a great Convention with many study clubs donating to our operating funds-Thank You! We are well over projections in this very important category! Our museum shop sales are ahead of projections for the first time this year. Final accounting for the auction shows we netted \$17,292

for this project. We are still finalizing convention revenues and costs and expect, when considering donations, we will exceed overall projections as well. We need more and innovative special projects so we can meet the goals in this year's budget and assure financial solvency.

Our expenditures for the first six months are 46.12% of our annual budget. We have spent less than projected which reflects the positive actions taken by your board and staff to keep expenses down. Our salaries are less than projected reflecting the reduction in hours and compensation. Increased health insurance costs plague us as it does other organizations and actions by the board are needed to reduce this cost.

Yearly receipts for the endowment fund total \$378,913.47 with \$359,556.94 of that amount representing the total settlement from the Kennon estate. The endowment fund has grown from \$1,587,066.84 to \$1,918,740.24 as of June 30, 2005. We have taken \$16,000 which is half of last year's earned income from the endowment fund and placed it in our operating budget as planned. We will place the another \$16,000 in our operating budget as we need it later this year. In July we will put the final \$5,434.00 in the endowment fund.

From now until year's end we will be depleting our cash balances since our prime money making projects are complete. Your continued support is needed. We had a great convention with our membership generously providing much needed financial funds for operations. That said, our financial picture will be clearer over the next few months but does remain critical.

I want to thank you in advance for your interest in the finances of YOUR association. YOUR Board as stewards are making sure our resources are spent wisely. We continue to struggle and need your thoughts and input on ways we can raise more funds to support the Museum and staff. Your financial support and volunteerism allows YOUR Museum to be a remarkable showplace and educational resource facility for all members.

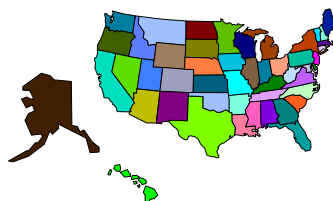

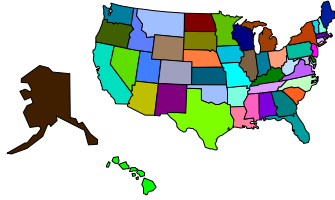

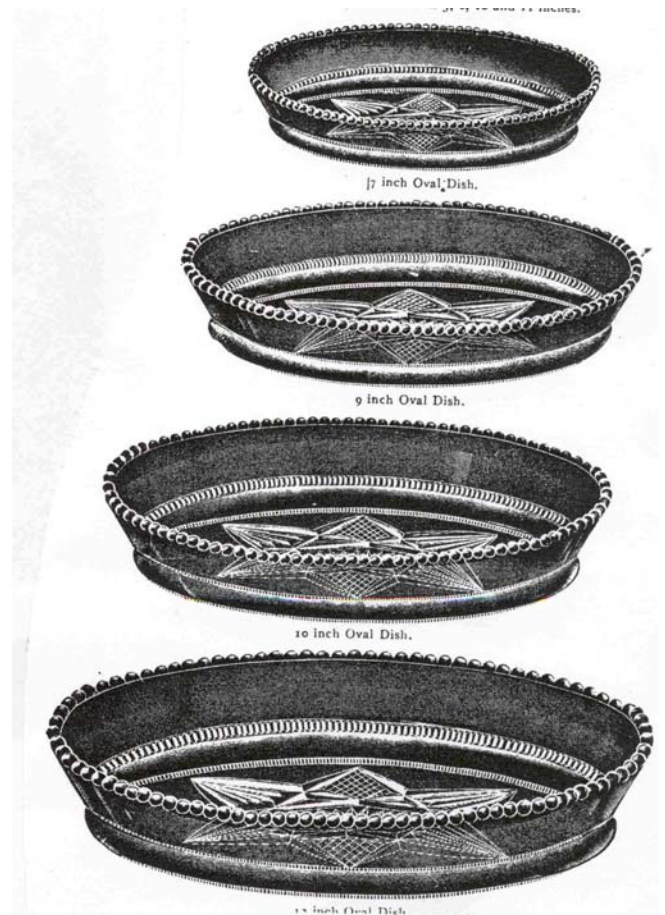
