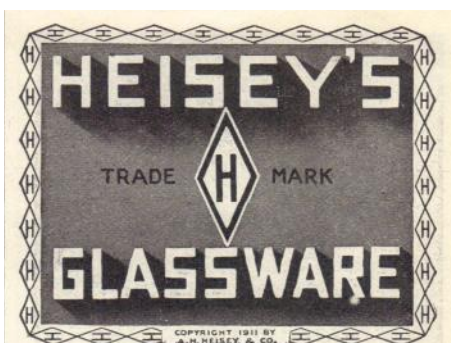

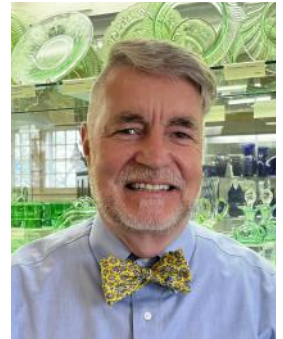

Words from Your Director-Curator



We are enjoying a day with temperatures in the upper 60s today but are expecting the low 20s for this evening. I would like spring to arrive here at the National Heisey Glass Museum, but I was not hoping for these wild swings in temperature.



I spent part of my morning today putting away the red shades for our two fantastic original King House gasoliers. I install the ruby shades for Christmas every year and usually leave them in place through Valentine's Day. Walter Ludwig has hated these shades since I first used them and calls them my Bordello lights. Their warm red glow may, indeed, have something to do with them staying in place until February 14th. Each gasolier is of a different design and has four very unusual matching antique glass gas shades that complement the fixture. Yearly, I take this opportunity to wash them before reinstalling. It is always a big sigh of relief when all eight delicate shades are safely cleaned and back in their original positions. These shades are much older than Heisey glass and as much as I have looked over the years, I have never seen matches for either of the patterns we have. I am told that Elizabeth King was overwhelmed with delight when she first saw the very light fixtures she had grown up with polished and restored as part of her home of five generations being used at our Heisey Museum. I know that when anyone visits our Heisey Glass Museum there is much to see, but please take a moment to appreciate these two wonderful original gasoliers with or without these elegant shades.

Just as our light fixtures are unique examples of fine design and engineering, I want to share with you part of a recent generous donation from California. Someone with a great deal of skill, patience, and time designed and crafted this unique, and possibly better than original replacement part. The 300-5 Old Williamsburg 5-light candelabrum is considered by many to be one of the ultimate Heisey collection items and it is indeed a magnificent statement piece. However, as many of you may have noted, the arms can be difficult to install. With this solution, each precisely made arm socket has an additional aluminum screw to hold it in perfect alignment so that all the candles are straight and true to the original design. I fear these would be very expensive to manufacture but I think many would be happy to have one. I appreciate the time and skill someone took to have this fine candelabrum look its best!

Heisey Collectors of America, Inc. HCA MEMBERSHIP SURVEY RESULTS, Part 2



SURVEY RATES IMPORTANCE OF MUSEUM SERVICES, EXHIBITS AND MORE

(Second in a series of articles on results of the 2022 HCA Member Survey. See February 2023 issue for more information.)

One of the most important questions on the 22-question survey conducted by Heisey Collectors of America (HCA) in June asked members to rate the importance to them of 15 activities, services, resources and aspects of the museum and the organization.

“This question really goes to the heart of what we do. We wanted to know what people value most about our museum and the activities of our organization. It gives us the information we need to be able to focus our efforts on what is most important to our members,” said HCA President Suzanne Parker.

Comparisons with results of the 2018 HCA Member Survey, show that the aspects of the museum and HCA that members value most remain the same. Once again, the most important are:

- 1. Viewing the glass collection at the museum.**
- 2. Reading *Heisey News*.**
- 3. Viewing special exhibits.**

Viewing the museum collection rated even higher in 2022 than in 2018, with 90.3% of respondents rating it as either extremely important or very important and another 7.7% rating it as somewhat important.* In 2018, 85% said viewing the museum collection was extremely or very important.

This is not surprising since many people wrote that they joined HCA because they love the glass. “Loved the quality and beauty of the glass as well as the people I met my first time at the museum,” wrote one member.

The importance of reading *Heisey News* changed little, with 82.5% rating it as extremely/very important in 2022, down about one percentage point. In addition, some survey participants added comments suggesting ways to improve *Heisey News*, though opinions varied widely. One member asked for greater detail in the financial news included in the newsletter, while another suggested there was no need for financial news every month. There were also suggestions to publish minutes of all board and committee meetings in *Heisey News*. Several people asked for more articles on Heisey glass.

The third most popular item, “viewing special exhibits,” was considered extremely or very important by 79.7% of those surveyed, up from 75.5 % in 2018. The percentage of members rating “viewing exhibits on glassmaking “ was virtually unchanged – 62.9% in 2022 and 62.7% in 2018.

Purchasing items in the museum’s gift shop showed the largest increase in importance to members, with 71.1% of respondents rating it extremely or very important, up eight percentage points. One member commented that the gift shop postings on Facebook are great.

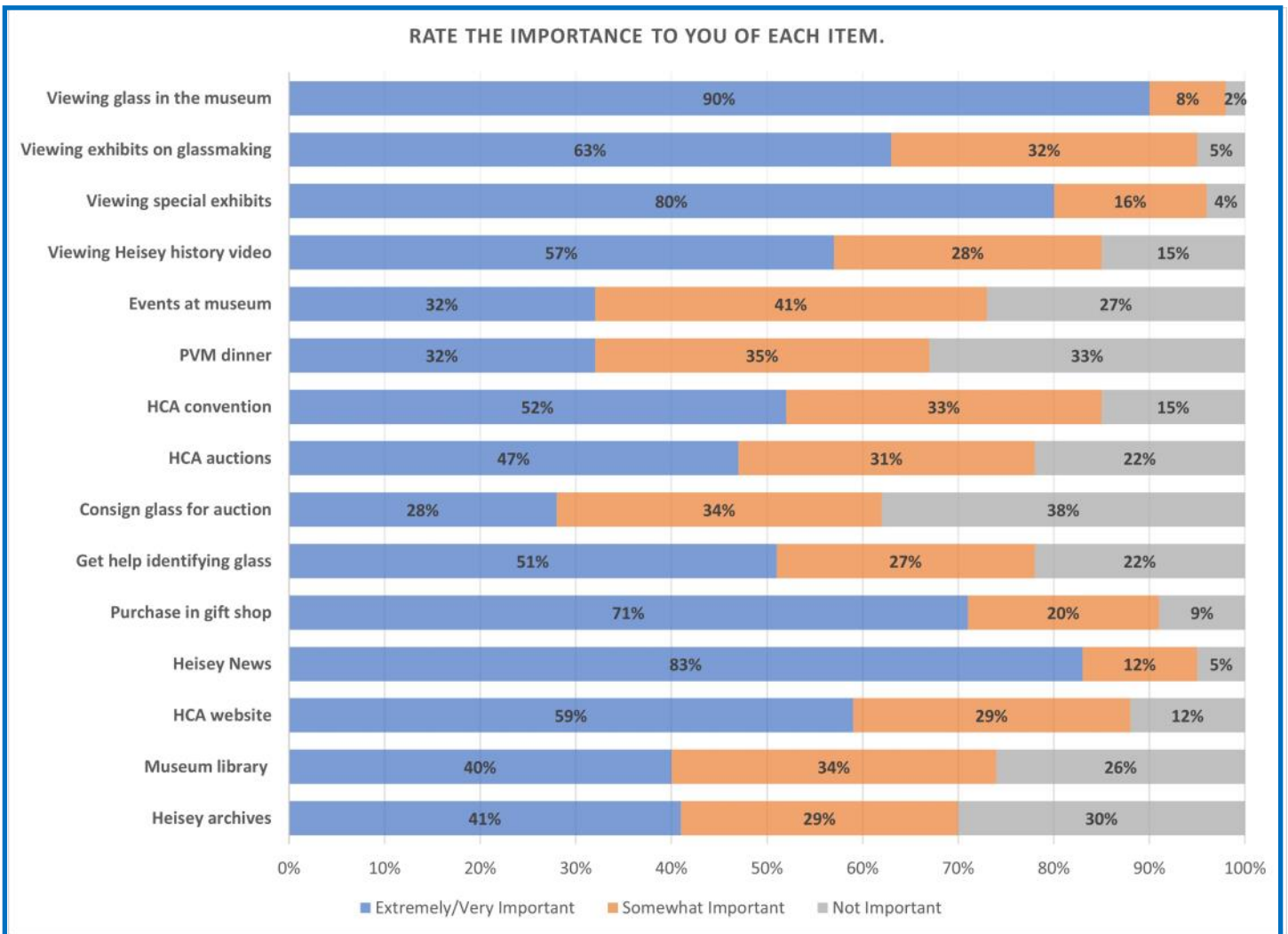
Attending the annual HCA convention was rated extremely/very important by 52.1%, up slightly from 2018. Attending auctions was up slightly as well, 47.2% in 2022 and 45.5% in 2018. Although less popular than the convention or auctions, the percentage of people who rated “attending the Percy and Vivian Moore Dinner” as extremely/very important increased by 7.5 percentage points, from 24.1% to 31.6%.

“Getting help from staff in identifying glass” was extremely/very important to half of those surveyed – 50.6%, up about two percentage points.

Using HCA’s website changed by less than one percentage point, with 59.4% rating it extremely/very important. The special sources of information available through the museum are important to a significant number of members; using Heisey archives” was rated extremely/ very important by 40% and “using the resource collection in the museum library” by 40.7%

Treasurer's Report by Andy Baldus



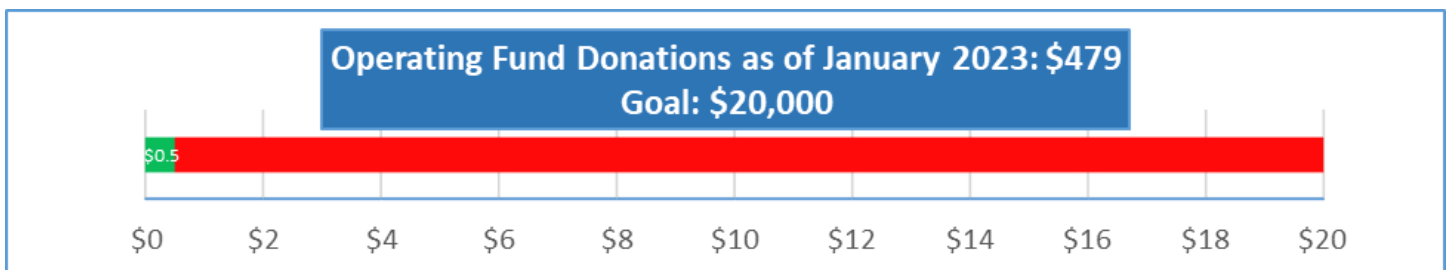
While we are waiting for our accountants to finalize the 2022 year-end report, I thought you might be interested to see how our two largest areas of gift shop sales have changed over time.

The graph below shows two categories of gift shop sales over time from 2017 to 2022. The numbers in the graph are items sold, not dollars. As you can see, glassware sales in 2022 benefited from recent donations of outstanding glass to the museum. The 2022 increased sales in special projects is attributed to the popularity of this year's bunnies, continued interest in buying pumpkins, the addition of acorns and a marketing campaign that helped sell some longtime inventory reproduction items including black tiger paperweights, Old Sandwich bar glasses and Lodestar nappies.



I want to thank those who donated to the Operating and Endowment funds during January. This is typically one of the slowest months for donations coming right after the holiday season.

The April 2023 Spring Benefit Auction is the 50th anniversary of Heisey auctions! We are looking for a donation of special quality pieces to sell at the auction. Maybe an experimental gold item! Please let the auction team know if you have something you would like to donate.

Cataloging for the 2023 Heisey Spring Benefit and the 2023 Heisey Heritage auctions is finished and the auction team has been feverishly working on publishing the catalog. It should be mailed by the time you read this. It has been mailed to all HCA members as well as non-members who have bid online. It will also be posted on the website. Look for both auctions to be posted to the HiBid website later this month.

We are now asking for consignments for the 2023 Dave Spahr Fall Select Auction. A consignment sheet for possible consideration is included in this edition of Heisey News. Members may consign up to 40 lots. Donations are also welcome and do not count in the 40-lot total. Fill out the list and send it to either royegg54@comcast.net or to Auction@Heiseymuseum.org by **May 5, 2023**.

The Auction Committee will compile a list of all submitted glass and make a decision on what glass will be selected. The auction committee will then inform the consigners, by mail, on what glass has been chosen and when it needs to be at the museum. **Please, do not send any glass to the museum until requested.**

The Auction Committee is seeking large collections of members' Heisey glass to consign long term for sale in our auctions. These can be from estates or general downsizing. If interested, or if you know someone who has items they would like to consign or donate, please contact Roy Eggert at 240-361-8146 or at royegg54@comcast.net.

As the Spring Benefit Auction is in April, we will be needing lots of volunteers to help with many tasks. At about 1 p.m., Wednesday April 12th, we will be transporting tables, glass and other auction materials to the GMP Local 244 Union Hall. We will also be setting up the Holdback area. On Thursday starting about 8:30 a.m. we will be unpacking all the auction glass and putting it on the tables. This is a very labor-intensive process and we will need lots of volunteers. On Friday and Saturday, we need volunteers to be a "Vanna," to show each lot of glass as it is being sold, to help record each lot as it is sold and to work in the holdback area. If you are unsure how to do any of these tasks and would like to help, we can train you! And lastly, when the auction is over, we will need help getting the tables and the online glass back to the museum. I thank everyone in advance for all the help and for supporting your museum.

Many of you don't know the arduous task involved in putting on an auction the size of the Spring Benefit Auction. It takes many long hours cataloging, arranging the catalog layout, double-checking the lot descriptions, loading all the data into the HiBid system, attending the weekly meetings, and I could go on and on. The core team (A team!) that does all this work is simply wonderful to work with. Dedicated to the task and to HCA. I can't thank them enough! Karen Taylo, Mary Ann Spahr, Walter Ludwig and Lisa Baldus.

This year marks 50 years of HCA auctions. A truly great accomplishment for our organization. We have finished cataloging the items for the 2023 Spring HCA auctions. You should have received your catalog by now (it was sent to all HCA members). We will again have two different auctions. On Saturday, April 8 we will have our third semi-annual Heisey Heritage Auction which will be an online only auction using the HiBid platform. On April 14 and 15, we will have the more traditional All-Heisey Spring Benefit Auction which will be both in person and online (HiBid). These auctions represent the full range of production of the A.H. Heisey & Company from its beginnings until the doors closed in 1957. I am sure you will find a treasure or two among the 907 lots being offered. The auction abounds in those old standbys of No. 1503 and 5003 Crystolite, 1540 and 5004 Lariat, 1567 and 5067 Plantation, 507 Orchid etch, 515 Heisey Rose etch, and many examples from Heisey's colonial lines.

A LOOK BACK at HEISEY HISTORY

HEISEY MOULDS COME HOME

By Neila Bredehoft (an encore article from the *Heisey News*, February 2013)



The following timeline article originally appeared in the April 1985 issue of Heisey News. It concludes the exciting chronicle of how the Heisey moulds returned to Newark. As Louise Ream, HCA Executive Director at that time, rightly noted in an article in the May 1985 issue of Heisey News: "This club is at its best when big things are taking place."

February 6, 1985

Bob McClain, Tom Bredehoft, Frank Frye, Sam Schnaidt, and Norm Thran met with Terry Hill of Contour Forming, Inc., owners of the former Heisey factory. They discussed the possibility of renting space for mould storage at the factory. Norm Thran was to find out about renting some space or getting space donated by Owens, who already has a large space rented.

February 11, 1985

Tom Bredehoft took more papers to the bank to clarify our tax-exempt status.

February 12, 1985

A check for the mould fund for \$100 was received from Consolidated.

February 13, 1985

A letter was sent to former employees requesting donations from them. Some donations started to arrive from local business.

February 18, 1985

Betty and Bill Barnard and Neila Bredehoft met George and Eileen Schamel at Imperial to finish sorting etching plates. Consolidated had been getting our moulds ready for shipping. Many pallets were ready to be moved, including many Zodiac moulds. In the afternoon, they found a treasure trove of Heisey paper - original mould drawings of Heisey pieces—some going back into the teens. There were thousands. As many as possible were returned to Newark.

February 20, 1985

Betty and Bill Barnard and Tom and Neila Bredehoft returned to Imperial to get the remainder of the mould drawings (3 large paper cartons) and to sort through Imperial's paper files to get material relating to Heisey. Several original Heisey catalogs were also found and returned to Newark. Tom told Mr. Sklarz that the last payment would be made March 4 and that HCA would begin taking moulds back to Newark that day.

February 22, 1985

Louise Ream and Norm Thran spent the day at Imperial buying animals, many of which were of quite limited production, for HCA. Norm called a meeting at his home that night. Those present were Ray and Delores Ziegler, Betty and Bill Barnard, Louise Ream, Neila Bredehoft, Dick Marsh, Bob and Phyllis McClain, Dick Smith, Liz and Walt Stickle, Norm and Janice Thran and Frank Frye.

Norm announced that the old Heisey factory was not available for lease. Frank Frye indicated he had found another warehouse at a cheaper rate which was closer to the Museum. Frank Frye also said he had found a semi which would be donated for one free trip. Plans were begun for a caravan to bring moulds back March 4.

February 24, 1985

Due to information provided by Sharon Metcalf, Bill and Betty Barnard staffed an informational table at the Stockwell Antique Flea Market in Columbus. Table space was donated by the Stockwells. They displayed moulds, etching plates and drawings. While donations to the mould fund were disappointing, many people showed a lot of interest in the display and in Heisey.

February 27, 1985

Ray Ziegler and Frank Frye inspected the warehouse and a contract was drawn up. Glass began arriving for the auction, donated for the mould fund.

February 26 and 27, 1985

Janice Thran and Liz Stickle began organizing the press coverage and the mould caravan for March 4. They contacted the *Licking Countian* who promised a complete story, WHTH and WCLT (Newark radio stations), Channel 10 News and Channel 4 News (Columbus TV stations). Louise Ream contacted the *Advocate*. Liz and Janice contacted the Licking Township Fire Department and the Newark Police Department about an escort to the Museum. They also contacted Kroger's and Wonder bread for contributions of food for a dinner following the return to Newark. An order for posters for the mould fund was given to a local sign maker.

February 28, 1985

By this date, a total of 15 vans, two cars and the donated semi were available for the caravan Monday.

March 3, 1985,

Liz Stickle began cooking the food for the dinner and arranging to have it ready when all members arrived.

March 4, 1985, —A Memorable Day for HCA!

Early in the morning the following HCA members and other volunteers met at Imperial Glass: George and Eileen Schamel, Bill and Betty Barnard, Norm and Janice Thran, Betty and Burl Whaley, Liz and Walt Stickle, Larry Stickle, Tim and Marty Hughes, Sam Schnaidt, Stan and Mary Holmquist, Mary and Mac McWilliams, Jack and Helen Huber, Buzz and Leota Friel, Louise Ream, Frank Frye, Jim Earnshaw, Jim

Williams, Dick Smith, Helen and Jim Kennon, Ray and Delores Ziegler, Hugo Wenzel, Paul Geidenberger and Tom and Neila Bredehoft. Everett Sklarz had hot coffee and doughnuts ready for us—very welcome. After a small ceremony of handing over the last payment of \$50,000 and a champagne toast, the moulds were loaded on the semi. After the semi was full of moulds and etching plates, all the trucks and vans were loaded. HCA members were all over the Imperial factory looking for anything that conceivably

be related to Heisey so we could return it to Newark. Many people took photos, including Jim Earnshaw who was the official HCA photographer of the day. Louise and Tom were interviewed by the Wheeling TV station and various local radio stations and newspapers. About 12:30 we left Imperial in a prearranged order with huge banners taped to the sides of the semi and all the larger trucks saying “Heisey Moulds Coming Home.” Smaller vans and cars all had blue Diamond H signs in their windows.

After an interminable trip, we were met at Jacksontown by firemen and the vehicles of the Licking Township Fire Department who escorted our long caravan with two of their trucks, lights flashing. As we approached the edge of Newark, one of the trucks returned, and was replaced by two Newark police cruisers. The caravan proceeded through Newark without stopping until it arrived at the museum parking lot. We were met by many people and the press—most of the local newspapers and Channel 10 and Channel 4 News from Columbus. Several members were interviewed and both TV channels had good coverage on the 6 p.m. news. We were all very emotional and quite a few tears were shed and cries of “We did it!” were heard over and over.

The semi went directly to the warehouse and most of the men went to unload it. The remainder came to the lower level of the museum and had a delicious lunch. The rest of the trucks and vans were unloaded by about 7 p.m. There were many tired HCA members that night, but no one complained. We were all thrilled.

March 8 & 9, 1985

The Annual March Auction was held with many pieces of glass donated to be sold for the mould fund. Members had the opportunity to see the photos taken by Jim Earnshaw of the caravan which were on display at Sam's auction house. Members also had the opportunity of seeing some of the moulds at the Museum and some of the etching plates.

March 10, 1985,

Ray Ziegler and George Schamel spent a large part of the day moving moulds and etching plates in the warehouse so more could be stored.

March 11, 1985,

Another two semi-truck loads of moulds arrived in Newark with another two to arrive March 12.

March 14, 1985,

Two loads of moulds have arrived on each day since the 11th. The Greek Key, Peerless and #1401 Empress punch bowls were included. Imagine how much those moulds weigh.

Postscript

By June 1986 over 4,000 moulds were residing in a warehouse in Newark specially purchased by HCA for the purpose and, perhaps more importantly, the mould fund not only reached its goal but went over in raising funds to pay for the moulds.
