HCA to involve all in developing strategic plan

After extensive consultation with search firms this past winter, the HCA Board of Directors has chosen **not** to hire a search firm to recruit our new executive director but to promote from within our existing museum staff.

The board appointed Jennifer Miller, our business manager and interim director, and Cheryl Varrasso, our gift shop manager, as co-executive directors effective May 1. They will maintain their current hourly schedule of full-time and halftime, respectively.

Each of the five firms we consulted gathered preliminary information via our website and through other internet searches before engaging in lengthy interviews to better understand our operations, budget, and goals. The free advice from these industry experts proved invaluable. In the end, they made it clear that HCA is not in a position at this time to attract candidates with education and experience in museum leadership.

Four of the five firms recommended that HCA first invest in working with consultants to develop a vision and strategic plan. We believe the assistance of a professional facilitator will likely yield satisfactory results as we involve our members, our museum staff, and our elected board in developing a vision and strategic plan.

In the meantime, the leadership qualities Jennifer and Cheryl have exhibited have given the board confidence in their ability to lead the museum together. This collaborative leadership approach is designed to leverage their unique strengths —Jennifer’s keen insight into business management and Cheryl’s expertise in museum operations and member engagement.

Cheryl came to the museum as a member guest service associate five years ago with extensive retail experience including designing displays, promotions, and hiring and training staff. While raising her family, she volunteered extensively in her children’s schools, organizing the parent-school organization, heading the band boosters, raising funds, and coordinating local and regional creative problem-solving competitions for 20 years. Her excellent work in the gift shop led the board to name her assistant gift shop manager and then gift shop manager.

Jennifer was hired as the museum’s financial coordinator June 2021 and promoted to business manager in December 2021. With the departure of the former executive director last summer, Jennifer was appointed interim director. She earned A.A. and B.A. degrees in art from The Ohio State University. Her major coursework included not only studio art and art history, but also art management and a number of courses in non-profit planning, organizing, managing, and fundraising, as well as courses in business management, administration, and economics. Since completing her degree, she has taken further courses in graphic design, applying design principles, marketing, and business analytics.

Prior to coming to the museum, she worked for Nader’s Insurance Agency in Newark, where she reorganized the company’s database, created office procedures, and managed the front office.

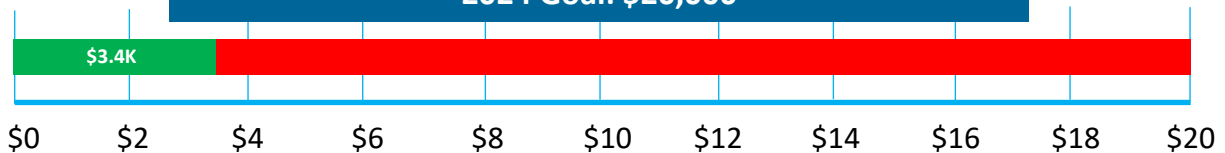

HCA Membership Meeting 2024 Highlights

HCA Membership Meeting Focused on June Election

The upcoming election was the highlight of the first HCA Membership Meeting of 2024, held April 13 immediately prior to the start of the second day of the Spring Benefit Auction at the GMP Local 244 Union Hall in Newark.

Three seats on the HCA Board of Directors will be open in June when Bari Fauss, Jay Goletz and Suzanne Parker complete their four-year terms of office. On behalf of the Nominating Committee, President Suzanne Parker announced the slate of candidates for the Board of Directors: Mary Cameron*, Jay Goletz, who is running for a second term, and David Malick. HCA member Elizabeth Shirley nominated Bari Fauss, who accepted the nomination to run for a second term.

Martha McGill, chair of the Bylaws Committee, reviewed two proposed amendments. The first would eliminate the voting membership category, thus making all HCA members eligible to vote in HCA elections going forward. This motion had been presented to members last year. Though 57% had voted in favor, it did not meet the two-thirds threshold necessary for approval. Since the majority of voters favored the proposal, the Bylaws Committee and the board agreed it should be presented again for a vote. (See page 7).

The second proposal would reform personnel management practices by allocating responsibilities between the board and the director in a manner more consistent with modern business practices. The board would retain the responsibility of hiring and firing the director, determining the number of staff positions, and setting compensation. The director would be given the authority to hire and fire staff and to revise work assignments as necessary to operate the museum efficiently. (See page 10).

The board sent a third proposal back to the Bylaws Committee for further work. It would have given flexibility for the board to range in size from nine to 12 members. This was part of a larger proposal under development that included reducing board terms from four to three years and increasing the number of required board meetings from four to six each year. Martha emphasized that the proposal was **not** rejected; because these changes are significant, the board felt they should not be made in haste.

President Parker also announced that HCA has had thoughtful and fruitful discussions with several search firms regarding a search for a new executive director to lead the museum. All firms consulted gave a consistent message – before launching a search, HCA needs to make internal improvements, such as developing a strategic plan and vision. “The board is exploring a reorganization of our current staff to meet our needs as we develop our strategic plan and vision,” said Suzanne. Members can expect additional communication shortly.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

The HCA Board of Directors proposes two amendments to the HCA Constitution and/or Bylaws.

The first amendment proposal would eliminate the voting membership category, thus allowing all HCA members the opportunity to vote in HCA elections. (See more information in Membership Meeting article on this page (above.) Because this amendment would modify the constitution, a two-thirds majority vote in favor is required for this proposal to pass.

The second amendment proposal would reform personnel management practices by allocating responsibilities between the board and the director in a manner more consistent with modern business practices. This amendment would impact the bylaws, so only a simple majority is required for passage.

All voting members are eligible to vote on these proposals in the June election during the Annual Meeting. For those unable to vote in person, absentee ballots are available by contacting the museum: Membership@HeiseyMuseum.org or 740-345-2932.

PROPOSAL #1: VOTING MEMBERSHIP

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1 There shall be ~~three kinds~~ **two categories** of membership, namely:
~~Voting~~
Associate Members
Honorary

Section 2 ~~3~~ Associate Membership

Any person, upon payment of the prescribed dues, may become ~~an associate~~ **a** member of this organization. ~~Associate m~~ **Members are not permitted to vote or hold elective office, and they shall have no interest in any funds or property of the organization.**

Section 3 ~~4~~ Honorary Membership

Any person who has distinguished himself in an unusual and praiseworthy manner in promoting the objectives of this organization may be elected to honorary membership. Honorary members shall have the privilege of attending all meetings of the organization, but shall not be required to pay dues or initiation fees, or be permitted to vote or hold elective office, and they shall have no interest in any funds or property of the organization.

Section 4 ~~2~~ Voting Membership **by Chartered Study Clubs**

~~Any adult, age 18 or over, upon payment of the prescribed initiation fee and yearly dues, is eligible to become a voting member of this organization. Other qualifications shall be as stated in the Bylaws.~~

A study group (charter club) that fulfills requirements as set forth in the Bylaws is eligible to cast one vote in this organization by a member of that club who is of legal voting age. (approved 3/12/83)

Section 5 No territorial limits shall be established for the organization and membership is open to all interested persons.

ARTICLE VI

Board of Directors

Section 1 The Board of Directors shall consist of twelve (12) (approved 6/17/05) director selected by the ~~voting~~ members of the organization. Terms of office are to be as provided in the bylaws. (Note: See Bylaws Art. VII Sec.4)

Section 2 The Board of Directors shall be the governing body of the organization and shall have power to make such regulation and take such action, not inconsistent with the Constitution and Bylaws as, in its judgment, may be necessary for the welfare of the organization. The decisions of the Board in all organization matters shall be final, subject only to the appeal to the ~~voting~~ membership of the organization.

ARTICLE VIII

Surrender of Charter

Section 1 If this organization deems it desirable, by unanimous vote of the active ~~voting~~ membership, to terminate operation of this organization, all assets, records and monies shall be turned over to the Licking County Historical Society and that such shall be used for the study and preservation of Heisey glass and other such ancillary uses of the property as may be deemed necessary. In the event the Licking County Historical Society has been dissolved then such shall be turned over to the Ohio State Historical Society for the same purpose therein stated. (approved 12/15/73)

ARTICLE IX

Amendment of Constitution

Section 1 This Constitution may be amended only after recommendation by the Board of Directors and by a two-thirds vote cast of the ~~voting~~ members, voting at any meeting of the organization or as provided for in the Bylaws for absentee voting, provided written notice of such proposed amendment shall have been given to members at least ten days prior to the meeting at which the issue for amendment of the Constitution or Bylaws shall come up. (approved 3/11/95)

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

Meetings

Section 4 Quorum

The majority of ~~voting~~ members present shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the membership. (approved 3/11/95)

ARTICLE VII

Election of Directors

Section 1

- (a) The Directors of the organization shall be elected at the annual meeting each year.
- (b) At the second regular meeting of the calendar year, the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of at least three members: the chairman shall be the immediate past President, then a ~~voting~~ member of the organization. If the immediate past President cannot serve, the chairman shall be another member of the Executive Committee, exclusive of the President. (approved 6/17/2011)
- (c) The Nominating Committee shall prepare a report giving the number of directors to be elected and one or more members for each vacancy.
- (d) After the report of the Nominating Committee at the first regular meeting of the calendar year and upon motion of any ~~voting~~ member, any name or names of candidates for Director shall be placed upon the ballot to be voted upon by the organization. (approved 3/11/95)
- (e) The consent of each nominee must be obtained prior to his or her nomination. (approved 3/11/95)
- (f) At the annual meeting there shall be furnished to the ~~voting~~ members a ballot containing the names of the nominees for Directors, upon which each ~~voting~~ member shall indicate his or her choices. If the number of nominees equals the number of Director vacancies, the ballot voting shall be deemed unnecessary if approved by the majority of the ~~voting~~ members present. (approved 6/17/2011)
- (g) In lieu of obtaining a ballot at the annual meeting, a ~~voting~~ member may obtain a ballot by applying to the secretary in advance of the annual meeting and may cast said ballot by returning it immediately to the secretary. (approved 3/11/95)

Section 2 Balloting

The nominees receiving the largest number of votes so cast shall be declared elected for the term of office beginning immediately following the annual meeting. The presiding officer shall abstain from voting except to break a tie vote. (approved 6/21/81)

Section 3 Election of Officers

Officers shall be elected as provided in Article V of the Constitution. (approved 3/17/73)

Section 4

The Board of Directors shall consist of 12 (approved 6/17/05) members elected from the roll of the ~~voting~~ members. (approved 3/11/95) The term of office shall be for four years. The number of consecutive four-year terms that a member may be elected to the Board of Directors shall be limited to two. (approved 6/20/82). To provide for the continuity of operation, three persons shall be elected each year. (approved 6/17/2011).

BYLAWS continued

ARTICLE VIII

Initiation Fees and Dues

~~Section 1 The Initiation Fee for voting membership in the organization shall be \$ 25.00 and shall be paid before the candidate can qualify as a voting member. Membership dues shall be as determined by the Board of Directors. (approved 3/11/95)~~

Section ~~1~~ ~~2~~ Associate Membership Dues

Membership dues shall be determined by the Board of Directors which shall include subscription to the organization newsletter and all rights and privileges as provided in the Constitution. Each additional household member is eligible to become a ~~a~~ associate member upon payment of prescribed dues per year. (approved 3/11/95)

Section ~~3~~ ~~2~~ Study group (charter club)

The requirements to establish and maintain a Study group (charter club) are:

- (a) All members must be ~~voting or associate~~ members of H.C.A.
- (b) Payment of a one-time \$25.00 fee
- (c) Annually submit a membership list to the Secretary of H.C.A. by May first
- (d) Have at least eight (8) members. (approved 3/12/83)
- (e) Written bylaws approved by HCA Board of Directors (approved 6/17/10)

Section ~~4~~ ~~3~~ All dues shall be payable when billed by the Treasurer. No person shall be deemed a member who is in arrears more than thirty (30) days in the payment of his or her dues. (approved 3/11/95)

ARTICLE XI

Amendment of Bylaws and Constitution

Section 1 The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the ~~voting~~ members present and voting at any regular meeting of the organization or as provided for absentee voting herein, after recommendation of the Board of Directors, or by any twelve ~~voting~~ members, provided written notice of such proposed amendments shall have been given to all ~~voting~~ members at least ten days prior to the meeting. The Bylaws may be amended by a majority vote of the ~~voting~~ members present and voting at any regular meeting of the organization, or as provided for absentee voting herein, after recommendation of the Board of Directors, or by any twelve ~~voting~~ members, provided written notice of such proposed amendments shall have been given to all ~~voting~~ members at least ten days prior to the meeting. With such written notice shall be sent a copy of proposed change or changes and a form to be returned to the Secretary, which form shall provide the opportunity to ~~voting~~ members to indicate approval or disapproval of each recommended change; which form, to be counted, must be received by the Secretary c/o the Museum at least three days prior to the scheduled meeting at which the vote on the recommended change or changes is to occur. (approved 3/11/95)

No amendments or additions to these Bylaws shall be made which are not in conformity with the organization Constitution.



PROPOSAL #2: REFORM PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT

PRESENT:

ARTICLE IV

Paid Employees and Staff

Section 1 Paid Employees

The Executive Committee shall have authority to seek out, interview or examine and recommend to the Board of Directors persons to serve as paid employees in capacities as from time to time become necessary.

Such employees shall be hired and their intended compensation set by a two-thirds vote by the Board of Directors at a meeting wherein a quorum is present. (approved 3/11/95)

The compensation of such employees shall be reviewed by the Executive Committee from time to time and any changes recommended to the Board of Directors who shall pass upon such changes by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors at a meeting wherein a quorum is present.

Such employees may be terminated by the Board of Directors by a two-thirds vote of said Board of Directors at a meeting wherein a quorum is present. (approved 3/11/95)

ABOVE ARTICLE IV TO BE REPEALED AND REPLACED BY:

PROPOSED:

ARTICLE IV

Organization Staff

Section 1. The Board of Directors may employ a paid Executive Director or co-Executive Directors, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Board. The hiring and, if necessary, the firing of the Executive Director(s) must be approved by a two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote of the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Director(s) shall be responsible for the day-to-day management of the organization and the museum, in compliance with the Constitution, these Bylaws, the policies and procedures and job descriptions approved by the Board, and the applicable law.

Section 3. The Board, in consultation with the Executive Director(s), shall approve the creation of and reorganization of the staff positions, and job descriptions for, any additional staff positions deemed necessary for the proper operation of the organization and the museum. The Executive Director(s) shall have the authority to hire and fire staff employees without the prior approval of the Board.

Section 4. The Board shall set the compensation for each staff position, including the Executive Director(s). The Board, in consultation with the Executive Director(s), shall review the compensation for each staff position at least once annually. The Board of Directors will perform an annual review of the Executive Director(s) prior to contract renewal or compensation review.



Research and Archives Committee Report



The current HCA Research and Archives Committee was constituted in July 2023 with three members: Mary Cameron, Eric Tankesley-Clarke and David Malick. The committee began meeting in August to create mission and vision statements to guide the work of the committee, as well as set long and short term goals and document issues requiring work and resolution.

Mission

The mission of the Research and Archives Committee is to preserve Heisey archives using professional archival processes and digitization in order to make the materials available to HCA membership, researchers and the general public to stimulate interest and research in Heisey glassware and its important place in the history of American hand-made glassware.

Vision

- Access to digitized materials will generally be determined by following the precedent set by A.H. Heisey & Co. Materials that were made public by Heisey (e.g. advertisements, brochures, patents, price lists, catalogs, etc.) should be made available to HCA membership and the general public via deployment to the HCA website.
- Non-public materials will be made available to researchers via an on-request process similar to what is described in the current HCA Archives Policy. Some of these materials may be deployed to HCA membership in the members-only area of the HCA website (e.g. turn books) as a benefit of membership.
- Digitization will be accomplished by a combination of flat-bed scanning and photography depending on the size and condition of the originals. Standards, equipment and personnel necessary to digitize the archives will be documented by the committee.
- The committee will determine storage, back-up and deployment processes in conjunction with HCA to preserve and enable access to digitized materials.
- Digitization and deployment processes will be executed in stages in order to realize immediate results and ensure that the work is actually started and eventually completed.
- When digitization is successfully completed, the need to access originals in the archive will be rare.



Accomplishments

- In November we completed documenting a high-level inventory of the materials in the archives to better understand the contents and enable access as needed until all materials are digitized. The detailed inventory will be completed in stages as materials are scanned.
- We created a scanning job aid to document best practices for flatbed scanning and arranged for the donation of a laptop computer and large format and standard format flatbed scanners to enable onsite scanning. This equipment has been delivered and set up in the archives office and includes the necessary software to scan items.
- We gathered and identified 34 rolls of microfilm and 143 sheets of microfiche of archive materials that were filmed by the Corning Glass Museum for HCA between 1984 and 1992. We obtained quotes to convert them to digital image files that can be converted to PDFs for deployment to the HCA website. A vendor was selected and the work is nearing completion. The materials contain 74 large format books, including turn books and cash ledgers as well as approximately 99 other publications and collections of documents.
- During two one-week working visits to the archives, we scanned nine boxes of original photographs as well as numerous advertisements, brochures, and other publications.



Future goals include sorting and identifying the original Heisey advertisements in a more logical chronological fashion; participating in the update of the HCA Archives Policy; and continuing scanning and deploying digitized materials to the HCA website once it has been migrated and updated.

Meet the Candidates

Bari Fauss

I bought my first piece of Heisey about 40 years ago. I grew up surrounded by Heisey because both my parents loved it, and they passed that love on to me. Some of my favorite childhood memories are of Mom and Dad finding a piece of Heisey while antiquing and their enthusiasm for collecting such beautiful glass. I started attending the annual convention with my mom back in the 1990s and I look back fondly on those days and wish she were still here to continue attending with me.

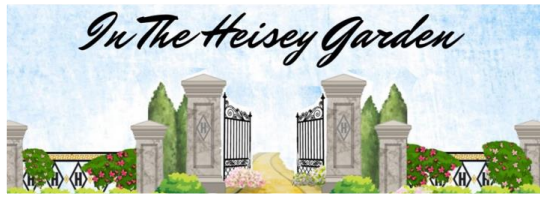
- Heisey Design Patents

Heisey Candlesticks, Candelabra, and Lamps comes out soon in a brand-new, revised and expanded third edition; a pre-order form is available at the bottom of this page. More than just a reprint, the third edition has the same look and feel of the previous editions and most of the excellent content from them remains intact. Now I hear you asking, "If that's the case, what's *really* new about this edition?"

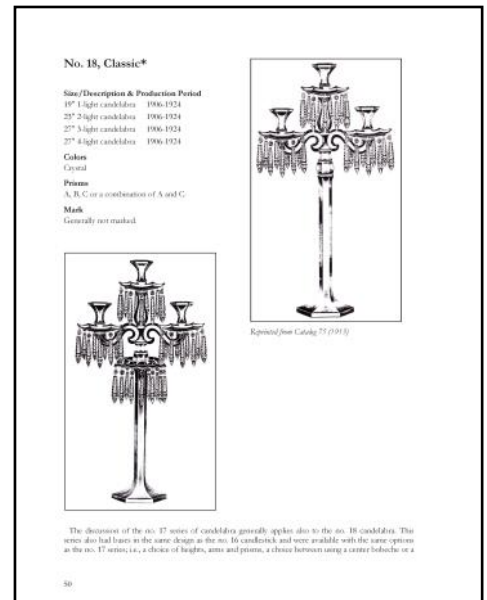
The third edition adds around 30 items, most of them never before published anywhere. This includes not only the titular candlesticks, candelabra and lamps, but also bobeches, prisms, epergnettes and other parts. In addition, variations of well-known pieces make their first appearances in the book. Certain other items that were mentioned previously only in passing are now included with their own full-scale entries. This is especially true for several lamps. Nearly 50 new images are included in the new book, including drawings from the archives never published until now.

What about revisions? It was 1984 when Tom Felt, Bob O'Grady, and Jack Metcalf concluded their stellar work on the first edition. The result, with its scholarship and clarity, set a high standard among glass reference books. Forty years have passed, however, and new information has been uncovered. Most significantly, Imperial closed during that time. Original Heisey factory documentation came to the museum archives that was not available to Tom Felt when he did his

initial research. The upside to that is my own research led to the thrill of discovery with gratifying frequency—a fancy way of saying I was excited to find a lot of new things. In the meantime, longtime Heisey admirers came forward with tantalizing tips and stories that yielded book-worthy finds. Even Tom Felt himself offered a trove of images, several of which found their way into the new edition.

With all that in hand, over the past year I reviewed the entire candlestick book from front to back, page by page, line by line, updating and adding information as I went. Time constraints and technical hurdles, those twin beasts of nearly every project, menaced progress, but they were overcome in the end, thanks to the support of the Education Committee and the museum. There are many individuals who should be acknowledged, and I have mentioned them in the foreword to the third edition. I guess if you want to know who they are, you'll just have to buy the book.
