There are many other examples of Faith in our history of 50 years, too many to list.

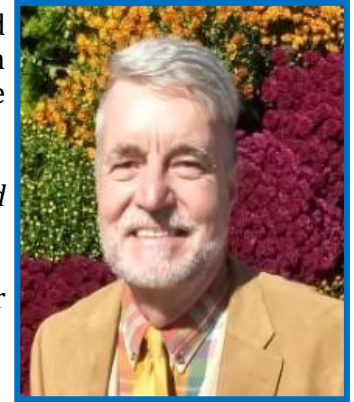

TREASURER'S REPORT

Help Yourself.....Help HCA

Here is another way to help HCA. If you are required to take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your tax-deferred retirement account, a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) may benefit you and HCA. RMDs create taxable income in the year of withdrawal. However, if you direct all or a portion of the RMD (up to \$100,000 max per person) to HCA -- a qualified non-profit entity -- the QCD amount reduces your taxable income. To qualify in 2021, the funds withdrawal must occur by December 31 and be payable directly to the Heisey Collectors of America. IRS rules are very explicit. You should consult your IRA account trustee or your tax professional for specific applicability to your situation.

A History of the Founding of HCA

Editor's note:

Mary Olson presented this retrospective of 50 years of HCA during the Percy and Vivian Moore Dinner on October 15, 2021, accompanied with images compiled by Caleb Michael-Files. It is available as a video on the National Heisey Glass Museum Facebook page.

After two years of canceled conventions, cancelled auctions and a cancelled Percy and Vivian Moore Dinner, we are finally together in Newark to renew acquaintances with old friends, make new ones and celebrate the 50th Anniversary of HCA.

*It is so incredibly fitting that we are gathering this evening, exactly 50 years from the day when 20 dedicated collectors founded the Heisey Collectors of America, Inc. in Newark, Ohio on **October 15, 1971**.*

News of the brand-new organization was reported in Heisey News, Volume 1, Number 1, dated Jan. 1972.

In the words of President Louise Ream, "It is with the greatest pleasure that we address you for the first time as fellow members of this exciting, new national organization. Immediately after last year's Heisey glass display, the Newark Heisey Club met and decided, in response to your requests, to investigate the possibility of starting a new national club, based in Newark, Ohio. It was not until October 15, 1971, after reviewing your response to our letters and ads, that we finally decided to go ahead with the club. We then reorganized to form the nucleus of the Heisey Collectors of America and began to seek members on a national level. The Newark Heisey Club has gone back to being a study group, its original purpose.

"The ultimate goal of this new club, as stated in the constitution, is to eventually establish a Heisey Glass museum in Newark where all may come to study the glass and its history. Other purposes of the club are to furnish information on Heisey glass...and to encourage its collection and preservation as one of the truly fine glassware ever made in this country."

If you wanted to join the club, dues were \$6. Those who wanted to be a voting member paid a one-time \$25 fee. That fee is still the same, though not nearly as steep as it may have seemed at one time.

Examining the first issue of Heisey News, which is available on the museum website, is a delight.

Readers of that issue learned about #1201 Fandango in an article by Loren Yeakley and were introduced to Paul Fairall, a former Heisey employee, by Evelyn Allen.

Dick Marsh wrote a column called "Heisey Figurines – Animals," in which he described the Horsehead bookends. He wrote very descriptively, "Our friend, here, is not as pretty as the rest of the Heisey stable of horses as he is rather ferocious looking. He has a rough, jagged mane, large eyes, large, flared nostrils and his mouth is opened wide." Marsh's plan was to discuss a different figurine or matched set of figurines in each issue, which he felt would take more than four years!

Frances Law wrote a series of stories called "Color of the Month," which was not quite as daunting as the animals. Her first month's offering was entitled, "Vaseline or Canary?" That's a question I have asked often!

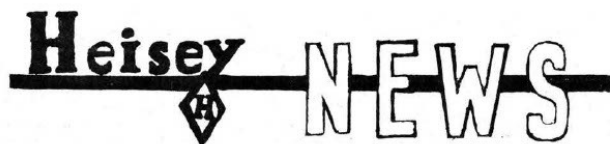
And of course, there were club notes – The Newark Club, the Reynoldsburg Heisey Club, and the Far East Heisey Club all reported in that first issue.

And, to round out the issue was a Question-and-Answer Column and a call to dealers to list their names in the dealers' directory.

Little tidbits of news made it clear that HCA's founding members were out spreading news of Heisey glass and the fledgling national organization. For example, in February 1972 Loren and Virginia Yeakley spoke to members of the Missilettes about the history of Heisey glass. The Missilettes was a women's organization at the Newark Air Force Station. A few days later the Yeakleys journeyed to Cincinnati to speak to more than 100 members and guests of the Early American Glass Club.

From the desk of...

President, Louise Ream.

HEISEY COLLECTORS OF AMERICA, Welcome!!!

It is with the greatest pleasure that we address you for the first time as fellow members of this new national organization to give you a little background of the club and acquaint you with its purposes and goals.

Immediately after last year's Heisey glass display, the Newark Heisey Club met and decided, in response to your many requests, to investigate the possibility of starting a new national club, based in Newark, Ohio.

It was not until October 15, 1971, after reviewing your response to our letters and ads, that we finally decided to go ahead with the club. We then reorganized to form the nucleus of the Heisey Collectors of America and began to seek members on a national level. The Newark Heisey Club has gone back to being a study group, its original purpose.

These appearances no doubt boosted membership. Within six months, there were 423 members from 31 states, and, 60 more women than men. Three months later there were 671 members from 35 states.

HCA was a busy group. By April 1972 it had selected the Fandango pitcher as its symbol and had begun raising money for a museum. That month Heisey News reported that the Newark Heisey Collectors Club gave a check for \$2,500 to HCA as the first gift toward establishing a Heisey glass museum in Newark. The

check was deposited in a museum fund at the Park National Bank.

Enthusiasm among members mounted and new clubs began to form. Within a few months of HCA's founding, there were notices in Heisey News for clubs forming in the Cincinnati – Dayton area of Ohio, the New England and Boston area, California and elsewhere.

I will share information on one, chosen at random, but chosen also because the name of the woman who brought this group together was so memorable and one of its early accomplishments was so great. It was on June 7, 1972 In Oxon Hill, Maryland, that Ms. Orva Heissenbuttal called a meeting for a group of Heisey enthusiasts. Just a month later, that group became the National Capital Heisey Collectors with 30 members. The following year, under the leadership of Ms. Heissenbuttal, the club organized the first all-Heisey glass show held in the United States. This show at the armory in White Oak, Maryland, featured 20 Heisey dealers and displays of glass from members' collections. According to Ms. Heissenbuttal, the driving idea behind this all-

Heisey show was to delineate the difference between Heisey's fine handmade glass and machine-made glass. Most notably, proceeds from that event were directed to the Museum Fund of HCA.

By December of 1972, President Louise Ream announced that HCA had finally received tax exempt status so donations would be tax deductible. "This should really give our proposed museum a boost," she said. It was clear that raising money for a museum was a priority of the organization.

In August 1973, less than two years after its founding, Louise Ream wrote in Heisey News, "Hooray!!! We have a museum. Well, not quite, but we do have a house to restore for the future museum. Little did we realize at the annual meeting in June that in a few short weeks the dream might begin to take shape as a reality." She explained that the museum committee looked at several available houses and then soon received an offer of one "that could be ours for the taking if we wanted to move and restore it."

As we know, HCA accepted the Samuel D. King home, which had been built in downtown Newark in 1831. In so doing, HCA saved the graceful Greek Revival style home from demolition. Following a period of restoration, it was dedicated as the National Heisey Glass Museum on June 14, 1975. Tim Heisey addressed the approximately 300 people who gathered for the ceremony. According to President Ream, "we could not have chosen a better speaker. He praised HCA for the achievement of the dream of the museum. He also spoke of the credit due the glassworkers for their work in creating the fine glass. He amused us with the story of his father, Clarence, who demanded that everyone say "High-see" yet murdered the name of everyone else."

Though they were clearly thrilled with their new museum, HCA members realized over the years that they simply needed more space to display their growing collection. After much work on the part of the Expansion Committee, the board approved a museum expansion plan in December 1991 to construct a two-floor structure with basement, 36 feet wide, 60 feet long, to connect to the present office building. The board soon accepted the bid for construction and on June 17, 1992, broke ground for the new gallery building.

The highlight of the 1993 convention was the dedication of the new building. Once again, approximately 300 people gathered for the dedication, which included a five-piece brass band, the usual speeches and a ribbon cutting by Louise Ream and Newark Mayor Frank Stare. Carl Sparacio described the event for Heisey News. I particularly liked this observation "...we rode the elevator up to the second museum level where I thought I'd died and gone to Heisey Heaven. On this level all the Heisey colors are displayed in examples of the many patterns in which they were made. Everything sparkled, thanks to the staff and the volunteers at the museum. The handcrafted, custom-made display cases complemented the glass beautifully. He went on to describe the first-floor gallery and the redecorated King House and ended with this observation, "To ice the cake you need only return to see the Heisey Museum complex lit on the outside after dark. Members could not ask more of their museum. The glass it honors is displayed beautifully in a facility equal to its task."

Tonight, we honor the legacy those founding members made possible 50 years ago today. It is up to us to continue the work they began by supporting our museum as a place where people come to learn about the tremendous glass made by expert craftsmen and women here in Newark.

And now, it's time to bid generously for tonight's mini auction items, and of course, at tomorrow's Dave Spahr Fall Select Auction.

2021 Dave Spahr Fall Select Auction Wrap-up

We held our annual Dave Spahr Fall Select Auction on October 16th at the GMP Local 244 Union Hall on Hudson Avenue. This was our first hybrid auction where we not only had in-person bidding, but on-line bidding as well.

Our volunteers boxed up the auction glass on Friday. We met at the Union Hall at 8:00 AM on Saturday to “unfur!” the 350 lots of glass from our 19 consignors/donors. We finished in plenty of time for the Preview which started at 11:00 AM and lasted till 12:00 noon. We had a wonderful selection of glass this year!!

Craig Connelly and cohort, Kevin Burchett, were our auctioneers. Only the best would do for this auction!!

Our auction began promptly at 12:00 Noon. The turnout for the auction was good. We had a crowd of approximately 100 with 67 individuals picking up bid cards, 11 absentee bidders and 74 on-line bidders. Bidding was robust with heavy competition for many of the special pieces in the auction.

We had total revenues of \$55,447.25 with glass sales of \$54,715.00 for the 350 lots. Our payments to consignors and other expenses are approximately \$42,000 so we have an estimated net profit for the Museum of \$13,000. We will exceed our 2021 budget projection of \$7000 which is tremendous. This year we had receipts of \$5,995 on 41 donated lots.

We hope you will consider donating glass in the future since 100% of the proceeds goes to support the Museum.

Putting on an auction is a team effort and HCA has some great volunteers! I want to thank the volunteers who helped to make this a successful venture. They are listed in this newsletter- sorry if we missed anyone. I also want to give special thanks to several individuals. First, thanks to Walter Ludwig who volunteered his time to help catalog and properly list the glass and write a wonderful article highlighting the glass. Second, a big thank you to Mary Ann Spahr for assisting in every aspect of the auction process. Third, a huge thank you to Karen Taylo for making the HiBid platform work, making sure the consignors get paid promptly and patiently working out all the issues bidders encountered while online. Lastly, to the online computer team: Caleb-Michael Files, and Doug Olson. This was our first webcast auction and Caleb and Doug did a yeoman’s job of navigating an entirely new system.

This was truly a team effort and could not have been done otherwise. When this team comes together, good things happen. It is my profound pleasure to work with everyone on the Auction Committee.

Thanks again to all of you who consigned and donated glass for this Auction and to those of you who purchased this wonderful Heisey glass. Hope to see you all at the 2022 Spring Benefit Auction on April 22–23, 2022. Please continue to support our Museum!

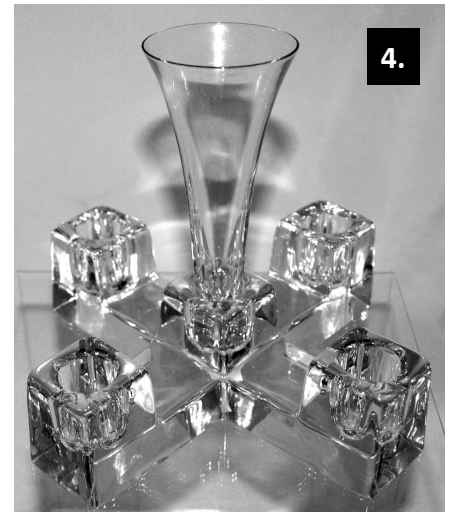

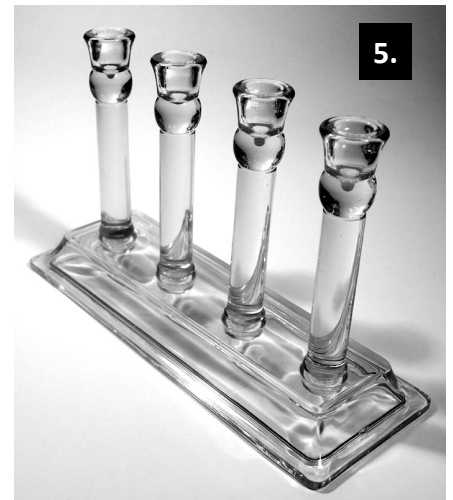

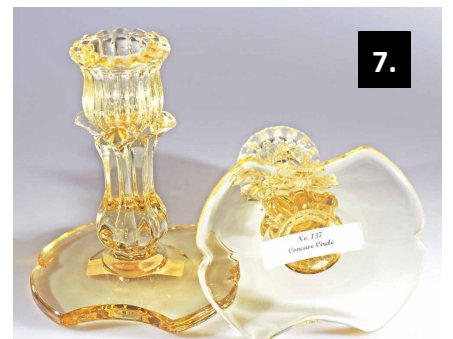

All items consigned for sale or donated are made by A. H. Heisey and Company. No reproductions by Imperial or others will be accepted, **except as commissioned by HCA.** The owner agrees to accept all responsibility for providing merchantable title for all glass sold.

The owner may consign no more than 40 lots (excluding donated lots) to be sold. The owner's list of glass (plus donated lots) is on the following page and is an integral part of this contract. There is no limit on the number of items in each lot, but HCA retains the right to increase and decrease size and make-up of each lot. Each owner may donate an unlimited number of lots to HCA for sale at the auction. HCA, however, at its discretion, will consign donated items for auction, add donated items to the museum collection, and/or sell donated items in the museum shop.

The HCA Auction Committee will reject any glass, once received, deemed not acceptable for this auction, or glass not made by A. H. Heisey and Company except as commissioned by HCA. These items may be returned to the owner if they desire, at their expense. Otherwise, these items become the property of HCA. Every owner must be a current dues paying member of HCA.

Commission:

The Owner of glassware in this auction will be charged on the following sliding scale commission per lot: \$5.00-\$50.00 = 40%; \$50.01-\$200.00 = 30%; \$200.01-\$400.00 = 20%; \$400.01-\$750.00 = 15%; \$750.01 and over = 10%.

Settlement:

Payment (settlement) to the owner for glass sold will be made in full not later than fifteen days after the completed auction from the HCA Auction Trust Account.
