

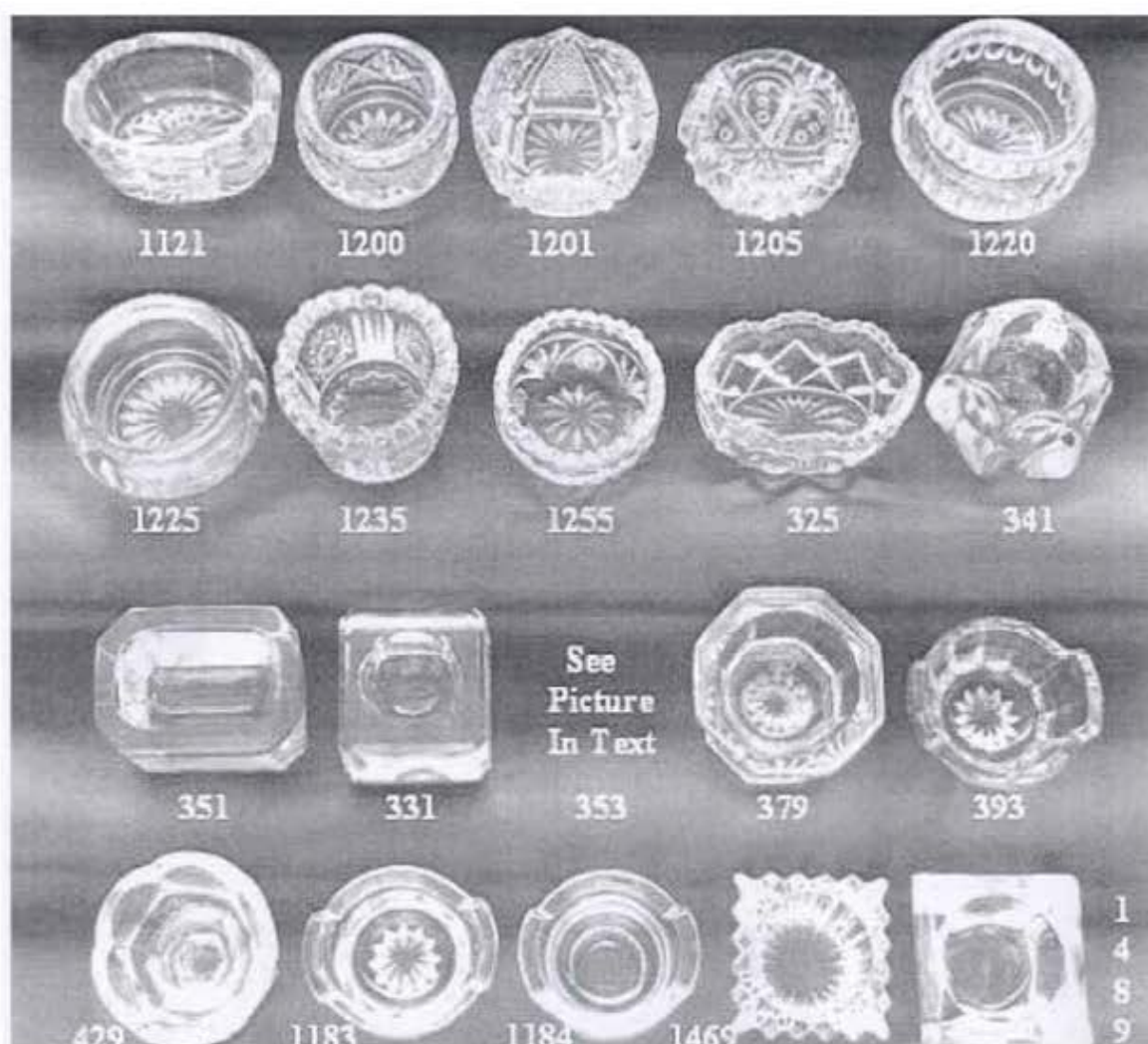

JOE LOKAY AND THE LOKAY INITIATIVE

It is with considerable sadness that I have to tell you about the passing of Joe Lokay over Memorial Day weekend. Joe had called me at the Museum about a month previously to let me know that he was undergoing treatments for leukemia and that he was not able to prepare any articles for the Newsletter in the foreseeable future. It was my hope that he would respond to the treatments and that he would be back writing for us soon. But, that was not to be. His body was not able to recover and so we lost him.

Joe and his wife LaVerne had been around Heisey for many years. But, his true passion when it came to Heisey was doing the basic research that is so important to understand the real history of the company. His first articles were written way back in the 70s and they were so important to all of us. We hungered to find out every detail of what the company made all those many years ago. Joe was generous with that information and got great joy in sharing his knowledge with whoever was willing to listen.

His articles and his seminars at the Convention were always eagerly awaited. We really missed him this year on the ID Panel – his knowledge and wit made it a truly educational experience for all that attended.

In that last few years, as I have taken on the role of Curator here at the Museum, one of the great pleasures was when Joe would come to town to do some research up in the library. When he was done, after a long day, we would go out to eat Chinese at a local restaurant and talk about what he had found that day. It always excited him so.

LaVerne and the Lokay family have donated to the Museum in Joe's memory the pair of 141 Edna candlesticks that have been on loan to us for many years. This is the only pair that has ever turned up in Moongleam. Joe was very proud of them and how he had spotted them many years ago in the window of a Pittsburg antique store. I used to joke with him about how he should donate them to a little museum I have up the road on Church Street. But now they are coming to the Museum as a fitting tribute to a great man.

The executive board had been looking for a way to pay tribute to Joe this Convention – even before we had heard that he was sick. I was asked what would be something that Joe would appreciate and I came up with the idea of the Lokay Initiative – something I felt was very in keeping with the spirit of the man.

In 2000, the Museum updated its computers and installed a network allowing for the storage and sharing of files between machines. The network had much greater capacity and we started a library of the Newsletters as they were produced each month. Until now no effort has been put into recreating the articles that were in the Newsletters prior to this date. It was a big job that we did not have the manpower to accomplish. With the advances in general computing and the World Wide Web, we feel that now would be a good time to try to recreate these files.

We are asking individuals and study clubs to take on the project of entering the articles that have been published in Newsletters prior to 2000. An individual may take a single issue or maybe two. A study club might take a half year or a full year and among the members the articles could be entered into any word processing package. They would then be sent to the Museum where I will coordinate the compilation of the articles. We are only asking that articles that deal with Heisey patterns or some historical aspect of the Heisey Company be entered – there would be no need to enter Convention news or other club business that was of the moment.

Once we have all of the information together, a true index of the information can be created. The articles can then be used to enhance our website – providing background information on patterns that there are only pictures of now. The articles could be compiled on a CD-ROM which we can sell in our gift shop – providing ready information to anyone who wanted more information on Heisey glassware.

We have published so much about Heisey glass, many of the articles written by Joe himself. I can not think of a more fitting tribute than to make his legacy of research available to even more people.

So call me or e-mail me at the Museum and let me know what you think you can do. We will settle on the issues that you will do and if you do not have those issues, I will send them to you. With us all working together we will complete the Lokay Initiative. ♦

HEISEY OPEN SALTS

Walter Ludwig

On May 1, the Midwest Chapter of the Open Salt Collectors met at the Museum for their semi-annual meeting. They seemed to really enjoy themselves as all glass collectors with a common collectible do. They had speakers, a little sales session, and a delicious lunch. I brought them on a tour of the Museum.

One of the highlights of the meeting was a presentation by Ed Bowman on Heisey open salts. Ed had put together material from many different sources including Heisey catalogs and earlier articles that had been written. One of the writers of these earlier articles was Ed Berg, an early collector and researcher on Heisey salts. Ed Bowman had also talked with me about some aspects of Heisey salts. Probably the biggest assistance he received was from James Taylo who was able to provide some additional pictures as well as the tabulation of Heisey salts that you see on page 7. His presentation was done in PowerPoint and he has kindly provided me with a copy of that presentation so that I may share it with you. His presentation was very thorough, but the slides do a good job of summarizing the information. His presentation also included Heisey nut dishes which I may be able to put together for you at a later date. Open salt collectors, you will find, are not purists. They do not just collect those items that a company marketed as open salts – but rather they will accept anything as an open salt as long as it could have possibly held salt and that it appeals to them. We however will stick with what Heisey called an open salt.

I am going to make a few comments on some of the slides that Ed presented.

1121 (page 8) – Ed Bowman and James Taylo both call this by the name Octagon. Although it is descriptive, it is not a name that HCA has applied to the pattern. Octagon is a name that is already associated with several different patterns, most notably 1229 Octagon which is

totally unrelated to this salt and comes from another era. Because of the look-alike most Heisey collectors are looking for a marked version of this salt. They are rather scarce.

1225 Plain Band (pages 10-11) – The original catalog drawings of both the table and individual salts having beading around the top. I am not aware of a salt with beading ever turning up. Bowman does show two different variations on this salt one with a row of sawtooth bands around the bottom of the salt and one without.

353 Medium Flat Panel (page 14) – This is probably the salt that is missing from most collections. It was sold individually but more commonly as the base of a shaker/open salt set. If you will go back to the Heisey News of October 2007, p 21-22, you will find an article on this set. (You will also find another article on Heisey salt shakers in that issue.)

393 Narrow Flute (page 15) – Bowman lists this salt as being available in both Moongleam and Flamingo. Neila Bredehoft in Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass: 1925-1938 only lists Moongleam. I have never seen this salt in either color. I hope someone is able to substantiate that they have this salt in color.

429 Plain Panel Recess (page 16) - (note the proper denotation of this pattern's name) Bowman asks if this might have come in Alexandrite. I seriously doubt that it did, but would not be surprised to find it sun purpled.

1183 Revere and 1184 Yeoman (pages 16-17) – These are patterns that Heisey made for a long period of time and items drifted between the patterns according to the time period that they were produced. Basically these two salts are the same. For convenience we separate the salts by calling all those with a star bottom 1183, while those with a plain bottom (and unmarked) are 1184. Most of those found decorated with cuttings will be 1183 while the colored ones are all 1184. The Cobalt 1184 Revere would be the star of any collection of Heisey salts.

1489 Puritan (page 18) – This is another salt that is very hard to identify because of the lack of a mark and the fact that there are so many look-alikes made by other companies. Hopefully, with the measurements provided you will be able to find a real Heisey one.

1116 Twin Salt (page 18) – For many years this salt confused collectors because the catalog picture did not show the one thing that differentiates this salt from several others, and that is the fact that the handle is an open loop on the Heisey twin salt.

Heisey Salts in Question (page 19) – When I came to the Museum, I found the rectangular salt on the top of the slide in our case with other Heisey salts. It certainly looked out of place and it was only with some diligent searching that I found an article by Ed Berg where he described this salt. The acid stamp looks like the Diamond H – but it has no three dimensional effect to it. I

immediately relegated this salt to our storage area.

The other salt on this slide is much more interesting. Unfortunately, being a blown piece it would really be hard to distinguish it. I certainly would be interested in hearing from anyone who has one of these.

Variations of Heisey Salts (page 19) – The Webster Co Sterling Rim salt is shown on the bottom and Bowman probably has some substantiation for calling it that. He says that it is made from a 411 Tudor piece, but that is not correct. The piece is identified by Bredehoft in Heisey Glass: 1896 – 1957 as the No. 1 tea drip to hold the old fashioned tea ball used with a fancy tea service. This is a piece that we do own the mold for.

Ed Bowman's presentation really educated me on open salts. I hope it does you also. ♦
