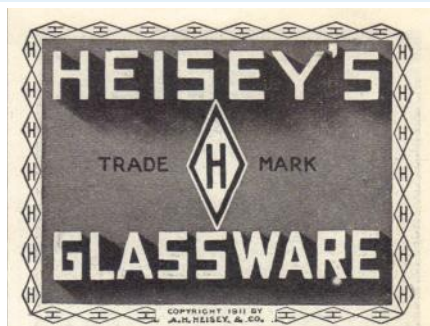

Message From the President



The Colors of Heisey were apparent everywhere you looked during the 2023 National Heisey Convention. From entering the museum gift shop filled to the brim with colorful Heisey glass, to dealer booths overflowing with even more colors, to the banquet napkins in the colors of Heisey, it certainly was a colorful convention! It is always a pleasure to welcome and visit members from across the country who love “our” glass and enjoy each other’s company.



After the Glass Show Premiere Thursday evening, the museum became the venue for a garden party reception. The beautiful flower arrangements that graced the entrances, the welcome desk area, dining room table and bountiful food table were a donation from a longtime member not able to join in the festivities. Tables scattered throughout the museum and courtyard were adorned with blue and white checked tablecloths. Conversation was lively and spirited throughout the evening -nothing unusual for HCA members.

Friday morning boxes of doughnuts and coffee greeted our members to supply nourishment for a long day of activities. The membership meeting began with the election of new board members. Returning board member Martha McGill and two newly elected members, Jim Cooke and James Warren, were sworn in and congratulated at the conclusion of the membership meeting. Certificates of appreciation were presented to outgoing HCA board members Emie Heisey for eight years of service and to Geoff Heisey and Martha McGill for four years of service. The proposed change to the HCA Constitution and Bylaws of the voting membership requirement to be eliminated thus allowing *all* members to vote in HCA elections was defeated.

Study clubs presented yearly club activities reports as well as wonderful donations for both operating and endowment funds. Through the generosity of HCA members and study clubs, the organization, along with prudent oversight, stays financially sound.

With official business concluded, the glass show opened at noon. Educational seminars offered at the glass show by Marilyn Smith, Walter Ludwig and Russ Reopell were well attended. We appreciate their knowledge shared with us on Heisey Cake Salvagers, Moongleam and Flamingo. In lieu of a fourth seminar, Trudy Mock asked and encouraged the 17 table display participants to explain their table displays – the inspiration for the theme they chose, the patterns and pieces of Heisey glass used, and supporting objects integrated to reflect their theme. What a fabulous idea! Thank you, Trudy.

The day ended with the Colors of Heisey Banquet at the neighboring Buckingham House. We were honored to have seven Newark community leaders present as our guests. The colors of Heisey napkins popping from the water goblets on the banquet tables certainly added to the visual effect for the evening festivities. Before dinner Director/Curator Jack Burriss read a lovely tribute to Susan Bruah. Bidding wars started after dinner for the various donated auction items and gift baskets. For the convenience and delight of winning bidders, credit cards were accepted for auction purchases! The evening concluded with the drawing for the winner of the Cobalt Ivy vase. Missouri here it comes. Thank you, Eric Tankesley-Clarke, for purchasing those four tickets! And a huge thank you to Gordon and Darlene Cochran for such a fabulous donation.

Saturday morning’s visit to the Canal Walk saw enthusiastic collectors buying bargains galore and enthusiastic participants at the dime toss. Saturday afternoon show attendees were able to participate in a book signing with Tom Bredehoft, who wrote *Heisey Glass 1896-1957: Identification and Value Guide*. He and his wife Neila have provided Heisey collectors with an indispensable guide. Tom graciously autographed members’ well-used books as well as new copies bought. At the conclusion of the show, it was time to empty the table display voting boxes stuffed with over \$800 and declare the “Trudy’s Tables - Colors of Heisey” table display winners: Addyson Dusenberry and Phil Deetz.

To all the HCA members who participated, volunteered, and contributed to the 2023 Convention, a huge thank you for your loyalty and continued support. Additionally, we cannot forget to acknowledge the museum staff for their contributions in helping with the various tasks of the convention. July Museum Updates



The Buckeye Heisey Study Club annual Dick Marsh Memorial Car Show and how it all got started.

Dick Marsh was a founding member of HCA and the first to donate to the HCA endowment way back when. Not only did he collect and love Heisey, he also collected classic cars. After Dick had passed, members of the Buckeye Club wanted to do something to honor him in a special way. Jim Matheny, who worked with Dick and Ginny Marsh, was a member of the club. Jim was also the largest car show supporter in the county and put on many successful shows including "Lite the Nite" which is the largest car show in Licking County; proceeds pay to light the Licking County Courthouse for Christmas. With Jim's help we organized the first Dick Marsh Memorial car show.

Year one, we had just over 70 cars. Not too shabby for the first time out. The next year we changed the date to align with Percy and Vivian Moore weekend. That show didn't fare as well since October weather just isn't as cooperative as that of late July, so, we went back to the last Sunday in July. Of course, thanks to COVID, we had to cancel 2020 but since then, the show has gained momentum. As of last year, we met and broke our goal of 100 cars. We finished with 102 cars, bikes, and trucks in 2022 and this year, it will be a record breaker again! The car show has become the Buckeye Club's largest fundraising event and creates community around our museum.

The reason this show is so successful and special is simple. We are not only putting on a car show, we are giving our community an event. It's not only the best cars and car owners around, we have music, we have food trucks, we have delicious donated Velvet ice cream that, thanks to Dick and Marilyn Smith, is served up in real Heisey glass! We have 50/50 prizes, door prizes and awards and, we have a beautiful museum open to all, free of charge. It's so much more than "just another car show." Those who come continue to come and they tell us that every year.

A few years ago, our host Jim Matheney passed away as well. He was the heart and soul of the show, so we are now dedicating the show to him and Dick Marsh. Without Jim, I'm not sure this could have happened or would be as great as it has become. James Matheny, Jim's son, said his dad loved this show. It was one of, if not his most favorite show of all. To honor his dad and keep the excitement going, James is continuing on as the show host, and he is doing a fantastic job and bringing the car crowds.

This year, the show will be held July 30 (see Page 5). If you are in town or nearby, be sure to come and share in the fun of this amazing event with us. If you can't make it we will share a recap and be live on Facebook. Our goal is 105 cars and I just know we will beat it! See you on July 30th.

Treasurer's Report by Andy Baldus



Our financial position is still on track with the approved 2023 budget. At our June membership meeting, I presented account balances that are included in the table below.

The preliminary net revenue from this year's convention is \$9,000, which exceeds the budget estimate of \$7,500. Thanks to all for making this a successful event.

I want to recognize and thank study clubs for their generous donations. Study Club donations presented at the convention totaled \$11,713 -- \$3,135 Operating, \$250 for Acquisitions, and \$8,328 for the Endowment Fund. I also want to thank Vicki Ensor for her \$300 contribution to support the membership breakfast, Jim Cooke for his \$5,000 donation to the Endowment, and Apple Tree Auctions for their \$215 mini show donation to the Endowment.

I want to thank and recognize Vicki Ensor (\$1,000), Madison-Collins-Stephens (\$500), and Matesich Distributing Company (\$1,000) for their sponsorship of tables at the banquet. And recognize and thank Mark Caughenbaugh Construction for its \$500 contribution and Bay State Heisey Collectors Club for its \$500 contribution to sponsor the radio broadcast truck.

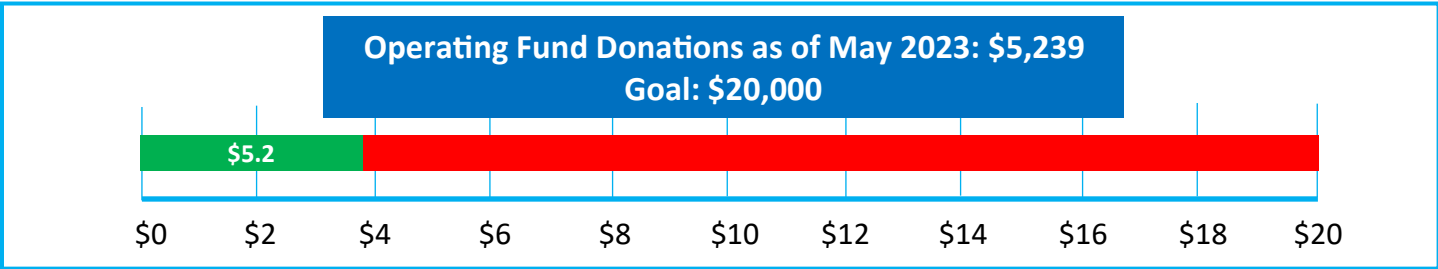

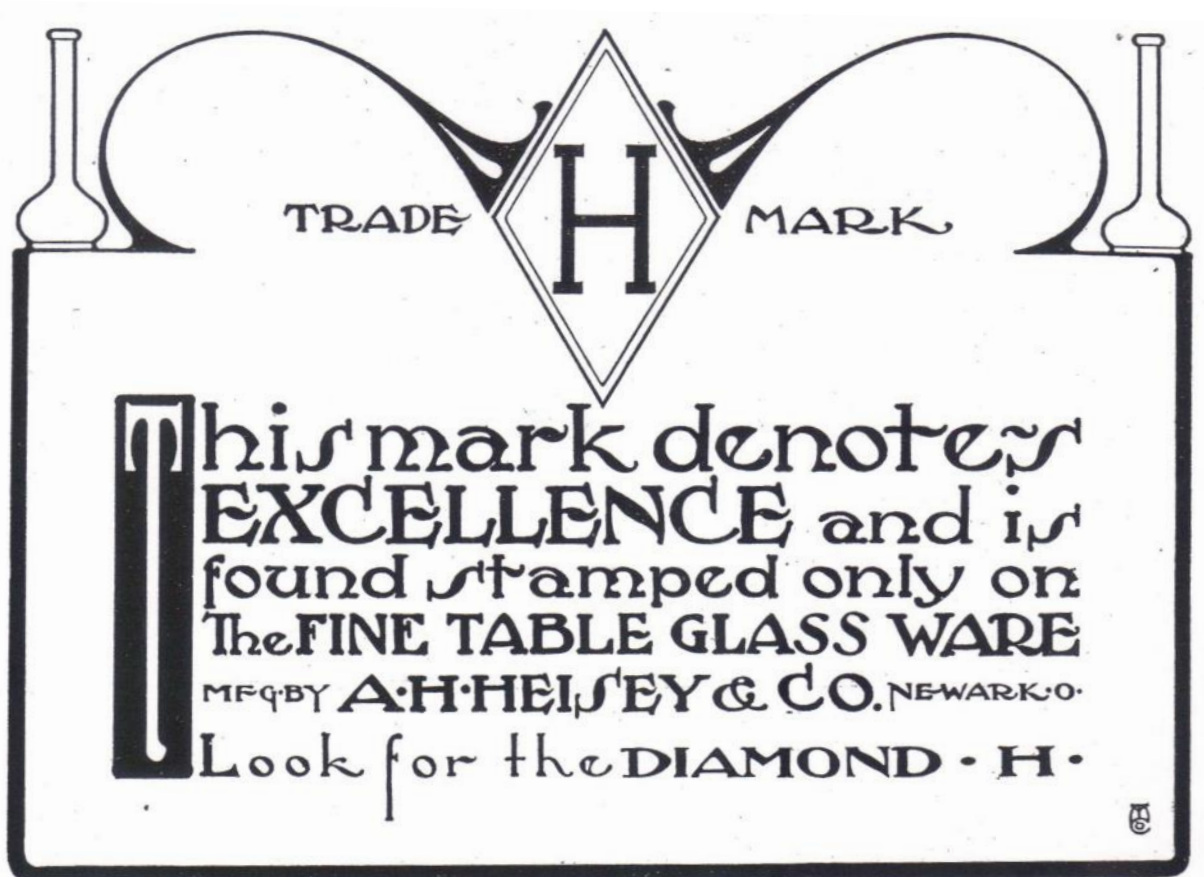

HCA Convention Celebrates the Colors of Heisey

Sparkling Heisey glass served as the both the centerpiece and the backdrop for the 2023 HCA Convention as most events took place under the bright lights of the Lou and Gib Reese Ice Arena June 15 through 17.

The convention officially opened Thursday with the Annual Glass Show and Sale. Many of the 13 individual glass dealers took the *Colors of Heisey* theme to heart in stocking their booths with a wide selection of glass in brilliant colors, some organized by color.

Immediately after the glass show closed for the day, convention goers headed to the museum for a garden party-themed Night at the Museum with appetizers in the library and Board Director Jay Goletz tending bar at the reception desk. It gave members the perfect opportunity to reconnect with old friends, talk with board candidates and stroll through the museum.

Annual Meeting

Friday morning opened with the combined Annual Meeting/Study Club Meeting and election. With the help of an electronic spreadsheet devised by Treasurer Andy Baldus, a team of members worked with Board Director Caleb-Michael Files to enter votes into the spreadsheet, which totaled them automatically. They completed the job in just 45 minutes and returned to hand the official tally printout, signed by all members of the team, to President Suzanne Parker. She read the names of the winners and announced that voters turned down a proposed constitutional amendment that would have eliminated the voting membership category and allowed all members to vote.

Suzanne then administered the oath of office to the winners – Jim Cooke, Martha McGill and James Warren, and presented a certificate of appreciation to Martha for having completed her first four-year term on the board.

Representatives of study clubs then reported on their activities during the year. Highlights included announcements by two clubs – the Dayton Area Heisey Collectors and the Heisey Club of California – that they are celebrating the 50th anniversary of receiving their charters. The Dayton club's anniversary gift to HCA is the completion of a guidebook on Heisey cordials created by their members; it is now available in the gift shop, with all profits going to the museum. The California club announced that it is launching an ambitious \$5,000 for 50 Years fundraising effort. They welcome all Heisey collectors to participate in their raffle of several desirable pieces of Heisey glass. Details will be in an upcoming issue of *Heisey News*.

The newest club, the one-year-old Crystal Clear Virtual Heisey Study Club, announced that it now has 137 members and meets virtually each month for an educational program and a fun feature in which members share which piece of Heisey they are drinking from during the meeting – and sometimes their beverage of choice.

With business completed, President Parker adjourned the meeting and encouraged members to shop the show and attend the seminars.

Table Displays and Seminars

Based on many of the comments overheard at the arena, the unofficial stars of the convention were the ever-popular table displays created by HCA members at the urging of Trudy Mock, chairperson for displays. Visitors to the table display area could be overheard exclaiming over the stunning tables, which captured members' attention immediately as they walked through the door. Many of the 17 tables featured a single color of Heisey glass, several others blended Heisey colors harmoniously.

A new feature this year was a seminar by Trudy using the table displays as teaching tools. She started with Crystal Clear's table, which was divided into pie-shaped wedges, each presenting a number of examples of a different Heisey color. It was accompanied with a large, informational poster with QR codes to help visitors access photos and information about each color using their smartphones.

"This table was just perfect for my seminar because all the information you could want about the colors was right there," said Trudy. "And I want to thank Walter (Ludwig) for jumping in and adding his comments on the colors." The audience enjoyed Walter as well, with one audience member stating, "He knows so much, I could listen to him all day."

Several creators of the table displays took up Trudy's invitation to explain how they developed the theme for their tables. "I really appreciated the displayers who told about why they decorated their table the way they did. It added such a nice personal touch and the audience really enjoyed it. They had so many questions and some came back later to ask more questions".

The displays raised \$836 for HCA as visitors voted for their favorite tables by dropping dollar bills into the collection boxes at each table. Addyson Dusenberry won for the Best Interpretation of the Theme award with a unicorn-themed table using the Empress pattern in Alexandrite and Sahara with accent pieces in Flamingo; ribbons in lavender, pink and yellow; and a sparkly unicorn she had created. “Addyson was our youngest creator this year. She celebrated her birthday during the convention. She was 14 when she started her table, and 15 when she finished it,” said Trudy. “She did a wonderful job!”

Phil Deetz won the award for the Most Original Display with his table titled “Add Sunshine and Sparkle to Your Day with Heisey.” It incorporated a variety of pieces with elaborate cuttings in Sahara and Crystal.

Other convention seminars were “The Heisey Cake Salvagers” by Marilyn Smith, “Moongleam: The Green Supreme” by Walter Ludwig and “Flamingo: 50 Shares of Pink” by Russ Reopell.

Another highlight of the convention this year was the opportunity to meet and chat with Tom Bredehoft, who, together with his late wife Neila, wrote what is no doubt today’s most popular book on Heisey glass, the indispensable *Heisey Glass 1896-1957: Identification and Value Guide*. Thanks to Lisa Baldus for inviting Tom to sign autographs.

During the Friday evening banquet at the Buckingham House, Director/Curator Jack Burriss paid tribute to Susan Bruah, longtime membership and study club associate, who had passed away on Monday. A number of members had attended Susan’s visitation and funeral before the banquet. (See tribute to Susan by Vicki Ensor on page 21.)

The banquet also included lively bidding of donated auction items, including the No. 1 2023 Heisey ornament and the No. 1 2023 Heisey pumpkin. New member and first-time convention attendee Voni Rock of Arizona was the successful bidder on two mystery boxes of glass. She was thrilled with both and hopes to return next year.

People arose early Saturday morning to get the best glass at the popular glass flea market in Newark’s Canal Market District. The ever-popular Dime Toss game attracted many who attempted to toss dimes

A LOOK BACK at HEISEY HISTORY

406, 407, AND 408 COARSE RIB

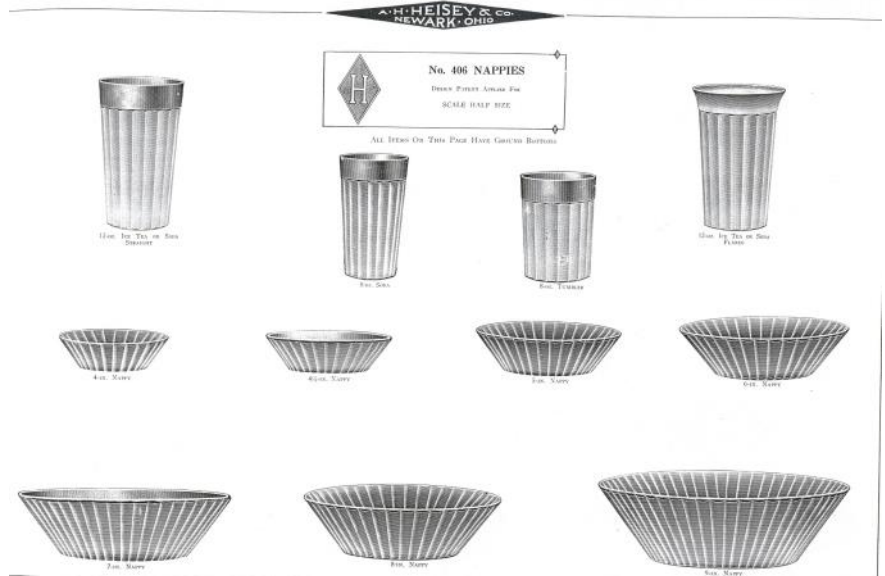

Two new patterns were introduced by A. H. Heisey, and Company at the Glass Exhibition held in Pittsburgh, Pa in Jan. 1923. One of the new lines was pattern No. 407 Coarse Rib (pattern numbers 406 and 408 were used to differentiate certain pieces that were made in different ways, e.g., two different styles of hotel sugars and cream sets or two different styles of tumblers). The factory only referenced the pattern number. The name Coarse Rib was designated later by Vogel, an early Heisey glass researcher. As described in the Jan. 22, 1923, and again in the Jan. 14, 1924 issues of *China, Glass & Lamps*, a complete line of tableware was offered in this new pattern. Thus, production of the Coarse Rib pattern started in 1922.

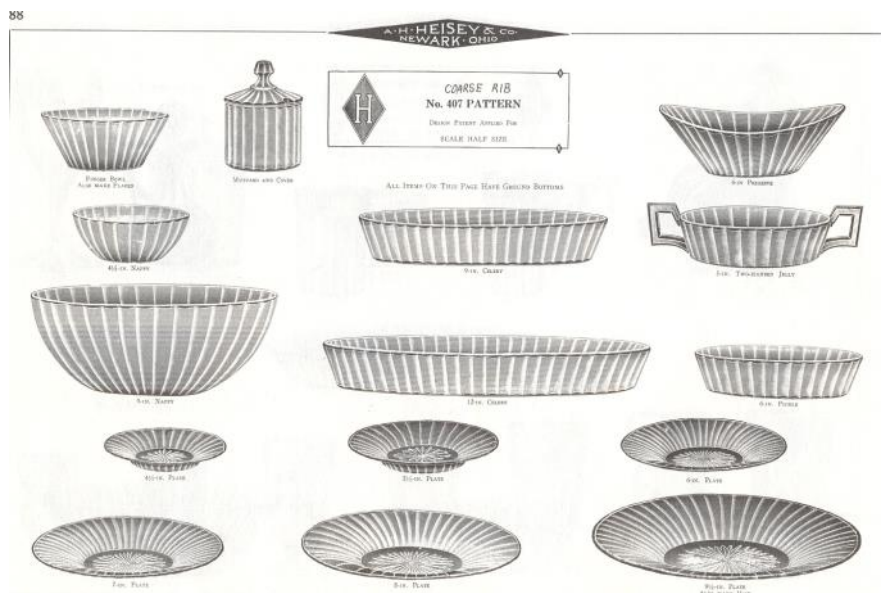
Applications for three design patents for 407 were filed by A. H. Heisey and Company in March 1923. Patent #66,630 for a plate was granted February 17, 1925, patent #66,853 for the round sided nappy was granted March 24, 1925, and patent #72,064 for the high footed jelly or compote was granted February 22, 1927.

The predominant feature of the Coarse Rib design is the rib effect. Each rib has a convex or outward rounded surface, producing a surface design which could best be described as logs placed side by side. The ribs are smaller and not as bold or thick as those found in the 1503 Crystolite pattern which would be produced later by the company. Most of the items in the pattern have ground bottoms.

The rib design carries through to the top edge on just about all the items except those which have a plain band around the top edge. There are two distinct features which differentiate and identify the 406 pieces from the 407 pieces. The 406 pieces have a plain band around the top edge while the same pieces in 407 do not have the band. The nappies in 406 have straight sides while the two nappies in 407 have rounded sides. The only item in the 408 pattern is a half-gallon jug which is identical to the 407-half gallon jug except that an ice lip has been hand tooled into the pouring spout. There was a total of 60 items in the Coarse Rib pattern. Most are shown in Vogel II, pages 87 to 90. There were 13 items in 406, 46 items in 407 and one in 408. There are only three items

for the stemware collector. No toothpick was made (they had gone out of fashion by the time this pattern was produced), but there is an oil bottle or cruet.

Coarse Rib was made in crystal and there are some pieces that were made in Flamingo, Moongleam and Hawthorne. More pieces seemed to be made in Moongleam than in the other colors including plates, 406 nappies, 406 hotel cream and sugar, pickles/celeries, lemon dish, footed jellies and ice tub. Of the pieces made in Moongleam, I have never seen the lemon dish or the high footed jelly in Flamingo. The only pieces I know to be made in Hawthorne were 406 hotel cream and sugar, plates, and the low footed jelly. The pickle, two celeries, and the mustard exist in a marigold stain over crystal. At least one of the jugs has been seen with the same marigold stain and the addition of silver overlay around the top.

The Museum does have a low footed cake salver that was probably made from the low footed bowl mold.

The Coarse Rib pattern did not appear in Heisey Catalog 212, circa 1937 or price lists after that date. Thus, production ended in about 1936, giving the pattern a life of about 15 years.

Coarse Rib is a very interesting pattern with some very unusual pieces. Given its long-life span, I would expect to be able to find a lot more of it available today. But many of these pieces are extremely elusive and are hard to acquire. Be on the lookout for this pattern when you are out shopping for Heisey.

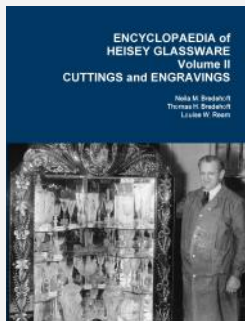

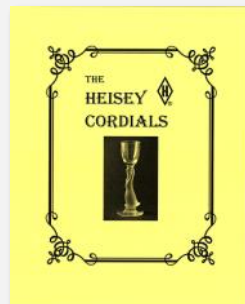
