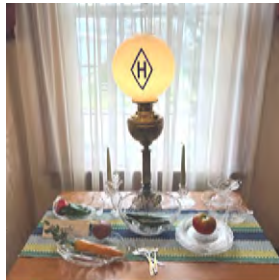

Dear Heisey Collectors of America Members,



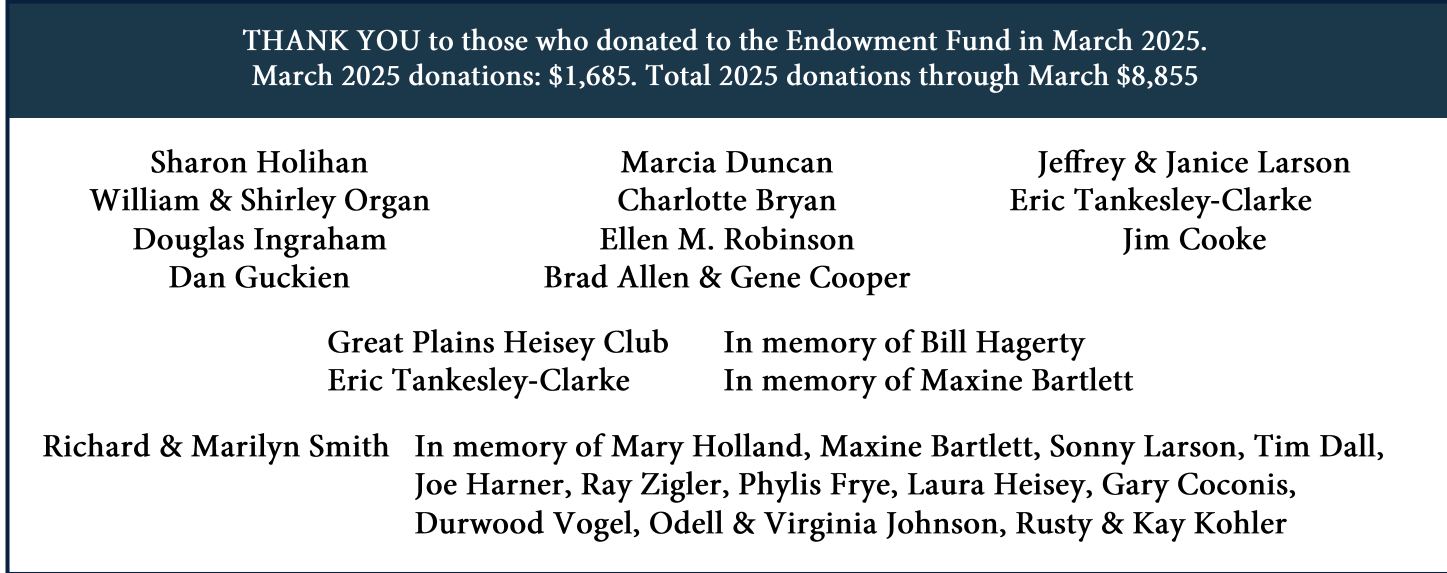
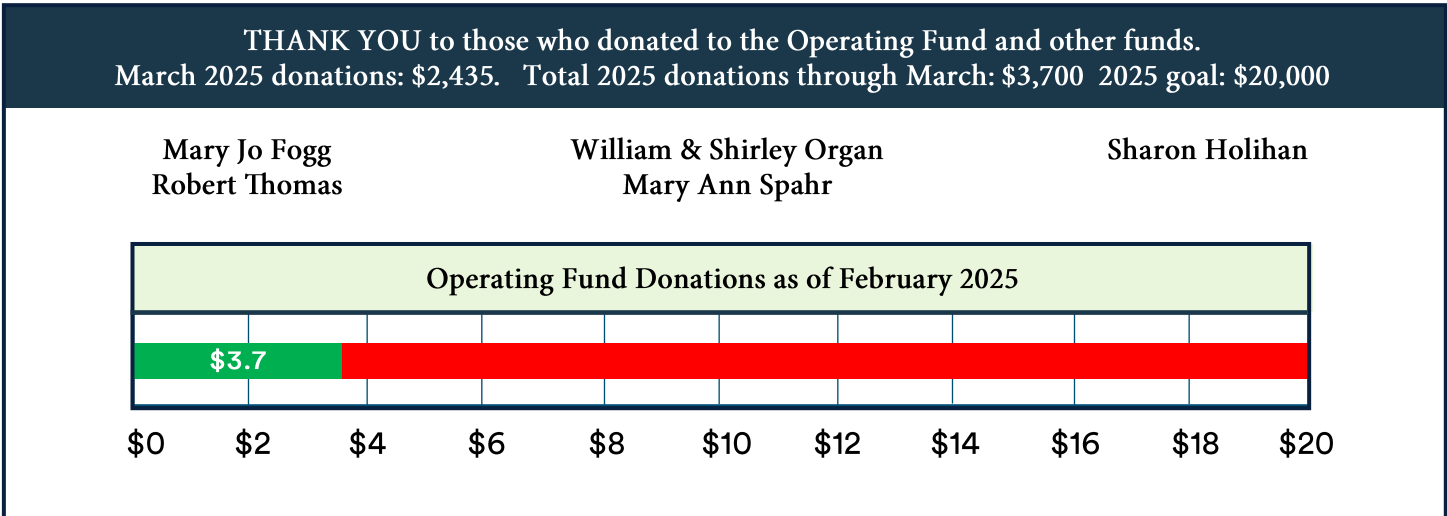
Treasurer's Report by Caleb-Michael Files

HCA Membership Meeting 2025 Highlights

Election of New Board Members

The upcoming election was the highlight of the first HCA Membership Meeting of 2025, held April 12 immediately prior to the start of the second day of the Spring Benefit Auction at the GMP Local 244 Union Hall in Newark.

Three seats on the HCA Board of Directors will be open in June when Caleb-Michael Files, Andy Baldus, and Frachele Scott complete their four-year terms of office. On behalf of the Nominating Committee, President David Blair announced the slate of candidates for the Board of Directors: Bucky Will, Caleb-Michael Files, and Andy Baldus. The latter two candidates are running for second terms.

Auction Committee Recognition

President Blair made a presentation of certificates of appreciation to the members of the Auction Committee who are departing the committee effective July 1, 2025. Roy Eggert has worked on HCA auctions for 14 years, serving as Auction Firm Manager for the last eight years. Mary Ann Spahr has volunteered on auctions for 21 years and Karen Taylo for 20 years. All three are long-time members of HCA and have served on the board of directors and as officers of HCA. He thanked them for their many years of dedication and hard work which have produced an enduring legacy.

Updated HCA Constitution and Bylaws

Andy Baldus presented the updated HCA Constitution and Bylaws on behalf of Martha McGill, chair of the Bylaws Committee, who was unable to attend the membership meeting. These documents have been revised to:

- Reorganize the constitution and bylaws, which had become a patchwork because of numerous amendments over the years;
- Correct inconsistencies between the constitution and bylaws and internal inconsistencies within the bylaws;
- Rewrite some provisions for clarity and to eliminate legalese, without changes in the substance of those provisions;
- Add new provisions and revise existing provisions to recognize the use of technology such as email and online meetings;
- Add new provisions to address real-life situations that have occurred in recent years (for example, during the Covid pandemic);
- Establish uniform procedures for voting on both the election of directors and amendments to the constitution and bylaws; and
- Make it easier to vote absentee while retaining the option of in-person voting.

This work of the Bylaws Committee was guided by the principle that this is a “fix the bylaws” project and not a “fix HCA” project. In recent years, members have advocated for some structural changes in HCA, which have not been adopted to date. The revised constitution and bylaws do not include these changes. This does not reflect a judgment by the Bylaws Committee or the Board of Directors on the merits of these changes. They simply aren’t part of this “housekeeping” project.

The revised HCA Constitution and Bylaws reflect significant input from members who provided suggestions for improvement via email and during one or more of three virtual feedback sessions. In addition, several study clubs provided extremely valuable input on the first published draft of the proposed documents.

The final draft was reviewed and approved by the HCA Board of Directors during its meeting on April 10 and the full text of the documents follows on pages 7 through 16. The final drafts and the updated side-by-side comparisons with the existing documents are available on the Heisey Glass Museum website.

All voting members are eligible to vote for candidates to fill the open board positions and on the revised Constitution and Bylaws in the June election during the Annual Meeting. CONSTITUTION OF HEISEY COLLECTORS OF AMERICA, INC. [PROPOSED]

Article I—Name

Section 1. The name of this organization is Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., a nonprofit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Ohio. The organization’s principal office is located in Newark, Licking County, Ohio.

Article II—Purpose

Section 1. This corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, educational and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code.

Section 2. The purpose of the organization is to collect, preserve, and exhibit glassware made by A.H. Heisey & Company and related items, to promote the preservation and collection of Heisey glassware and related items, and to educate the public about the history, craftsmanship, and cultural significance of Heisey glass by, among other things, the establishment and maintenance of a museum for the display and study of Heisey glass and related items and the establishment of chartered study clubs.

Article III—Board of Directors

Section 1. The board of directors is the governing body of the organization. Subject to the provisions of the laws of the State of Ohio and any limitations in the articles of incorporation and this constitution and the organization’s bylaws relating to actions required or permitted to be taken or approved by the members of the organization, the activities and affairs of this organization shall be conducted and all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the direction of the board of directors. Decisions of the board of directors shall be final, except that members of the organization shall have the right to seek reconsideration by the board.

Section 2. Directors shall carry out their responsibilities, including those on any committee they serve on, in good faith and with the belief that their actions are in or not contrary to the best interests of the organization. Directors shall exercise the same level of care that a reasonably prudent person in a similar position would use under comparable circumstances. Directors serving on committees are considered to be fulfilling their duties as directors.

Section 3. The number and terms of office of the directors shall be as provided in the bylaws.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1. The organization shall have the following officers: President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The officers shall be elected as provided in the bylaws. The terms of office and duties of the officers shall be as provided in the bylaws.

Article V—Membership

Section 1. The organization shall have members. Membership in the organization shall be open to any individual, organization, or institution interested in supporting the organization’s mission.

Section 2. The classes of membership shall be as follows:

- (a) Voting members
- (b) Associate members

- (c) Distinguished members
- (d) Honorary members

Section 3. The qualifications for, and rights and privileges of, each class of membership shall be as provided in the bylaws.

Article VI—Meetings of the Membership

Section 1. Regular and special meetings of the membership shall be held as provided in the bylaws.

Article VII—Study Clubs

Section 1. The organization shall issue a charter to any study club that meets the requirements specified in the bylaws.

Article VIII—Bylaws

Section 1. The organization may adopt bylaws that are consistent with this constitution. In the event of any inconsistency between the bylaws and this constitution, the provisions of the constitution will govern. Any provision of or amendment to the bylaws that is inconsistent with this constitution shall have no force or effect.

Article IX—Amendment of Constitution

Section 1. This constitution may be amended only after a recommendation of the board of directors, followed by a vote of the voting members and study clubs that are qualified to vote as provided in the bylaws.

Section 2. Written notice of the proposed amendment shall be given to all voting members and qualified study clubs at least ten (10) calendar days before the mailing of ballots. Such written notice shall include the text of the proposed amendment or amendments and may be given by publication in the official newsletter of the organization, by electronic communication, by United States Mail, or by any or all of these methods.

Section 3. Proposed amendments may be voted on at any regular meeting of the membership. Any amendment to this constitution must be approved by a two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) majority of the votes cast on the proposed amendment. Except as otherwise provided in this Article, the vote on any proposed amendment to this constitution shall be conducted in the manner provided in the bylaws for proposed amendments to the bylaws.

If a proposed amendment requires amendments to both the constitution and the bylaws, a two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) majority of the votes cast is required for passage.

Section 4. If competing amendments are submitted to a vote of the membership and both receive sufficient votes for passage, the amendment receiving the greater number of votes shall be adopted. In the event of a tie vote, both proposed amendments shall fail.

Article X—Dissolution of Corporation

Section 1. The organization may be dissolved voluntarily in the manner provided in the Ohio Nonprofit Corporation Law, Ohio Revised Statutes section 1702.47, and any other applicable laws, except that a two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) majority of the votes cast shall be required for adoption of a resolution of dissolution.

Section 2. Upon dissolution of the organization, all of its assets, records, and monies shall be turned over to the Licking County Historical Society to be used for the study and preservation of Heisey glass and other such ancillary uses of the property as may be deemed necessary. If the Licking County Historical Society has been dissolved, then such property shall be turned over to the Ohio History Connection to be used for the same purpose.

**BYLAWS OF
HEISEY COLLECTORS OF AMERICA, INC.
[PROPOSED]**

Article I—Board of Directors

Section 1. The board of directors shall consist of twelve (12) directors elected by the voting members of the organization. Only voting members as defined in Article IV, Section 2, shall be eligible to serve on the board of directors. The term of office shall be four (4) years. The number of consecutive four-year terms that a member may be elected to the board of directors shall be limited to two. Terms of office shall be staggered so that three directors are elected each year.

Section 2. Vacancies on the board of directors shall exist (1) on the death, resignation, or removal of any director, and (2) whenever the number of authorized directors is increased.

Any director may resign effective upon giving written notice to the president, the secretary, or the board of directors, unless the notice specifies a later time for the effectiveness of such resignation. No director may resign if the corporation would then be left without a duly elected director or directors in charge of its affairs.

In the event of a vacancy, the board of directors, by a majority vote, may appoint a voting member of the organization to fill the vacant position. If the number of directors then in office is less than a quorum, a vacancy on the board may be filled by approval of a majority of the directors then in office or by a sole remaining director. A person appointed to fill a vacancy on the board shall hold office for the remaining term of the director he or she is replacing or until his or her death, resignation, or removal from office.

Section 3. All members of the board of directors shall serve without compensation.

Section 4. Regular meetings of the board of directors will be held at least four times per year.

Special meetings may be called by the president or pursuant to a written request from three or more board members. A written request includes an electronic communication. Special meetings shall be called to address specified matters, and only those matters shall be considered during the meeting. When calling a special meeting, the president shall inform board members of the matters to be considered and the estimated length of the meeting. In the event the meeting lasts longer than the estimated time, the Sergeant at Arms shall determine whether the meeting may continue.

Meetings of the board of directors may be held at the organization's principal office, or at any other place designated by the president, or by use of authorized communications equipment as defined in Ohio Revised Code section 1702.01, subdivision (Q).

Notice of the place, if any, and time of each regular or special meeting of the board of directors shall be given to each director either by personal delivery or by mail, by overnight delivery service, or by means of authorized communications equipment at least two days before the meeting.

Except as otherwise provided by the organization's constitution and bylaws or the applicable law, parliamentary procedure in the conduct of meetings of the board of directors shall be in accordance with the latest revised edition of *Robert's Rules of Order*.

Section 5. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the authorized number of directors. When filling a vacancy on the board, a quorum shall consist of the majority of directors in office.

Section 6. Actions that would normally require a board meeting can also be approved without a meeting if all directors give their written consent. If a director votes on a proposed action, it counts as their consent to handle the matter without holding a meeting. Additionally, any vote or consent sent through authorized communication equipment, including but not limited to electronic mail, counts as written consent for this purpose.

Section 7. Unless excused by the president (or the vice president in the case of the absence of the president), each member of the board of directors shall attend 75% of all regular board meetings during any given operational year. If a member fails to attend the required number of regular board meetings, the board of directors may declare his or her position vacant by a two-thirds vote of the members of the board present. An operational year shall begin with the first regular board meeting after the annual meeting.

Section 8. The board of directors will review and address any grievances, defaults, or complaints involving a board member. The board has the authority to take appropriate action, including imposing sanctions, against the director. The board may remove a director from office or impose a lesser sanction, such as suspension from office, a formal censure, or any other sanction the board deems appropriate. Before any action is taken, the director shall be given notice and an opportunity to respond. The board can remove a member or impose a lesser sanction with a two-thirds vote of the directors present at the meeting.

Section 9. The directors shall not be personally liable for the debts, liabilities, or other obligations of the corporation.

Section 10. The directors and officers of the corporation shall be indemnified by the corporation for their acts and/or omissions in their capacity as an officer and/or director to the fullest extent permissible under the laws of the State of Ohio.

Article II—Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be elected from and by the board of directors. All officers shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The election of officers shall take place at a special meeting of the board of directors, to be held no more than fourteen (14) calendar days after the annual meeting. Immediately upon taking office, the president shall appoint a sergeant-at-arms. It shall be the duty of the sergeant-at-arms to preserve order at all times and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to this office.

Section 2. Duties of the President. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization and the board of directors. He or she shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to such office and such other duties as may be required by law, by the articles of incorporation, or by the organization's constitution and bylaws, or which may be prescribed from time to time by the board of directors. Except as otherwise expressly provided by law, by the articles of incorporation, or by the organization's constitution and bylaws, he or she shall, in the name of the organization, execute or direct the execution of such deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments that may from time to time be authorized by the board of directors.

The number of consecutive years a director may be elected to the office of president shall be limited to three.

Section 3. Duties of the Vice President. In the absence of the president, or in the event of his or her inability or refusal to act, the vice president shall perform all the duties of the president, and when so acting shall have all the powers of, and be subject to all the restrictions on, the president. The vice president shall have other powers and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by law, by the articles of incorporation, or by the organization's constitution and bylaws, or as may be prescribed by the board of directors. In the event of a vacancy in the office of the president, the vice president shall assume the office and title of president during the unexpired term of the president.

Section 4. Duties of the Secretary. The secretary shall:

Maintain or cause to be maintained the membership records of the organization.

Record the attendance at meetings of the board of directors and the Executive Committee.

Record and preserve the minutes of meetings of the organization, the board of directors, and the Executive Committee, including supporting documents.

Record and preserve the records of electronic votes by the board of directors and the Executive Committee.

See that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of the organization's constitution and bylaws or as required by law.

Oversee the conduct of elections in accordance with the organization's constitution and bylaws.

Perform all duties incident to the office of secretary and such other duties as may be required by law, by the articles of incorporation, or by the organization's constitution and bylaws, or which may be assigned to him or her from time to time by the board of directors.

Upon leaving office, the secretary shall turn over to his or her successor or to the president all minutes, records, and any other organization property in the secretary's possession.

Section 5. Duties of the Treasurer. The treasurer shall:

Have overall responsibility for all funds and securities of the organization, and deposit, or cause to be deposited, all such funds in the name of the organization in the banks, trust companies, or other depositories selected by the board of directors.

Receive or direct the receipt of any monies due and payable to the organization.

Disburse, or cause to be disbursed, the funds of the organization as may be directed by the board of directors.

Keep and maintain, or cause to be kept and maintained, adequate and correct accounts of the organization's properties and business transactions, including accounts of its assets, liabilities, receipts, disbursements, gains, and losses.

Report on the financial condition of the organization at regular meetings of the organization, at regular meetings of the board of directors and the Executive Committee, and at other times as directed by the president or board of directors. Such reports may include the available balances in the corporation's accounts, the status of the corporation's Endowment Fund, reports of income and expenditures for the year to date as compared with the organization's budget, and any other reports deemed necessary by the treasurer, the president, or the board of directors.

Render to the president and board of directors, whenever requested, an account of any or all of his or her transactions as treasurer.

Prepare, or cause to be prepared, and certify, or cause to be certified, the financial statements to be included in any required reports.

In general, perform all duties incident to the office of treasurer and such other duties as may be required by law, by the articles of incorporation, by the organization's constitution and bylaws, or which may be assigned to him or her from time to time by the board of directors.

Upon leaving office, the treasurer shall turn over to his or her successor or to the president all funds, books and accounts, and any other organization property in the treasurer's possession.

Section 6. Compensation. All officers shall serve without compensation.

Article III—Organization Policies

Section 1. The organization shall have, and the board of directors shall enforce, a Code of Ethics. The board of directors may amend the Code of Ethics as needed.

Section 2. The organization shall have, and the board of directors shall enforce, a nondiscrimination policy. The board of directors may amend the nondiscrimination policy as needed.

Section 3. The organization shall have, and the board of directors shall enforce, a conflict-of-interest policy. The board of directors may amend the conflict-of-interest policy as needed.

Section 4. The board of directors may adopt and enforce other policies as needed for the proper operation of the organization and the museum.

Article IV—Membership

Section 1. Classes of Membership. The term “member” as used in these bylaws shall include all classes of members unless the specific class of membership is indicated in the reference to “member.”

Section 2. Voting Members. Any adult, age 18 or over, is eligible to become a voting member of the organization upon payment of the prescribed voting fee and yearly dues.

Section 3. Associate Members. Any person may become an associate member of the organization upon payment of the prescribed yearly dues. Associate members are not permitted to vote or hold elective office.

Section 4. Distinguished Members. Members of the organization may be recognized as Distinguished Members in accordance with policies adopted by the board of directors. Distinguished Members retain their existing rights and privileges of membership but are not required to pay dues to the organization.

Section 5. Honorary Members. Non-members of the organization may be recognized as Honorary Members in accordance with policies adopted by the board of directors. The rights and privileges of Honorary Members shall be as set forth in such policies.

Section 6. Members of the organization shall have no interest in the funds or property of the organization.

Section 7. Dues and Voting Fee. The membership dues and voting fee shall be determined by the board of directors. The voting fee shall not be less than \$25. All dues and fees shall be payable when billed.

Section 8. Termination of Membership.

(a) A member may resign by delivering a written resignation to the president or secretary. A written resignation includes a resignation received through authorized communication equipment, including but not limited to electronic mail.

(b) A member who is in arrears more than thirty (30) days in the payment of his or her dues shall be dropped from the active membership roll and lose all rights and privileges of membership.

(c) A member whose membership has been terminated under subdivisions (a) and (b), above, may rejoin the organization by paying the yearly membership dues and, if applicable, the voting fee. If the rejoining member was a voting member, the member is not required to pay an additional voting fee to rejoin as a voting member.

(d) A member who violates the principles or ethics of the organization or engages in other misconduct detrimental to the organization, including but not limited to violations of the nondiscrimination or conflict of interest policy or the Code of Ethics, may be expelled from membership by a two-thirds vote of the board of directors. In its sole discretion, the board of directors, by a two-thirds vote, may impose a suspension of membership, censure, or other lesser sanction. The member shall be given ten days’ written notice of the proposed action together with a copy of the complaint against him or her. The member shall be given an opportunity to respond to the complaint before any action is taken. A member who has been expelled may be reinstated by a two-thirds vote of the board of directors.

Article V—Meetings of the Membership

Section 1. Regular meetings of the organization’s membership shall be held at least two times per year at such times and places as the board of directors shall designate.

Section 2. The regular meeting designated as the annual meeting shall be held at the organization's annual convention for the election and installation of directors and for the presentation of annual reports and transaction of other business.

Section 3. Special meetings of the organization's membership may be called by the president or by a majority of the board of directors upon regular written notice to the secretary at least ten (10) days in advance of said meeting. Written notice may be given by authorized electronic equipment, including but not limited to electronic mail.

Section 4. Notice of regular meetings of the organization's membership shall be given to the organization's members of record no fewer than ten (10) days and no more than sixty (60) days before the date of the meeting. Notice may be given by publication in the organization's newsletter, by authorized electronic equipment, including but not limited to electronic mail, by United States Mail, or by any or all of these methods.

Section 5. The board of directors may establish procedures for members to attend meetings of the organization's members by the use of authorized communications equipment.

Section 6. The majority of voting members present, including by the use of authorized communications equipment (if used), shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the membership.

Section 7. In the event of a public health emergency, natural disaster, or other emergency declared by the appropriate governmental authorities, the board of directors may dispense with in-person meetings and establish procedures for members to attend meetings of the organization's members by the use of authorized communications equipment for the duration of the emergency.

Section 8. Except as otherwise provided by the organization's constitution and bylaws or the applicable law, parliamentary procedure in the conduct of meetings of the organization's membership shall be in accordance with the latest revised edition of *Robert's Rules of Order*.

Article VI—Committees

Section 1. Executive Committee. The organization shall have an Executive Committee consisting of the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Immediate Past President. The Immediate Past President must be a voting member of the organization in good standing but is not required to be a member of the board of directors. The Immediate Past President shall have voting privileges on matters coming before the Executive Committee. If the Immediate Past President cannot serve or chooses not to serve, a member of the board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the board of directors to serve as a member-at-large. Vacancies on the Executive Committee shall be filled by a majority vote of the board of directors.

The Executive Committee shall meet monthly and at other times as called by the president.

The Executive Committee shall exercise such authority as is granted to it by the board of directors. The Executive Committee may act only between regular meetings of the board of directors and is subject to the direction and control of the board of directors.

The Executive Committee shall be informed of matters affecting the management of the organization that arise between meetings of the Board of Directors and shall make recommendations regarding such matters to the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee may refer such matters to a standing or special committee for further study and their recommendations to the entire Board. The Executive Committee shall promptly inform the Board of any matters that require action by the Board before the next regular meeting of the Board and the Executive Committee's recommendations, if any, regarding such matters.

Section 2. Standing Committees. The organization shall have the following standing committees:

Membership
Projects

Budget and Finance
Publicity
Convention
Fundraising

Section 3. Duties of Standing Committees. The standing committees shall have the following duties and such additional duties as may be assigned by the president from time to time.

- a) **Membership Committee.** The Membership Committee shall address matters associated with organization membership and report observations and recommendations to the board of directors as the committee may deem appropriate.
- b) **Projects Committee.** The Projects Committee shall devise and/or consider projects that further the aims and objectives of the organization and make recommendations to the board of directors as the committee may deem appropriate. The Projects Committee shall coordinate with study clubs to avoid duplicate projects.
- c) **Budget and Finance Committee.** The Budget and Finance Committee shall address matters related to the budget and business practices of the organization and the museum and report observations and recommendations to the board of directors as the committee may deem appropriate.
- d) **Publicity Committee.** The Publicity Committee shall address matters related to the organization's public relations including the use of traditional news media, social media, and other means and report observations and recommendations to the board of directors as the committee may deem appropriate.
- e) **Convention Committee.** The Convention Committee shall have responsibility for planning and overseeing implementation of the activities conducted during the organization's annual convention.
- f) **Fundraising Committee.** The Fundraising Committee is responsible for planning, organizing, and overseeing efforts to secure financial support for the organization through various fundraising activities. The committee works closely with the Board of Directors and museum staff to ensure that financial goals are met and the organization's financial stability is supported.

Section 4. Special and Ad Hoc Committees. The president may establish special and *ad hoc* committees. *Ad hoc* committees may be established only for a limited purpose and for a limited time.

Section 5. Appointment of Committee Members. The president shall appoint the members of all committees except the Executive Committee. The president shall be an *ex officio* member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Article VII Election of Directors

Section 1. The directors of the organization shall be elected at the annual meeting.

Section 2. The President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of at least three members. The chair shall be the Immediate Past President. If the Immediate Past President cannot serve, the chair shall be another member of the Executive Committee, other than the President.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a report stating the number of directors to be elected and nominating one or more candidates for each vacancy.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee shall submit its report at the first regular membership meeting of the calendar year. Any voting member may nominate additional candidates for director.

Section 5. The consent of each candidate must be obtained prior to his or her nomination.

Section 6. A ballot and instructions for voting shall be sent by United States Mail to each voting member and the secretary of each study club that is qualified to vote as provided in Article IX. The ballot shall contain the names of the candidates for directors and any other matters submitted to a vote of the membership. Each voter shall indicate his or her

choices and return the ballot to the secretary or his or her designee in accordance with the instructions. The secretary shall establish procedures to ensure a secret ballot.

Section 7. In lieu of voting by mail as provided in Section 6, above, voting members and representatives of qualified study clubs may elect to vote in person at the annual meeting.

Section 8. The board of directors may authorize the use of a secure method of electronic voting in lieu of or in addition to voting in person or by mail or both.

Section 9. In the event of a public health emergency, natural disaster, or other emergency declared by the appropriate governmental authorities, the board of directors may dispense with in-person voting and conduct the election using voting by mail or electronic voting (if available) or both.

Section 10. The candidates receiving the largest number of votes so cast shall be declared elected for the term of office beginning immediately following the annual meeting. A candidate must receive at least one vote to be elected. The presiding officer shall abstain from voting except to break a tie vote.

Article VIII—Organization Staff

Section 1. The board of directors may employ a paid Executive Director(s), who shall serve at the pleasure of the board. The hiring and, if necessary, the firing of the Executive Director(s) must be approved by a two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote of the board.

Section 2. The Executive Director(s) will oversee the daily operations of the organization and the museum, ensuring compliance with the organization's constitution and bylaws, board-approved policies and procedures, job descriptions, and applicable laws.

Section 3. The board, in consultation with the Executive Director(s), shall approve the creation of and reorganization of the staff positions, and job descriptions for, any additional staff positions deemed necessary for the proper operation of the organization and the museum. The Executive Director(s) shall have the authority to hire and fire staff employees without the prior approval of the board.

Section 4. The board shall set the compensation for each staff position, including the Executive Director(s). The board, in consultation with the Executive Director(s), shall review the compensation for each staff position at least once annually. The board of directors will perform an annual review of the Executive Director(s) prior to contract renewal or compensation review.

Article IX—Study Clubs

Section 1. The organization shall issue a charter to any study club that meets the following requirements:

- (a) All members of the club are members of the organization.
- (b) The club pays a charter fee of \$25.
- (c) The club submits a membership list to the secretary no later than May 1 of each year.
- (d) The club has at least eight (8) members.
- (e) The club's written bylaws have been approved by the organization's board of directors.

Section 2. A chartered study club that meets the requirements stated in section 1, above, is eligible to cast one vote in the organization's elections. The club's vote shall be cast by a member of the club who is 18 years of age or older.

Section 3. A study club's charter shall remain in force provided a membership list is submitted to the secretary by May 1 of each year that verifies that the club continues to have at least eight members and that all the club's members are members of the organization.

Section 4. In the event a chartered study club is dropped from the rolls, it may be reinstated by satisfying the requirements stated in section 1, above, except for payment of the \$25 fee.

Article X—Resolutions and Assessments

Section 1. Any resolution or motion to commit the organization on any matter that is offered at a meeting of the organization's members shall be referred, without discussion, to the board. After considering the matter, the board shall take action on the resolution or motion. The board's decision shall be final, except that members shall have the right to seek reconsideration by the board.

Recommendations by twelve or more voting members to amend the bylaws as provided in Article XI may be presented at meetings of the membership. Voting on such recommendations shall be conducted as provided in Article XI.

Section 2. Except as provided in this section, no assessments shall be permitted to be placed upon the membership of the organization, nor shall any person or organization be permitted to appeal for funds for any purpose whatsoever before a regular meeting of the organization. With the permission of the president, chartered study clubs and members of the organization may seek support for fundraising projects and events for the benefit of the organization.

Article XI—Amendment of Bylaws

Section 1. These bylaws may be amended after a recommendation of the board of directors or a recommendation of any twelve voting members, followed by a vote of the voting members and study clubs that are qualified to vote as provided in Article IX. The board of directors shall decline to place on the ballot any proposed amendment that would violate the organization's constitution or applicable law.

Section 2. Written notice of the proposed amendment shall be given to all voting members and qualified study clubs at least ten (10) calendar days before the mailing of ballots. Such written notice shall include the text of the proposed amendment or amendments and may be given by publication in the official newsletter of the organization, by authorized electronic equipment, including but not limited to electronic mail, by United States Mail, or by any or all of these methods

Section 3. Proposed amendments may be voted on at any regular meeting of the membership. Any amendment must be approved by a majority of the votes cast on the proposed amendment. The vote on any proposed amendment will be conducted in the manner provided in Sections 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article VII.

If a proposed amendment requires amendments to both the constitution and the bylaws, a two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) majority of the votes cast is required for passage.

Section 4. If competing amendments are submitted to a vote of the membership and both receive sufficient votes for passage, the amendment receiving the greater number of votes shall be adopted. In the event of a tie vote, both proposed amendments shall fail.

Section 5. Amendments to these bylaws must be consistent with the organization's constitution. Any amendment to the bylaws that is inconsistent with the constitution shall have no force or effect. ♦

sandblasting, carved glass, and polishing. Heisey was always looking for something that would set its products apart from the other glass companies. One method used was glass decorations. The primary method of glass decorating was etching, which usually involved the glass item submerged in an acid bath for varying periods of time. There were different types of etching with their own name and numbering system. These included needle etch 1-53 then 9069-9072, pantograph etch 100-200, plate etch 300-500, double plate etch, silhouette etch, intaglio, engraving, sandblasting, matte etching, carved glass, and polishing. Needle etching was the simplest form and involves the placement of a pre-arranged pattern on a piece of glass. The pantograph etching was somewhat more complicated than needle etching. It was more elaborate and slightly more expensive to produce yet it was still a mass-produced type.

The most popular of the acid-type decorations was plate etching. It was more elaborate than previous methods and permitted unlimited artistry. Double plate etchings were so named because two plates and two etching processes were required to make them. These were sometimes referred to as cameo etchings. Silhouette etching was a new process which was an innovation in producing silhouette etchings without first having the design molded into the glass. Intaglio was an embellishment created by carving or cutting below the surface of the glass so the elevation of the designs were hollowed out and an impression made from it creating an image in relief. Engraving was a style of embellishment involving a wheel of copper or steel, which was held against the glass while spinning and a design was cut into the glass. The wheel was aided by an abrasive such as pumice and linseed oil.

Sandblasting was a method of embellishing glass with fine grains of sand, crushed flint or powdered iron blasted at high velocity onto the surface. Matte etching was a process where by the surface to be frosted was subjected to a weak acid solution for a short period of time in order to produce a light matte finish. Carved glass was any glass that had been embellished by any of the above-mentioned techniques. Polishing was completed by the decorating department after the glass item is completed.

Among the noted Heisey engravers were Emil Krall, Willibald Krall, Oscar Krall, Anton Krall, Emil Krall Jr., Max Seidel, Walter Gray, Mark Pickrel, Joseph Wharton, and William R. Groves.

Show and Tell presentation was next. Jaime Robinson showed the No. 1567 Plantation candy box with No. 516 Plantation Ivy etch, No. 1951 Cabochon candy box with Ivy etch, No. 1509 Queen Ann cup and saucer and iced tea with No. 501 Belle Le Rose etching, No. 1567 Plantation goblet with No. 1038 Pine cutting, No. 1401 Empress oval compote and cake plate with No. 861 Neapolitan cutting, Heisey cake plate with Neapolitan cutting and No. 5010 Symphone stemware with No. 502 Crinoline etching. Carolyn Loar showed Heisey No. 479 Petal Footed creamer and open sugar in Flamingo, Imperial No. 1590 Zodiac double light candlestick, and No. 4052 National Bar Glass with No. 467 Tally Ho etch.

Mystery gift was won by Kelly Adams. It was a beautiful No. 160 Locket On Chain compote furnished by Robert Moreno. ♦

The Encyclopaedia of Heisey Glassware Volume I: Etchings and Carvings mentions that plates have been found with the Diamond H that have this etch, but a US Glass (Tiffin) advertisement of the etch seems to confirm it is not a Heisey etch. Other members noted that some etches were done by decorating companies on blanks bought from different glass companies like Olympus or Bubble Girl which is found on pink glassware from Fry, Cambridge and Heisey. It is unlikely that glass companies shared their etching plates with other companies, so the etch is probably not a Heisey etch even if it is found on a Heisey item.

The meeting concluded with a White Elephant lottery presentation by David and Dan who used it as an opportunity to part with items before the move. Heisey glass paired with other goodies such as chocolates, spices, candies, little two oz. liquors and more were wrapped as Christmas gifts. Members chose a gift in turn and could steal an already opened gift instead of making a choice. It was a fun and exciting way to conclude our meeting.
